

# BLANDY UP FOR AWARD

Admiral William H. P. Blandy, native of Newark, and one time University of Delaware student, who now is commander of the Atlantic Fleet, has been placed in nomination to receive the American Alumni Council's annual Award of Merit.

Recipient of the award last year was General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower, Chief of Staff.

Requisites for nomination include: Eminence in the person's chosen field of activity, worthy contribution to his community beyond the demands of his own profession, concern for the spiritual and moral welfare of his community, and interest in the welfare of his college or university.

During the war he was chief of the Bureau of Ordnance, directing development of many of the Navy's new weapons, and later he commanded an amphibious support force in the Pacific, becoming commander of cruisers and destroyers, Pacific Fleet.

He attended the University of Delaware with the class of 1910, but left shortly before his graduation to accept appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy.
