From Newark to New Orleans

Flacco takes flight on field, remains grounded off it

When Joe Flacco takes his first snap in Super Bowl XLVII in New Orleans, it will mark the first time ever that two quarterbacks from the same FCS (formerly Division I-AA) program will have started in the big game.

Delaware also will become the first college at any level to have two different starting quarterbacks since 2003, when Rich Gannon started for the Raiders in a 41-28 loss to Tampa Bay.

Not bad for a football program best known for a Wing-T offense now seldom used anywhere at the college level. And in fact, when Flacco was under center at UD in 2006-07, the Tubby Raymond-inspired offense was a distant memory. In hindsight, that was probably a good thing for Flacco.

Gannon and several other great UD quarterbacks had the running ability needed to successfully execute the Wing-T offense. Flacco did not.

"Joe wasn't a great runner, but as far as a pure passer and pro-style passer, he was the best one to ever play here," commented Harold "Smitty" Smith, former UD football (1959-60) and baseball (1959-61) player now in his third term as president of the Blue Hen Touchdown Club. "He had the best arm in terms of strength and accuracy and was the best at being able to read the game."

Many NFL experts say Flacco has the strongest arm in the league, an observation shared by those who saw him throw at Delaware Stadium.

"The first time I shook his hand, his hand engulfed mine," recalled Jerry Oravitz, director of UD football operations. "His fingertips went up to my forearm. I said to myself, 'Holy smokes, this guy's got some paws on him.'"

Flacco used to put on passing exhibitions in practice.

"He threw such a tight spiral so effortlessly," Oravitz added. "I've never seen a guy with that kind of arm. I remember turning to the person next to me during Joe's first practice and saying, 'This guy's going to be playing on Sundays.'"

Before he started playing on Sundays, Flacco played high school

NEWARK BARS PREPARING FOR DELUGE OF RAVENS FANS

Nothing screams Super Bowl like a 100-inch projection TV and free food.

Many of Newark's restaurants and bars are gearing up for big game parties and festivities Sunday as the Baltimore Ravens get set to take on the San Francisco 49ers.

"We always have a Super Bowl party here, but this year it's a little more interesting with the tie to [Joe] Flacco and Baltimore, of course," Klondike Kate's chef Pete Shade said. "We tied in a little bit of a theme."

Josh Shannon, Newark native and UD grad, chosen to lead Post

Josh Shannon, a Newark native, has been selected as the new editor of the Newark Post.

Shannon, 24, has been serving in that role on an interim basis since Jan. 1, when former editor Katy Bowman left the newspaper to take a job at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

"Josh has demonstrated that he has the experience and enthusiasm needed to handle the day-to-day operations of the newspaper and

its website," Ralph Bush, general manager of the Post, said. "There's nothing better than taking advantage of home-grown talent."

Shannon is a 2011 graduate of the University of Delaware, where he worked for the student-run newspaper, The Review, for four years, including one year covering Newark government and two years as editor-in-chief.

He began freelancing for the Newark Post as a sophomore in college and upon graduation, was hired as a staff reporter for The Cecil

Whig, the Post's sister paper in Elkton, Md.

In March 2012, he was promoted to digital editor of ACM Chesapeake's Upper Shore Division, which includes the Post, the Whig and the Avenue News in Essex, Md. In that role, he was responsible for helping all three papers grow their online and social media presence.

Shannon said he is excited for the chance to lead the Post, noting that he grew up

reading the publication.

"Some of my first interactions with newspapers came from reading the Newark Post at my grandmother's house, and my first professional journalism experience came from freelancing here," he said. "This news-

paper has always been special to me, and after Katy left, I jumped at the chance to help write its next chapter."

Shannon plans to bolster the Post's weekly print

edition and also to continue developing newarkpostonline.com as the daily, go-to place for news about Newark and the surrounding area.

"It's not lost on me that I'm taking over the same week that the Post is celebrating its 103rd birthday," he said. "It's come a long way since Everett Johnson published the first issue in 1910, and there's been plenty of bumps in the road, but the Post remains rooted in the Newark community."

In the coming weeks, Shannon said, readers can

expect expanded coverage of local schools, neighborhood groups and community events, as well as continued coverage of city government, crime, sports and other news. In addition, look for the Post's website to be spruced up with new features and easier navigation.

