CHLORATE OF LIME AT COST

At the request of the local Board of Health, Mr. R. T. Jones has consented to keep on hand, for the convenience of the public, a supply of chlorate of lime, which will be sold at cost, in any quantity, to those who will call for the same. Heretofore it has been difficult to purchase this necessary disinfectant, and the present arrangement will doubtless be appreciated by the public.

Teacher's Right Of Punishment Tested

To test the right of teachers to inflict corporal punishment upon refractory pupils, the Milton School Board has appealed to the Sussex Court of General Sessions the case of Principal Howard Williams of the Milton High School, who was fined \$5 for punishing a disorderly male scholar. He paid the fine but the School Board decided to appeal the case.

Good Roads Association Of Delaware

The bad roads of Delaware have long been a reproach to the State, and recently a Good Roads Association was formed, with William H. Cook president. This letter had been sent out to prominent men of the State relative to the new organization:

"A Good Roads Association has been formed in our State. It is not a political association, and we want every man's support who is a good roads man. We believe the time has come when we must rise and demand something to be done. Year after year passes with no improvement, while in Maryland and Virginia the best of improvements are taking place. Auto licenses are paid into the treasury of the State year after year and voted out by our legislature for every other purpose than for 'good roads.' In politics we have had every issue from both parties that could be thought of, from muskrat laws up or down, but never once, by either side, the great and vital issue to every citizen, namely, good roads; and now we ask all good roads advocates to join us and help us bring about tolerable conditions. Something must be done, and it is incumbent on every citizen to give his assistance, and do it promptly. No candidate for office this year on any ticket can have our votes if he is not for 'good roads' first of all and above every other issue."

The letter is bringing many responses, and it looks as if the good roads movement will result in much benefit.

PROMINENT EDUCATOR LEAVES DELAWARE

Becomes Principal Of Mauch Chunk Township

Mr. George S. Messersmith, supervising principal of the Dover Public Schools for the past two years, has been elected supervising principal of the schools in Mauch Chunk Township, Carbonate county, Pa. In this position Mr. Messersmith will have supervision over the six schools in the township, one of them being a large modern high school, which with its equipment cost about \$100,000. It is understood that Mr. Messersmith has accepted the position.

Mr. Messersmith is well-known in Newark, where he for five years held the position of principal of Newark public schools. He has been an active member of the State Board of Education and is now serving as its vice-president. Mr. Messersmith has also been a member of the State Board of Examiners since the creation of that board. A text book written by him on "The Government of Delaware" is in general use in the schools of Delaware. He has also contributed articles along the lines of the teaching of English, home industrial work and medical inspection of schools. Until a year ago he served as the President of the State Association of Principals and High School Teachers.

Prisoners Escape From Greenbank

James Deshields and William Chamberlain, serving six and three year terms in the Workhouse at Greenbank, made their escape from the prison while the inmates were exercising on Sunday. Making a flying leap they caught the bars of a window in the East wing of the prison and standing on the sill managed to grasp the edge of the 20-foot concrete yard wall upon which they pulled themselves and dropped to the ground outside. They outfought quickly pursuing guards and disappeared in the thick woods near Stanton. As they wore the regular uniform it was thought that they would not long elude capture.

Officers' Camp Of Instruction

Captain L. B. Jacobs and Lieutenant Frank Clark are spending the week at the State Rifle Range, near New Castle, where a camp of instruction is being held under the direction of Lieutenant Elvid V. Hunt, U. S. A. Previous to this time it has been customary to have more instructors and include in the camp the company officers and those of the battalion. Owing to the present demand for regular army officers it has been impossible to conduct the camp in the usual way. The officers of the battalion will be instructed during next week.

Plans For Armory Complete

Receiving Money for Ground

Plans and specifications for the new Armory for Newark have been submitted to the State Military Board and that body has approved same. The plans as accepted were prepared by Architect Crawford of Wilmington.

Everything is now in readiness to begin the building as soon as title is given the State. The appropriation was made with the understanding that Newark would purchase the site.

Capt. Jacobs of Company E. has been instructed by the Board that they are ready to start immediately on receipt of clear title. To date interested citizens have donated \$400 of the \$1,000 necessary.

