Council strikes language on rental inspections

The Newark City Council Monday night struck provisions in a revised city code that was viewed as a way to force tenants to allow building inspector to enter rental property.

Councilman David Athey said the language presented a number of problems. The city would still have the right to inspect rental property. In cases where the landlord or tenant refused to admit a building inspector, the city would still have the right to seek an administrative warrant to impose an

inspection. Also, exteriors would not be affected in cases where code violations are evident.

The language in the section of the ordinance had come under fire from the American Civil Liberties Union and landlords as being unconstitutional.

Landlord John Bauscher said he was not happy with the attitude of the city in not informing residents about the right to not let inspectors enter the dwelling. Bauscher said he would join other landlords to let tenants know about the right to refuse entry.

Bruce Harvey, president of the

Duo may be connected to 40 jewelry thefts

New Castle County Police have arrested two men for multiple counts of burglary and related offenses after an alert detective located a stolen ring at a Christiana jewelry store.

Detective Eric Godwin, who was investigating an unrelated crime, saw the ring among other jewelry that had been recently pawned. His work led to tying the men to 40 or more jewelry thefts in the Newark area.

Based on the characteristics, Godwin conducted a computer inquiry and determined the ring had been reported stolen on October 4, from a home in the unit block of Maple Avenue in the Newark area.

The detective learned the ring had been pawned by Amara Gumaneh who resides in the unit block of Fairway Road in Newark (Hunters Crossing Apartments).

Godwin later executed a search warrant at Gumaneh's apartment where he recovered a large amount of stolen property that included: jewelry, elec-

tronic devices, wallets, credit cards and foreign currency. Two handguns with obliterated serial numbers were also found in the home.

The residents of the apartment, Amara Gumaneh, 19, Kesselle Kanda, 20, were found at home and were arrested without incident. They were charged with seven counts of burglary and related offenses. Both were committed to the Howard Young Prison after failing to post \$69,000 secured bail on October 13.

As a result of additional follow-up and linking some of the recovered property to additional victims, detectives charged them (on Monday) with an additional 26 criminal offenses stemming from this case. They were both arraigned at the prison and each received an additional \$17,000 secured bail.

So far, the suspects have been linked to burglaries that have occurred in the following communities over the past four months: Rutherford, Harbor Club Apartments, Scottfield, Robscott Manor, Breezewood, Harmony Woods, and other communities within the city of Newark.

Robbery occurs at Pathmark

Police are on the lookout for an unknown suspect who robbed a cashier at Pathmark, located at 100 College Sq. Shopping Center, last Friday.

The victim told officers that she had observed a white male, wearing a black hat, black hooded sweatshirt, and camouflage pants, walk into the employee's section of the customer service desk and demand that she open the cash drawer. After several attempts, the employee stated that she couldn't get the drawer open. The suspect then lifted his jacket and said "Don't make me do anything stupid." The employee said she saw a bulge in the suspect's waistband, believing it to be a handgun.

The drawer was finally opened, where the suspect took an unknown amount of cash and fled the store. The victim notified a manager who chased the robber on foot. When the manager caught up to the suspect, the suspect displayed a large military-style knife. The suspect fled into a dark-colored minivan and drove out of the store's loading dock area, heading northbound on Library Ave., with its lights off.

A search of the scene revealed no usable video surveillance footage or additional witnesses. A Be On the Lookout (BOLO) was issued for the van with no reports so far. An inventory of the cash drawer is still pending.

17 criminal offenses

Newark Police have arrested William Johnson, 29, of Fleming Street., Newark. He has been charged with 17 criminal offenses after an incident that occurred on October 21 around 5:30 p.m.

Police reported the Newark 911 Center received a call about a man with a gun on O'Daniel Avenue. O'Daniel is on the west side of the city near Casho Mill and Elkton Road. The officers could not locate the suspect, but soon found the victims of the incident. The investigation revealed the following:

The victim is the former girlfriend of Johnson and was a passenger in a car being driven by her current boyfriend. Also in the car were a male friend of the victim and the victim's two small children. As the car was being driven on O'Daniel, Johnson pulled in front of the vehicle, causing it to stop. Johnson then got out of his vehicle, opened the front door of the victim vehicle, and punched the driver. Johnson

then opened the back door of the car, pulled the male passenger from the car, and began a fight with the man.

