A realistic presentation of "I Remember Mama" was given by Mrs. Elizabeth Hill Conrad, Scranton, Pa. before the New Century Club on Monday.

The play, one of the most popular on Broadway this season, is concerned with the life of a humble Norwegian family in San Francisco around the turn of the century. Mrs. Conrad slipped easily into the Norwegian accent her role required, which, she said, she learned from a Norwegian nurse in childhood. 
## Newark Cub Pack To Hold Xmas Party

## SQUIRE IS APPOINTED DEAN AT UNIVERSITY

**Bush Named  
Registrar;  
\$92,000 Gift  
Made U. Of D.**

Dr. Francis H. Squire, recently released from the Navy, has been appointed dean of the University of Delaware. He is also dean of the School of Arts and Science and professor of history. It was announced the past week by Dr. W. Owen Sypherd, acting president of the University.

The position, a newly created one, was provided for in the new plan of reorganization of the university. Dr. Squire is the first man to hold the post.

Another appointment made was that of Charles W. Bush as university registrar. He is also acting director of business guidance and placement bureau.

It was further revealed that the university has received a \$92,000 gift from R. R. M. Carpenter, a trustee of the university, to be used toward the completion of the field house.

It was Mr. Carpenter's generosity in 1941 that made possible the construction of the first unit of the structure which was dedicated and first used in the winter of 1942. The cost of the original structure was \$135,000.

Last June Mr. Carpenter made a donation of \$34,000 towards further expansion of the field house which is to (Please turn to page 3)

## CARPENTER RESIGNS AS U. OF D. TRUSTEE

**His Son To  
Succeed Him;  
Marshall Is  
Also Elected**

Two new members were elected to the board of trustees of the University of Delaware and one member resigned his position, it was announced Wednesday by Dr. W. Owen Sypherd, acting president of the university.

R. R. M. Carpenter, vice-president of the duPont Company and a member of the board since 1940 resigned his post. The board accepted the move with regret. His son R. R. M. Carpenter, Jr., was elected to succeed him. Also elected to board membership was Joseph L. Marshall, an official of the Lewes Trust Company and past president of the Delaware State Bankers Association.

During his service on the board Mr. Carpenter has taken an active interest in the university and provided the funds for the construction of the new field house. Announcement of the gift of an additional \$92,000 for expansion of the field house was made at Saturday's meeting.

His son, who succeeds him on the board, is now a sergeant in the U. S. Army engaged in rehabilitation work at Camp Upton, N. Y. A graduate of Tower Hill School, he attended Duke University where he played varsity football. He is president of the Phillies baseball team in the National League and of the Wilmington Blue Rocks in the Inter-State League. Mr. Carpenter is married and has two children, R. R. M. Carpenter III and Mary Kaye Carpenter.

## NEW OFFICE TO OPEN AT UNIVERSITY JANUARY 1

**Will Handle  
U. Of D. Public  
Relations And  
Alumni Affairs**

An office of Alumni and Public Relations, newly organized at the University of Delaware, will open January 1, it was announced this week by Dr. W. Owen Sypherd, acting President at last Saturday's meeting of the board of trustees.

The new office, recommended in a joint proposal of the Alumni and Alumnae Associations, will provide a single office to centralize all work relative to activities of alumni and alumnae groups and handle all phases of university publicity and other forms of public relations. Responsibility for operation of the office will be delegated to a director of alumni and public relations, appointment of which is expected before the first of the year.

The newly authorized department will be financed by the university and will become an integral administrative unit of the institution. An important function will be to conduct an annual campaign to raise the funds for general and specific needs of the university of soliciting former students and friends. In previous years, separate drives have been conducted by the Alumni and Alumnae Associations.

Among other functions of the new office will be keeping of records of former students and preparing for reunions and other meetings. A quarterly magazine for all graduates and former students also will be published in the public relations field and the office will collect and disseminate all information of public interest from schools and divisions of the university. Cooperation with the press and radio will be one of its objectives.

**War Films  
Are Shown**

The Newark Junior Chamber of Commerce held their bi-monthly meeting last Thursday Evening, in the Deer Park Hotel with President James Garner presiding. The program made since the reorganization of the various committees was reported.

The highlight of the evening was the showing of war film by Captain Jack Doordan, chairman of the program committee. "The Fleet That Came To Stay" depicted actual battle scenes and efforts of the Japanese suicide planes to cripple the U. S. Fleet off the coast of Japan proper.

Two other films showed the invasion of Okinawa by U. S. Forces and the military government set up to organize the island for a future United States Naval Base. The third and last film, entitled "Target Invisible", revealed the actual use of Radar by B-29's which was highly instrumental in bringing about the final destruction of the Japanese Empire.



## REV. TIERNEY WILL BE ORDAINED SATURDAY

**To Celebrate  
First Solemn  
Mass Here  
December 30**

The Reverend Francis J. Tierney, son of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Tierney, will be ordained a priest this Saturday in the historic Cathedral of the Assumption in Baltimore by Bishop John N. McNamara, D. D., and will celebrate his first Solemn Mass at his home parish in Newark on Sunday, December 30, at eleven o'clock.

Father Tierney will be the first priest ever to be ordained from Newark.

