

Police Chief Haussler Warns Of Holiday Traffic Dangers

Christmas Weekend Cited As Disastrous From Traffic Accident Standpoint; "Tragic Commentary On Goodwill Toward Men," Newark Police Chief Advises Motorists

Newark Chief of Police Arthur S. Haussler warned today that the Christmas holidays are traditionally the most disastrous in terms of traffic record—and that the New Year's weekend is close behind—accident-wise.

"This is a tragic commentary," Haussler emphasized, "especially at the time of year when 'good will toward men' should be the dominant spirit."

"We know better, but still we get caught up in a complex turmoil—last minute rushes... parties... heavier than normal drinking... all kinds of pressures," Haussler said.

Pedestrians, Too
"A person subjected to such stresses," he continued, "is less able to cope with the normal, every-day problems of staying safe—and this applies to walkers as well as to drivers."

The chief admitted it's difficult to change people, but he did point out that every walker or driver has the responsibility to recognize "psychological danger signals" in himself and modify his behavior accordingly. "I don't believe that's asking too much," Chief Haussler emphasized. "We all know the right and safe way of doing things. We may just have to work a little harder doing it."

The chief cited parties and more than normal seasonal drinking as an example.

"We can't overdo and then slide behind the wheel of a car thinking, 'I can get away with it, just this time.'"

There are better, sure ways of getting home, he contended.

Think Ahead
Chief Haussler urged all Newark citizens to think ahead of the special dangers of the season—of the weather, and of the holiday's psychological pressures—and to adjust accordingly.

At the same time, Haussler pledged all steps possible to hold down this year's holiday accident record to within reasonable limits; and ended on this word of warning: "Your police department will be out with all the manpower we can muster to protect those who simply can't seem to cope of their own accord with the stresses of the season. That's a bit of psychology for which we have the prime responsibility," Newark's chief of police concluded.

Exhibition Planned For Area Artists At Student Center

The committee in charge of the sixth annual art show is headed by Mrs. Samuel Lerner of Wilmington. It will be headed by Howard Schroeder, artist from Lewes; Homer Johnson, Philadelphia artist, and Dr. William I. Homer, chairman of the department of art history at the university.

A special preview is scheduled from 2 to 5 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 8, for the artists and some 400 invited guests, but the event is open to the public as well.

The event is sponsored by the university to encourage artists in the Delaware Valley and also to acquire paintings and other art forms for the university's permanent collection.

Last year, there were 126 works exhibited. Of these, 13 were purchased by the university and a number of others were sold to private collectors.

A. R. Christensen Wins Silver Star As Vietnam Hero

Captain, ROTC Instructor At Delaware, Wins Honor With Battle of Lino Hon

Capt. Allen R. Christensen, military science instructor at the University of Delaware, received the Silver Star last Thursday for heroic action in Vietnam last June. Christensen received the nation's third highest decoration for valor from John E. Hecutt, vice-president for student affairs at the university.

The award cites Capt. Christensen's actions against the enemy near Trung Luong on June 22, when he was assigned to Company C, 2nd Battalion, 327th Infantry, a unit of the 101st Airborne Division.

The citation states that Christensen's company "came under intense and heavy attack by a reinforced company of North Vietnamese Regulars. At the height of the battle the enemy had closed to 6-ft. of positions in the vicinity of the anti-tank platoon's sector."

"Captain Christensen immediately moved from his covered position over open terrain, fully exposed to enemy automatic, semi-automatic, rocket and mortar fire in order to be present at the most critical area. Upon reaching the critical sector, he directed fire upon the closing enemy and personally led a counterattack to repel the enemy."

"Relieved and encouraged by the heroic example of their leader, Capt. Christensen's men repelled assault after assault." During the two-hour battle, the company killed 150 of the enemy.

The citation is assigned as assistant professor of military science at the university ROTC program. He is the son of retired Army Col. and Mrs. Arthur G. Christensen, Severna Park, Md.

