This Sunday or Tuesday, seven women who are the foundation of perhaps the most popular team in University of Delaware history will play their final game at the Bob Carpenter Center. Win or lose, it will mark the end of a four-year era that might never be matched by any UD athletic team in terms of winning percentage or popularity.

Game 1 winner vs. Game 2 winner, 7 p.m.

On Twitter, they trend as #UDHoopSquad. Around the country, they are known as the team with that Elena Delle Donne player on it. But around campus they are known

as, well, just regular students.

And that's what makes this team so endearing.

I attended Delaware in the late 1980s and have been on or near

campus ever since, and I never recall a team that changed a sport or energized a fan base quite like the UD women's basketball team.

As a comparison, there have been

great Delaware football teams over the years with exceptional and popular players. But those Blue Hens

Big Dance headed to Newark

Main St. businesses hoping for slam dunk

For the seven seniors on Delaware's women's basketball team, the NCAA tournament games being held at the Bob Carpenter Center this weekend are an opportunity to advance in the tournament and close out their Blue Hen careers on a high note.

For Delaware fans, it's one last opportunity to watch a team that has captivated many in the state and rejuvenated UD's basketball program.

However, city officials and downtown business owners see still another kind of opportunity.

"It's a great opportunity to remind people of downtown Newark and what we have to offer here," said

Newark Newsstand building condemned, will be demolished

Clothes in the Past Lane plans to move to site once it's rebuilt

The former site of the Newark Newsstand will be demolished this month after city building inspectors condemned the structure.

Newark Planning Director Maureen Feeney Roser said the property owner began renovations on the building without a permit, and during the process, crews took out load-bearing walls.

"It's unsafe to inhabit," Feeney Roser said.

The newsstand, which occupied the 70 E. Main St. location for more than 75

years, closed Dec. 31, a decision its owners blamed partly on decreased demand for print media.

The property owner, Bachu Patel, said this week that he plans to quickly rebuild the one-story building in its original footprint, noting that he hopes to have it ready to rent out by July. Later, he will apply for a permit to add second-story apartments.

As a penalty for the unauthorized renovations, all permit fees will be doubled, Feeney Roser said.

Sandi Patterson, owner of the Clothes in the Past Lane boutique, said she has

already signed a lease to move her store half a block up Main Street to the newsstand site.

The unplanned demolition has not changed her plans, she said.

Patterson, who has operated the clothing store for seven years at 56 E. Main St., said she decided to move because she fears her current building could soon be repurposed.

Joining Clothes in the Past Lane at the newsstand site will be a "blow-dry bar" operated by Gloss Salon, located at 276 E.

Water main flushing scheduled for today, next week

Newark's Public Works & Water Resources Department will begin water main flushing today and run through Thursday. Each year, the city flushes the

water main system to remove sediment from water mains, check water valve operations and test fire hydrants.

In order to minimize the impact on water service, the water main flushing program is

scheduled during the University of Delaware's spring break.

As flushing of water mains is conducted, residents and businesses may experience fluctuations in water pressure and changes in water clarity. These

changes are temporary.

The city advises residents to minimize their water usage between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on their scheduled water-flushing day and to avoid doing laundry during the day throughout the week to prevent possible staining by discolored water. Keep in mind that operations in one neighborhood could bleed into another neighborhood on any given day.

If residents' laundry becomes stained, keep the clothes wet and rewash with "Rover Rust" powder. Free powder packets are available from the Public Works & Water Resources Department, located on the second floor of the Municipal Building.

The flushing operations will dislodge sediment in the water mains that cause discoloration of the water.

It is suggested that residents check the cold water as late in the day as possible to determine if there is any residual discoloration. If so it is suggested that residents run a tub or wash basin

using the cold water to flush the system. Do not run the hot water till the water has cleared to avoid discoloring the water in the hot water tank.

Area around Chestnut Hill Road. Includes Arbour Park, Bellevue Road, Cannon's Gate, Cobblefield, Silverbrook, South Chapel Street, South College Avenue, Welsh Tract Road, Yorkshire and Yorkshire Woods II.