After punches were exchanged, Johnson got back into his car and drove in reverse down O'Daniel Ave, toward a house where he is known to stay. The driver of the victim's car parked and the group began to walk toward the victim's house. While entering the house, the victims saw Johnson walking toward them, carrying a handgun. Johnson cocked the hammer of the gun as he approached. The victims entered the house, and Johnson shortly began banging on the door. Johnson banged on the door repeatedly, but eventually left when the door was not opened.

Officers located Johnson at a residence on O'Daniel Avenue and took him into custody. It was learned that there was an active court order for Johnson to have no contact with the victim. Johnson was charged with five counts of Aggravated Menacing, five counts of Reckless Endangering, two counts of Endangering the Welfare of a Child, two counts of Offensive Touching, and one count each

of Possession of a Firearm During the Commission of a Felony, Possession of a Firearm by a Person Prohibited, and Breach of Release. After an initial appearance at JP Court #2, Johnson was committed to the Young Correctional Facility, Wilmington, in default of \$32,000 bond.

Sign damaged again at Main St. business

A lively discussion by Dean, Rove at UD

Feuding, bickering, diametrically opposed – these are a few of the aspects of the political landscape that Delawareans have seen in the past few months with the hotly contested U.S. Senate seat up for grabs. Both Democrats and Republicans can't seem to agree on much these days, and Monday night's event, "Election Eve: Howard Dean and Karl Rove Together", was no exception.

The discussion was part of UD Speaks, a series dedicated to bringing world-class leaders to Delaware, the event, and moderated by Ralph Begleiter, former CNN correspondent and director of the UD Center for Political Communication. Held at the Bob Carpenter Center, the event brought together two of the most-widely recognized authorities on American politics.

Using a question-and-answer format involving both Begleiter and previously-recorded questions from UD students, the hour-long session covered such topics as the downfalls of the

two-party system, the effects of the Tea Party movement on the Republican Party, the effects the media has played in elections, the positives and negatives of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, immigration legislature, and the effect of raising or lowering taxes on the economy.

Though a few times Dean, former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and Rove, former senior advisor and political strategist for Pres. George W. Bush, agreed on some points the other made, most of the event involved the two in a vigorous and heated debate on the basic ideologies that divide Democrats and Republicans, across the country and in Delaware.

On the effects the Tea Party has had on Republican primaries, a hot-button topic in the First State, Rove said that it has had a largely positive effect in that a higher than anticipated number of registered Independent voters across the nation have shifted and will vote with Republicans. Dean called it a "mixed bag", in that, positively, Democrats, especially young voters, are mobilizing in response to the extremist views expressed by the Tea

Party, but are also worried about the effects of what is being said by the opposition.

As part of the discussion, Begleiter brought up the Senate race in Delaware between Chris Coons and Christine O'Donnell and the effect O'Donnell had in winning the primary from U.S. Rep. Mike Castle. Both Dean and Rove, showing their respect for Castle, agreed that had he won the primary, the U.S. Senate seat would have been his in the general election. But the dynamic changed greatly when Republican voters, upset with the policies of career politicians like Castle, voted for O'Donnell,

a candidate who has never held a political office.

Rove showed his respect for O'Donnell by acknowledging her courage in stating the "I'm not a witch" comment in her "I'm You" campaign ad and the clarifications she made about her financial troubles. Dean talked about the primary's effect on Democrat Chris Coons, as he became the front-runner in an election that was most certainly a win for the Republicans.

Emotions were high as the topic of the media was brought up. Dean started by talking about the trusted position news had occupied when he was a child and his disappointment now as corporations have created news centers to be a profit-making

enterprise instead of a reliable information source.

Citing "If it bleeds, it leads", the idea that news outlets lead with crime and negative news pieces as a way to increase interest, Dean relayed that news agencies are focusing on sensationalism, instead of telling people what they need to know.

Rove believes that media has a big effect on elections by determining what questions are being asked, but he stated that there is a liberal, Ivy League, and Democratic domination of today's press that tilts viewpoints into their favor. He elaborated that sources like the Wall Street Journal and Fox News provide a greater diversity to the public, especially Fox which he claimed clearly separates their opinion shows from their news shows. Rove works for Fox. That prompted a loud groan from the audience.

A round of applause was heard when Dean retorted, by saying "Never put Fox & news together."