The Company will start out in earnest now to secure this additional amount. There is no doubt of its forthcoming—the point is who will secure place on this Roll of Honor. Any contribution you may have will be gratefully received by the officers of the company.

19 RUNS IN ONE INNING OFF WILLIS

Baseball history is crowded with the many great battles that Vic Willis, the former star, took part in while helping Pittsburgh to win pennants and a World's championship, against such noted twirlers as "Big Six" Mathewson, three fingered Brown, "Nap" Rucker, and many others, but as far as can be learned, a game that Willis pitched at Lancaster many years ago in which 19 runs was made off him in the first inning, is not recorded anywhere among the great games that he has pitched. This happened as far back as the ordinary baseball player cares to remember and there can be no doubt about the truth of that one inning batting rally for Victor now tells the story himself. It was a sore spot for years but after a player has retired from baseball for several years he no doubt begins to see the humorous side of some things that looked tragic while in active service. This is no doubt the case of Willis and the Lancaster game, for sitting by the fire-side one cold day last winter he recalled this game played up among the Dutch and told the story of how he was battered for 19 runs in one inning.

In those days as near as the writer can find out, was about the same time that Billy Bryan first thought of trying to make a home run to the White House, Lancaster, Pa., and Newark, N. J., were members of the old Atlantic League. Deacon Ellis, a noted character among baseball men of his day was manager of the Newark Club and he had an important series on with Lancaster at Lancaster.

This was of course before Willis made his debut in the big show with Boston under Seale. Ellis was anxious to win this series and hearing of the great drop that the Newark boy had perfected sent for him and gave up \$25 of real currency for him to pitch one of the games. Willis started the first inning and Deacon being a humorist chap himself, let him finish it. When the scorers got through tabulating it was found that 19 runs had been scored.

Deacon Ellis, after this one inning, is said to have looked Willis over in a sorrowful sort of way and remarked, "Young fellow, to avoid any possible accidents you had better start for home at once." "I am on my way," countered Vic.

Dr. Sypherd Gives Extension Lectures

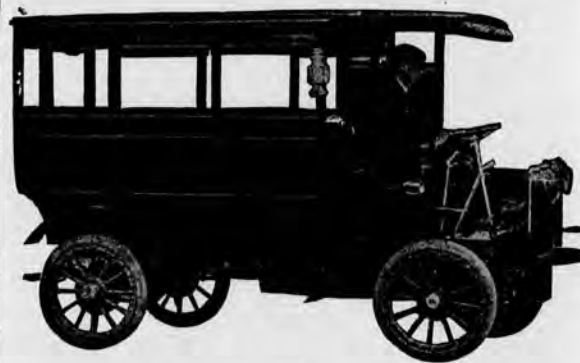

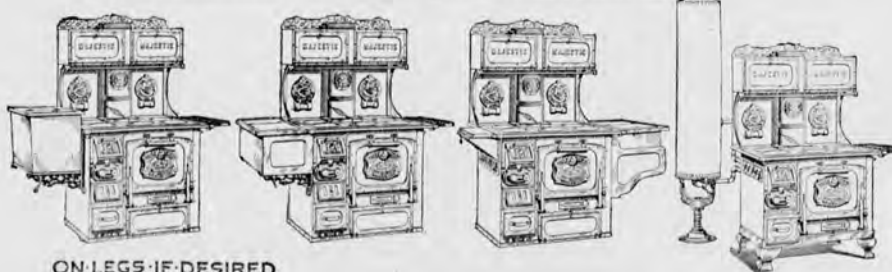

PSYCHOLOGY VERSUS FACT

The statement made by President Wilson, that the present business depression is "merely psychological" is, indeed, interesting. Not that it gives any definite information of the cause, but that it is an official admission, by the Administration, of the existing conditions. Democrat politicians and the Democratic press have been, for months, proclaiming prosperity. They have done their duty well. If there is anything in suggestion, the country would be living under unprecedented prosperity. But now, contrary to statements of Democratic press, here comes the President with an admission of the actual state of affairs.