Tuesday

Area bounded by Main Street, South Chapel Street, CSX tracks, Apple Road, Beverly Road and Elkton Road. Includes Academy Street, Amstel Avenue, Dallas

Avenue, South College Avenue, Grantham Place, Indian Road, Kells Avenue, Kent Way, Manns Avenue, Manuel Street, Lovett Avenue, Orchard Road, Park Place, Phillips Avenue, Ritter Lane, Sunset Road, Townsend Road, Winslow Road, Wollaston Avenue and Wyoming Road.

Wednesday

Area west of Apple Road, south of Nottingham Green, and west of Casho Mill Road. Includes Abbotsford, Binns, Briar Creek, Cherry Hill, Country Hills, Country Place, Devon, Elan, Madison Drive, Timbercreek, and Williamsburg Village.

Thursday

Area of Paper Mill Road, Corbit Street, and North Street. Includes Chapel Hill, Cleveland Avenue, Creek Bend, Fountainview, George Read Village, Jenney's Run, Lumbrook, Main Street, Middle Run Meadow, Nonantum Mills, Ridgewood Glen, The Hunt at Louviers, Woods at Louviers and White Chapel.

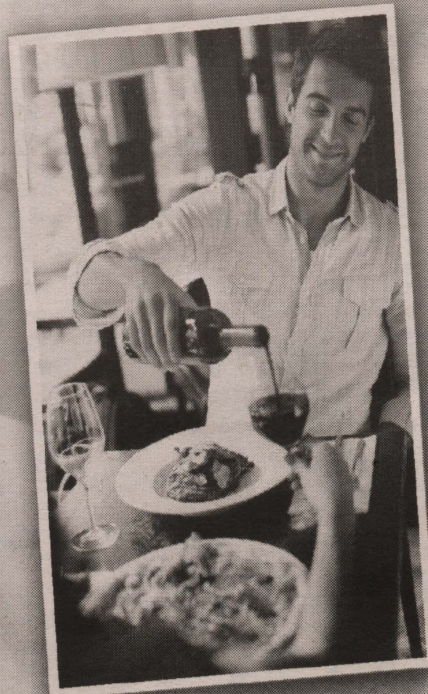

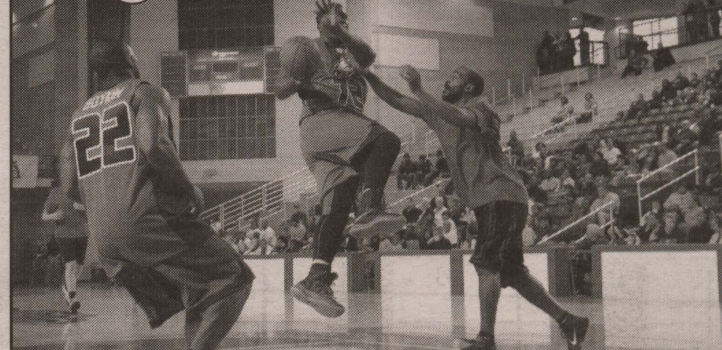

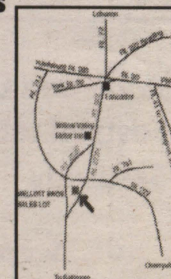

City announces new director of finance

Newark has tapped a former state treasury official to handle the city's finances.

Louis Vitola, Delaware's director of finance and treasury services, will take over as Newark's director of finance on Monday, city spokeswoman Dana Johnston said this week.



Vitola

A graduate of the University of Delaware, Vitola previously served as director of finance for Middletown and also spent several years working in the private sector.

"I believe Lou is uniquely positioned to serve our community and organization and to do so quickly given his State of Delaware and municipal experience," City Manager Carol Houck said in a statement. "His enthusiasm to work with our departments, Deputy City Manager Andrew Haines, and me to ensure our ability to serve our community well into the future was another important aspect of Lou being the right fit for this position."

Work on the 2014 budget will begin shortly after Vitola arrives, Johnston said.

Longtime finance director Dennis McFarland retired in January 2012. Robert Uyttebroek filled the position but resigned after only a few months. The seat has been filled on an interim basis by Wilma Garriz, who will now return to her regular role of assistant finance director.

