Unbeaten Hens Face Tough Test Saturday With Conference Champions At Rutgers

The University of Delaware's top-rated Blue Hen football team will face probably its toughest opponent of the season to date in Rutgers this Saturday at New Brunswick, N.J., in a game pitting last year's Middle Atlantic Conference champions with one of this year's leading challengers—Delaware.

The Hens are tied for the university division lead with the Bucknell Bison, who pulled a surprise upset over the Scarlet two weeks ago. Rutgers defeated Delaware a year ago, 37-20 in a thrill-packed game at Delaware Stadium. It was the Scarlet's first win over the Hens since the series was resumed in 1955 after an 18-year lapse. In the backfield, Stiegman uses Larry Brown at blocking back; Bill McGooey at fullback; and Arny Byrd at wingback; with three sophomores sharing the tailback slot.

Delaware Coach Dave Nelson will count on his Wing-T attack backed by a heavy line and experienced backfield.

Probable starters will be Mickey Heineken and Dick Broadbent at ends; John Moradas and Mike Boyd at tackles; Leon Dombrowski and Jim Garvin at guards and Captain Mark Hurm at center.

Quarterback Gampy Pellegrini, who Nelson last week called one of the best he's had, will lead Delaware's hard-running backs—Jack Turner, who threatens a new university individual career rushing mark—John Bowman, and Tony Suravitch.

William Penn was pounding on the Yellowjacket door in the final minute of play with goal to go.

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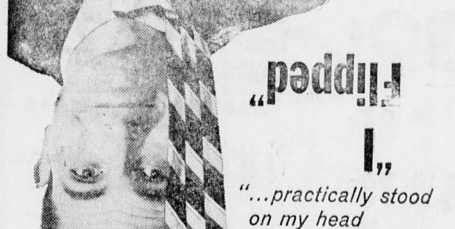

Of those who entertains these spirited Hallowe'eners, why not brew them a cup of hot, spiced cider or serve cold apple juice? All of these fruits and juices are on local markets and wear attractive price tags this week.

Citrus fruit—grapefruit, oranges and lemons—are increasing each day, with quality good and prices low.

Bananas are cheaper again this week—averaging 13 cents a pound. Honeydews can still be found for 59 to 69 cents each and Florida avocados are selling as low as 19 cents for a large one.

Don't forget about the record crop of cranberries this year—these berries are high in quality and low in price. Buy an extra box or so this week.

Meat prices continue to edge downward under the influence of stepped-up marketings. Pork marketings over the next five weeks will be about 10 per cent higher than last year. However, this week pork prices have gone both ways—up and down. Fresh pork shoulders went up 2 cents during the week, but this weekend dropped 5 cents a pound as a special in many stores.

Lard dropped a penny and is still about the least expensive shortening available. This is the new, more delicate lard packaged now days in pound prints.

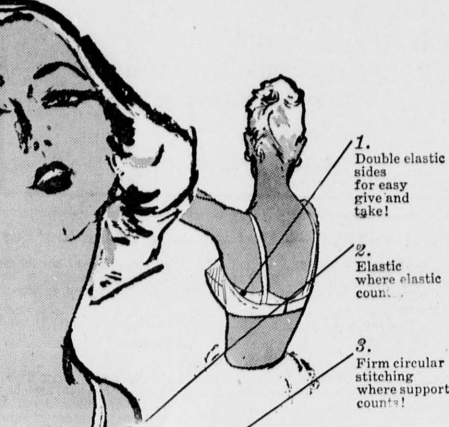

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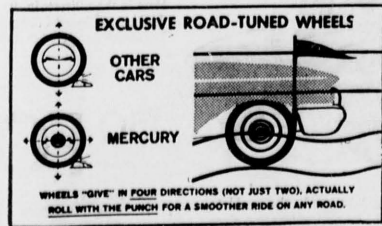