While we admire his frankness, we take issue with his interpretation of the cause. It smacks of text book economics. The present slump can not be explained away as "merely psychological." Class room theories have not reached the science that permits of such ready application to the actual facts of the business world.

We do not question his honesty nor his patriotism. No more do we question the honesty or patriotism of the great bulk of the business men in this country. But in dismissing a delegation of business representatives with that "psychological" platitude, that much advertised Wilson firmness ceases to be an individual virtue and becomes the rule or ruin policy known as Democratic stubbornness. Had the President admitted conditions and shown a spirit of co-operation, we might accuse him of error in judgment. But to set his opinion, founded on theory and campaign catch phrases, against that of men who have led lives teeming with practical problems of business—it simply brings out the startling fact of his teaching days has not lessened. He has clearly shown that when he has the power he will project his personal opinion into legislation without even granting the courtesy of conferring with those who may differ with him. No act of the present administration has so shocked the same mind of the business world as has that "merely psychological" dismissal of business men who called for consultation.

The G. A. R. incident while petty was only personal in its influence. But the psychological episode shows an autocrat that may well cause alarm.

that we will have to appeal to the good citizens and business men of this town for support in order to continue these concerts, as the starting is too much for the boys to keep up, while it would be only a trifle for the town people if there was a good number contributing.

If there is anyone who can give a better suggestion as to the handling of this, we would be glad to hear from them. If a monthly contribution is decided upon, we are ready to receive same and if you will only give us your name (which will not be made public), we will call on you for the contribution and not put you to any trouble at all. We would be glad to hear from any one on this subject.

We learn from inquiry that in other towns of from one to two thousand inhabitants, where they have a band, the band is supported by the town through a yearly contribution.

We are under the impression that these concerts are a benefit to the town as well as the people and should not be overlooked.

Now everybody get busy and see what can be done. We will do our part if some others will only help a little, no matter how small it would be. Every little helps.

On Wednesday, June 10, the Alumni will have a special luncheon in the gymnasium. The luncheon will be followed by the regular business meeting. A greater number of the Alumni are expected back this year than ever before.

Game Conditions In Delaware Never Better

The reports received by the State Game and Fish Commission from all parts of the State show that the Game is rapidly increasing. Many hundreds of young quail have already been seen and rabbits are unusually plentiful. Supt. A. B. Merriam of the State Game Farm has just reported to Chief Warden LeFevre that 550 young pheasants have hatched, and over a thousand pheasant eggs are setting. Experiments are also being conducted on the State Farm with wild ducks and quail, and the indications are that the Commission will have many birds to distribute over the State for stocking purposes. It is hoped that a distribution can be made within a few months.

The game fishing has also been unusually fine. Most of the ponds and many of the streams of our State afford unrivaled bass fishing. Some of the grandfathers of this funny tribe have been landed since

the season opened on May 20th. Quite a list of applications for fish for stocking purposes has been filed with the Bureau of Fisheries at Washington, and notice has been received that all of the applications will be filled in order.

The strong protest lodged with the Department of Agriculture against the Federal regulation, which prohibited reed bird shooting in Delaware, has resulted in the Department issuing a notice that the reed bird season would be restored to Delaware. The new regulation provides an open season on reed birds during September and October. This news has been hailed with delight by thousands of Delaware sportsmen, whose chief delight is hunting for the toothsome reed, as it again permits them to enjoy their favorite sport as heretofore.

Very few reports of violations of the game laws are being received, and the general observance of the laws is very gratifying to the Commissioners. A noticeable increase in the numbers of our native song birds is also reported, and beneficial results in the lessening of bugs and insects will surely follow. Every one is urged to co-operate in the good work, and give the birds a chance. Dogs and cats are the worst enemies of the birds, and should be restrained from doing damage. Many stray dogs and cats infest our State, and should be destroyed on sight. The English sparrow is probably the worst enemy of our native birds and individuals and communities are urged to wage an unceasing warfare upon them.

"Pennsy" Roll Of Honor

Approximately ten millions of dollars have been paid out of the Company's revenues in pension allowances to employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad System up to May 1st, 1914, according to a report issued today. The exact sum paid out to date is \$9,912,67.95.