Annual Wine and Dine Festival returns to Main Street Saturday

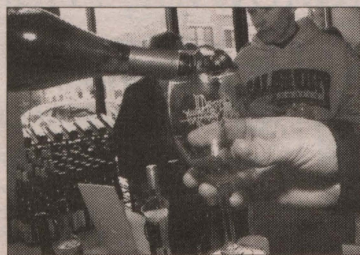

Downtown Newark will recreate Napa Valley Saturday, as the city welcomes area wine lovers to sample more than 70 featured wines and food pairings at the ninth-annual Wine and Dine Festival.

"To the best of my knowledge, we are the only city in the country that recreates Highway 29 Napa Valley in their downtown area with tasting rooms for the day," said Mayor Vance A. Funk III, who helped found the event.

Seventeen restaurants on Main Street will offer a featured menu from 2 to 8 p.m. Guests can pick up a wine glass at any participating location and will pay as they go.

A two-ounce sample of wine will cost \$2. Premium tastings will also be available at varying prices.

Funk created the event eight years ago with hopes of boosting the quality of the city.

"As you can see over the last eight years, the number of better restaurants that have moved to Main Street is reflective of the success of the event," Funk said.

He said he is most excited that Julie Johnson, the owner and wine-maker of Tres Sabores Winery in Napa Valley, Calif., will be participating in the event. Johnson will be pouring her own wine at Stone Balloon Winehouse from 6 to 8 p.m.

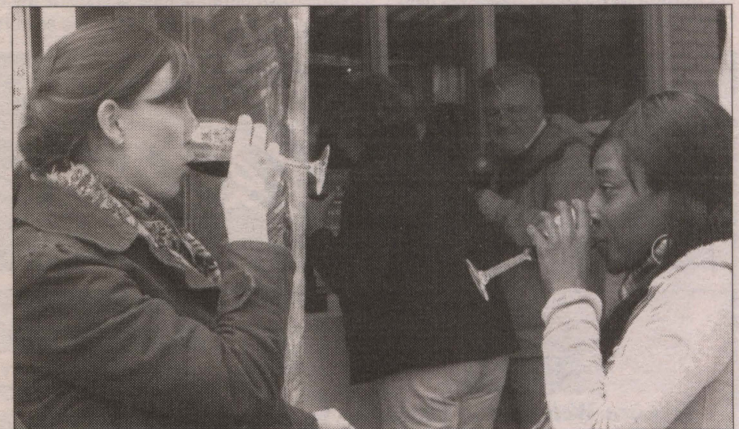
The restaurant's featured cuisine will include beef bourguignon, pork rilletes and pickled beets.

Megan Whetham, manager of Santa Fe Mexican Grill, said the restaurant participates in the event every year. This year, it will feature Chilean wines and dishes.

"It's always fun and a great marketing tool," she said. "It allows people to see what we have to offer."

Retail stores will also be participating in the event with store drawings. Stores will be giving away close to \$1,000 in gifts.

"Wine and Dine typically attracts around 5,000 people, but the event coincides with the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament," he said.

The first 2,000 attendees will receive a Wine and Dine commemorative wine tasting glass and wine pouch at the information booth located in front of the Barnes & Noble bookstore on Main Street. Tickets are not required, and

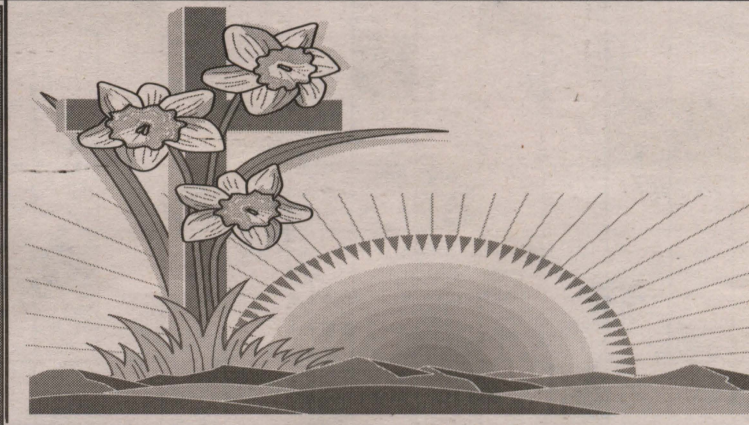

Skateboarders weigh in on proposed Newark skate spots

You've got your ollies, your wallies, your hubbas, your grinds, your slappy grinds, your half-pipes and your quarter-pipes — and you know how "sick" they can be.

