RED CROSS VOLUNTEERS OPEN \$7000 DRIVE HERE

Zone Chiefs To Submit 1st Report On Sunday

Despite bad weather, over 100 volunteer Red Cross solicitors began their drive to raise \$7000 in Branch Area 1. The drive is to help the victims of the recent fire in the Branch Area 1 building.

The captains are scheduled to make their first report to Dr. John R. Downes, chairman, this Sunday from 7 p. m. at the county health offices, Main Street.

Early returns have not yet been tabulated, but a sign that this year's drive is a success is seen in the report received to date, submitted by Mrs. Carolyn M. Jody, who captured a central zone. Contributions in area thus far, she says, already equal last year's final figure.

NAMED TO U. OF D. STAFF BY CARLSON

T. Pegg And Fitzpatrick Join Drama Department

Two appointments to the University of Delaware faculty in the Department of Dramatic Arts and Speech have been announced by Dr. William S. Carlson, university president. The new staff members are Edward Clement Fitzpatrick, Jr., as technical director in the department, responsible for the physical staging of dramatic produc- tions in the university's theatre; and Thomas Benton Pegg, as instructor in dramatic arts and speech.

Fitzpatrick's position is a new one on the university's faculty, since he never before has been a full- time technical director of dramatics. He is X. Gallagher, who resigned from the faculty, was responsible for this work in addition to his duties as instructor in dramatic arts and speech. Mr. Pegg has assumed the duties of a bachelor of arts degree in speech and dramatic arts from the University of Iowa in 1936. Mr. Fitzpatrick took two and one-half years advanced work at Yale School of Drama. He studied and worked with some of the nation's leading technicians. Several summer and com- munity theatres also have had him as technician.

Mr. Pegg, who has studied under some of the outstanding authorities in speech, previously served on the faculty of the Feagin School of Drama and Radio, New York City, in charge of voice and diction courses. He has been secretary to the assistant president of National Broadcast- ing, and recently was director of series of programs on WNYC, New York City's municipal station. He has a bachelor of science degree from State University, in 1939, and a master of arts degree in speech from Columbia University, in 1941.

Three Fire Calls Sounded Past Week

Three fire alarms were sounded here the past week, the first coming last Wednesday when a defective oil heater caused flames to break out at Frank Smith's Atlantic Service Station on Main Street. The blaze was controlled promptly and no damage was reported.

Sunday night, a chimney caught fire at the Academy Apartments, owned by Louis Handloff at Main and Academy Streets. Cause of the blaze was not disclosed. Aetna volunteers extinguished the flames before severe damage occurred.

An out-of-town call came Monday night, when an oil stove caused a blaze at the Willis Service Station, Appleton, Md. The fire broke out in a small building in the rear of the property, destroying most of the structure and causing damage estimated at \$400.

P. KRAEMER WILL BE NHS DELEGATE IN BOY'S STATE

Will Join Pupil Representatives In Ruling State For Day, Mar. 22

Paul Kraemer will represent the Newark High School at the annual Boy's State in Legislative Hall, Dover, on March 21 and 22.

Purpose of the event, which will bring together student delegates from high schools throughout the state to take over the state government for a single day, is to instruct youth in the underlying principles of government. The program is sponsored by the Department of Delaware American Legion.

During the first day, the boys will merely watch the proceedings of the General Assembly, but the following day they will take over the offices of the state government from Governor down to legislative attachés.

Although the youths will receive assistance from legislators and state leaders in forming their organization, the boys themselves will carry out the debating and take consequent action.

A special luncheon will be served in the Walter L. Fox Post of the American Legion on Friday and Saturday.

Boys who participate are urged to carry back their experiences to their respective student bodies. Through the project, it is hoped that the state's future citizens will acquire some conception of the operation, function and ideals of their government as well as gain an appreciation of the responsible part each citizen must play in the success of his government.