"Above all, I'd like to hear from readers about what they want to see more of in the Post," he said.

City, university reach deal on electricity contract

After nearly two years of negotia-

tion, the city has signed an agreement to extend its electric service contract with the University of Delaware.

Under the terms approved by council

Monday night, the city will continue to provide electricity to UD for the next 15 years.

"It represents many months, even many years, of negotiation," City Manager Carol Houck said. "This has great value to our organization."

The deal guarantees the city at least \$2.6 million in revenue each year. In addition, the university will increase its subvention payment to the city by \$300,000 annually.

The city can raise the university's rates equivalent to increases for other customers.

The agreement also lets the university self-generate up to five megawatts of power over the next 15 years.

Currently, the university buys 17 to 20 megawatts from the city each year. That amount is expected to increase by as much as 13 megawatts as UD opens several new facilities in the next few years.

Law no longer an idle threat

City, state officials cracking down on idling motorists

Newark residents may notice that new signs have been posted throughout the city proclaiming, "Stop Idling - It's the Law." These signs are a part of a new

anti-idling campaign that hopes to improve Newark's air quality by reducing emissions from personal and commercial vehicles.

The campaign was created by the Newark Conservation Advisory Commission and was made possible by a \$15,000 grant through DNREC's Greenhouse Gas Reduction Projects Fund. In addition to the signs, the grant will go toward public service announcements, brochures and mailers to promote new awareness of the ordinance, which was passed in 2009.

"The state at that point already had the anti-idling ordinance for diesel vehicles, which made sense to the state," said Tom Fruehstorfer, chair of the Newark Conservation Advisory Commission, "But we figured a lot of the idling issues we had in the city of Newark weren't necessarily diesel, but a lot of passenger vehicles."

The law prohibits idling a vehicle engine for more than five consecutive minutes in a 60-minute period. Violators will get a warning for the first offense and a \$100 fine for subsequent offenses.

However, the law does not apply when the temperature is below -10 degrees, or when then temperature is below freezing and young children or the elderly are in the car.

Though the anti-idling law was created several years ago, it has not been strongly enforced, and awareness of the law is limited. Fruehstorfer said he thinks that this is partially due to police interest in traffic violations and violent crimes over environmental crimes, however, he feels that making the public aware of the anti-idling policy is an important first step in changing idling behavior.

"We're hopeful that most folks will be supportive

because they'll think that clean air is important and they want to live in a healthy community," said Collin O'Mara, secretary of DNREC. "And at the same time, you save money, right? If you're not idling, then you're using less gas which translates into dollars you can spend on something else."

While the collaborators of the campaign are hopeful, the reactions of visitors to Main Street this week were mixed.

Josh Marks, of Wilmington, said he feels that reducing vehicle emissions is a good idea, but figures that the cost of gas is already a good regulator of how much people idle.

"If you want to waste gas and pay a lot of money, then that's your business," Marks said.

While Danielle Bowen, of Elkton, Md., said she can see the positives of idling less, she doesn't feel that Newark's anti-idling law is fair.

"I can understand a little why they don't want you to be sitting there for a long time, but five minutes is pretty short," Bowen said.

Police: Newark man dies while fleeing officers

A Newark man died Saturday after he lost control of his vehicle while allegedly trying to flee police.

The man, Edwin C. Halko, 58, is believed to have been driving under the influence of alcohol, said Sgt. Paul G. Shavack, a spokesman for the Delaware State Police.

The incident happened at approximately 12:48 a.m. when a trooper on routine patrol pulled Halko over for traffic violations in the 100 block of U.S. Route 13 near New Castle, Shavack said.

Halko pulled over into the parking lot of a Hooter's Restaurant, but when the trooper approached Halko's car, the Newark man refused to exit the vehicle and instead backed into the police cruiser, Shavack said.

"Halko immediately fled the parking lot at a high rate of speed onto U.S. 13 northbound, and proceeded to make a U-turn, traveling southbound on U.S. 13," Shavack said. "The trooper, with emergency equipment activated, attempted to catch up to the speeding vehicle but was unable to do so, remaining a distance behind. Halko continued southbound and traveled onto westbound Pulaski Highway."