There was no disputing any of that among the dozens of skateboarders who crowded into the George Wilson Center last week for a workshop on two concrete skate spots coming to city parks this summer.

The goal of the March 13 workshop, organized by the Newark Parks & Recreation Department, was for local skaters to provide local ideas to Micah Shapiro, lead designer and marketing and sales manager for Grindline Concrete Skatepark Design & Construction, out of Seattle.

The company is designing a pair of 3,000-square-foot skate spots, one in Handloff Park and one in

Phillips Park.

The skaters looked at the preliminary designs and gave Shapiro suggestions about modifying ramps, rails, steps and ledges. Those suggestions will be taken into account when the final design is completed by April 1.

"It feels great. We as skateboarders have been fighting for years and years — probably over a decade — for a safe public skate park, and for that to be a reality is really awesome," said Tyler Jacobson, an avid skateboarder and owner of the Switch skate shop on East Main Street.

Skater Bo Polite said he welcomes the new skate spots for the same reason.

"I find myself skating on tennis courts or down Main Street or just anywhere," he said.

Both skate spots will be built with cast-in-place concrete rather than wood or prefabricated concrete.

"Cast-in-place concrete is the most durable substance out there in terms of skate parks right now," Shapiro said.

Shapiro urged the skaters to think about long-term usage.

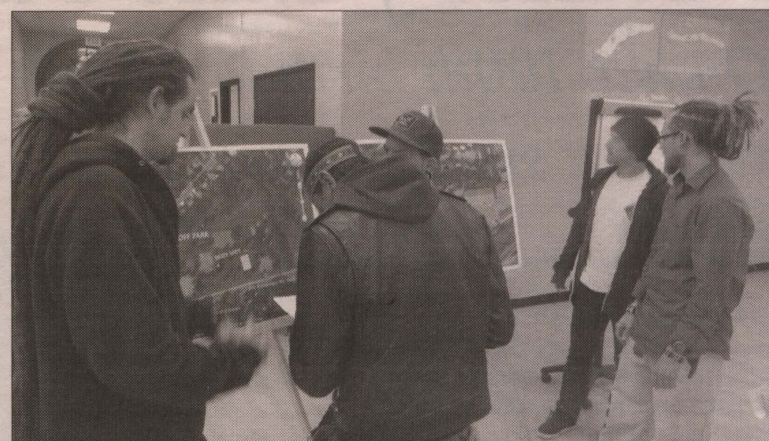
"We don't want to do something that's a fad," he told them. "It's a really cool time in skating right now, so think about what you'll want to be skating five years from now."

Shapiro stressed that his firm wants to build "neighborhood-style" skate spots for Newark.

"We're not trying to attract people nationwide to come here to skate," he said.

Parks & Recreation Director Charlie Emerson said he's pleased the skate spot idea has finally come to fruition.

"We recognize that this is another opportunity for young kids to get active who don't play soccer or basketball, but who want to do something less traditional,"

he said.

He said signage will be put up at the parks urging riders to wear pads and helmets, but that the skaters would have to police themselves in that regard.

The skaters in attendance said they were pleased not only for their own sake, but also because

"I think I learned a whole new vocabulary tonight," Emerson said.

Council to vote on three development projects Monday

Newark City Council will have a lot on its plate when it meets Monday night.

Council will consider four recommendations from the Newark Planning Commission and/or the Planning & Development Department.

Those recommendations, all open for public comment, include the replacement of four single-

family rental homes with eight new townhouse-style apartments on Chambers Street; the demolition and redevelopment of three apartment buildings on Murray Road; and the development of 12 townhouse-style apartment units on New London Road.

Those recommendations do not require an ordinance change, explained Maureen Feeney-Roser, director of Planning & Development, because the proper-

ties are already zoned residential.

Among the eight items on the consent agenda are first readings of rezoning bills that would clear the way for proposed residential developments at Suburban Plaza on Elkton Road and Newark Shopping Center on East Main Street.

Those proposals, which would add hundreds of apartment units to the city, generated much public comment at the Newark Planning Commission meeting March 5.