The pension roll, or "Roll of Honor" as it is termed by the Company, contains 4,123 names. Of this number 63 were added in May, making a total increase of 306 names since the end of last year. Some idea of the scope of the pension system of the Pennsylvania Railroad may be gathered from the fact that since the "Roll of Honor" was established on the lines East of Pittsburgh on January 1st, 1900, and on the lines West a year later, 8,047 employees have enjoyed its benefits—of that number, 3,924 have died.

The Pennsylvania was the first American railroad to establish for its employees a pension system wholly dissociated from any other provident undertaking, and financed exclusively from the Company's revenues. Last year the total appropriations on the lines East and West of Pittsburgh for pensions amounted to \$1,168,584.33.

CHERRY SHERBERT

1 qt. of sour cherries
1 lb. sugar
1 qt. of water
Boil the sugar and water together for fifteen minutes. Stone the cherries, add them to the syrup, and stand aside until perfectly cold. Press through a very fine sieve, freeze, and add meringue as directed. Stir constantly while freezing. Beat the white of one egg until frothy, then add a tablespoonful of powdered sugar and beat until white and stiff. When the mixture is frozen, remove the dasher, stir in the meringue, repack and stand aside to cool.

ROMAN PUNCH

4 large juicy lemons
1 quart of water
1 orange
1 1/4 pounds of sugar
Freeze the lemon water ice until it is very, very hard. Beat the whites of three eggs until frothy, add four tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar and beat until stiff and firm. Stir this into the water ice, with two tablespoonfuls of rum, a gill of champagne and two tablespoonfuls of marachino. Repack, using an extra quantity of salt.

FROZEN STRAWBERRIES

1 qt. of strawberries
Juice of two lemons
1 pound of sugar
1 quart of water

Add the sugar and lemon juice to the berries, stand aside one hour. Mash the berries, add the water, stir until the sugar is thoroughly dissolved and freeze slowly. Repack and stand aside to ripen.

STUFFED MOUSSE

1 qt. strawberry water ice
1 pt. cream
1 teaspoonful powdered vanilla
1-2 cup powdered sugar
Whip the cream to a stiff froth, drain it, sprinkle over it the sugar and vanilla, and mix carefully.

Pack a two quart mould in salt and ice, line it with the strawberry water ice, reserving enough to cover the bottom of the mould. Turn the whipped cream in the center, cover the water ice over the bottom, put on the lid, bind it with a strip of buttered muslin. Cover with salt and ice and stand aside for three or four hours.

To dish the dessert, lift the mould from the ice and carefully wipe off the salt. Wipe the bottom with a towel dipped in boiling water, put a dish over the top of it, turn it upside down and remove the can; if it should stick wipe it again with the hot towel.

CHOCOLATE PUDDING

1 qt. milk
1 heaping teaspoonful corn starch
2 eggs
1 cup sugar
A little butter and a pinch of salt
2 ozs. of chocolate
Mix the corn starch with a small quantity of the milk, yolks of eggs, sugar and salt. Dissolve the chocolate over steam, and gradually mix with a small quantity of the milk. Heat the remainder of the milk to near boiling. Add the butter; stir in the other ingredients and allow to boil for two minutes. Beat the whites of eggs to a stiff meringue. Spread over the top and brown in a quick oven.

SNOW PUDDING

Pour one pint of boiling water on one-half box of gelatine; add juice of two lemons and two cups of sugar. Strain and let stand until nearly cold and it begins to stiffen. Beat in whites of three eggs, until white as snow and stiff. Serve with the following custard.

CUSTARD

Add one pint of milk to the three yolks of beaten eggs; sweeten and thicken with one small teaspoonful of cornstarch. Flavor highly with vanilla.

FEW REALIZE EXTENT OF WORK PLANNED

Society Of Civic And Social Welfare Explains Object

The organizing committee of the proposed Delaware Society of Civic and Social Welfare held a meeting in its temporary office at duPont Building at Wilmington. There was an interesting discussion of the work.

Some members of the committee in talks with friends had been asked a question of the need for \$10,000. This shows that the people of the State have not yet appreciated the thoroughness of the work planned and what it means to do the work right. There is no agency in the State at present familiar with the details of all welfare work and legislation.