Prompted by a question from a UD student who had served in Iraq, the audience was fully engaged when the topic of the war in Iraq and the unfruitful search for weapons of mass destruction was brought up.

Rove, defending the policies of Pres. Bush, said that the reason we received bad intelligence was the dismantling of human intelligence networks in the region in the 1970's and the fact that Saddam Hussein had cultivated a disinformation campaign aimed at keeping powers in the region away from Iraq. Though Rove claimed that a large amount of physical evidence was found – uranium, shells, missiles, and warheads – and that the United States and the world community had come to the conclusion that Hussein had possessed these weapons, there was not irrefutable proof that the weapons existed.

One audience member challenged Rove by asking why reconnaissance troops were not sent into Iraq to find the proof. Rove responded by saying that it would have been impossible to move troops to the targets when information was scarce and the targets were too hard to find.

Dean continually questioned why the primary objective was not to remove Hussein from power. Rove retorted by saying that Hussein's removal without securing Iraq would have allowed Iran to control Iraq, thus creating a more powerful and unstable government in the region.

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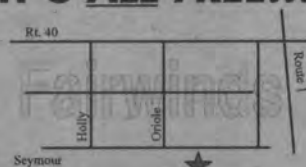

Bush named general manager for Upper Shore

Ralph Bush has been hired as the general manager of ACM Chesapeake's six Upper Shore publications, including the Cecil Whig and Newark Post, publisher David Fike announced this week. The 53 year-old Bush officially reported for his first day on the job Monday, and will be based out of the Cecil Whig offices in Elkton.

"I am excited to have Ralph join our team," Fike said. "He comes to us with an extensive amount of senior level

experience managing community daily and weekly newspapers."

Bush's duties will include overseeing the day-to-day management of American Consolidated Media's six Upper Shore publications and becoming actively involved in the community.

"We want him to look for ways for each of our publications to better serve the residents of each county we serve," Fike said.

Bush said he grew up read-

ing the Neosho Daily News, a newspaper based in Neosho, Mo., that was owned by his grandfather.

"I delivered the newspaper as a young boy," he said, adding that he did not know then that he would have a career in the newspaper business as an adult.

After leaving Missouri Southern State College in Joplin, Mo., Bush spent 15 years working in sales and customer service before eventually taking ownership of an



office machine and computer business.

About 15 years ago he began a career in the newspaper industry that has included advertising, publishing and management jobs at several newspapers in Missouri, Florida and Tennessee.

"I'm really looking forward to working for ACM and living in Cecil County," Bush said this week, adding that the job's proximity to the Chesapeake Bay and the county's five rivers would fulfill his dream of being

able to enjoy life on the water.

Bush said he is an avid sailor and already has joined the North East River Yacht Club.

"I believe a newspaper has a responsibility to the community and needs to be involved in it," he said.

Bush referred to himself as a people person and said he is excited to begin meeting people in the community.

Bush said he and his wife, Kathleen, who have three grown children, would be moving to North East.

City finances in good shape

Newark Landlord Association, also criticized what he says is the city's strategy of handling problems related to tenants via inspections, and coercion. "You can't inspect it away," he said.

A couple of residents, after hearing the statements of landlords, pointed out problems with trash, dying trees and other areas that are under the control of landlords.

Following the decision by the council, Harvey said he would like to see more of a dialogue involving all involved, including the city, landlords renters and homeowners in an effort to resolve long-standing problems. The Town and Gown Committee is one possibility, but Harvey added that broader representation on any working group would be a better idea.

Atty also said inspection is a two-way street for landlords, with tenants also having the right to seek inspections from the city.

In other matters:

• Dennis McFarland, finance director, said the city

is faring better with revenues running nearly \$2 million above the budget. A hot summer helped electric utility revenues. Those figures could fluctuate in coming months, but McFarland said the city appears to be headed in the right direction.

• The Council earlier went into closed session to discuss pending litigation. Mayor Vance Funk said no action was taken. The session presumably centered on a lawsuit by landlords who claim the city's rental fee amounts to a revenue raising tool. Chancery Court rejected the city's argument

that it has authority to levy the fee, even if it is considered to be a tax. The decision means that the suit can go forward.

• Council approved changes to the city code to reflect revised state statutes regarding child restraints in vehicles.

