Fix the FOIA laws

t's a classic do-as-I-saynot-as-I-do.

The State General Assembly a long time ago passed a law applying the Freedom of Information Act to all city and town councils, school boards and other public - only it decided to leave itself out of the law.

Currently, however, there

is a bit of a push to change that.

Several attempts have been made over the last few years restructure the law but they haven't been very successful Valania and nothing has happened. This



year's effort seems to have a bit more steam.

There was a Freedom Information Forum Wednesday night hosted by the New Castle City Council. The forum's organizers hoped to bring attention to the matter and support for having the law changed to include the General Assembly.

It's really no wonder that there has been a steady increase of FOIA violations by various public bodies over the last couple of years.

Look at the example they

If the General Assembly doesn't have to abide by the law, why should any other organization?

The General Assembly's exemption from the law sends a clear message to every other public body that it's not really necessary to be completely transparent to the public and that they should do everything they can to keep things secret. After all, that's what

Newark's Jeanne Jugan Residence has served elderly poor for 30 years

ister Marie Jeanne will correct you if you mistakenly refer to the elderly who live at Jeanne Jugan Residence as

They're residents, she makes clear. More than that, they're family – and, at Jeanne Jugan, they're home.

"This is a family here. It's not a nursing home. It's a home for the elderly," she said.

For 30 years, the Little Sisters of the Poor have fostered a home for Delmarva's elderly of low income at their Newark location on Salem Church Road. Before that, the Little Sisters worked out of a home in Wilmington, which opened in 1903.

The Jeanne Jugan legacy goes back to the 1800s when Jugan, a French woman, opened her home to a blind elderly woman one winter's night. Soon, another woman came, then a third. A few years later, Jugan and three young companions were caring for 40 persons. To provide for their needs, she walked the roads of France seeking alms.

The Newark-based Little Sisters oper-

Delaware has free GED classes available through **Groves High School**

n recent months, Delaware's Department of Education has received numerous calls from students and parents with questions regarding high school diplomas, GED (General Equivalent Development) certificates and college diploma offers from questionable sources.

"I urge anyone who is looking at completing requirements for a high school diploma," said Delaware Secretary of Education Valerie A. Woodruff, "other than by graduating from a traditional public high school or a well established local non-public high school, to be extramely equations in selection to be extremely cautious in selecting

Victim robbed at gunpoint in Fairfield Apartments

A 20-year-old resident of an apartment in the Fairfield Apartment complex reported an armed robbery to Newark Police on Sunday, Dec. 2, at 6:41 a.m.

The victim said, when he returned home from work, he was approached by three unknown black males. The suspects forced him to the ground at gunpoint, and then removed an undisclosed amount of money and property from him, said police.

The suspects struck the victim several times prior to fleeing the apartment building in an unknown direction. The victim was not injured during the robbery, said police.

The first suspect is described as a black male, 19 to 20 years old and six feet tall, wearing a black hooded sweatshirt, gloves and a black ski mask. He carried a silver semiautomatic handgun, said police. The suspect had two upper front teeth protruding and a noticeable gap between them, police were told.

The second suspect is described as a black male wearing a gray hooded sweatshirt, gloves and a mask. He carried a handgun of an unknown make and model.

NHS student charged with drug offenses

n 18-year-old student at Newark High School was arrested and charged with cocaine possession and intent to deliver cocaine after an officer found him to be in possession of 10 rocks of crack cocaine near school property last week, said Newark Police.

Police said an employee of

the high school saw two students leave the school without permission around 10:50 a.m. on Thursday, Nov. 29. The School Resource Officer was notified and went to look for the truant students, said police.

The officer located them on Delaware Avenue, about a block from the school. One of the students, Troy Dale, 18, of the 1000 block of Bennet Street in Wilmington, was found in possession of 10 rocks of crack cocaine, each individually packaged as if ready for sale.

The student was arrested and charged with possession, with intent to deliver cocaine and possession of cocaine within 1.000

feet of a school, said police. He was committed to the Young Correctional Facility after failing to post \$6,000 bail. He was also ordered to not be within 1,000 feet of any school in the state of Delaware if he should be released, said police.

Party crasher busts car windows

Uninvited guests asked to leave a party in the 100 block of New London Road took their anger out on four cars parked in a lot nearby, police were told on Saturday, Dec. 1, at 2:18 a.m. Witnesses saw a male suspect use a baseball bat to smash the rear windows of four cars parked in the lot, said police. The suspect and his friends then fled by car. Investigation will continue.

Jogger knocked to ground, robbed

A 47-year-old Newark man was attacked by a robber while jogging in the rear of the Fairfield Shopping Center on Tuesday, Dec. 4, between 5 p.m. and 5:30 p.m., said Newark Police.

