Newark's Main Street national semi-finalist

Newark's Main Street is in elite company.

The Downtown Newark Partnership has been named a semi-finalist 2011 Great American Main Street Awards. The 10 semi-finalists were selected from a nationwide pool of applicants and now move to the final round.

The National Trust for Historic Preservation will present this year's five winners at the Main Street Awards Ceremony during the National

Main Streets Conference in Des Moines, Iowa this spring.

"I think we have a good shot," says Maureen Roser, administrator for the Downtown Newark Partnership. Roser noted that the city's central business district made the list

on its second try.

The partnership and the city have a lot of work ahead in preparing a final entry. While Roser expects little trouble in getting letters of support for the downtown effort, she is looking for a company or organization to produce a video that

Hens, Eagles meet in Jan.

Delaware quarterback Pat Devlin has said all along the reason he transferred from Penn State his junior year is for the opportunity to win a national championship. Now, the senior will get his chance.

The University of Delaware punched its ticket to the NCAA Division 1-AA championship game for the third time in eight years with a 27-10 win over Georgia Southern Saturday afternoon in front of 10,317 noisy fans at Delaware Stadium.

Georgia Southern's highlytouted triple-option attack stymied the Hens at first, but the UD defense quickly hunkered down and not only stopped the Eagles' offense, but forced five turnovers while doing so.

"They have a tendency to fumble a lot because of that offense," defensive lineman Chris Morales, whose fumble recovery in the fourth quarter sealed the win for the Hens, said after the game. "We just took advantage of it."

After struggling offensively on its first two series, senior quarterback Pat Devlin hit a wide open Mark Schenauer in the back of the end zone to cap a 16-play, 85 yard drive to give the Hens a 7-0 lead they would never

relinquish.
"We struggled at first,"
Devlin, who completed 14 of 20 passes for 137 yards and two touchdowns, said after the game, "but we righted the ship. We ended up scoring 27 points and our goal is to score 24.

Anthony Bratton played what coach K.C. Keeler called the point position against the Eagles' triple-option attack and recorded a career-high 14 tackles, while Paul Worrilow chipped in with

Delaware (12-2) will now take on the top-seed Eastern Washington Eagles (12-2) on January 7 in Frisco, Texas, in the title game. Eastern Washington defeated defending NCAA champion Villanova 41-31 in the other semifinal. Frisco is a suburb of Dallas.

"They had to tell me who we were playing," Keeler said after the game of the Hens' next opponent. "I was just so focused on this game."

Keeler, who is making his eighth trip to a title game as a head coach (five with Rowan), said after consulting with several coaches who have been to bowl games that the coaching staff decided to let the players head home for the holidays and report back on Dec. 28 for practice. He

could help the city move into the finals.

The recognition comes after a lengthy effort to revitalize downtown, which underwent a serious decline in the 1980s as competition from outlying shopping areas took its toll.

The Greater Newark Partnership was formed in the 1990s to address various issues, including retaining and attracting merchants, marketing Main Street, architectural design and parking. It is comprised of the University of Delaware, local businesses and the City of Newark.

Despite a severe economic downturn, downtown has seen tens of million dollars in investment in frenovated buildings, as well as an influx of retailers and restaurants. The partnership reported 15 new businesses came to downtown in the past year, including seven restaurants, seven retailers and one bank. More businesses will open in downtown next year, including a new bookstore for the University of Delaware.

The partnership has also

added other programs, the most recent being a gift card promotion that offered a \$25 gift card with the purchase of \$250 from a participating merchants.

Roser emphasized that the partnership will not rest on its accomplishments, but will continue to work to improve signage, parking and other concerns on Main Street.



Burglary suspect arrested in neighborhood

victim grabbed an undisclosed amount of money from the register and handed it to the subject. The suspect then fled out the front door in an unknown direction.

The suspect was described as being in his 30s, between 5'6" and 5'8" tall, with a medium build. He was wearing blue jeans, a dark colored jacket with a hood and his face was concealed.

Two injured in crash

Investigators from the New Castle County Police Traffic Services Unit are currently investigating a single car crash that occurred early Sunday morning that left two 19 yearolds from Newark hospitalized. According to investigators, alcohol and black ice are thought to be contributing factors in the crash.