Jeannette Wernitz, Russell Williams Cite Scholarships

Mrs. Jeannette T. Wernitz and Russell Williams, guidance counselors at Newark High School, have announced that six general scholarships are available to Newark High School students—scholarships that can be used at the college of the students' choice.

The National President's Scholarship offered by the American Legion Auxiliary is a \$1,000 award to a senior girl, daughter of a deceased veteran serving in World Wars I or II, or the Korean conflict.

The Chrysler Corporation Fund provides a four-year college scholarship for sons and daughters of Chrysler employees with the specification that the applicants must have taken the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

The Lockheed Leadership Fund Scholarship is for seniors who wish to enroll in a course leading to a major in engineering, business administration, finance, or subjects applicable to the aerospace-electronics industry. Ten scholarships in engineering and five in other fields are made in the amount of full tuition, fees, and \$500 a year for expenses.

ROTC scholarships in Army and Navy programs provide free tuition at a participating college, plus \$50 a month for living expenses, to students who have taken the December College Boards.

S&H Foundation National Scholarship awards are made on the basis of need and provide up to \$1,000 per year.

Seven SICO Foundation Scholarships of \$300 per year are offered Delaware residents planning to major in elementary education at the University of Delaware or Delaware State College.

The counselors announce that they have scholarship information from colleges throughout the United States. Students or parents should contact the counselors at Newark High School.

UD's Cole, Connell Crittenden Survey Soybean Farming

Each year Delaware soybean farmers get better—and the weather gets worse. Soybean growers are continually improving their farming practices, according to a survey conducted by University of Delaware agriculturalists.

Dr. Richard Cole, chairman of the agronomy department; Dr. Walter Connell, associate professor of entomology; and Dr. H. W. Crittenden, associate professor of plant pathology, made a random survey of the state's soybean acreage last August 16, and Cole reports growers in general did an excellent job.

The number of growers producing varieties best suited for this area increased again this year. About 90 per cent of the fields checked were planted with recommended early-to-medium-maturing varieties.

More farmers are using 36-in. rows, and 10 per cent of the fields visited had even narrower rows—30-in. or less.

In addition to the obvious problems caused by dry weather, the survey indicated severe infestation of mites and heavy weed growth were causing trouble. Both mites and weeds were more of a problem due to dry weather.

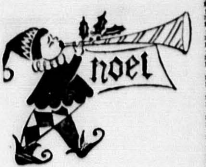

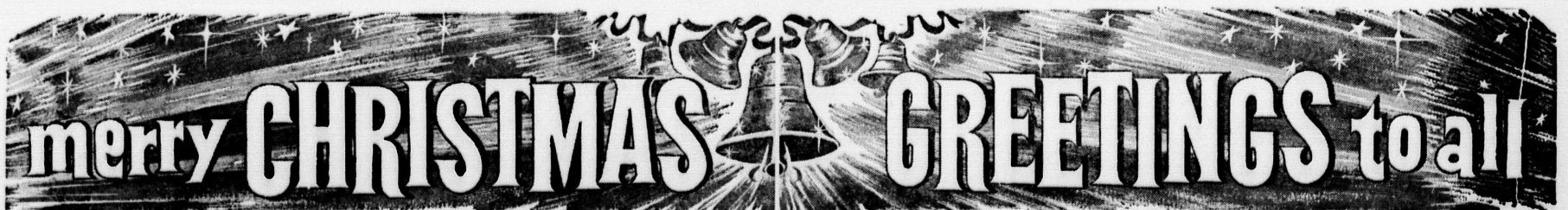

In the case of panfish and average bass and pickerel. With a hastily obtained yardstick, the crappie measured a full 16-inches, while we estimated its weight at a conservative pound-and-a-half. Maybe the Billy system is better. That crappie looked as though it could have weighed three pounds with its impressive depth.

"That's what I estimate," Brandy Davis said in agreeable concurrence with an elder. "A pound-and-a-half."