Police said the unknown suspect knocked the jogger to the ground, demanded money and then fled on foot in an unknown direction. The victim was not injured and returned home after the incident, said police.

The suspect is described as a black male, 5'10" to 6', weighing

about 180 pounds. He was wearing a gray-hooded sweat shirt and dark pants, and had braids or dreadlocks protruding from his hat, said police.

Residents warned of scam

The Newark Police Department has been made aware of a scam being sent by fax to city residents. The fraudulent notice makes reference to a true, event, said police, which may cause some receivers to think the offer is authentic. Police warn, however, it is not.

In the document, the sender claims to be the financial advisor and property manager to Morris Thompson who died in an Alaska Airlines plane crash. The sender claims Thompson left more than \$20 million in a bank account in South Africa in an "open beneficiary mandate." The sender offers a percentage of the funds to the recipient of the fax in exchange

for assistance in transferring the money, said police.

Police said Morris Thompson did die in a plane crash, however there is no truth to the allegation that the \$20 million South African account exists. Police called this an example of an advance fee scam. Eventually, people who reply will be asked to send advance fees in the form of cash payment or bank transfer in order to cover taxes, transaction fees, attorney fees and more associated with the account.

Man struck in face with cast

A 24-year-old man told police he was walking with friends in the parking lot behind the Galleria in the unit block of E. Delaware Avenue when an unknown suspect struck him in the face with his hand, which was in a cast, and stole a pizza he had been carrying, on Saturday, Dec. 1, at 2 a.m.

Residents invited to invest in Newark's history

"Histories of Newark: 1758-2008" on sale now

On Dec. 7, from 6 to 9 p.m., Newark residents will get a chance to invest in their history, by visit-ing the open house for "Histories of Newark: 1758-2008" inside the Aetna Fire Hall at Academy Street and Delaware Avenue. The book is hot off the press and several of its authors will be on hand to sign copies of it.

The project includes 76 stories written by 50 different local authors. Some of the stories are short, about a quarter of a page, while others span more than 10 pages of the book.

It was Mayor Vance Funk IIII who had the original idea for the book. When elected in 2004, he sought out friends interested in Newark history, and they began work on a Historic Book

Paul Bauernschmidt from the Delaware Heritage Commission, directed the project; Deborah Haskell, formerly of the Delaware Heritage Commission, served as editor-in-chief; Rebecca Johnson Melvin of UD Library's Special Collections also collaborated on the project. Wallflowers Press, owned by Ray Nichols and Jill Cypher designed the book and took the many photographs for

The finished product is a 288page collector's item with special pages in the back to encourage citizens to start recording their own Newark Stories. It's based on an old Delaware History Book - "Delaware: A Guide to the First State," which was a Federal Works Progress Administration Book conceived during the Depression as an effort to give work to writ-

isa Roberson Hatfield, a Newark native, has been named the new Alderman for the city's Alderman's Court, and will be sworn into the position next Tuesday, Dec. 11.

Hatfield called the opportunity "long time goal," saying she welcomed the chance to work in and for a community her family has been a part of for several generations. "It's a real way to get back into this community," she said of the position.

A city resident and member of the Delaware State Bar, Hatfield (whose maiden name is Roberson) graduated from Newark High School in 1987. She graduated from the University of Delaware,

and received her law degree from the University of Tennessee.

She returned to Newark and began private practice in Elkton, Md. As a solo practitioner, her caseload included family law, juvenile matters, criminal law, contract disputes and general civil matters.

Since July 2000, she has served in the Cecil County, Md., State's Attorneys' Office, gaining experience in preparing and trying a broad variety of criminal cases and advocating for appropriate sentencing.

Hatfield said, as Alderman, she looks forward to viewing criminal law "from a different perspective." While prosecutors

Five State Teachers of Year in 11 years

ount Pleasant Elementary School first grade teacher Courtney Fox was named the 2008 Delaware State Teacher of the Year. She was selected from a pool of candidates representing the state's 19 public school districts.

Fox becomes the fifth state Teacher of the Year from Brandywine School District in 11 years. The District has had more winners than any other school system since the award was first offered in 1965.

"For the first seven years of my teaching career, I honed my skills," said Fox. "I learned how to teach emergent readers the strategies they need to become readers; how to immerse children in the writing process; how to make math the fun and engaging subject it should be; how to engage students in the scientific process; and how to facilitate conversations that extend thinking in all subject areas. Then, I became the mother of two amazing boys. The combination of these experiences has made me the teacher I am today.'

