



SELF-DETERMINATION FOR NATIONAL MINORITIES?

"Yes," say the peoples of the U.S.S.R. "No," say the leaders of fascism in Germany and Italy. "Perhaps," answer the spokesmen for European democracies. Thus controversy rages about a world problem that increasingly demands an honest solution.

UNDER THE PERSONAL LEADERSHIP

of LANGSTON HUGHES, well-known Negro author and playwright, an inter-racial group of travellers will spend July and August, 1937 in Europe and the Soviet Union studying different National Minorities. Two particular questions in regard to each National Minority will be extensively considered by the Hughes group: (1) What is the present status of minority individuals? (2) What opportunity is being given for cultural development in such fields as art, music, literature, and the drama? The tour itinerary calls for brief but focussed glimpses of the relations existing in England, Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Poland and France with smaller and subject peoples. Attention however will be concentrated on the Soviet Union where for 31 days the Russian answer to the problem will be examined.

MR. HUGHES' GROUP SAILS

from New York July 3rd on the S.S. Berengeria. After stops in London, Copenhagen, Stockholm and Helsingfors, the party will reach Leningrad July 18. Here, as in Moscow and Rostov, visits will be made at institutes such as the University for Eastern Peoples, and museums of minority cultures. Mr. Hughes will lead discussions on nationality problems so that a comprehensive insight into the Soviet theory of behavior towards minority groups may be obtained. Then the group will travel southward to the Caucasus and Black Sea where it will have first hand contacts with a half dozen different racial groups, such as the Ossetians, Imeretians, Ingushi, Kabardins, Balkars, and Abkhasians. During the 11-day period in the Caucasus, the group will go from Ordzhonikidze to Kutais over the Ossetian Military Road passing through many picturesque villages situated among some of the world's most magnificent mountain scenery.

To reach the beautifully located health resort of Shovi, near the Mamisson Pass the group will leave the beaten path and travel one day by horseback or cart. An optional excursion by horse to a glacier has been planned. From Kutais, capital of Imeretia and one of the most colorful cities in the Caucasus, the group will visit Batum with its subtropical vegetation and then travel by Black Sea boat to Sochi, one of the newest and most popular bathing resorts on the Russian Riviera. The group will leave the Soviet Union via the Ukrainian cities of Kharkov and Kiev. A day will be spent in Warsaw and four days in Paris before embarking upon the S.S. Aquitania.



LANGSTON HUGHES, the distinguished Poet, looks at the world today that is full of alarms, wars, and threats to world peace and democracy. The sensitive reactions of a talented poet and writer to these world events is exciting and unusually instructive.

LANGSTON HUGHES, famed in many lands for his poems and other writings, will look at the world through his poems, reading them aloud and describing the scenes and circumstances that inspired him to write them. Of greatest interest will be his new poems of Spain from where he has just returned.

Many of Langston Hughes' poems, and some of his articles and stories have been translated into German, French, Spanish, Russian, Chinese and other languages in newspapers and magazines.