A meeting to discuss and familiarize themselves with the details of the proposed new Town Charter will be held by the members of the Newark Lions Club on Tuesday, March 18, President Ira C. Shellender announced yesterday.

The club's civic committee, composed of Wayne Brewer, William Gregg and Ben Hicks, has been directed to procure a copy of the charter draft and prepare to give the members an outline of its provisions. William Swan is assisting the committee.

Program chairman for the session will be W. O. White. A business meeting marked this week's session in which a general discussion of the charter was conducted.

COUNCIL ISSUES 6 BUILDING PERMITS

\$41,500 In Construction Is Authorized During Feb.

New construction rose here slightly during February, with Town Council issuing six building permits authorizing \$41,500 in new buildings. The largest went to Danita Hosier Mill, Inc. for six dwellings on Wyoming Road to cost \$36,000.

Others were granted as follows: Louis Mercuri, for \$1000 addition of second floor apartment to cement block garage, 132 East Main Street; Isaac Money, for 2-room addition to bungalow, 64 West Cleveland Avenue, to cost \$300; and Walter R. Powell, for \$4000 store building of brick and concrete, 43 East Main Street.

Town Engineer Cleaver Price's report for February disclosed that the work on additions to the sewerage treatment plant is now ninety per cent complete. Additional town maintenance and repairs during the month, he said, included the connection of two new electric services and several change-overs to new poles, also the installation of three three-quarter inch water taps and one sewer connection.

Town crews also cleared snow from Main Street between the two railroads. During the month 16,234,000 gallons of water were pumped for a daily average of 579,786 gallons, an increase daily of 22,236 gallons over February and a jump of 485,600 gallons over February, last year.

NHS PUPILS GET AID ON STUDY PLAN

Guidance Talks Help In Picking Future Courses

A series of home-room discussions, aimed at assisting pupils to plan their courses for next term and the years following, currently features the guidance program at the Newark High School.

On Friday, the guidance periods were devoted to a discussion of the purposes and advantages of the various courses offered at the school. Subsequent sessions will cover the education plan of each student, elective subjects and guidance committee work.

Five courses, Academic, Scientific, Vocational, Commercial and General, are offered. The first two are suggested for those who plan to enter college. In addition to the numerous required subjects in each course, a wide variety of electives are offered. Among these are: Social Studies IX, Home Economics, Agriculture, Commercial Geography, Industrial Arts, Fine Art, General Mathematics, Introduction to Business, Algebra, Latin, Plane Geometry, Biology, World History, Business Arithmetic, French, Spanish, Chemistry, Shorthand, Typing, Academic Typing, Bookkeeping, Dramatics, Journalism, Solid Geometry, Trigonometry.

A student must pass with a grade of 75 per cent or better in order to earn credit. All subjects carry one credit upon satisfactory completion, except a few which offer fractional credits. Industrial Arts and Music carry credit based on the number of hours per week.

First Pay Day Fixed

Enrollment of Battery "C", 736 AAA Battalion now totals 18 men, Lt. Joseph Balbach, commander, announced yesterday. Latest recruit to be signed is Henry L. Dickinson, a former enlisted member of the state guard.

The battery's recruiting campaign is still underway, Lt. Balbach said, and additional men are being sought to meet the unit's April quota.

A change in drill time from Friday to Wednesday was also announced.

The first Battery pay will be issued soon, Balbach also announced. Funds covering drill time have arrived for some of the members.

CLUBWOMEN HEAR PEACE NEEDS CITED BY SPEAKER

Women Urged To Give More Attention To Government

Increased interest in government on the part of women was urged by Lawrence Fairhall, well-known New Zealand newsman and independent observer, in an address Monday afternoon, on "International Relations," before members of the Newark New Century Club.

Women, he said, have a natural insight into such problems and a direct approach to them. Also, they have proved abundantly that they are capable of holding responsible positions. He added that women have a tremendous responsibility in working for peace.