Fox said she tries to treat her students the way she would like teachers to treat her sons. "This forces me to react to children in a way that is always respectful, firm and kind," she said. "When two kids are having trouble settling an argument, I help them develop the strategies they will need to solve the problem if they encounter it again, when a student is having difficulty with a particular skill, I take the time to work with them and develop alternative ways to help them learn, and when I have a few spare minutes, I use that time to just sit with kids, listen to them talk, and get to know about them both as students and as people. The joy, generosity, and

love that radiate from children give me hopes for the future and energizes my spirit. I leave every day excited about the next and am so glad that his is how I have chosen to spend my life. During the school day, and actually long afterward, I think of them as 'my children' and I care about each of them very much!"

Fox is now in her 10th year of teaching, years during which she's established herself as a strong teacher leader.

"Her classroom is a community of learners where each and every child is valued and respected for the contributions they bring to the group as a whole," says Mt. Pleasant principal Joyce Skrobot. "She celebrates the uniqueness and individuality of every child in her class. Room 106 is a place where students grow socially as well as academically, blossoming into independent learners, critical thinkers and problem solvers.

Skrobot said that relationship extends to the parents of her students as well. "She respects parenting styles and provides parents with strategies that they can use at home to help their children become more independent and self-sufficient," said Skrobot. "They marvel at how she brings out the best in their child?

Fox has served on a number of district level committees and provides professional development opportunities for fellow educators through workshops and publications. She began her career in Brandywine School District as a kindergarten teacher at P.S. DuPont Elementary and was later hired as a first grade teacher at Mount Pleasant Elementary School. She earned a bachelor of science degree in elementary and early childhood education and has done master level coursework at the University of Delaware and Fort Hayes University.
In 2003, she earned National

Board Certification as an elementary generalist and earned certification as a gifted and talented teacher in 2004.

Fox comes from a family of educators, including her grandmother, mother, aunts, uncles and brother, who teaches physical education at Mount Pleasant Elementary.

Automatically nominated for the National Teacher of the Year award, Fox earned state honors based on classroom observations, portfolio, and information from her peers. She receives a state grant and numerous other educational grants for use in her classroom, as well as professional development opportunities.

Maple Lane principal wins state honors

ulianne Pecorella, principal of Maple Lane Elementary in Brandywine School District, was named the 2007 Delaware State Elementary Principal of the Year. Pecorella was honored with the award last spring by the Delaware Association of School Administrators.

In 2004, Maple Lane implemented the Balanced Calendar in an effort to reduce summer learning loss and provide additional instructional opportunities for at-risk students. The pro-gram has paid off with DSTP math and reading scores increas-ing dramatically. The Balanced Calendar features a shorter summer break and Intersession periods when at-risk students can get extra help.
In 2003, the year prior to

the inception of the Balanced Calendar, 73 percent of Maple Lane third grade students met or exceeded DSTP standards in math and 72 percent met or exceeded the standards in reading. In 2006, 82 percent met or exceeded the standards in math and 86 percent met or exceeded the standards in







Centenarians

very few years, editors get the centenarian itch sending reporters out into the hustings for stories. This move is not limited to the local rags, but even the likes of National Geographic. With all the grant money floating about and the American fascination with statistics, the topic is a winner particularly with neo-

retirees. Not only the printed page, but the World Wide Web is brim full. And, why not? Nonagenarians (90s) reaching for that once rare 100, are the fastest growing sector of the U.S. population.



The Web doesn't Gruber do research but its

writers delve into other peoples' numbers and what follows comes from there. One source cites three areas bearing the highest per-centages of centenarians in their populations are: Sardinia, Italy, Okinawa, Japan and the Seventh Day Adventists in Loma Linda, Calif. Individual accounts for longevity pop up (e.g. a 116 year-old in Ecuador) but the Guinness Book of World Records rarely accepts the claim due to lack of written proof (no doubt creating local chagrin).

Back in the mid-20th-century the newspapers occasion-ally printed similar claims from someplace, usually an inaccessible area of Asia or the Caucuses giving the reason for their success as a diet heavily dependant on

yogurt.
It's interesting that both
Sardinia and Okinawa are islands inferring saltwater fish may play an important role in the diets. Okinawa is an excellent source of data as the Japanese have kept dependable demographic records for about 150 years. There are now more than 600 centenarians on that island. Early on, some

researchers thought their numbers were due to genetic makeup, not lifestyle. It turns out to be

lifestyle.

Here's why. Okinawans transplanted to other areas pick up the local habits and their mortality numbers soon mirror that of the natives. Secondly, Japanese medicine has made giant strides in reducing strokes and stomach cancers. Life expectancy gained 20 years in four decades principally because of that.

What's their solution? Mostly it's lower caloric intake. They have a saving

'Eat until you are 80 percent full.