• Council approved the use of industrial space off Elkton Road for use as an indoor volleyball tournament center that could bring hundreds of persons to Newark for regional tournaments. The city was assured that the complex would not cause parking problems when those events were being held.

Safety awareness as the days grow shorter

October and Fall Bring Awareness to Safety for All

The cool nights are bringing about the change of color in the trees I look forward to every fall. I also notice the days are getting shorter quickly, and I am reminded that Daylight Savings time is due to end at the beginning of November. This means a lot of sun glare for drivers at the end of a long work day. At this time of year, it is harder to see other cars and pedestrians --- and pedestrians there are! More youth and college students fill the streets of Newark during the fall. These pedestrians are celebrating sports events, the cooler weather, and, of course, Halloween events in neighborhoods and on Main Street. October is also Fire Safety

Month. So, as we turn back the clocks, drive to fun events, enjoy walking, prepare costumes, and check our smoke alarms, there is a lot to think about in terms of safety for the whole family.

First, as a driver of a vehicle, be alert. Make sure you double check at intersections and at crosswalks for pedestrians. The change in time can cause drowsiness as our biological clock takes several weeks to adjust. Drive the speed limit through neighborhoods where youth and adults may be walking through driveways, alleys, medians, curbs, and between parked cars to get home or to walk their dog. Reduce distractions by not eating or using your cell phone so you can pay full attention to your surroundings. This helps fall and Halloween be a safer and more enjoyable time for all

and it could help save someone from injury.

Parents must help drivers of vehicles by teaching their youth some safety tips. Children younger than 12 need to be accompanied by an adult to make sure they are crossing streets safely at night. Older youth should go in groups and give you their planned route. Crossing at street corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks is a good strategy. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic and as far to the left as possible. Be alert for cars turning or backing up. Make the costumes more visible by adding reflective tape and ensure they don't restrict vision. Flashlights are required by law when walking at night. Of course, even though there may be a lot of favorite candy and chocolate collected, it is always wise for parents (I know we all try to sneak our favorite snack from those Halloween bags) and youth to check to make sure none of the treats are opened before eating them.

Fires and burns are a concern all year long, but we tend to remind ourselves when the clocks change it is time to vacuum and check or change batteries to our smoke detectors and smoke alarms. Safe Kids USA reports that during the colder months of the year, fires and fire-related deaths are more likely to occur at home. They also state that 40% of home fires and 50% of fire-related deaths occur in houses without smoke alarms. Children who play with fire are still a major concern of home fires. Children under five are at greatest risk for injury and death from home fires. We also know that youth and adults cause fires when they leave candles burning unattended.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has a very informational Smoke Alarm Safety Checklist that provides the following information on alarms. You should have a smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on each level of the

house. Know what type of smoke alarm you are using---an ionization alarm, a photoelectric, or combination alarm. Ionization alarms respond to a flaming fire, a photoelectric responds to a smoldering fire, and a combination responds to both. Be sure your alarms are interconnected even if they are wireless. Replace all alarms when they reach 10 years of age. Test your alarm's battery monthly using the test button to make sure it is functioning and so everyone knows what the alarm sounds like. Make sure your alarm bears a certification from a respected testing laboratory. Any trained fire fighter or educator will tell you it is very important to have an escape plan in case of a fire, to practice the plan twice a year, and have a designated place to meet outside if there is a fire in your home and you need to exit quickly.

There are special considerations for those with disabilities when it is related to fire safety plans. The NFPA has

a fire story entitled, "I know My Fire Safety Plan" for children with autism, that may help them handle a stressful incident such as a fire. For those who are deaf or hard-of-hearing, there are alarms with strobe or flashing lights to wake a sleeping person. The Delaware Department of Health and Social Services has a program called "SNAP" or Special Needs Alert Program. You can enroll your child in the program by calling the department or get materials by calling 302-223-1355.

Be prepared and safe this fall, as the days turn darker sooner, by being observant and attentive to your driving, walking, and smoke detectors or alarms. One thing I am going to enjoy is that extra hour of sleep when I turn my clock back an hour; how about you?

O'Donnell gets small business support at event

At a press conference held at the Republican Headquarters in College Square Shopping Center in Newark, U.S. Senate nominee Christine O'Donnell joined with local small business owners to discuss her views on the national and Delaware economy. Joining O'Donnell was owner "CB Joe" Williams, who talked about his support for the candidate.