Supporters of the projects touted the need for more housing, as well as the aesthetic appeal of the projects. Opponents asked why the city needs housing with deluxe amenities that few struggling families can afford.

The Newark Shopping Center proposal includes more than apartments, but also a wholesale makeover of the aging retail plaza, which is home to many of the city's commercial vacancies.

First readings are merely a pro-

cedural motion; debate and voting on those items is set for April 22.

Also on the agenda is a resolution marking the retirement of Patricia M. Fogg as city secretary/treasurer, and a resolution observing the final council meeting of five-term Councilman David J. Athey, who is not seeking re-election in polling on April 9.

Memory lane runs through Woolworth's

On her 100th birthday, Main Towers resident stays busy living 'full life'

When Dorothy Chere closes her eyes, she sometimes smells the tantalizing aroma of popcorn popping and sees the fluffy yellow kernels brimming out of a crinkly red-and-white bag.

Dorothy Chere, age 100, a resident of Main Towers, is not a carnie, but she is one of the few people who remember the retail phenomenon known as F.W. Woolworth, where she worked for 31 years.

Woolworth's was unique in retailing. Sure, it was a pioneer of the "five-and-dime" concept, but at what other store could a customer buy clothes, housewares, toys, a bag of plump cashews from the Nut Hut and a red-and-white paper sleeve of freshly popped popcorn even before checking out?

What other discount retailer featured a wall of glowing aquariums where customers could choose goldfish, tetras and black mollies?

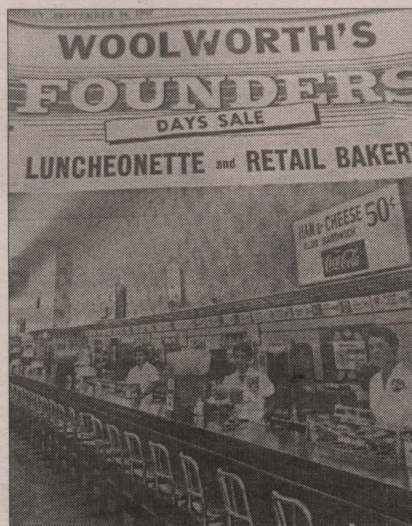
And what other discount store featured a gleaming

chrome lunch counter where a hungry shopper could get a grilled cheese, soft drink and slice of pie for under a dollar?

Welcome to Dorothy Chere's world. Woolworth's was her second home from 1947 when she worked a lunch counter in Wilkes Barre, Pa. (for 25 cents an hour), to 1978 when she retired as restaurant manager for 29 stores — including one in Newark Shopping Center.

Her years at Woolworth's coincided with the height of the retailer's success. Around the time Dorothy Chere retired in 1978, Woolworth's was the largest department store chain in the world.

When Chere celebrated her 100th birthday on March 8, Gov. Jack Markell and others dropped by her apartment in Main Towers to extend con-



gratulations.

She likes the governor and thinks he's a nice guy, even though he caught her by surprise.

"I wasn't ready," she says. "I have to get my hair done and put my face on."

• • •

Many memories fade like a distant melody for Chere, and yet the lunch counter in Wilkes-Barre remains as shiny and vivid in her mind today as the day it was built.

She remembers the day the

company bigwigs came to her with their idea of putting a single booth at the end of the lunch counter.

"I told them that was crazy. As soon as the kids got out of school, they would sit there all afternoon drinking Cokes," she says. "I told them, put four booths right up at the front."

That proved to be a good marketing move, since anyone walking by could see customers dining — and it quickly became standard in all Woolworth's luncheonettes.

Another memory that stands out, though she can't put her finger on when it happened,

was one day when customers were crowded out front before the store even opened.

It was the day Woolworth's got escalators.

"Oh, my lord, you wouldn't believe it," she says.

She remembers customers riding up and down just for the sake of it, and of course, boys and girls trying their hardest to run up the down escalator and down the up.

• • •

Her husband, Roy, whom she met on a double date, died in 1959.

Meanwhile, her career

progressed at Woolworth's, with the company sending her to store locations in upstate New York and elsewhere.

"I'd get up at 4:30 on a Monday, get a cab to the airport, then fly home later in the week," she says.