Mr. Fairhall also discussed the strong points and drawbacks of the United Nations Organizations as an institution for securing permanent peace. Although the U. N. has numerous powers, it needs, he feels, time for growth and development, in order to acquire a place in world tradition and custom as an international governing body.

Mr. Fairhall's originally scheduled topic was "International Trade." However, he said the question of peace was so paramount at the moment that all other considerations are dependent upon it.

Mrs. R. O. Bausman, president, presided, and the program was in charge of the international relations committee, headed by Mrs. G. E. Kauffman. It was also announced that Mrs. A. D. Cobb and Mrs. David Eastburn, of the fine arts committee, have been appointed as the club's representatives on the Newark committee for the Delaware Festival of the Arts.

A collection of old pressed glass, including loop goblets, compotes, and a easter set, were displayed on the fine arts table. The exhibit also included antique linen napkins.

POLICE CAR GETS 2-WAY RADIO SET

Tie-Up With State Force In Operation

The two-way radio tie-up between the Newark Police Force and the Delaware State Police, which was authorized by Town Council some time ago, is now in operation, Police Commissioner Norman Battersby said yesterday.

The new set-up is proving highly satisfactory, he said, and the members of the local force have expressed general approval with the short wave receiver and transmitter installed in the Newark patrol car.

Only feature of the system now lacking is the direct telephone wire to state police headquarters. Under the original plan, all local police calls were to go by direct wire to the state police, who would relay them by radio to the local force. For the present police calls are still being handled through the town office.

The radio tie-up, nevertheless, has greatly improved police coverage for the town, it was said. The local force is now able to receive prompt aid from state cars in an emergency, as well as to keep abreast of police reports throughout the state.

The system is also part of the state police's plan to bring various local forces into a close-knit, state-wide organization. Cost of installing the radio in the Newark car was \$375; the yearly maintenance charge will be \$175.

VFW Will Elect Officers Tonight

An election of officers will be held tonight by the local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, No. 475, Commander Drexel Harrington has announced. All members are urged to be present. Two new members were added to the post roster this week. They are Herbert Cox and Donald Savitch. These plus William Hogan and Robert Davis have received the obligation.

Annual Town Election Scheduled For April 8

Although three posts on the Town Council will be open, no candidates have filed as yet for the annual municipal election to be held April 8, it was disclosed this week.

Councillmen John Hopkins, Norman Battersby and Norris N. Wright, will round out their two year terms this month.

None has indicated officially as yet his intentions as regards filing again, nor have any new office seekers appeared on the local political scene. Deadline for filing is ten days before the election.

Appointment of Frank Luton and Robert Galiher as election officers for next month's balloting was announced at the Town Council meeting here Monday night.

CHURCH YOUTH CLUB HOLDS MEET FOR PARENTS

Presbyterian "Triangle" Group Stages Program Here On Sunday

A special program for parents and friends of the members was presented Sunday night by "The Triangle," a newly formed organization of young people between eleven and thirteen at the First Presbyterian Church.

The chairs were arranged in the shape of a triangle and four candles were lit, each representing one of the four commissions, blue for faith and life, red for stewardship, gold for christian outreach, and white for christian fellowship.

The meeting was led by Phyllis Baker, commissioner of faith and life. After a hymn, Jimmy Draper read the Scripture and Ruth Mary Cooper gave the prayer. Special music was presented by Stephanie Worrlow, Diane Carr, Annette Ely, and Nancy Lewis with Mary Anne Miller accompanying at the piano. A question and answer period followed, which brought out facts concerning the christian church in general, with emphasis on the Presbyterian church here.

Phyllis Baker then told how in November a mere handful of enthusiastic young people met to talk over the possibility of forming a youth organization. Aims and purposes were discussed, time and place of meeting were decided, and some names for the organization were suggested. DRAFT OF NEW TOWN FIRE CODE IS STUDIED

Action On New Ruling May Come Next Month

A tentative draft of a new town fire code, which, if adopted, will set up standard safety regulations for all construction here, was given an initial reading by the Town Council at its March session Monday night.