CB Joe is a New Castle-based retailer of electronics and appliances. Williams said business at CB Joe is down about

20 percent because customers lack faith in the future.

In her remarks, O'Donnell said she would vote against what she calls the largest tax increase in history when Congress returns in November. She also proposed a two-year capital gains tax holiday and the end of the death tax. As Senator, she said she would work to cut regulation for business and get government out of the way.

She took note of claims that ending the tax cuts approved

during the Bush administration for those in the upper two percent in terms of income would fall heavily on small business owners.

The event did have its share of controversy when the News Journal and reporter Ginger Gibson were apparently barred from attending the press conference. The O'Donnell campaign been at loggerheads with Gibson and the newspaper. The newspaper had been allowed to attend a previous event at the Newark GOP headquarters.

owner told police that this was approximately the tenth time that damage has occurred to the sign. The damage is listed at \$300.

Main St. stabbing proved as hoax

Maryland State Troopers have detained two suspects who claimed they had been stabbed on Main Street last week. The pair, a white woman and a Hispanic male, were brought into the Christiana Hospital emergency room stating that they had been stabbed by a male in a black mask who attacked them. An examination by hospital staff showed that the male had suffered three stab wounds to his thigh area and cuts to the area between his fingers and thumbs. The female had wounds to her back. An interview by Newark Police

showed that the pair could not remember the location where the stabbing occurred and that their accounts kept varying, leading officers to believe that they were lying. A phone call from Christiana stated that Maryland State Police were on the lookout for a duo wanted in connection to a home invasion and robbery that occurred in North East, MD, earlier that night. Maryland authorities stated that the duo in Newark Police custody matched their description, including the stab wounds which happened when the home owner grabbed a knife to defend himself. Upon further questioning, the pair told officers that they had left the home owner and drove to a house in Elkton, MD, seeking a ride to a hospital. When no one was home, the suspects went to an adjacent house and asked a neighbor for a ride, using the Main Street stabbing as a cover story. The suspects asked to be dropped off

at Christiana Hospital and not Union Hospital, which made the neighbor suspicious. Police have secured the vehicle as part of the investigation. Maryland authorities have taken over the case.

Tools taken from truck

The owner of a 1985 Dodge work truck told police that someone had entered the vehicle and removed several hundred dollars worth of tools from it. The items, including a first State Home & Garden toolbox containing several small tools, a Dewalt drywall drill, a 100 ft. extension cord, a 14 amp Bosch cordless screwdriver, a Milwaukee saw, and various woodworking tools, were secured in the bed of the vehicle with a top that encloses the rear area. No other damage was reported to the truck. The tools are valued at over \$1,100.

Chancery Court allows landlord suit to proceed

The City of Newark lost one round in a lawsuit filed by a group of landlords over the city's rental permit fee. Vice Chancellor Leo Strine rejected the city's argument that it was empowered to levy the fee, even if it is determined to be a tax.

Strine's decision paves the way for the class action lawsuit to move forward by denying the city's request for a summary judgment that would have ended the suit. The landlords claim the steady rise in the rental fee makes it a tax, rather than a fee that pays for the city's cost of regulating rental properties.

Landlords hired Pennsylvania and Delaware lawyers to handle the case, a reflection of a decision in the Keystone State that deter-

mined the rental fee amount to a revenue raising tool. Separately, the city has been working to determine the costs of providing services.

In a 43-page decision that included references to the early days of rock and roll, Strine noted that the city attempted a similar move in 1958 when it attempted to levy a franchise fee on Delmarva Power & Light for electricity it sold to customers inside the city, other than the city. (Newark operates its own municipal electric utility).

In 2009, the argument emerged from counsel (after the city was faced with litigation) that Newark had broad taxing powers for 60 years, but did not discover it had such authority, Strine noted.

"Based on this history, the

plaintiff's argue that it is far too late for Newark's current lawyers to pretend that this is the very early days of rock and roll, to ignore 59 years of history, and to urge me to discover that Newark's City Council has had all of the taxing authority of the General Assembly since before Chuck Berry and Buddy Holly made the music scene, but just did not realize that this was the case," Strine wrote.