What else? You already know the rest. High vegetable (particular green) and fruit consumption, regular exercise, moderate alcohol use, avoidance of smoking, blood pressure control and a stress lowering psycho-spiritual mind set. It's that time of year again

Val Nardo puts out annual call for food, donations

s an exciting time of year for Val Nardo.

The 88-year-old Wilmington man donned his trademark redand-green Christmas hat last week as he put out an annual call for food and donations for his organization, Val's Needy Family Fund.

For the past 39 years, Nardo has spent the holiday season collecting food and helping distribute canned goods stocked in his Newark warehouse to families in need. This year is no different.

"It has been exciting, all these years," he said. "I don't get much sleep. I do all my planning at night, and then my wife wonders why I have to take naps during of thanksgiving when his wife had a cancer scare. The tumor turned out to be benign. Nardo said he asked God to show him a way to be thankful, and the response was to feed the needy.

So that's what Nardo did. He gave out 10 baskets of food in 1968. The project grew from 10 to 30 boxes the next year, and continued growing. Last year, his funds contributed to nearly 1,700 baskets put out in conjunction with 17 different organizations.

This year is a little different. Nardo, planning for the years ahead, united his fund with the Newark Area Welfare Committee in June as a way to ensure his good work continues. The two organizations have worked together for the past 15 years on an annual Christmas basket project that distributes food to more than 400 families in the Newark area.

In addition to his partner organization, Nardo depends on many volunteers for his work to succeed.

'Please mention my volunteers.' he said. "Without them, I couldn't do a thing.'

This year, the Newark Area Welfare Committee will distribute baskets on Saturday, Dec. 22. Interested persons still have time to donate food and money to Val's Fund, which contributes to the

Media literacy skills for youth

With pre-teen youth, using media as a conversation starter is also a good way to help your child begin to make choices on their own. Talk to your child about what he or she sees on TV and share your own beliefs and values.

Whenever you can, watch, play, listen, and surf with your kids and talk about the content. If you don't like something you've seen, use the opportunity to ask your child thought-provoking questions such as, "What else could they have done? What would you have done? Do you think what they were doing was wrong?"

"We've been at Boscov's a lot, providing pet therapy for stressed out shoppers," one of the other volunteers exclaimed, "because they know how well behaved our animals are."

The store was crowded; the background music, and occasional announcements, obvious. The lights were bright, and people loud. Yet, these dogs did not bark. They were incredibly quiet and calm.

"Can I pet your dog please," a little girl asked. "Of course," Deanna Pedicone

"Of course," Deanna Pedicone said, stooping down so that the child could touch Annabelle, a small pretty dog that she had been carrying in a handbag.

PAWS (Pet-Assisted Visitation Volunteer Services) is a non-profit organization founded in February 2005. The volunteers, after being tested and trained, visit various facilities in the geographic area. More than 100 volunteers provide pet therapy to elders, children and people with disabilities.

"People with Alzheimers, who don't talk or interact will spend a half hour petting a dog, and smiling," said Perno, who, with Abby, visits Christiana Hospital and Abbey Manor.

PAWS believes that interaction with a gentle, friendly pet "lowers blood pressure, brightens emotional outlook, encourages communication, helps lessen feelings of isolation and alienation, improves mental stimulation,



literacy — help kids question and analyze media messages. Ask them how they feel about solving problems with violence, stereotyping people, selling products using sex or cartoon characters, or advertising to kids in schools or in movie theaters.

Teach your child to question and learn from what he or she views on TV. You can use TV to explain confusing situations, and express your feelings and values about difficult topics (sex, love, drugs, alcohol, smoking, work, behavior, family life).

UD Library adds new Civil War digital collections

The University of Delaware Library has added three new digital collections to the University of Delaware Library Digital Collections Web site http://fletcher.lib.udel.edu/. All Library Digital Collections are freely available to any Internet user. The new collections are part of the Library's American Civil War Digital Collections, which will include future additions.

Newly added are three collections of Civil War letters: the Edward A. Fulton Collection; the David Lilley Letters; and the Thomas J. Reynolds Letters to Louisa J. Seward. All the letters are from Union soldiers and were written to family members and others living in Delaware. The original letters are available in the Special Collections Department in the Morris Library.

New prototype vehicle generates electricity— and cash

team of University of Delaware faculty has created a system that enables vehicles to not only run on electricity alone, but also to generate revenue by storing and providing electricity for utilities. The technology – known as V2G, for vehicle-to-grid – lets electricity flow from the car's battery to power lines and back.

"When I get home, I'll charge

"When I get home, I'll charge up and then switch into V2G mode," said Willett Kempton, associate professor of marine policy, the V2G pioneer who began developing the technology more than a decade ago and who is now testing the new prototype vehicle. The UD V2G team includes Kempton as well as Ajay Prasad, professor of mechanical engineering; Suresh Advani, George W. Laird Professor of Mechanical Engineering; and Meryl Gardner, associate professor of business administration, along with several students.