Halko then lost control of his 1998 Chrysler Sebring near the intersection of Pulaski Highway and Wilton Boulevard and drifted off the road, hitting a utility pole.

Halko, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was ejected from the vehicle, Shavack said. He was taken to Christiana Hospital, where he died.

The trooper was not injured, and the patrol vehicle was not damaged.

Newark woman robbed at Bear ATM

A Newark woman was robbed at knifepoint Sunday while attempting to get money out of an ATM in Bear, police said.

The incident took place at approximately 7:20 p.m. outside the TD Bank at 1001 East Songsmith Drive, across the street from Governor's Square

Shopping Center.

The 35-year-old woman was approached by a masked man as she exited her car and walked toward the ATM.

"The suspect displayed a knife and compelled the victim to turn over cash she had been carrying," said Cpl. John Day of the Delaware State Police. "He then directed her to withdraw money from the ATM."

However, after the victim and robber discovered the ATM was out of service, the robber ran away.

The suspect is described as a white man, 25 to 30 years old, approximately 5 feet, 9 inches tall with an average build. He was wearing dark clothing and a mask.

Street signs ripped from ground

A rash of street sign vandalism was discovered Monday.

At approximately 3 p.m., an officer on routine patrol found a street sign laying behind a building at the Park and Shop Center on South Main Street. The sign, which belonged at the intersection of West Park Place and Peach Road, was attached to a stop sign.

"The sign was completely intact and appeared to have been ripped from the ground," said Master Cpl. Gerald Bryda, of the Newark Police. "When public works (crews) arrived, they had four similar signs in their truck."

No damage to the signs was reported.

Apartment burglarized

Someone entered an apartment in the Continental Court Apartments on South Chapel Street and stole cash.

The incident happened between 11:15 p.m. Friday and 1:15 a.m. Saturday.

No one was home at the time, but the door had been left unlocked, police reported.

Investigators have no suspects.

Electronics stolen from vehicle

Someone broke into a car and stole nearly \$2,800 worth of electronics on Saturday.

The theft occurred sometime between 3 a.m. and noon in the 6000 block of Woolen Way, police said.

The thief made off with a

GPS unit, a radio, tools, a wallet and other electronics.

The bandit also used one of the credit cards in the wallet at a nearby convenience store.

Drunk man wanted in two thefts

Newark Police believe the same person is responsible for two thefts on South Main Street last weekend.

The first happened at approximately 9:45 p.m. Friday outside the Claymont Steak Shop.

Police say an intoxicated man approached an employee of the restaurant as she was clearing snow off her car and demanded a ride. When the employee declined, the man went around the corner and urinated on the ground.

Moments later, the woman went back into the store to get

an item she had forgotten and returned to find the suspect opening her car door.

The thief took a sandwich and bag of chips before running off.

The second occurred at approximately 12:45 a.m. in the 300 block of the South Main Street.

Police say the victim was walking through a cemetery when he was approached by a man asking for change for a \$5 bill.

When the victim opened his wallet, the thief reached in and stole \$10.

The suspect in both cases is described as a white man, 24 to 30 years old, between 6 feet, 1 inch and 6 feet, 4 inches with a large build. He was wearing a black hooded sweatshirt with white writing



New deputy city manager 'thrilled' to be back in Newark

Former parking division manager returns to help lead city staff

Selected to fill the newly created position of deputy city manager, Andrew Haines began work Monday as second in command of Newark's staff organization.

Haines described his position as a form of consolidation for the city's staff. The position, created by Newark City Manager Carol Houck in order to better delegate author-

ity by replacing the position of assistant to the city manager, makes Houck first in command with Haines acting as her "right-hand man."

"The general focus and scope of the position... is personnel, pension, some day-to-day items, special projects," Haines said. "So I think that's going to grow depending on the need in the manager's office, as there's an ebb and flow of workloads and demand."

Having previously served

Newark from 2002 to 2007 as administrator of the city's parking division, Haines said that he took this position for both family and professional reasons. On a personal level, Haines said he felt that becoming deputy city manager afforded him the opportunity to come back home.

After leaving Newark the first time, Haines served as township manager for Hatfield Township in Pennsylvania. While he

loved his time there, Haines said that professionally, he was drawn to apply for the deputy city manager position for the challenges of running a full-service city that offers water, sewer, electric, waste disposal and public transit.