Strine also rejected the city's argument that a Chancery Court decision in the 1970s that upheld the city of Dover's authority to levy an assessment for a sewer line extension was in line with the Newark's authority to levy rental fees. He also noted that the 1950s decision by Chancery Court had been followed by the city.

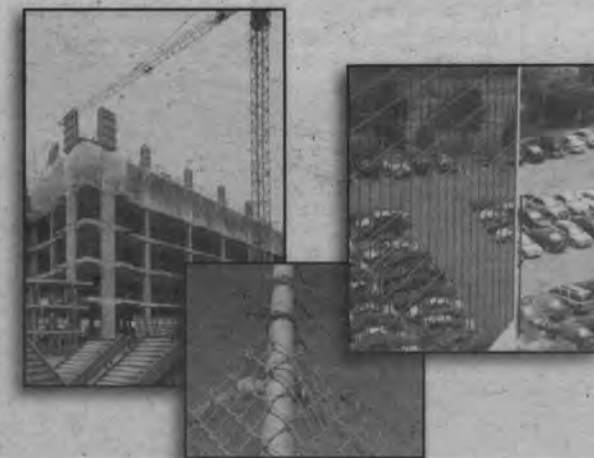

Rotary builds communities in Newark

Educating young people is not an "8 a.m. to 3 p.m. only" effort. Classroom teachers can do only so much to present good study habits and skills that our children need. The Newark Morning Rotary Club is helping reinforce what is learned in the classroom.

On Mondays and Wednesdays, for six weeks this Fall, 12 second and third graders at Downes Elementary School, Casho Mill Road, leave their classroom at dismissal time and head to the school library for help with their homework and some organized play time.

Rotarians from the local

club, along with six counselors from Newark Parks and Recreation, help the students with spelling, math, reading and other homework assignments, reinforcing the responsibility of doing homework promptly after school, developing a habit that can last throughout a lifetime. Most days the students get one-on-one help.

The CATCH program is supported by a grant from the Newark Morning Rotary Club and some assistance from the Nemours Foundation.

After a healthy snack and when homework is completed, the students then go outside with the counselors and play organized games that foster exercise, teamwork, leadership, and fair play. No technol-

ogy needed here — just good old fashioned games that do not include computers, Xbox, iPods, or GameBoys.

"This is what it's really about," said Rotary club president Clinton Tymes after one 30-minute lesson with a second grader. They were working on simple addition and subtraction problems, and at times both of them needed all 10 fingers in the air to figure out the answer.

"I thoroughly enjoyed working with these kids," Tymes said. "Just having another adult work with them reinforces what the teacher does in the classroom. They really need the attention and help."

To support the parents, the Rotary club is also sponsoring three parenting sessions lead by professional counselors that will reinforce setting good study habits at home, developing good relationships with teachers and a literacy program appropriate for all grade levels.

In addition to the tutoring sessions, the homework club students will be introduced to the Appledumpling Adventure series that teaches children how to be truthful and fair to others as well as build good partnerships.

"If we don't help in the early years, students can get left behind very quickly," said Rotarian Robin Broomall, a former teacher herself. "When

students get individual attention to reinforce what the teacher is saying, they really respond."

The Newark Morning Rotary Club also supports Downes School with tutoring in the classrooms, supplying clothes for the school nurse's emergency closet, providing ACME

gift cards for needy families, and other classroom activities. Turkeys were purchased by the club for the annual kindergarten Thanksgiving feast.

Each third grader receives their own personal student dictionary, courtesy of Rotarians, in the Fall, to help in the classroom as well as at home.

For some students, this is the first book new book that they own. All third-graders in the Christina School District get dictionaries courtesy of the Newark Morning, Christiana, and Newark Rotary clubs.

OUT OF THE ATTIC

This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated picture of Ott's Chapel from the 100th Year Anniversary Celebration leaflet for the service held June 5, 1971. Stephen Ott moved here from Bridesburg, PA in 1840. He was a farmer, had fruit orchards, and was the first to bring strawberry culture to this area. Ott, a Methodist, held religious meetings in his home. After the end of the war in 1865 he changed to the Christian denomination. In 1871 he built Ott's Chapel with the financial help of several neighbors. From then until his death, and assisted by his wife Jane, he held Sunday school and preaching services each Sunday and also weeknight services. Jane continued the services for a few years after his death.