When the car is in the V2G setting, the battery's charge goes up or down depending on the needs of the grid operator, which sometimes must store surplus power and other times requires extra power to respond to surges in usage. The ability of the V2G car's battery to act like a sponge provides a solution for utilities, which pay millions to generating

stations that help balance the grid. Kempton estimates the value for utilities could be up to \$4,000 a year for the service, part of which could be paid to drivers.

The technology will work on a large scale, he said, because on average 95 percent of all cars are parked at any given time. One hour a day of car usage is the average in America.

"A car sitting there with a tank of gasoline in it, that's useless," he said. "If it's a battery storing a lot of electricity and a big plug that allows moving power back and forth quickly, then it's valuable." Kempton already has one of those large plugs at his home. He has a 240-volt plug that gives the battery a full charge – or a range up to 150 highway miles – in just two hours. A smaller, standard 110-volt plug works but provides a full charge in about 12 hours. The smaller plug also moves less power for the grid operator when the car is in V2G mode, Kempton explained.

"The bigger the plug, the more power you can move, the more revenue," he said, explaining that it cost about \$600 to have the larger plug installed.

But even though Kempton is supplying power to the grid with the prototype car, he's not getting paid for it – yet.

paid for it – yet.

PJM, the grid operator for 14 states, including Delaware, is keen on the technology and even hosted the second-ever public demonstration of the V2G car in action last week. (The first was at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, two weeks earlier.) But PJM requires at least 300 megawatts to purchase power. That means the UD team and its collaborators must get 300 cars up and running.

The prototype car is a stepping-stone to that goal. Kempton is working with the UD mechanical engineers Prasad and Advani, who plan to add V2G to the University's fuel cell bus. Next, the team, including the company that created the car, California-based AC Propulsion, will test the prototypes and fix any potential problems they bring to light. Then they'll begin creating a user interface that will let drivers, for example, tell the car to never go below 50 percent charge while in V2G mode.

UD prof's new book focuses on critical role of native plants

elaware's native plants make it possible for the state's 850,000 people to exist, says Douglas Tallamy, chairperson of the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware. Tallamy has been conducting research studies on the interaction between native plant species and native wildlife since 2000. And with every study, he is further convinced that healthy local ecosystems aren't just important for wildlife but for people.

"Bringing Nature Home: How

"Bringing Nature Home: How Native Plants Sustain Wildlife in Our Gardens" is the title of Tallamy's new book (released by Timber Press on Nov. 15), and it's also his credo on how we can all make a difference.

"We invariably take plants and the benefits they provide for granted," says Tallamy. "Who takes time to think that the oxygen in each breath we take has been produced exclusively by plants?"

Plants play the primary role in the food chain. "Most native

insects cannot, or will not, eat alien plants," says Tallamy. "When native plants disappear, so, too, do native insects.

"A land without insects sounds like a gardener's dream; doesn't it?" notes Tallamy. "But a land without insects is a land without most higher forms of life."

With the rapid rate of development in Delaware and resulting habitat destruction, the pressures on native plants – and thus native species – has never been greater. Propped up near a window in Tallamy's office, next to a sweeping view of UD's Newark Farm, is a map of all current and proposed development projects in Delaware. At first glance, it appears that the only thing not under development is the farm right outside.

But Tallamy isn't ready to give up on the First State anytime soon. There is a way to sustain biodiversity in Delaware, he says. The heroes won't be the scientists who conduct research, the legislators who enact restrictions on

development or the environmental groups who work to reduce habitat loss – as valuable as all these things are.

Look in the mirror – you're looking at the potential hero of this story, says Tallamy. "Every Delawarean has the ability to

affect change," he says. "Every one of us has the power to make a significant contribution toward sustaining biodiversity."

'I am thrilled with the book," he continued. "It is visually stunning with over 3,700 photographic images. I think the book will be a model other cities will use when they try to capture their

Ray Nichols of Wallflowers Press echoed Bauernschmidt's sentiment that the photographs of Newark citizens stand out. "The idea was a good one and when you see the final book, the citizens are what you remember best. The band (with the local residents' photographs) runs through every page of the book."

The publishing was funded by private donors. Funk donated \$5,000 in 2005 to get the book committee started. In 2007, three local residents (David Kandra, Rick Longo, Edward Sobolewski), pledged \$3,000 each to buy 180 books and donate them to the Newark Historical Society. The Society will resell the donated books to the public. Funds will support activities for Newark's 250th Anniversary, which is in 2008.





