CUT IN TRANSIT SERVICE!

Due to the critical shortage of gasoline, the Office of Defense Transportation has ordered an immediate reduction of 20 per cent in gasoline bus mileage.

The Order issued by the Office of Defense Transportation dated May 27, 1943, provides: "No person shall, during any calendar week, operate in the area in which this order is applicable a greater number of motor vehicle miles than eighty (80) per cent of the total motor vehicle miles operated by such person in such area during the week ending May 22, 1943."

To make this reduction possible it is necessary to revise the schedules on gas bus and trolley coach lines. The reason for changing the trolley coach schedules is that because of the heavy traffic, gasoline buses have been used to supplement the service on certain trolley coach lines.

Every gallon of gasoline saved will help the fighting men to bring the war to an end more quickly. We know the public will understand that service to war work-ers must come first and we believe that you will cheerfully accept the temporary changes it is necessary to put into effect. Your cooperation will be most appreciated in helping us to carry out our war time responsibilities.

The following CHANGES IN SCHEDULES will become EFFECTIVE TUESDAY, JUNE 1, 1943:

DELAWARE AVENUE

Week Days—During the morning and evening rush periods every other coach will turn back at Woodlawn Avenue.