Very few citizens can answer the question as to just where Delaware stands in the civic and social progress in its many departments.

There is a need of study to be carried on with thoroughness and serious purpose. To make this study worth while by gathering first hand and accurate information of conditions within the state and experience outside of it, will require available funds. To treat as a whole the improvement needed in the State and decide on the relative urgency of social questions, the General Service Board must be familiar with the details of all questions, and reduce them to a basis for study and presentation to the preparing of data on many points and that a capable general secretary conduct investigations any early out the work.

Once the study of a question or questions has been completed, and the society as a whole has voted on a line of procedure in regard to approved measures, the efforts of the board and general secretary will be devoted to an educational campaign. The thoroughness and efficiency of this campaign will again depend upon funds for bringing the necessary information before the people of the State in a telling manner.

In many cases the hard and unsettled work of a small group of people in the State has failed or ended in compromise unsatisfactory to business interests and reformers alike. Had such a General Service Board and society been in existence to conduct hearings and prepare an impartial setting forth of the situation based upon thorough and comprehensive study and investigation supplementing and backing the efforts of the original workers, the history of these movements might have been more satisfactory.

While the educational campaign is being carried forward by the General Service Board and any particular approved problem which calls for legislation, the legislative committee will be preparing for the final presentation of the measure before Legislature or Council, employing the outside legal assistance necessary. For, by whatever individual or group of individuals bills may be presented, legislation itself which is to fulfill its purpose for the permanent and effective protection of human rights and the preservation of the material well-being and resources of a community must be prepared under the direction of trained minds.

There is no limit to the possible activities of such a permanent body as the proposed Delaware Society of Civic and Social Welfare with its active general board. There are many questions concerning which it is not necessary to go to law. Only an awakened conscience or accurate knowledge on the part of the public is sufficient to correct many of the minor evils and unfortunate conditions of today.

The committee does not believe that this General Service Board and Society will be able to carry through every measure necessary for the good of the State without meeting difficulties and delays, but those who have given most thought to the problem do believe that the idea if sufficient support can be secured to work it out properly, is worth a trial, and that the good resulting from continued concerted effort on these broad and thorough-going lines will more than repay the citizens for the expenditure of the moral and financial support now called for.

Harvest Hands Wanted In The Middle West

The Division of Information of the Bureau of Immigration, U. S. Department of Labor, has received telegrams from Kansas, Missouri, and South Dakota concerning the need of harvest hands in those States, in addition to the request from Oklahoma which appeared in bulletin dated May 27, 1914.

Persons interested in obtaining work of this kind should apply to the offices in the States named. It will be necessary for those desiring work to defray their own expenses to the place of employment.

KANSAS

30,000 men needed; wages will range upward from \$2 per day and board, average probably \$2.50. Large percentage of men will be needed for from 90 to 120 days. Men can go direct to towns in wheat belt in central and western Kansas

and be distributed to farmers by local organizations, or write to W. L. O'Brien, Director, State Free Employment Bureau, Topeka, Kansas, for directions.

MISSOURI

30,000 men needed; wages \$2 to \$3.50 per day according to experience, class of work, and conditions; three to six months' work, beginning about June 15. Apply to State Free Employment Offices at St. Louis, Kansas City, or St. Joseph, or write to John T. Fitzpatrick, Labor Commissioner, Jefferson City, Mo., for directions.

SOUTH DAKOTA

Harvest help needed beginning about July 15; wages \$2 to \$3.50 per day and board. Considerable of the former wheat acreage is now in alfalfa and corn, and help will be needed through husking. Apply to Charles McCaffree, Commissioner of Immigration, Pierre, S. D.

as well elect one because he has a
 bald head or sings bass. A city
 government should be a corporate
 government. The city of Dayton,
 Ohio, has a model government.
 They secured the best man they
 could for the position of manager
 of the city's affairs and pay him a
 salary of over \$12,000 a year. It is
 the most democratic form of gov-
 ernment and it is the most efficient.
 The manager is held responsible
 for the management of the city's
 affairs. The biggest job a man has
 he declared, is the management of
 the city's affairs."