At 2:00 a.m., County Police and Paramedics were called to Upper Pike Creek Road, in an area between New Linden Hill Road and Grandville Road, for a personal injury accident. When Officers arrived, they found a 1999 Buick LeSabre had crashed into a tree and sustained heavy front end damage to the driver's side of the vehicle.

The male driver sustained a head injury and was transported to the Christiana Hospital. where he was admitted for observation. A female passenger suffered a broken ankle.

The investigation indicated the driver, Jarrett Avena, was traveling northbound on Upper Pike Creek Road when he approached a slight curve (right) in the roadway. His car then traveled across the roadway and crashed into a tree.

The crash remains under investigation.

Man pleads guilty

David C. Weiss, United States Attorney for the District of Delaware, announced that Newark-area man pled guilty to child exploitation charges. Joseph Starkey, age 31, Newark, pled guilty to transfer of obscene material to a minor, in violation of federal law. Starkey, who will be sentenced by United States District Judge Sue L. Robinson on March 24, 2011, faces a maximum sentence of ten years in prison and three years of supervised release. He also will be required to register as a sex offender in any jurisdiction in which he lives, works, or attends school.

In April 2010, Starkey came to the attention of a Special Agent of the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Child Predator Unit, who was posing online as a 13-year-old girl. Using the screen name "oneluckyguy79," Starkey engaged the fictitious minor in a number of video chats during which Starkey repeatedly masturbated via a web camera.

During the chats, Starkey attempted to persuade the fictitious minor to send him nude pictures. Starkey also offered to purchase a web camera for the fictitious minor and offered tips on how to hide a web camera from her parents. Starkey has been detained since his August 19, 2010 arrest.

While we cannot give back the innocence to those who were abused and exploited, we can make sure that justice is served," said John Kelleghan, ICE special agent in charge of Homeland Security Investigations in Philadelphia. "HSI and its law enforcement partners stand vigilant to protect the most vulnerable among us, our children."

When officers arrived, the operator was found to be semiresponsive and trapped in his 1999 Dodge Intrepid that was observed to have heavy front end damage. The operator had to be extricated from the vehicle by rescue personnel.

The male driver transported to the Christiana Hospital and admitted to the intensive care unit with internal injuries and severe head trauma. The investigation has revealed the driver, Jacob Brown, was traveling northbound on South Gerald Drive when his car traveled across the roadway and crashed into a tree at the intersection of Powder Horn Drive.

The crash remains under investigation. Charges are pending.

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
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
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OUT OF THE ATTIC

They are, left to right, Officer LeRoy Hill, Chief William Cunningham, and Officer Elmer Morrison. The Town Council minutes of April 19, 1932 list their appointments as - "Chief of Police, William Cunningham, employed by the month, salary, \$125.00 per month, allowance of gas and oil for motor cycle. Police patrolman, LeRoy C.
Hill, salary \$120.00 per month,
employed by the month. Police
patrolman, Elmer Morrison,
employed by the month, salary \$100.00 per month." In
December 1932, Officers Hill and Morrison were given a gas allowance for their own cars when they used them while on duty. Cunningham used his own motorcycle until Council approved the purchase of a new one in June 1933. Sixty years later, 1992, the Newark Police Department had 51 full time officers and 21 other staff. 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



Turnaround plans outlined for Glasgow, Stubbs

The Christina District will soon submit final draft plans for its two Partnership Zone schools, Stubbs Elementary School and Glasgow High School, and is currently working with the Delaware Department of Education (DOE) on revisions to proposals. Final drafts were submitted to DOE by December 22.

The plan would result in Glasgow High being organized into three academies for students.

The schools are under a state partnership agreement that requires major changes, due to student performance issues.