He and Sue had been fishing amid the drowned tree trunks in the lee of the south shore of Lum's Pond—a picturesque, placid place that we had the pleasure of fishing with Mr. and Mrs. Davis last October—when the bobber sank from sight, the monofil knifed through the water from a suddenly straining rod tip, and after a strong struggle, a great slab of silver splashed mightily in a series of surface swirls as it was reeled close to the Davis boat.

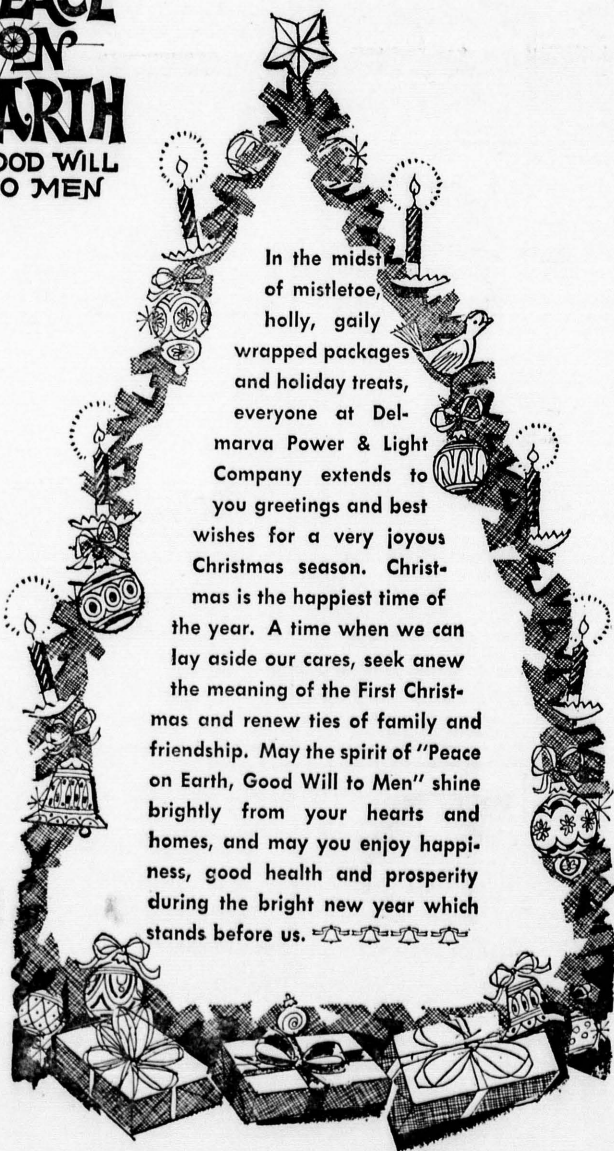

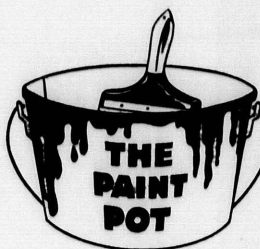

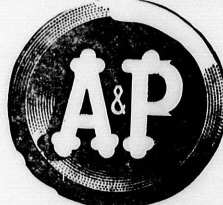

"The 112-lb. class may present a problem. Former Jayvee John Walters, a junior, or newcomer Roger Reed, a soph, are impressive. Roger has some junior high experience at Central. This could develop into one of Christiana's strong weight classes after several meets," Klimek commented.

At 120-lbs. Monte Baldwin, a senior letterman with four years experience, is expected to be a tough contender. He was last year's 112-pounder for the Vikings with a 7-2 record. Baldwin lost to State Champ Woody Thomas of DeLaWarr, and to Newark's Mark Hill, conference champion, in close contests.

John Hall, brother of last year's ace Glen Hall, is working to upset Reed, and has shown good strength and speed in practice.

Senior Letterman Jeff Heath is the Viking 145-pounder.

"An indication of this boy's toughness," Klimek said, "is the job he did for the Viking football team as a 150-lb. fullback. He ran over many 180-pounders on the gridiron, and is very fast and aggressive. We expect Jeff to be one of the Vikings' mainstays through the middle."
