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# Nelson's No. 1 Hens To Meet Bucknell In Saturday Finale For Unbeaten Season

LEWISBURG, Pa. — Delaware's No. 1 small college team in the nation, the Blue Hens, will meet Bucknell in a Saturday finale for an unbeaten season. The Blue Hens, who have won 11 of 12 games, will face the Blue Hens in a game that could be the top small college game in the East this season.

Coach Dave Nelson's Delaware team can clinch the Middle Atlantic Conference championship for the second straight year with a victory, and a Blue Hen win would also virtually wrap up the Eastern and national small college titles.

On the other hand, Bucknell can gain a share of the MAC title with a victory, and an upset decision over the Blue Hens would almost certainly raise the value of Bison stock in the final Lambert Cup balloting.

Bucknell's upset hopes will be riding largely on the aerial combination of Senior Quarterback Dan Rodgers and Soph End Tom Mitchell. Rodgers was named to the ECAC team of the week for the third time this season last Saturday as he led the Bisons to a 32-14 victory over Lehigh. The stocky right hander completed 15 of 21 passes for 147 yards and three touchdowns against the Engineers, and Mitchell caught six of the strikes to set a season receiving record.

The season finale for both teams, Saturday's game is expected to draw a crowd of over 10,000 people to Memorial Stadium.

Delaware finished its 1963 season with a 12-0 record, and won its 12th straight game last Saturday by defeating improved Rutgers 14-3 at New Brunswick, N. J.

Coach Dave Nelson's 96th career win didn't come easy, as the fired-up Scarlet Knights battled Delaware to the finish. Only the great running of Mike Brown, two goal-line stands, and some alert defensive work offset a Rutgers statistical lead.

Brown, 250-pound senior halfback from Wilmington, was superb in his latest bid for Little All-America honors. He gained 114 yards in 19 carries, and almost singlehandedly drove the Blue Hens to the first touchdown, which Brown scored himself.

For the first time since mid-1962, the Hens found themselves behind in a football game as Rutgers' Jack Hohnstine kicked a 32-yard field goal with 4:46 gone in the first period. A Delaware fumble at the Hen 29-yard line gave the Knights their scoring chance.

Delaware quickly went ahead to play, however, beginning a drive from its own 18.

Brown carried four times for 62 yards, earning the sensational show with a 29-yard TD romp over right tackle with 8:15 remaining in the opening quarter.

John Osborn, senior placekicking specialist from Normandy Beach, N. J., kicked the first of his two extra points.

The Knights fought back, sustaining a drive from the Delaware 33 to the 16 as the second quarter began. The Knights couldn't get across, though, winding up with the ball lost on downs at the Hen 20.

Rutgers' next drive was from the Hen 25 to the two, where a fourth-and-one situation tested the nerves of both teams and the 16,000 fans in attendance.

A scorching tackle by Walt Higgins, 196-pound junior guard from Larchmont, N. Y., brought Knight Fullback Don Viggiano down in his tracks and took the Hens out of their trouble. The Knights never got as close again.

Delaware's 7-3 halftime lead marked the 21st consecutive time Nelson's club has led at intermission since mid-1961.

The clutching touchdown was scored on Delaware's first drive of the second half.

With Brown again picking up the big yardage, Delaware moved from the Rutgers 37 after Joe Slobogian, senior halfback of Glenside, Pa., recovered a Knight fumble.

Brown set up the score with a 60-yard dash to the one-foot line from which point Mike McCrann, powerful sophomore fullback from Amityville, L. I., bulled across for this third short-yardage TD in as many tries this season.

Osborn kicked the point with 6:18 gone in the period.

It was a defensive battle after that. The game ended with Rutgers on the Hen 22-yard line.

## Mike Brown Wins All-East Selection As For At Rutgers

Another brilliant performance against major college opposition has earned Mike Brown, halfback for Coach Dave Nelson's unbeaten Delaware Blue Hens, selection to this week's Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference All-East college division team in pressbox polls.

With Delaware trailing Rutgers 3-0, Brown carried four times for 62 yards, including a 29-yard scoring run, to put the Blue Hens ahead to stay.

In all, he picked up 114 yards on 19 carries in the 14-3 victory.

Two teammates, Guard Walt Higgins and Fullback Mike McCrann, the latter a sophomore, received ECAC honorable mention this week.

At home, Coach Bob Hoffman's Yellowjackets are leading the Blue Hen Conference with a 7-1 record after last Saturday's 21-0 win over Delaware. ## Care in Selection Of Yuletide Gifts Advised By Expert

Christmas is only a few weeks away, and whether you buy your Christmas gifts or make them yourself, this is the time to start.

Gifts of clothing are always popular — but choose them carefully so recipients won't have to exchange them after Christmas for something more suitable, urges Janet Reed, clothing specialist at the University of Delaware.

She says that without realizing it, many people choose items they would like to have themselves rather than carefully deciding what would be most suitable for the recipient.

Miss Reed suggests keeping an up-to-date list of sizes and color preferences for each person.

When selecting the gift, keep in mind the recipient's taste.

You can save a lot of time—and tired feet—by having a good idea of the items you want to get before you start shopping, Miss Reed says.

She also recommends shopping early in the day, if possible before you are too tired, and before the stores become crowded.

Go shopping alone, she says, so there's no one to influence you in your decisions.

Many people prefer to make some or all of the gifts they give — and these items are often appreciated much more than a gift you might buy, Miss Reed points out. But if you are going to spend the time and effort to make something, be sure it is an item the recipient can use and will appreciate.

You may enjoy crocheting a little girl's dress, she says, but when crocheted dresses aren't in style, this would be a poor choice, and perhaps a set of doll clothes would be a more suitable gift.

Other hand-made gifts that are fun to make and to receive are stuffed animals for children or teenagers. These can be made from terry cloth, washable velvet or corduroy, gingham, washable acrylic or imitation fur fabrics.

They should be stuffed with a washable filling, and all trimmings should be firmly attached so a young child cannot pull them off and swallow them.

Whatever gifts you make, be sure they are items you will be able to finish at least several days before Christmas, so you won't have to sit up half Christmas Eve sewing final touches," she cautions.

Fortunately, powdery mildew will rarely kill lawn grasses, although it may seriously weaken them.

The disease can be effectively checked by chemical controls applied as soon as symptoms appear.

Fungicides available for this purpose include Karathane, Actidione PM and wettable sulfur.
