- 1. The bill is opposed by the State Board of Education, which is at the head of school affairs in the State.
- 2. The bill is not advocated by any large number of teachers in the State, and is not wanted by a majority of them.
- 3. Since the bill limits the questions to be asked on examinations to the text books in use in the schools, persons who had been refused certificates, might by careful study of the text books, pass a sufficient high percentage to obtain certificates, and by underbidding, crowd out graduates of normal schools, high schools and teachers of long, continued arduous services.
- 4. The bill is insufficient as it does not state what catch questions are and who are to be the judges of the same.
- 5. The bill implies that catch questions have been used often, which we deny, having passed the ordeal of the examination eleven times.
- 6. The bill, if enacted into a law, would prevent the examiner from testing the general knowledge of the applicant by asking him a set of questions not found in the text books.
- 7. The bill would render useless the holding of summer schools and prevent the bringing into the State some of the ablest educators of the country to the great detriment of the teachers and scholars.

- 8. The teacher need not be many lessons ahead of the scholars if he had a good knowledge of the text books.
- 9. The teachers not being compelled to study beyond the text books in order to pass an examination would become narrow-minded and often bigoted, ignorant and indolent.
- 10. The person whose general knowledge and reading does not extend beyond the text books is unfit to teach school."

To the House of Representatives of the State of Delaware:

The bill which has passed both Houses of the General As sembly and been presented to me, entitled 'An act to repeat Chapter 556, Volume 18, Laws of Delaware, entitled 'An act for the protection of fish in Indian river. Rehoboth bay and tribu

taries thereof,' being House Bill No. 20, has been considered by me and I now return it to the House with the following objections:

The act which said bill proposes to repeal makes it unlawful for any person or persons to catch or take any fish in the waters of Indian river, Rehoboth bay or any tributaries thereof by means of any drag seine of less size bar than one and one-eighth inches. This provision in my judgment affords a wise protection against the destruction of small and partly grown fish. Fish are annually placed in these waters by the Federal Government for the purpose of stocking them with wholesome and profitable food fish, and the destruction of these young fish so supplied has the appearance of folly and improvidence. If fishermen were permitted to use a seine without any restriction as to the size of bar or mesh, fish of all sizes would be caught and those that are unfit for food purposes would be allowed to die.

It is difficult for any person who is acquainted with this subject to understand the motive that could lead to such short-sighted legislation, giving, possibly, to a few an immediate advantage, but destroying in the near future the means of livelihood of those who follow the business of fishing and depriving other citizens of the State of the right to have these food fish protected.

It has come to my attention that the object sought in the proposed legislation is permission to fishermen to use seines of such mesh or bar as will hold eels, which are found in said waters. This would be legislation for the doubtful benefit of a few and destructive of the rights and interests of all, including eventually the few.

Such legislation cannot be justified by any line of reasoning, is unwise, and I must withhold from the said bill my approval. I herewith return it to the house where it originated.