Father Tierney attended the Newark schools for 12 years, after which he transferred to St. Charles' preparatory school in Catonsville, Md. In September, 1940 he entered the Major Seminary of St. Mary's on Pica Street in Baltimore, where he spent two years in the study of Philosophy. He then went on to the Theological Department of St. Mary's at Roland Park where he finished his course.

Other officers of the Solemn Mass will be: Arch-priest, Eugene Kraemer; Pastor of St. John's Church; Preacher, Rev. John C. Selmar; Deacon, Rev. Anthony D. Mieleke; Sub-deacon, Rev. James Quinn; and Master of Ceremonies, John Clancy. Minor officers will be altar boys of St. John's parish.

Father Tierney's two brothers, Ensign J. M. Tierney, and Quartermaster William A. Tierney, Jr., are both in the South Pacific and will be unable to attend his ordination.

## NEWARK VETERAN KILLS SELF

**Dies Of Gas  
In Kitchen  
Of His Home**

A week after his discharge from the Army, James Walter, Jr., 30, former lieutenant in the Air Transport Command, was found dead of illuminating gas in the kitchen of his home in the Colonial Apartments Tuesday night.

A note saying "this is the best way out" and indicating that he had been living under a severe nervous strain gave his explanation for the act.

Unsuccessful efforts were made to save the victim when the Newark Fire Company's inhalator was hurriedly brought to the scene and artificial respiration was given for nearly two hours.

Walter, a flight officer, spent 10 months and flew 750 hours on C-54 missions over "The Hump" between Burma and China. He trained air cadets in this country before going to the South Pacific.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Jane Walter, with whom he operated a restaurant in Newark; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Walter of Kennett Square; four brothers, Joseph, Thompson and Philip of Kennett Square and Charles of Newark; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Chambers of Unionville; Mrs. Anna Myers of Kennett Square, and Mrs. Helen Hammill of Newport.

## POLLARI CITED BY NAVY FOR GALLANTRY

### Local Sailor Is Awarded Silver Star On Flagship

Wayne John Pollari, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pollari, R. D. 1, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal by the United States Navy for gallantry in action. The ceremony took place recently aboard the LCT Group 65 Flagship before the enlisted men and officers of the command, the medal being presented by his Group Commander.

Pollari is now on his way home for an honorable discharge, according to a report received here by the Navy.

In describing the circumstances under which Pollari distinguished himself under fire, the report said:

"The LCTs of the group were subjected to heavy mortar and artillery fire while landing in the assault wave of Luzon Island, P. I., on January 9, 1945. The LCT (6) 1035 had beached and was unloading its invasion cargo. A mortar shell landed in the aft section of the ship causing several army casualties. Fragments of the mortar shell seriously wounded the crafts skipper and he fell to the deck. Although he had wounds in the legs, Wayne J. Pollari took charge of the conning of the LCT and retracted it from the beach while still under heavy enemy fire. He kept the helm at his post who was himself wounded, and brought the LCT safely away from the beach. He administered first aid to his 'Skipper' as the ship pulled away from the beach."

The official citation from Admiral Kinkaid read as follows:

"For distinguishing himself by gallantry and intrepidity in action while attached to the U. S. S. LCT (6) 1035, during operations against the enemy at Luzon, Philippine Islands on 9 January, 1945. When his Officer-in-Charge was severely wounded by enemy action, Pollari, though wounded himself immediately assumed charge of the vessel. Despite dangerous enemy fire, he skillfully retracted the ship from the assault beach and directed it to safe waters. In addition, he ably administered first aid to his superior officer while underway, probably saving his life. His courageous conduct throughout was in keeping with the best traditions of the Navy of the United States."

In concluding the report, his superior, Lt. Benjamin R. Bookless, USNR, said of Pollari, "It has been an honor and a privilege to the men and officers of this command to have served their duty with and to have had under their command such a man. His attitude, cooperation and morals were of the highest standard throughout the struggle."

### Newark's Is County's Highest

## RESEARCH PRAISED

### University War Studies Lauded

The University of Delaware, along with three Wilmington industries, was commended recently for its contribution to chemical warfare research and to the successful prosecution of the war by Maj.-Gen. Alden H. Waitt, new chief of the U. S. Army Chemical Warfare Service at Edgewood Arsenal, Md.

"Without the ingenuity of chemical research and development, our incendiary bombs, flame throwers, chemical shells and smoke-generating appliances would not have been so decisively effective, nor would our high degree of preparedness for gas have dissuaded the enemy from introducing that weapon," General Waitt said.

"I can't pay too high a tribute," the Army's chief of chemical warfare declared, "to the many firms, institutions, groups, and individuals responsible for the unprecedented success of chemical weapons and munitions, both active and passive."

cated on the bank of Frazer Field, back of the Sigma Nu Fraternity house.

No announcement was made concerning the date at which construction of a new unit is expected to begin, nor whether it will be built in conformity with plans originally drafted in 1941.

Dr. Sypherd made his announcement at the semi-annual meeting of the board of trustees, who were also informed by Dr. Sypherd that the university faces a critical need for additional dormitory facilities in the forthcoming academic year.

Dr. Squire was appointed acting dean of the School of Arts and Sciences last June 26 and has filled the duties of that office since August.

Dr. Squire, who is 43 years old, was graduated from Yale University in 1925 and came to the University of Delaware in 1927 as an instructor in history. He continued studies during summer periods and made several European trips.

For two years he returned to Yale in the history department, and in 1935 he received the degree of doctor of philosophy there.