She always took a cab, she says, because she didn't learn to drive until she was in her late 40s.

After that, though, there was no turning back.

She and two good friends hit the road for Florida, and sent postcards back home signed "the three merry widows."

• • •

Chere says she never feels alone. She has two daughters, five grandchildren, 12 great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren. Her phone rings all the time.

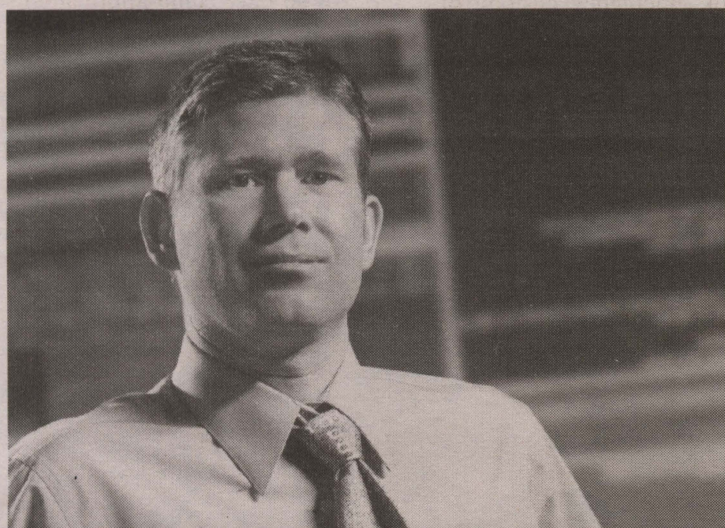
If she wants television, she sits near her set and watches "The Talk," "Katie Couric," "Dr. Phil," "Wheel of Fortune," "Jeopardy!" and "Dancing with the Stars."

"I have a pretty full life," she says. "If I get to thinking I'm alone, I dress up like I'm going somewhere, and go down to the lobby."

And even though she gets to go to Perkin's, Friendly's, Red Lobster or Olive Garden about twice a week, she still cooks for herself as well.

Her favorite dish? Anything with mashed potatoes, and either a turkey club or a bacon and tomato sandwich — Woolworth's-style.

Police: Seller on Craigslist robbed prospective buyer

A Newark-area teen responding to a Craigslist ad allegedly punched and robbed the potential buyer last week, police reported.

Once there, Jervey sat in the victim's car while mak-

ing the transaction.

"It is at this point that the suspect grabbed the victim and then began to punch the victim in the face," Bryda said. "(Jervey) then fled from the vehicle after taking the victim's wallet, money and the keys from the ignition of the vehicle."

Moments later, police officers responding to the scene were tipped off by a citizen that Jervey was walking on nearby Bellevue Road. He was taken into custody without incident.

Jervey was sent to the New Castle County Detention Center in lieu of \$18,000 secured bond.

Alleged threats to officer have negative outcome

Newark Police arrested an Elkton man who they say threatened them repeatedly during an incident early Saturday morning.

Cpl. James Spadola, police spokesman, said a patrol officer was approached by a woman asking for help removing a man from the back seat of her car, which was parked at 54 E. Delaware Ave., behind the Galleria.

As Cameron Szymanski, 22, was climbing out of the car, he allegedly told the officer more than once, "You may as well arrest me because I can kill you."

Szymanski then tried to assault some onlookers before a struggle with the officer ensued, according to Spadola.

During the struggle, Szymanski allegedly told the officer, "You're not big enough to arrest me."

Szymanski was taken to Newark Police Department and charged with resisting arrest, disorderly conduct and offensive touching. He was released pending an appearance April 17 in Alderman's Court.

The defendant is of average stature, Spadola said.

Night at Deer Park becomes night in prison

A Newark man's night at the Deer Park ended up as a trip to prison, according to police.

Newark Police responded to the Deer Park at 1:05 a.m. Saturday

to learn that the University of Delaware Police Department already had 21-year-old Jarell Harvey in custody.

According to Cpl. James Spadola, a Deer Park bouncer had told Harvey and his friends to leave the tavern. Harvey allegedly returned, followed by his friends, who carried him out again.

Minutes later, Harvey returned with a 3½-inch knife and menaced the staff, asking "Who wants some?" His friends returned once more and carried him out, Spadola said.