In 1889 George Blake, a member of the Elkton Bar, organized a Sunday school that met in the Pleasant Valley School. In a short time he moved it to Ott's Chapel where services had been discontinued. With the help of his brother-in-law John Frazer, and John's brother Dr. James Frazer, the Sunday school kept



going until Blake's death in 1910. William Walton of Iron Hill, MD, grandson of Stephen Ott, was elected Superintendent and served for 27-1/2 years until his death in 1943. Ott's Chapel was incorporated December 13, 1929. The room in the back was built in 1956 to increase class space. Mrs. Florence Savin succeeded Walton as Superintendent followed by Mrs. Frances Peel whose term included the 100th anniversary.

The Newark Historical Society seeks interior pictures of Ott's Chapel and more information about the congregation.

Christina District football squads all win

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For the first time since the third week of the 2007 season all three Christina School District football teams won on the same weekend.

The game at Hoffman Stadium resembled more of a track meet than a football game, but when the final horn sounded it was Newark High that walked away with a thrilling 44-35 victory over A.I. du Pont (5-2, 2-2 Flight A).

Junior quarterback Taylor Reynolds either threw or ran on nearly every play from scrimmage, finishing with 242 yards through the air and 176 on the ground and four offensive touchdowns. But despite his spectacular play on offense, his biggest play of the night came on the defensive side of the ball when he intercepted a pass and ran it back 60 yards for a touchdown with less than two minutes remaining in the game to seal the win for the Yellowjackets.

"I was just thankful I had the strength and energy to make the play and win the game for my team," Reynolds said of his game-winning touchdown.

Newark (3-4, 2-2 Flight A)

plays at Glasgow (2-5, 1-3) Friday at 7.

Glasgow picked up its second win of the season with a 20-14 win over Delcastle (1-6, 1-4). The Dragons trailed 14-0 at the half but junior running back D'Andre Johnson scampered 70 yards for a third-quarter touchdown to make the score 14-8. Sophomore quarterback Khari Ngozi then hit senior wide receiver Andre Davis for a 25-yard score to tie the game (PAT failed) early in the fourth quarter. Johnson then scored the game-winner on a 9-yard run with 1:20 remaining in the game.

"This win gives our young team a lot of confidence," Glasgow coach Shannon Riley said of last week's game before looking ahead to Friday night's showdown. "Newark is our rival and we know we have to play our 'A' game to beat them. We are very similar to them. We both run wide open offenses with great quarterbacks. I think it will be an entertaining game for all to see."

Christiana celebrated homecoming by picking up its first win, 20-14 over Brandywine (0-7, 0-4).

Sheriff Rouse's 5-yard touchdown run in the first quarter put the first points of the

season on the scoreboard for the Vikings, and then Hasaan Boyer added touchdown runs of 4 and 15 yards.

A stingy Tribe defense forced Delaware (7-1, 4-1 CAA, No. 6 in the Sports Network Division I-AA national rankings) to settle for just one touchdown and three field goals (19, 40 and 20 yards) on seven trips inside the Tribe's 30-yard line.

My Player of the Game: Sophomore wide receiver Nihja White had a career day, catching 10 passes for 146 yards and a touchdown.

Injury update: According to coach K.C. Keeler, tailback David Hayes (high ankle sprain) will remain sidelined for at least another two weeks, possibly three.

Keeler's quips from his weekly presser

On the loss: "We couldn't have prepared any better. We couldn't play any harder. We just didn't play well enough. ... This was the No. 4 team in the country, at their place, after a bye week. And we were within a field goal of winning it."

On the struggles in the red zone: "If we are going to go for it on fourth-and-1, we need to play better on short-yardage situations. I have great confidence in my defense, but we really need to think about getting points every chance we get. We are evaluating if we are in the right personnel groups in short yardage situations. ... You can't throw out everything you've done because you are 7-1 for a reason. We just haven't

played as well in short yardage and the red zone as we have to."

On the defensive effort: "We had a season low on missed tackles and season low on missed assignments."

On Andrew Pierce's decreased production after rushing for over 100 yards in each of his first four games but just once (against Rhode Island) in the last four: "It's a result of him taking a lot of hits and us playing better opponents."

On the bye week, which Keeler calls a "get better" week: "Kids have to get their bodies healthier, minds recharged, and we'll get back on practice field Thursday and Friday and really work on tech-

nique. I think (technique) is something that you lose during the course of the season. ... Coach (Brian) Ginn is going to go back and evaluate every single throw we've made to the receivers and is doing an analysis on each receiver."

