

Improvement Made To Delaware Oyster Beds

Approximately 575,000 bushels of seed Approximately 5/5,000 business of seed oysters were taken from Delaware Bay in the 38-day season set aside by the Delaware Commission of Shell Fish-eries from May 1 to June 6, and ap-proximately 75 per cent of these oysters were planted in Delaware Bay

oyster-bed areas, according to the commission's annual report submitted to Gov. Walter W. Bacon. The report also stated that the com-mission believes that the work done on Plogger Bed last year, along with cer-tain restrictions made by the com-mission, will result in an at least 25 per cent improvement in the condition of the beds at the season's opening next year.

The commission's report mentioned the purchase of 25,000 busitels of oyster shells to be planted in the buy to cath growth of small oysters, and planting of 150,000 bushels of oysters in Re-boboth Bay during the past year.