Anniversary Of Y. M. C. A.

Seventy years ago on June 6, the
 work of the Young Men's Chris-
 tian Association was started in
 London by George Williams, a lad
 of 19, fresh from the farm, when
 his personal influence among his
 fellow-clerks so changed their lives
 that where it had been said of
 them it was impossible for one to
 be a Christian it became impossible
 to be anything but a Christian. In
 this experience he worked out the
 idea of the Young Men's Christian
 Association. He called together a
 few of his fellow-clerks and they
 held weekly prayer meetings in the
 dormitory over the store in which
 they worked. As the result of the
 movement a complete transforma-
 tion had been made in the habits
 and character of the dry goods
 clerks of London.

The secret of the great strength
 of the association movement is the
 same today that it was in London
 70 years ago. It is not represented
 by one hundred million invested in
 brick and stone, neither by the na-
 tional, state and local boards of in-
 fluential men, but by the young
 men, many of them in their teens,
 imbued with the idea to help
 young men with whom they come
 in daily contact.

The principle of this early move-
 ment though simple and compre-
 hensive has survived and is the
 foundation and inspiration of the
 association today. On this the as-
 sociation has been planted in 50
 countries with 1,100,000 members
 (600,000 in America), \$115,000,000
 of buildings and equipment (four-
 fifths in America), enlisting 6,000
 employed officers (five-sixths in
 America), and extending its bene-
 ficent services to every class of
 young men—college men, school
 boys, working boys, country boys,
 railroad men, soldiers, sailors, me-
 chanics, miners, immigrants and
 business men. Its success in the
 Orient is quite as great as in the
 western countries and China, Japan
 and India now look upon the as-
 sociation as one of the most effective
 agencies of bringing the message
 of Christ to their people.

The local Young Men's Chris-
 tian Association organized in 1889
 is a branch of this world-wide or-

ganization. The work of this as-
 sociation has likewise advanced
 with rapid strides. The people of
 Wilmington have seen the associa-
 tion in comparatively a few years
 move from the rented quarters into
 the magnificent building which it
 now occupies. Just a few interest-
 ed men conducted the activities in
 the early days of the association,
 now hundreds of men are support-
 ing and are intensely interested in
 all branches of its work. This great
 achievement has been and is the
 work of young men.

The motto of the association is,
 "Work for Young Men by Young
 Men." The organization is thor-
 oughly democratic, controlled by its
 membership and the great propor-
 tion of its members are young men
 under 30. Its ranks are constantly
 recruited with boys and young
 men and thus it maintains its
 character of perennial youth.
 George Williams, its founder, never
 lost the spirit of youth, but the
 welfare of the young men was al-
 ways to him the most vital interest
 that could engage his attention.
 It is a comfort to those who have
 watched for many years the growth
 of the association to feel that this
 same process of reincarnation of
 youth is still going on, and that we
 may safely entrust to the young
 men of today and tomorrow the
 work so wisely built up by young
 men of the past 70 years.

TAKING STOCK OF A TOWN

An Appeal To The Civic Conscience

One of the most popular lectur-
 ers appearing on the program of
 the Chautauqua in session in Dela-
 ware towns this week, is Frank
 Dixon who made the acquaintance
 of local audiences on the spring
 circuit last year. Mr. Dixon's sub-
 ject this season is "Taking Stock
 of a Town." The speaker, by way
 of preliminary, has a fund of apt
 stories which he uses to illustrate
 his address and incidentally to put
 his audience in a receptive frame
 of mind.

He says: "I am here to tell you
 to get acquainted with your own
 city. The successful business firm
 has a disinterested individual to
 come in and look them over. A town
 should be similarly investigated. A
 town is a corporation and should
 be conducted as efficiently as any
 business firm on earth. The affairs
 of a city should be conducted as
 economically and efficiently as a
 business corporation. No city can
 investigate itself; there must be ex-
 pert guidance from without. The
 object of such a survey is to lay
 bare the condition of the commu-
 nity. Sum up your forces and con-
 serve your energy that it may be
 rightly directed. The first element
 of value in your assets is the plan
 you are pursuing when you are
 building your city. The average
 town and city in the United States
 is an ugly, dirty blemish on the face
 of nature. Are you pursuing an
 intelligent design when you are
 building your city? When you
 build your house, you have a plan.
 Why don't we draw a plan of the
 city we want to build? When a
 woman makes a quilt without a
 plan, she calls it a crazy quilt. The
 same is true of a town built with-
 out a plan. If a hundred years
 ago you had a plan of your city, it
 would have been a hundredfold
 more beautiful. There is such an
 enormous waste in building in a
 haphazard manner."