The knife was found near the train tracks, he said.

Harvey was charged with three counts of aggravated menacing, and possession of a deadly weapon during commission of a felony, then committed to the Howard R. Young Correctional Institution in Wilmington in default of \$40,000 cash bond.

Stray pig is caught, taken away in cop car

Officers responded to a report of a pig on the loose shortly after 10 a.m. Saturday.

Man charged with nearly striking Newark officer with vehicle

A Pennsylvania man is in custody after he allegedly nearly ran over a police officer, police said.

The officer went to the McDonald's parking lot on East Main Street at approximately 4 p.m. March 14 after getting a report of a motorist weaving down New London Road and falling asleep at a traffic light before continuing to drive and park at the McDonald's.

As the officer approached the gold Dodge Caravan, he could see a man inside holding a needle with suspected heroin packets strewn around the vehicle, according to Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda.

Upon seeing the officer, the man, later identified as Sean W. Jeavons, 22, of Landenberg, Pa., allegedly put the van in reverse, smashing into a police cruiser.

"The officer had to jump out of the way to avoid being struck," Bryda said.

Jeavons sped out of the parking lot but turned himself into police two hours later, according to Bryda.

Officials would not disclose any other information about the fire or the investigation.

inherited a solid football fan base and local following as soon as they stepped on campus. The seniors on this UD women's team will forever be considered the group that established a fan base for the sport of women's basketball.

It hasn't hurt that the team's best player is one of the three greatest in the country. Delle Donne has made more national headlines and appearances on ESPN as a Blue Hen than any other UD athlete in history. It also worked in the team's favor that she and, perhaps the fans' favorite UD player, Kayla Miller, attended nearby Ursuline Academy. They were First State fan favorites before ever stepping foot on campus.

Thirty years from now when people look back and talk about this team, they'll remember those two names

This group will be remembered for packing, and often selling out, the Bob Carpenter Center during a stretch when the men's team struggled to make an argument that both sets of bleachers needed to be pulled out. It was the UD women that made the Bob Carpenter Center once again the place to be on a cold winter day or night.

This women's team attracts fans of both genders from every generation. In fact,

many loyal men's basketball fans switched their financial and time investments to the women. And perhaps what is most impressive about this team is the number of UD students who make the trek over the railroad tracks to watch their beloved team play. I can't help but think that the "we're just one of you" feeling the players emit has something to do with that.

This team is active in the community, whether refereeing a Special Olympics basketball tournament or visiting sick children in the hospital. And they are successful in the classroom. As a group, they are almost too good to be true. They are the straight-A's, good-looking star quarterback of the high school team. These young ladies are the big men on campus.

But perhaps what endears us to this team more than anything else is how they genuinely enjoy being around each other, on and off the court. They come across like sisters, one big happy family with head coach Tina Martin as the matriarch. And while some teams might preach that family atmosphere to the public but not practice it behind closed doors, you only need to follow the

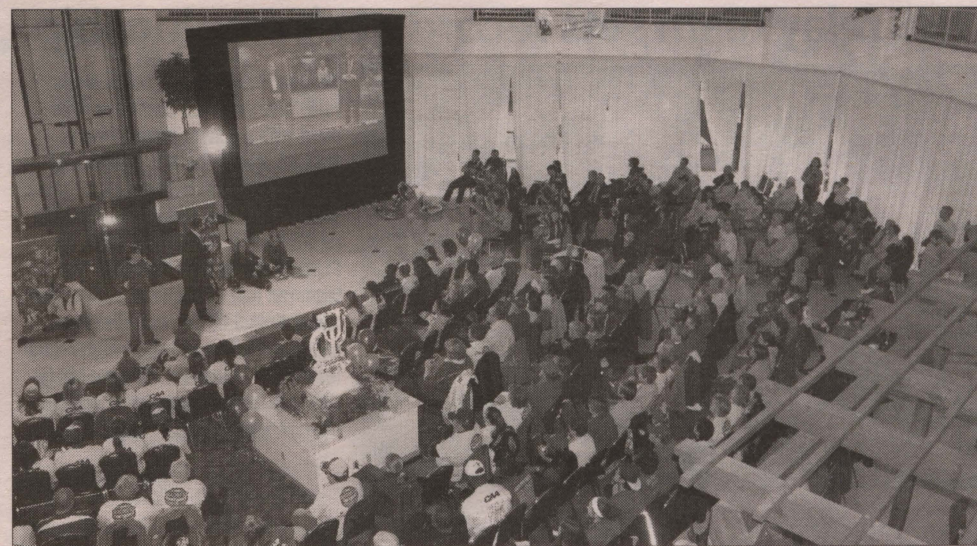

This team has personality. The players have all of the nurturing qualities that endear people to people. And they happen to be pretty darn good basketball players.