On NFL scouts who come to watch often-injured Matt Marcocelle: "What the NFL scouts see is a hardness and willingness to get back out on the field. Missing a practice due to a sore hamstring is life in the NFL. ... He hasn't missed time on the field. They are very impressed with how he plays."

On the recent NFL controversy surrounding illegal hits: "I think it's important that we coaches, as ambassadors, do a good job of teaching the kids how to tackle properly. Otherwise parents won't let their kids play football anymore."

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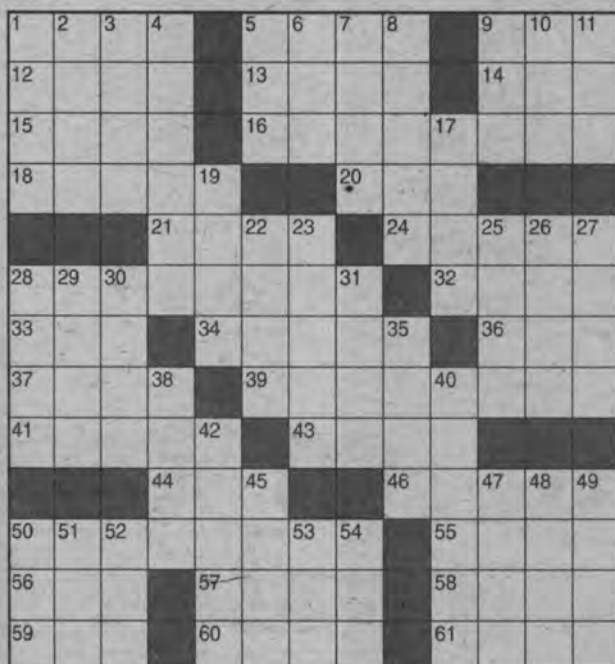

Washington. At the end of her tour of duty, she studied comparative religion, "with a goal to be a better witness of God's love, mercy and forgiveness," and converted to Islam in 1989.

King is currently the programs director of the Civilizations Exchange and Cooperation Foundation, a non-profit organization in Baltimore founded by her husband, Imam Mohamad Bashar Arafat, in 2000. Together they work internationally to "eradicate stereotypes and bring about better understanding between people of different cultures, regions and religions."

In her talk, she will address the struggles she has faced both internally and externally as a Muslim American woman, particularly after 9/11, as well as offer strategies for building diverse and mutually supportive communities among cultures and identities in apparent conflict.

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Coons Flip-flops on Taxes

Chris Coons, Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, has a history of changing his position on major issues affecting Delawareans. While he promised not to raise taxes during his tenure as County Executive, Chris Coons raised taxes an average of \$500 on New Castle County residents and proposed a myriad of other new fees and taxes.

Now, as the Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, he has changed his position on federal taxation four separate times.

The original position Coons took on taxes, which is still featured on his campaign website, agrees with

his party bosses' promise to raise taxes on incomes over \$250,000, a number he may or may not today consider "an arbitrary line."

Coons' statement contradicted three previous publicly stated positions.

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Chris Coons' Family Business Could Earn Billions Under Cap And Trade

Dover, DE: Special interests and corruption is all but the norm in the political landscape of the nation, but it hits closer to home when it rears its ugly head here in Delaware.

Delaware US Senate Candidate Christopher Coons knows a lot about special interests. Coons' family company, W.L. Gore & Associates, produces industrial air filtration systems, which are made to remove particles from air. The company, which was founded by his step-grandfather and stepfather, also makes fuel cell components and other things that companies will be forced to buy if

Cap and Trade legislation is passed by Congress.

Interestingly, as corporate counsel for W.L. Gore & Associates, Coons deployed scientists to testify before Congress in favor of environmental mandates because, as Coons said, it was good for business. In fact, on Nov. 16, 2003, "company lawyer Christopher Coons" told Wilmington's News Journal: "This is one of those very rare moments where the legislative outcome matters to Gore."

Now, as candidate for U.S. Senate, Coons himself admitted during a nationally televised debate hosted

by Wolf Blitzer of CNN, that his stepfather's business stands to make billions off their industrial air filters if Cap and Trade legislation is passed.
