Last Of Sabin Oral Vaccine To Be Administered on Sunday

Third, Final Stage In Immunization Program Offered At Newark High School From 1 To 6 p.m. This Sunday With State-Wide Effort To Wipe Out Threat Of Polio

The third and last dose of Sabin Oral Vaccine will be given to the public this Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m. at Newark High School, Dr. Floyd L. Hudson, executive secretary of the Delaware State Board of Health, announced today.

"The Type II vaccine may also be taken by those persons who missed the first two doses," Dr. Hudson said.

The public is reminded that this mass immunization

program with Sabin Oral Vaccine is being conducted by the Medical Department of the State Board of Health, and the national chapters of the American Red Cross and the National League of Nursing.

Immunization Hope
The vaccine is said to be measured in terms of effectiveness in preventing polio. We are told that the immunization given to the public will be the same as that given to the children of the State.

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Theatre Scheduled By Pomeroy Firm At Newark Center

Motion Picture Theatre Construction To Begin In June For Fall Opening

Newark's first new motion picture theatre in several decades will be built at the Newark Shopping Center, Pomeroy Realty, Inc. officials, owners of the shopping center, announced that construction will begin next month and is expected to be completed by early fall.

The new theatre will be operated by Eastern Shore Theatre Co., along with six others, operated by owners Muriel Schwartz and Mrs. Reba Schwartz, in Dover, Smyrna, Middletown, Delmar and Elkton.

The Schwartz family has been in the theatre business for generations, and through Mrs. Schwartz, is allied with the Tropicana family which has owned and operated theatres in Wilmington.

A policy of quality programming has been announced for the new theatre by Eastern Shore.

Included in the design by architect Richard P. Fox of Newark will be several innovations in theatre construction, foremost of which will be special seating areas in the orchestra equipped with audiophones for convenience of patrons with hearing problems.

In addition, there will be a special room for private theatre parties separated from the main auditorium by a thermopane window and provided with its own sound system.

The building will be air conditioned and climate control as well as the most modern sound equipment will be provided.

The shopping center site will assure convenient free parking.

Contractor for the new theatre which will seat 600 patrons is Frederick G. Kraft & Son of Wilmington. The theatre will be located at the northwest corner of the Newark Shopping Center.

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William P. Cooke, Fred E. Williams Seek School Board Election In Saturday Vote

Polls will be open at each school site throughout the Newark district this Saturday from 2 to 9 p.m. for the election of one of two candidates for a four-year term as a member of the local board of education.

All citizens over 21 who have resided in the Newark district for 30 days; within the county for 90 days; and in the State of Delaware for one year are eligible to vote in this special election.

Polls will be conducted at all school building offices with the exception of the Central schools where voting will take place in the bus waiting room between the buildings, and at the Jennie E. Smith and Ogletown Junior High schools where polls will be set up in the Smith School entrance hall.

William P. Cooke, a DuPont chemist and development representative, and president of the Newark Board of Education, is seeking reelection to the board with the expiration of his current term. A Harvard graduate, he resides with his wife and two daughters at 17 Kensington Lane, Brookside.

Cooke is opposed by Fred E. Williams, a research chemist with the Hercules Powder Company.

"We already have a good district, with every potential of becoming a top-quality district," Cooke declared. "We have already put into effect some of the administrative changes recommended to us by a team of consultants last summer."

"I feel the people of the district can afford this program. The question is, will they be willing to pay for it? I think that the top job of the school board is to sell the public on the benefits to be derived from increased expenditures for education."

A graduate of Franklin and Marshall College with a BS in chemistry, Williams received his master's at the University of Cincinnati, and his doctorate at Penn State.

A resident of the Newark district since 1948, Williams is vice-president of the Junior-Senior High PTA, and resides with his wife and son at 717 Nottingham Road.

Other members of the Newark school board are Mrs. John A. Munroe, Alan D. Duff, and Martin J. Gauger.

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Reduced Airline Service Cited As Danger To Newark Growth

Curtailment Of Commercial Airline Service Reported By Ross Anderson, Jr., State C. of C. Vice-President, As Deterrent To Newark's Growth As Industrial Site

Newark's industrial growth will be jeopardized if the state's only commercial airline service is curtailed or eliminated, an official of the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce said this week.

Ross E. Anderson, Jr., executive vice-president of the Chamber, said that a move by Allegheny Airlines to reduce service to the Greater Wilmington Airport can have only a

negative effect on Newark's attraction as a site for new industry.

The Greater Wilmington Airport is the only airport in the state served by commercial airlines, and Anderson said that the Allegheny move could lead to discontinuance of commercial passenger service there.

Earlier this week, G. Ray Borton, chairman of the airport commission, stated that the airport is petitioning the Civil Aeronautics Board to require Allegheny to restore east-west service between Wilmington and Pittsburgh and to restore northbound flights to Boston.

Pittsburgh Flight Lost
Last March 27, CAB announced an investigation of east-west service to determine if there was sufficient need to warrant federal subsidization of service. Six days later, without waiting for the Board's determination, Allegheny filed a scheduled change which discontinued the Pittsburgh flight as of May 1.

Anderson said that every town in the state has a despondent interest in the CAB decision affecting the Greater Wilmington Airport.

Flight Factor
"There are a number of factors which industries consider in the selection of new sites," he said. "One of the important factors is air transportation. In some cases, air transportation is the principal factor."

He pointed out that if the Salisbury (Md.) airport should lose its commercial status, the Greater Wilmington Airport would be the only one with commercial airline service on the entire Delmarva Peninsula.

"The entire state of Delaware, and possibly Pennsylvania, would be at a disadvantage if the Salisbury airport service is discontinued," he said. "It is important that citizens of Delaware . . . in every corner of our state . . . express their concern over this situation."

"I would like to invite all interested Delawareans to write to the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce, Inc., 1112 King Street, Wilmington, and state their views on this keeping air service in Delaware," Anderson concluded.

Whatever your age, your life expectancy is greater today than it ever has been. In the first fifty years of this century, life expectancy for men has increased 17.6 years...

In 1962, the various yearling
auctions saw 2,244 young
Thoroughbreds sold for a total
of \$12,544,800. An even busier,
though less publicized market
for race horses is the claim
box in the racing secretary's
office. The purpose of the
claiming race is not to market
horses, however. It is a method
of grading the *hot* *pot* of
horses. The owner, in
effect, puts a price on his
horse and risks losing him.
Among older horses one can
be fairly certain that a horse
entered to be claimed for
\$2,500 is worth just about
that. Some rare bargains do
come out of the claim box
however. Two years ago, at
Aquia Caliente, Mrs. Paula
Hunt took a fancy to a 3-year-
old maiden named Crazy Kid
and claimed him for \$2,750.

Crazy Kid went on to win five
straight races for his new
owner, and last summer at
Del Mar, California, he moved
into stakes competition and
set a new world record in
winning a division of the
Bing Crosby Handicap, named
for one of the founders of
Del Mar. In all, Crazy Kid has
won 10 races for Mrs. Hunt
and earned \$71,000. At the
present time, only an owner
who has started a horse at
the meeting may make a
claim, but The National As-
sociation of State Racing Com-
missioners is considering a
proposal, made at the 1962
Annual meeting of Thorough-
bred Racing Associations,
which would permit anyone to
make a claim, once he had
established his character and
financial security with the
Racing Commission.

For a succession of bloom, plant the corms at two-week intervals from now until the end of June.
