Dear Dannie:

We left Mexico City last Tuesday morning and arrived here early Friday morning. We have a comfortable attractive apartment 12 K and the meals in the restaurant are good. The trip up was comfortable and we really enjoyed it.

I had written Dresel we were coming and called him Friday morning. We saw him Friday afternoon and for 2 hours and he made an exam of Marion including cardiogram. He found her pulse much too fast and the cardiogram undoubtedly showed some irregularities. As Marion complains so much of her stomach and bowels and has so much gas, I suggested a stomach examination. Dresel gave her some medicine to slow down pulse - asked her to keep quiet over week end and see him Monday. Tauber came Saturday to take blood for tests I did not have a chance to talk to Dresel alone but he did not seem disturbed during examination.

Marion has been feeling better the last two weeks and we were much encouraged. She felt fine Friday, but altho we stayed at hotel Saturday quietly, I could feel she did not feel so well, and her pulse was fast.

I am sure there is nothing important but I want Dresel to make very thorough exams of the intestinal tract and I think he will start on that tomorrow. It will take him at least a week for all the tests and we will stay here at the Carlyle as long as necessary.

I spoke with the Bank in Washington today and told them I would be over some time this coming week. Allan Graydon will be here on some business Monday, and Edwin Graydon is coming here Tuesday. So Alland and Edwin and I can have all Tuesday on Mexlight matters.

I have spoken with Bachrach and we will have some time together Monday to get me fully up to date on Barcelona.

Jack Franklin of the U.S. Lines had gone to his farm in Maryland when I called Saturday but his Vice President told me that they had accommodations for the four of you on the America on Aug. 31. He had word from London that morning. I said that I had only asked for Hettie Edna, and he said that London must have had further word from Brussels, as they were reserving for four. I do hope this means you are returning at that time. He said that as now as General Franklin has my letter, he gave orders that a way had to be found for the accommodations on the America Aug. 31.

I got your envelope containing the copy of the resolution. Many, many thanks! You are too kind and thoughtful and generous. When Allan Graydon is here Monday and Tuesday we can talk this over. There is and can be no hurry.

There are so many things to talk over. I do not cover any business in this letter, but will be writing you in a few days.

We are thinking of you all - and miss you. Marion joins in love and good wishes to you all.
