The Duty of the Newspaper

It happens not infrequently that the newspapers print reports of happenings against the wishes of persons concerned therein, and, sometimes, against the wishes of the editors and publishers themselves. Indiscretions and thoughtless pranks sometimes bring distasteful notoriety to persons who normally are of good repute. Naturally the publication of such occurrences is not pleasing, either to the persons directly concerned, or to others who are interested in them.

When such incidents are trifling especially when such

When such incidents are trifling, especially where youthful offenders are concerned, the newspapers often voluntarily make no mention of them, with the hope that the guilty parties have learned a lesson and will not offend again. But when there is actual violation of law, or when public attention has already been drawn to the incident, the newspapers cannot omit publication of such occurrences.

occurrences.

The newspapers, it may be well to point out, do not make news. It is their business, however, to print the news that is made by others, and when they fail to do so they are lax in their duty to the public. That is why, if we want to be fair with ourselves and our readers, we find it necessary to decline requests, often received, to refrain from printing what are legitimate items of news.