In speaking of education, Mr.
 Dixon says: "Have you had your
 schools thoroughly investigated? Your
 superintendent ought to have
 the right to search the county over
 and get the best teachers available.
 Do you pay your superintendent a
 good salary? Do you send your
 superintendent to see what meth-
 ods other countries are using in
 educational matters? What kind
 of salaries do you pay your teach-
 ers? Probably less than a farm
 hand receives. You probably hire

more women than men teachers be-
 cause they are cheaper. When a
 woman does the work of a man and
 does it well, she should receive sim-
 ilar pay." He pointed out that
 boys should have men teachers
 when they reach the adolescent age.

Then some questions were asked
 regarding the government of the
 city.

"What kind of assets have you
 got in city government? Did you
 ever elect a mayor because he was
 a Democrat or Republican? Might

Big Spring Fair At Oxford

Taking everything into consideration the outlook for the fair is more encouraging this spring, than for many seasons past, and, given weather that is at all favorable, the management will come out on the right side of the ledger, and with the confidence of the people, increased tenfold in the ability and discretion of the directors of this movement, which has had nearly half a century of uninterrupted success.

DEMOCRATIC MADNESS

The Administration's Mexican Plan

"The President is determined to upset the established institutions of a neighboring country. He is determined to upset the established institutions of this country. He has a passion, he says, for the 'tolling railroads.' He will not only be their champion in person but he will devote the resources and the power of this nation to the accomplishment of his purpose. History grows with the disasters such policies have occasioned. International law is civilization's answer to their impracticability."

"Motives of philanthropy may be assigned for this unwarrantable interference," said Andrew Jackson in reference to a sovereign people's undoubted right to regulate their own internal affairs, "and weak men may persuade themselves for a moment that they are laboring in the cause of humanity and asserting the rights of the human race; but everyone, upon sober reflection, will see that nothing but mischief can come from these improper assaults upon the feelings and rights of others." Lincoln would not even emancipate the slaves until it became necessary as a

war measure, so sure was he of the final justice of this doctrine.

With clever phrases, the President has built up a situation which does not exist. His analysis of the domestic business depression is an example. Agrarian reform at our dictation in Mexico can be regarded by the responsible elements only as a program of spoliation, which, Americans are beginning to realize, is not much different from that pursued at home toward those with much property and few votes.

From Argentina come reports of peonage worse than slavery; also from Brazil. Conditions abhorrent to the American concept of right exist in all parts of the world. We are not responsible for them and we cannot cure them. The Administration by not recognizing Huerta and by supporting the Constitutionalists made Mexico's problems our problems, as if it did not have enough of its own to solve at home, or as though its concept of justice were sufficient excuse for sweeping aside all right between nations as centuries of experience settled it.

It is utter madness. That it has any support at all only shows how

easily a people can be led into an untenable position. Mediation, the hopelessness and helpless state into which the Mexicans have been plunged, may miraculously save this nation from the consequences of the Administration's mania. All good citizens hope so. But there is no longer any confidence in the Administration's reasoning. Intelligent citizens are humiliated by the spoliatoric conduct of our foreign affairs. They are indignant that the nation should have been led into a ridiculous position, at variance with our whole history, without instruction from the people. There will be more crises, more grave incidents, before we are through, and the success of mediation will be but the beginning of a long series of problems which will attend pacification. We are engaged in an adventure which is more hazardous because it is so unnecessary.

The day will be generally observed throughout the United States by school children, members of patriotic societies and others. Owing to the recent Tampico incident and the demands made upon the Mexican Government to fire a salute, Flag Day will be of greater significance than ever.