Trolley follows loop

The trolley – a bus that has been produced to have an old time look and feel with real wood panels, wooden seats and leather straps – rode its first loop through Newark Monday morning. The vehicle seats 28 passengers, with room for as many as 21 standing riders. Cost of a ride is 25-cents per person.

The route starts at the Newark Municipal Building on Elkton Road, then heads down Park Place, turns left at Academy Street and passes the Perkins Student Center. The trolley then turns right at E. Delaware Avenue and continues onto Library Avenue. From there, it turns left onto Main Street and travels through the commercial shopping district.

The 30-minute loop finishes at Elkton Road. A schedule for stops can be found online (http://www.dartfirststate.com/preview/31/).

downtown loop," said Kingsberry at a kickoff for the new service held last week at the Municipal Building.

"This, however, is much more than a feel-good effort by DelDOT," he said. As the population in the region grows, more people seek out bus services, said Kingsberry. "It makes perfect sense, then, to have this multi-modal transportation here in the great city of Newark.

City officials hope the trolley helps with traffic congestion in the downtown area and encourages more students and residents to use public transport.

Funk said it will also play an important role in the city's 250th anniversary celebra-tion next year. "Having the trolley in place at the very beginning is very important," he said. "It demonstrates our commitment to the community, and it also demonstrates our commitment to mass transit.'

In addition to the trolley service, DelDOT has plans for another upgrade to public transportation in Newark. A new transit hub will be built between Main Street and Delaware Avenue at Farmer's Lane. The scheduled completion date is April 2008.

ates their home, one of 32 in the United States, in Jugan's image. "Our Mother Foundress had this motto, "Make the elderly happy. That's what counts," said Sr. Marie Jeanne.

The facility does that by providing several levels of care to up to 80 residents. Independent individuals and married couples live in 12 apartments on campus, paying only what their income allows. As those residents age and require more assistance, they can move into the residential portion of the home. Residents who need a higher level of care live in an area staffed with skilled nurses.

The residence home has a campus-feel, complete with its own beauty salon, gift shop, several dining rooms and a chapel. Residents do not have to be Catholic, but faith is important to the experience. "The idea is to let them experience God's love coming through our brothers and sisters, so that they can believe in it in the most important time of their lives," said Sr. Marie Jeanne

Like Jeanne Jugan's home of long ago, the Newark home

runs on the blessings of others. Various forms of social assistance, including Medicare and pensions, contribute to 45 percent of the costs. Sr. Marie Jeanne and others regularly go "begging" in the community, visiting churches and businesses to explain the organization's needs and ask for donations.

Recently, the organization launched an ambitious campaign to raise funds to bring the now 30-year-old building into compliance with current ADA (handicapped accessibility) standards and to decrease energy consumption with new windows and a new boiler system.

The campaign will unfold over the next years. The first phase requires \$4.3 million. "This is just one phase of three that are going to renovate the building completely up to ADA compliance and energy efficient standards and help us maintain this facility for another 30 to 40 years," said Duke Doblick, director of development.

The public has been asked to get involved. A direct mailing went out this week to Newark area residents, asking for contributions.

Sr. Marie Jeanne, still passionate about her work with the



OK, pull out the diary of Blue Hen epic playoff victories and add Saturday afternoon's 39-27 upset quarterfinal victory over previously undefeated and topseeded Northern Iowa University in Cedar Falls.

Beginning with the University of Delaware 1973 loss to Grambling in Atlantic City's Convention Center, the Blue Hens have played 40 games in the NCAA postseason format. They have won 26, all of them special but a few deserve epic status in the program's annals.

Saturday's case, the Panthers were not only 12-0 and ranked No. 1 through much of the season. they had defeated major-college

Iowa State who Tomashek

defeated Iowa who defeated Illinois who defeated Ohio State, a national-championship contender.

Granted, Delaware this season defeated Navy who the next week defeated Notre Dame, but the Irish were light years from their dynasty days and no one is campaigning for Navy to be admitted in the Big 12 or the Big Ten. So what games - in addition to Saturday's classic come-frombehind classic - deserve special recognition in UD playoff history? One might expect the two winning championship games, the 1979 Division II victory over Youngstown and the 2003 romp over Colgate, to be included but Delaware had beaten YSU during the regular season and Colgate had somehow defied the Peter Principle for three games after emerging as the Patriot League representative.

Epic in this case is about Blue Hen playoff games in which they defied enormous odds to defeat teams of Herculean standing. In at least one man's count - either by word of mouth or profession-al observation, Saturday's epic, Saturday's Midwestern Corn Belt blast was the latest of six Blue Hen epic efforts. Since beauty is in the eyes of the beholder, they are listed in chronological order

Blue Hens get ready for NCAA semifinal vs. S. Illinois

The University of Delaware football team arrived home early Monday afternoon, coming off an arduous trip to Iowa and facing a return west to Illinois late Thursday afternoon.