We'll always remember this team for the winning streaks, the records it broke,

the individual awards and the championship trophies. But I get the feeling that 30 years from now when we start talking about Delle Donne and Miller, and the other seniors who didn't always grab headlines but played vital roles in this team's run, what we will remember most is how this group of ladies captivated us unlike any other team in Blue Hens history.

And perhaps like no team ever will again.

Out of the Attic

Deer Park Grove (early 1900's)

This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated photograph of the Deer Park Grove looking east toward Depot Road from the front yard of the Deer Park Farm manor house.

This house was built around 1850 by James S. Martin, a Philadelphia fur trader who came to Newark and bought the Anderson farm. He named the house Deer Park for the numerous deer that came and grazed in the wooded area shown in the picture.

Martin razed the St. Patrick's Inn at the intersection of Main Street and New London Road and built the Deer Park Hotel on the site. An unconfirmed story is that Martin improved the dirt lane Depot Road running between Main Street and the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad station three blocks south of the grove.

Martin left town as suddenly as he arrived. The manor house became the home of the Pie family. Later, it was a members' retirement home run by the Order of Red Men



Delaware Lodge. It was twice a frat house for University of Delaware fraternities.

Plans to renovate it as condos ended when it was leveled to make way for the Christian Science Church that now stands on the site on West Park Place. Depot Road is now South College Avenue. Historic Deer Park Grove stands today at the northwest corner of South College Avenue and West Park Place as it has for two hundred years, a reminder of another era when the deer grazed and people found a place of renewal. The deer may be gone but people still walk and pause and listen. And drivers slow and look and think, "This is part of my heritage."

Ricky Nietubicz, administrator of the Downtown Newark Partnership.

Throngs of Blue Hen fans will descend on Newark this weekend, and with them will come out-of-town fans of other teams, players, coaches, referees, NCAA officials and television crews. All of them will need somewhere to stay and somewhere to eat.

"It's going to be a heck of a weekend," said Bill Sullivan, director of the UD Courtyard by Marriott hotel. "I think this could be a real boost to the economy."

His hotel is accommodating referees, NCAA staff and ESPN crews and is already sold out. Other area hotels are designated for the four teams and their fans.

The Downtown Newark Partnership and its member businesses have been planning for tournament weekend since last summer and

have designed several ways to attract visitors to Main Street.

Free shuttle buses will take fans from the Bob Carpenter Center to Main Street so they don't have to worry about parking downtown. The buses will run Sunday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Tuesday from 5:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Many restaurants and stores are offering promotions for the weekend, and DNP members will hand out coupons at information booths at the Carpenter Center and in front of the Barnes & Noble bookstore on Main Street.

"We're optimistic we'll see a lot of business from the tournament," said Bob Baker, a manager at Klondike Kate's, which is giving fans 10 percent off all food prices. "We're hoping the turnout offsets the effect of spring break."

The weekend also coincides with the city's annual Wine and Dine Festival on Main Street. The event is always held in late March,

as a way to help out restaurants during the slow period they see during UD's spring break.

This year, Nietubicz said, the hours have been extended and a larger crowd than usual is expected, as fans who arrive in town early look for something to do.

Most of the crowds will come Sunday afternoon after the games wrap up, he predicted, but another rush could come after the second-round game on Tuesday, especially if Delaware advances that far.

"Hopefully, they'll be celebrating late into the night," Nietubicz said.

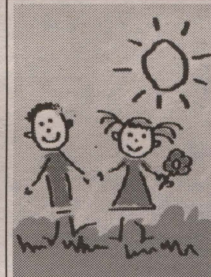