Design Teams made up of parents, staff, union representatives, a board liaison, and community members have spent the last three months developing a reform plan for each school that meets Delaware Department of Education requirements as well as requirements mandated through the Federal Race to the Top Grant overseen by the U.S. Department of Education. Each school will receive up to \$700,000 per year for up to 3 years to implement the plans. More detailed information about each plan follows:

At Stubbs Elementary School, the plan proposes the first early Science, Technology, Engineering, Math (STEM) model in Christina, and would implement a Project-Based Learning (PBL) approach. If the plan is approved, Stubbs

Elementary School would be provided with ongoing support by a Partnership Zone Technical Assistance Team made up of staff from the District and the Department of Education, as well as a STEM Advisory Committee. In addition, Stubbs Elementary School is one of three Community Schools in the Christina School District, a community-based partnership between Christina, Children and Families First, and JP Morgan Chase. Students at Stubbs will also benefit from Extended Learning Time, which will focus on creating a more effective school day to better meet the academic, social, and enrichment needs of Stubbs students.

At Glasgow High School, the proposed plan would create the first high school in the Christina School District that is organized into three smaller Academies, each with a focus geared to college and career readiness, student engagement, and sustained academic success. The three Academies proposed for Glasgow are STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math), Business and Entrepreneurship, and Humanities and the Arts. As part of its proposed plan, Glasgow High School would also implement a Project-Based Learning (PBL) approach in many subject areas.

Academies would begin with 9th and 10th grade students in Fall 2011, and add grades 11 and 12 in following

Students in 11th and 12th grade in Fall 2011 would continue their current course of study towards graduation, and would receive additional support towards academic success and college and career readi-

- Academies would expand

to serve 9th -11th grade in Fall 2012, and 9th -12th grade in Fall 2013

If the plan is approved, Glasgow High School would be provided with ongoing support by a Partnership Zone Technical Assistance Team made up of staff from the District and the Department of Education, as well as a STEM Advisory Committee. In addition. Glasgow will implement new initiatives to support a positive school climate at Glasgow. These include school-wide team training in Positive Behavior Support (PBS), cultural competency training, and classroom management training. Students at Glasgow will also benefit from Extended Learning Time,

which will focus on creating a more effective school day to better meet the academic, social, and enrichment needs of Glasgow students.

Girl Scout cookie sales drive nearly here

Around the time most people are finishing off the last fruitcake from Christmas, Girl Scouts will be gearing up to take orders for their annual cookie sale.

Girl Scouts of the Chesapeake Bay Council, which includes all troops on the Delmarva Peninsula, will begin this year's cookie sale Jan. 8, according to spokeswoman Liz Farrell.

Although Girl Scouts of the USA offers 11 flavors in total, some flavors are only available in certain areas of the country.

This year, the 15,500 Girl Scouts in the 14 counties that make up the Delmarva Peninsula -- including 1,300 in Cecil County - will offer six varieties, or the Super Six.

"We came up with the Super Six after looking at sales figures for the most popular cookies," Farrell said Wednesday. "We want to deliver what people

The Super Six that will be sold locally include the peanut butter and chocolate Tagalongs; the underappreciated shortbread Trefoils; Do-Si-Dos, which are two oatmeal cookies surrounding a peanut butter-flavored layer; the donut-shaped caramel and coconut Samoas; Lemon Chalet Creams, a sandwich cookie that combines cinnamon-ginger spice with lemon cream; and everyone's favorite Thin Mints.

All of the varieties, which still sell for \$3.50 a box, are made with all-natural ingredients and contain no preservatives or trans-fats.

Farrell said 85 percent of the council's Girl Scouts participate in the annual sales campaign, which promotes life skills such as goal setting, planning, marketing, budgeting, record keeping, community relations and a sense of responsibility and achievement.

"It's a wonderful program and a core critical fundraiser for Girl Scouts," she said, adding that last year's sale raised a combined \$3 million for troops in the Chesapeake Bay Council, which is headquartered in Newark.

Those proceeds fund the council's annual budget, provides resources for camp maintenance, trips and activities and support scholarship programs from Girl Scouts heading to college, Farrell said.

In recent years, the council also has undertaken "Operation Taste of Home," which gives customers the option of making tax-deductable cookie purchases for local charities and military personnel serving overseas.

Farrell said donated cookie purchases made through Operation Taste of Home now represents more than a quarter of the council's total annual

The program also has shipped more than a million boxes of the tasty treats to soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan through Dover Air Force Base.

"This region has been very supportive," she said.

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

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