Midwestern storm forced 36-hour layover after upsetting Northern Iowa 39-27 in the UNI-Dome, a victory that earned the Blue Hens a nationally-televised semifinal game at 4 o'clock

Saturday afternoon against 12-1 Southern Illinois in Carbondale.

The upper bracket was originally scheduled for Friday evening, but the NCAA moved the game back to Saturday because of Delaware's travel problems, and the other semifinal between

Appalachian and Richmond semifinal was moved up to 8 o'clock Friday night in Boone, N.C.

"I don't think we'll see any better teams than James Madison and Northern Iowa," Delaware

beginning with Delaware's upset in Baton Rouge, La.

Paired against the University of Nevada-Las Vegas in the NCAA Division II semifinals, Delaware was confronted by a 12-0 teams considered outstanding by any classification. The Blue Hens were coming off an easy victory over Youngstown State but was considered no match for UNLV, but the Delaware Wing-T baffled the opposition and dazzled the spectators in a 49-11 semifinal romp. UD trailed 3-0 after one quarter and then took charge, log-

ging 553 yards including 483 rushing, Vern Roberts carrying for 176 and Nate Beasley for 153.

In 1982, the Blue Hens were a distinct underdog headed to Louisiana Tech in Ruston where NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Terry Bradshaw presided before going to the Pittsburgh Steelers. Tech, who earlier that season defeated Division I-A Southern Mississippi and finished the regular season ranked 29th nationally, never found its footing on its muddy home field and Delaware walked away with a 17-0 victory. Matt Dunigan had broken most of Bradshaw's offensive records, but

was a lackluster 22-for-47 and was picked off three times.

Some might believe the 1986 quDelaware went one-and-out in its next two NCAA appearances, 1988 and 1991, before opening the 1992 tournament with a 56-21 romp over Samford College, coached by Terry Bowden, son of legendary Florida State coach Bobby Bowden. But what they did in that game was only a prelude to the next Blue Hen classic, a 41-18 victory over the nation's No. 1 Divisison I-AA team, Northeast Louisiana in Ruston. The host team had four players targeted for the NFL draft and were considered by some to have an open road to the I-AA title, but after scoring first NE Louisiana was held to a field goal and meaningless fourth-quarter TD while Delaware rolled up 462 yards and six TDs.

Finally, the 1993 Blue Hens barely avoided a Northeastern upset in their final regular-season game but claimed an NCAA berth and a several thousand mile trip to Missoula and a game against No. 2-seeded Montana on a Thanksgiving weekend where temperatures hovered just above the 0 mark during the day. The poor regular-season finish, the weather conditions, and a matchup against a strong Montana team did not bode well for the Blue hens, but in one of the wildest playoff games ever the Hens held on for a 49-48 decision, closed by the Hens with a TD with 55 seconds left in the game. The two teams combined for nearly 1,100 yards on the frozen Montana tun-

After the 1986 victory over W&M, the Blue Hens were simply out-manned by Arkansas State 55-14, but fate was tougher on the Hens than the opposition after the other four vintage triumphs.

Delaware's lineup was riddled by injuries when it lost the 1974 championship game to Central Michigan 54-14. In 1982, Eastern Kentucky returned a blocked

field goal attempt and a Blue Hen receiver dropped a sure TD pass in a 17-14 loss to EKU. And dynamic quarterback Bill Vergantino was ravaged by a virus during the week of the 1992 NCAA semifinals, and UD - the game tied at halftime - lost a 8-7 decision at Marshall after Vergantino was forced to leave the game. And after the Montana upset, Delaware traveled to Marshall where some late clutch play from quarterback Dale Fry coming off a mid-season shoulder injury - wasn't enough to overcome a late Marshall runback and a 38-yard field goal with 3 seconds left to beat UD 34-31.

Based on the history after those classic playoff victories, Delaware is due for a break or two. No matter what, Saturday's victory will remain one for the books, but K.C. Keeler and his Blue Hens are certainly hoping it will be the centerpiece for the program's second national championship in five years.

Height stays the same

ding increases in size from two to three stories and adds two more apartments for a total of 10. The footprint of the building increases from 8,250 square feet to 10,711. The height of the building remains the same.

Lisa Goodman, an attorney representing Amstel Associates, said the revision was needed in order for the project to be "economically viable." The first design, she said, did not allow enough room for commercial tenants. which will occupy the bottom floor.