Final action on the measure will probably come at next month's meeting.

Adoption of the long needed code will put teeth in the council's efforts to enforce adequate and uniform fire precautions in buildings here. The ordinance will also create the new municipal office of fire inspector, who will have full authority to enforce its rulings.

Fire Chief Elmer Ellison has been proposed for the post.

Features of the draft, now under consideration, are regulations calling for the removal of all fire hazards such as collections of waste or dust as well as the correction of defective construction. In addition, the code forbids hazards such as obstructions on fire escapes or standing in the aisles of movies or churches.

Two other ordinances, setting up building and plumbing codes, with a municipal inspector for each, are also being considered by Council.

Treasurer's Report Gives Funds On Hand

Town Treasurer Vernon Steele's report for February, submitted at Monday night's Town Council meeting, listed electric light receipts totaling \$9,980.16, plus electric power returns of \$5,242.55 and water rents amounting to \$7,417.96. Total cash balance was \$48,513.86, less disbursements of \$24,049.21, for a total cash on hand at the month's end of \$24,464.65.

Ninety-three arrests were made by the Newark Police Force during February, according to Chief William Cunningham's report also submitted Monday night.

The breakdown is as follows: parking tickets, 55; disorderly conduct, 7; assault and battery, 2; drunk, 13; speeding, 2; larceny, 1; passing "stop" sign, 1; reckless driving, 2; resisting arrest, 1; passing red light, 1; breaking and entering, 2; giving alcoholic drink to minor, 1; vagrancy, 1; panhandling, 1; failing to report accident, 1; using profane language on street, 1; threatening bodily harm, 1; investigation of accidents, 13; breaking and entering, 7 (one cleared); prowler, 1; larceny, 1; runaway child, 1 (found and returned home); stolen car, 1 (recovered and returned to owner).

Two cases were committed to the workhouse and four were dismissed. Over night lodging was provided five transients. The police car covered a total of 3181 miles.

Magistrate J. H. Rumer reported fines collected during the month totaled \$214.50.

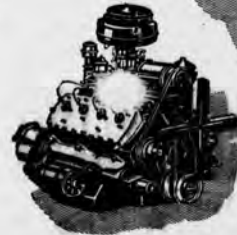
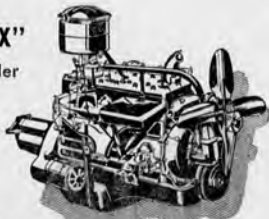

Admiral William H. P. Blandy, native of Newark, and one time University of Delaware student, who now is commander of the Atlantic Fleet, has been placed in nomination to receive the American Alumni Council's annual Award of Merit.

He attended the University of Delaware with the class of 1910, but left shortly before his graduation to accept appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy.

Carrying on its agenda the same subjects that were discussed at its previous meeting, the Newark Memorial Chapter of the American Veterans Committee met last Thursday at the Newark Elks Club, West Cleveland Avenue, to complete plans for its coming campaign to raise student-veterans subsistence allowances.

The local group urges backing for the American Veterans Committee bill, introduced in Congress by Rep. Edith Nourse Rogers (Rep.-Mass.) which provides an increase from \$65 to \$100 for single vets and from \$90 to \$125 for married veterans. American Veterans Committee chapters throughout the country have made great strides sending petitions and personal letters to the nation's legislators, urging passage of this bill.

The Newark AVC also discussed fully the possibilities for a campaign to obtain badly needed housing for all citizens in the Newark area, a problem which has as yet not been undertaken forcefully by any group. They will as well plan to campaign against the possible lifting of rent ceilings, an action which would result in evictions not only for many veterans, but for Newark citizens as well.

The Newark Memorial Chapter is headed by Robert H. Levine, chairman; Richard D. Groo, vice-chairman; William Brown, secretary; and Harvey Newton, treasurer. All former men or women members of the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard and Merchant Marine are invited to attend this meeting.