"In Pennsylvania with a lot of the way it's structured, that's not an opportunity from a management perspec-

tive," Haines said. "So, I'm coming back down for that reason as well, not just professional, but also family."

In the short term, Haines hopes to learn as much as he can and continue the work that has been done by current Assistant to the City Manager, Charles Zusag, who will be retiring in February. Haines is looking

forward to being a supportive colleague to city staff and to Houck.

"My family and I, we're excited to be back with the city, with the city organization, and to be a part of the team once again," Haines said. "It's been very positive on day one, so I'm thrilled to be back here to continue to try to do well for the city."

Developer hopes to build two duplexes

A plan to build two duplexes on a mostly vacant lot on Prospect Avenue won its first round of approval from city council on Monday.

Council unanimously agreed to subdivide two parcels on the 0.36-acre property at 29-35 Prospect Avenue into four separate lots.

However, before construction can begin, the developer, South Pond Properties, must submit a detailed plan for approval by the planning commission and council.

Initial plans call for building two, three-story duplexes, which would result in four separate units. The property would also contain 12 parking spaces.

A three-car garage, the only structure currently on the lot, would be demolished.

Wawa may be headed for downtown Newark

Company holding forum on possible South Main Street store, gas station

Wawa could soon be the latest company to open a store on South Main Street, one of the fastest growing areas of the city.

The convenience store chain has indicated a desire to build its newest location at the Park and Shop Center across from the Newark Municipal Building on the former Elkton Road.

However, Wawa has yet to file an official proposal with the city's planning department.

"They have come in and talked to us," Planning Director Maureen Feeney Roser said this week. "I know they're very interested."

If Wawa goes ahead with the plan, the store would likely be located in the former bank building at the corner of Apple Road and South Main Street, Feeney Roser said.

Like many of its newer locations, the Wawa would include gas

pumps. However, the architectural design would be altered to better fit in with the area's downtown feel.

"We talked about that corner being downtown, and it should look like that," Feeney Roser said.

Company officials will be in Newark next week to present more details about the plan and hear feedback from residents. The forum, hosted by councilmen David Athey and Doug Tuttle, is set for 7 p.m. Wednesday in city council chambers.

Tuttle said he has already heard from nearby businesses concerned about increased competition, but is not yet sure what reaction from residents will be.

"It'll be interesting," he said.

He commended Wawa for reaching out to the community even before filing the plan, noting that the company sent letters to its would-be neighbors to invite them to Wednesday's meeting.

"It's unusual for someone who wants to do development to put something out there before they go to the planning commission,"

Tuttle said.

If the plan is filed and approved by council, the South Main Street store would be the company's sec-

ond location in city limits. The store at the corner of Ogletown and Marrows roads opened in March.

Refund anticipation checks: A real choice for your refund?

According to the Department of Treasury, the use of refund anticipation checks (RACs) has increased considerably. RACs are temporary bank accounts established on behalf of a taxpayer into which a direct deposit refund can be received. A RAC is a bank deposit, not a loan, limited to the size of the refund less applicable fees, which can range from \$30 to hundreds of dollars, depending on which tax preparer sets up the account. Most users access the refund in the form of a prepaid debit MasterCard.

Research shows that RACs are no quicker than other IRS direct deposit returns, but for those without a bank account who would receive a paper check in the mail, they may speed up refunds by up to six weeks. Other reasons people use RACs may be lack of funds to pay for tax preparation costs because RACs let filers pay for tax preparation fees out of the expected refund.

Use of these accounts can

be helpful to tax preparers. But it is important to look for ways to cut costs. The Internal Revenue Service sponsors free tax preparation and, in many cases, free electronic filing for low-income and elderly filers, through its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance and Tax Counseling for the Elderly programs (<http://www.irs.gov/Individuals/Free-Tax-Return-Preparation-for-You-by-Volunteers>). The AARP Foundation also sponsors free tax preparation services (<http://www.aarp.org/applications/VMISLocator/searchTaxAideLocations.action>). And there's also free help for many filers on the I.R.S. web site (<http://www.irs.gov/uac/Free-File-Do-Your-Federal-Taxes-for-Free>). Also, there is assistance from the Stand-ByMe.org for both federal and state tax return preparation.