The property owner, Tim Thompson, whose family ran the Trap for 25 years, became aware of flaws in the original design when he asked a second person, Kevin Heitzenroder, to participate in this phase of the project. Already, Thompson has overseen the building of two rows of townhouse apartments on the

Thompson said the redesign of the main building J-shaped facility that will front Amstel Avenue and Elkton Road - "recreate(s) the spirit of the original plan while addressing several design issues."

The new design has a flat roof instead of a gable roof. Wide brick sidewalks extend from the street to the front of the building, mimicking sidewalks on the nearby University of Delaware campus. A decorative tower with the name of the project, Amstel Square, anchors the building at one corner.

Goodman said the developers thought this to be a "more urban design" that "better suits the site." She told city council that redevelopment projects like this often require changes to the design.

Council approved the redesign with a 6 to 1 vote.

work towards sentencing, judges "look for equal justice under the law," she said. "It will be really nice to view it from the perspective of a neutral party.'

She's also looking forward to working with university students, and she has much experience. She served as a resident assistant while attending UD, and worked in the office of judicial conduct at the University of Tennessee.
"It will be nice to get back to that again," she said.

Hatfield interviewed for the position of Alderman in August 2007 at a special meeting of city council. Four candidates were considered for the position, including former Deputy Alderman Larry Sullivan and State Sen. Steve Amick. Council selected Hatfield and forwarded her recommendation to the Delaware State Senate, which, by state law, must confirm it. Confirmation came last week.

Hatfield will fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Alderman Anthony Forcina, who had served as Alderman since 2002. She will serve on the bench with Deputy

Alderman Malcolm Cobin, who

was sworn in January. Hatfield lives in Newark with two daughters, ages 10 and 9.

High school credits can be earned outside the classroom

a path for earning the necessary requirements for completion.'
Woodruff said t

Delawareans interested in taking the GED or receiving their high school diploma should beware of "diploma mills," companies that claim to offer high school diplomas or a GED certificate over

the Internet or through correspondence courses. "These companies often advertise one low fee, require little or no coursework and offer a promise of a high school diploma in a short period of time," Woodruff said. "Similar offers are made for

obtaining a college degree."

A state of Delaware high school diploma can only be awarded to students graduating from a Delaware public high school or to students completing their high school credits through the James H. Groves Adult High School program. The only acceptable means to receive a GED is the successful completion of the General Education Development examination offered by the American Council on Education.

"The Delaware Department of Education does not accredit non-public or private high schools," said Secretary Woodruff. "Therefore, if you are a resi-

dent of Delaware or elsewhere, I encourage you to do your research before you enroll in an unfamiliar program."

There are many well established non-public and private high schools in Delaware where graduates receive diplomas from these schools, cautioned the Secretary, "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

James H. Groves Adult High School is a secondary school for adults who have not finished high school. The school is approved by the Delaware State Board of Education and accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools.

Classes are held at local high schools and other facilities in Wilmington, Newark, New Castle, Marshallton, Middletown, Georgetown, Selbyville, Bridgeville and Ellendale. Groves Diploma-ata-Distance is also available by calling 1-888-321-GRAD (4723)

Like all high schools in the state, students must acquire a total of 22 credits to graduate with four-and-one-half as electives and 171-and-one -half credits prescribed by the Delaware State Board of Education. Students work at their own pace. Credits can be earned in any of the following ways:

Diploma mills unmasked

So how can you tell if the institution you're thinking about is legitimate? The Federal Trade Commission has some telltale signs of a diploma mill:

 No Studies, No Exams - Get a Degree for Your Experience.
 Diploma mills grant degrees for "work or life experience" alone. Accredited colleges may give a few credits for specific experience pertinent to a degree program, but not an entire degree.

• No Attendance. Legitimate colleges or universities, including

online schools, require substantial course work.

• Flat Fee. Many diploma mills charge on a per-degree basis. Legitimate colleges charge by the credit, course, or semester, not a flat fee for an entire degree

 No Waiting. Operations that guarantee a degree in a few days, weeks, or even months aren't legitimate. If an ad promises that you can earn a degree very quickly, it's probably a diploma mill.

• Click Here To Order Now! Some diploma mills push them-

selves through aggressive sales tactics.

Accredited colleges don't use spam or high-pressure telemarketing to market themselves. Some diploma mills also advertise in newspapers, magazines, and on the Web.

 Advertising through spam or pop-ups. If the school caught your attention through an unsolicited email or pop-up ad, it may be a diploma mill. Legitimate institutions, including distance-learning programs, won't advertise through spam or pop-ups.

Why would people go to a meeting when they have no idea what is being discussed?


A better question is why do we, as citizens of the state, put up with it?

Hopefully, the public will call their state senator and demand a change and, hopefully, when the bill is introduced again it won't suffer the dreaded desk drawer