If you are considering using a RAC, be sure to ask the tax preparer what the fees are before you have them prepare your taxes. Like everything else, com-

parison shop. The fees can vary widely; some charge a fee for tax preparation and the account set up, and some have a flat fee for both services. You will also want to

be sure that your funds are insured should you lose your card. Find out how you will have access to your money should this occur.

Lastly, consider that your

refund is now available via a debit card. Though this may sound very convenient, consider that when you withdraw money at an ATM, fees will be charged by the bank

sponsoring the ATM. This will further reduce the value of your tax refund.

For all these reasons, carefully weigh your decision to use a RAC to get your refund.





Leopoldo Alberto "Al" Roybal

Leopoldo Alberto "Al" Roybal, 71, of Newark, Del., died at home Jan. 16, 2013, three and a half years after being diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and Parkinson's disease.

The oldest of nine, Al was born Nov. 3, 1941, to Pablo and Ruby Roybal and raised on Rancho Las Lagunas, the family dairy farm begun in 1946 in Nambe, N.M.

Delivering milk in glass bottles through the streets of Santa Fe and steering a tractor across fields of alfalfa as a child sparked a fearless attitude toward exploration, a nurturing impulse and a fascination with how things work. As an adult, these qualities were expressed in his career as an engineer, a yard with more than 50 types of trees and plants, a talent for giving new life to old machines, and a sense of direction that guided him on dozens of car trips through the back roads and big cities of America.

Al graduated as valedictorian from Pojoaque High School in 1960, received a B.S. in chemical engineering from New Mexico State University in 1964, and then spent six months living on farms in Ireland as part of a 4-H program, an experience that helped

shape his views on religion and politics. He also received an M.S. in chemical engineering from the University of Delaware in 1969.

He began a 28-year career with DuPont as a research scientist in Delaware in 1965. He had first been introduced to the East Coast during a 4-H high school trip to Washington, D.C.; when it came time to look for a job, the green beauty of the East Coast attracted him. At DuPont, he worked primarily on polymers at the Experimental Station in Wilmington, Del., and at plants in Texas, North Carolina, West Virginia and Tennessee, and developed a process to recover and sell byproduct acetonitrile. After retiring from DuPont in 1993, he consulted in Chicago, Philadelphia, Maryland and New Jersey before beginning a second career in 2003 as an environmental engineer regulating air quality for the State of Delaware. He worked full time at DNREC until October 2012.

Devoted to learning inside and outside of his career, Al was a regular library patron, early to use computers and the Internet, and generous in sharing his knowledge with colleagues and neighbors.

Al was a longtime hiker with the Wilmington Trail Club. Healthy and active, he nevertheless loved to indulge in the culinary richness of our country — from N.C. barbeque to red-eye gravy to carne adovada to hot pastrami sandwiches. He also had wide

tastes in music, dialing the radio among country, pop, jazz, news and sports stations.

As a parent, Al timed at swim meets, coached soccer and encouraged his children's imaginations by building them theatrical stages and hand carving a rocking horse, train and other toys. On frequent trips to museums, he shared his enthusiasm for art, history, science and nature. As his children grew up and moved about, he was always available at a moment's notice to drive a distance to support them.

He is survived by son Peter Roybal, of New York City; daughter Jessica Roybal, MD, and grandson Asher McCoul, of Seattle, Wash. (husband Edward McCoul, MD); former wife Ann Roybal, of Newark; siblings Roberto, Rick, Paula Sanchez, Alfred, Jim, Anna Price and Paul; and a large and loving family of aunts, uncles, cousins, nephews and nieces. His brother Don preceded him in death.

Fans, former teammates recall Flacco's down-to-earth charm

football in New Jersey and attended the University of Pittsburgh for two frustrating years before transferring to the UD campus. Once he arrived in Newark, Flacco quickly moved to the top of the depth chart, unseating projected starting quarterback and captain, Ryan Carty.

"Joe was always an amazing teammate and a great friend," Carty, now the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, said in an email to the Post. "It's not an easy transition to be a transfer, and he made it seamlessly. It's awesome to see Joe reach the pinnacle of sports. We keep in touch to this day and I, of course, wish him the best of luck."

Blue Hens in the Super Bowl

If the Ravens win, Flacco and Gradkowski will become the first former Blue Hen to win a Super Bowl. The others who appeared in Super Bowl losses are Ivory Sully (1980-Rams), Rich Gannon (2003-Raiders) and Ben Patrick (2009-Cardinals).

Flacco heads to New Orleans having won six playoff road games in five years, the most of any quarterback in NFL history. He's also one of just two quarterbacks to complete two passes of more than 50 yards in the same playoff game. The other is former Blue Hen Scott Brunner.

"When I first saw Joe Flacco play, I knew he had all the physical attributes needed to play in the NFL," recalled Brunner, who led UD to the 1979 National Championship and went on to play for the Giants in the NFL. "The only question I had was about his ability as a leader to put a team on his back and carry them to a championship. I think he answered that question for me his senior year when he carried the Blue Hens through the playoffs and

into the national championship game. He once again has displayed those same leadership qualities in leading the Ravens into the Super Bowl."

Despite his stardom, Flacco remains as grounded as when he played at Delaware Stadium.

"Joe's so down to earth, sometimes I don't think he realizes he's an NFL quarterback," Pete Gilbert, sports anchor for WBAL TV/Radio in Baltimore, told the Post prior to this season. Flacco's humility, as much as his rifle arm, made him a fan favorite while he was a Blue Hen. Bob and Judy Ramsey have been loyal fans for 15 years and were most impressed not by Flacco the quarterback, but rather, Flacco the person.

"Hearing Joe say, 'I don't know what the big deal is, it's just football,' gave me insight to his true personality and his approach to the game," Bob said. "He wasn't caught up in Joe."

Judy added, "Joe was very down to earth. His talent never changed how he reacted to his fans."

One of those fans is current UD junior Chelsea Madden, who before she was even considering colleges, traveled from her Yardley, Pa., home to see her cousin play for the Hens.

"I guess you could say Joe put the University of Delaware on the map for me," Madden said in an email while studying abroad during winter session. "I remember waiting for him after the game where all of the players came out of the locker room and being able to go on the field. If the stars align, I will be spending Super Bowl Sunday in New Orleans—with my whole extended family. If not, I will definitely be with my family and we will be cheering loud enough for Joe and the Ravens to hear us all the way in the Superdome."

Matt Brancato has been cheering for the Blue Hens since he enrolled at Delaware in 1979. He didn't hesitate when asked to share his most memorable Flacco play.

"The sideline pass he made at Northern Iowa in the playoffs," Brancato

said, shaking his head. "He was about to go out of bounds and rifled the ball about 45 yards on a line for a completion. It's one of my all-time favorite Blue Hen plays."

It was plays like that which impressed NFL scouts, who traveled to Newark weekly to see and meet with Flacco.

"The scouting process didn't faze him," said Oravitz, who texted Flacco "Congratulations" immediately after the win and received a "Thanks" reply soon after. "Joe handled those visits and those conversations with the scouts just like he handled [the AFC Championship Game] postgame press conferences: He was nonchalant, calm, cool, matter of fact. It was no big deal for him."

The way Flacco carries himself, you'd never know he is a multi-millionaire NFL quarterback.

"He remains very polite, very humble," Smith said. "He's not at all about Joe. He doesn't try to be out front and the guy everybody is noticing. He showed up to a spring-ball alumni barbecue in Bermuda shorts and a T-shirt. He totally blended into the group. He didn't want to be the

star guy. He was just very comfortable with his old buddies rehashing the old times."

Now his buddies will be watching him play in the biggest game of his life.

"We realize this opportunity and how special it is," Flacco said during a press conference last week. "That's why we have to work hard and just make the most of it."

If the Ravens do make the most of it, when the game ends Sunday night the cameras will be scrambling to catch up with Flacco as he trots off the field so he can make the traditional "I'm heading to Disney World" proclamation. Who knows, he might even crack a smile and show some jubilation knowing he's heading to the "Happiest Place On Earth."

But if not, Blue Hen fans won't be surprised. And in fact, they'll understand. After all, wanting to be in the spotlight just isn't Joe. It never was.


