
Other teams had impressive seasons as well. The


volleyball team won the North Atlantic Conference and qualified for post-season play for the first time in their playing history. The track teams of the university, despite injuries, had members place high in major competitions.


More important than the overall records accumulated

This unique team started slowly with inauspicious wins over the University of Massachusetts and the University of Rhode Island and suffered an embarrassing loss to the Division II team of West Chester University. Despite the slow start, the Blue Hens came on with significant wins over Villanova University and won the Yankee Conference Championship outright. They also participated in the NCAA I-AA Championship, beating Samford University and Northeast Louisiana, who were rated #1 for most of the season, finally losing to Marshall University, the eventual National Championship winners.

The coaching staff commented that this year's team was one of the best teams in the history of the University of Delaware. Leading this team were a number of truly excellent players: Bill Vergantino (Sr.), Mark Hrubar (Sr.), Scott Griemsmann (Sr.), Dan Cooper (Jr.), and Daryl Brown (So.). Bill Vergantino completed his career as a four year starter and broke several of the University's records. Mark Hrubar finished his career as an outstanding defensive lineman. Coming into his own was Dan Cooper, as an excellent spread receiver. Daryl Brown was an exceptional running back who completed the season as the leading ground gainer.

Scott Griemsmann, a three year defensive tackle starter, was injured in pre-season play and was out for the year.

With Tubby Raymond at the helm, more years of entertaining and winning seasons are sure to be a part of the University of Delaware tradition.












Two key players, Kelly Hollinger and Brenda Lear did their best to get the Hen's ahead this past season. Senior, Kelly Hollinger helped pick up a big win over Vermont with a final score of 9-2. The nine goals scored in this game tied a UD record and set an NAC record that was formerly held by Northeastern with six, for most goals scored in a game. Of these nine goals, Kelley Hollinger had seven of them, including a hat-trick. Sophomore Brenda Lear tried to bring the Hen's to victory against the Lady Dragons of Drexel, converting a penalty stroke to a goal. Unfortunately, the Drexel team was able to score twice in the last two minutes of the game.

One impressive win this past season was against Northeastern (1-0), who was ranked number one in the NAC and number five in the nation. Drexel's Lady Dragons proved fiercer than they seemed to the Blue Hen team, who were prevented from playing in the NAC Tournament this past season because of their 1-3 loss against Drexel.

Five graduating seniors will be greatly missed this upcoming season: Kelly Hollinger, Cassie Herr, Arlene Gregory, Alex Speiss, and Jennifer Daggett. The University of Delaware team had been made stronger because of them.


The University of Delaware Field Hockey team had a uniquely good attitude this past season. According to their coach, Marybeth Holder, this team was "in" every game and they never gave up.



The 1993 Blue Hen volleyball team has a lot to be proud about. This year's team was extraordinarily talented, winning, for the first time, The North Atlantic Conference championship. They also reigned over their own home tournament for the first time since 1977, their second time ever and qualified for national level, post-season play for the first time since 1979.

Among this team of winners, four key players rise above the rest: Jill Graber (Captain), Jerelyn Lawson, Sarah Fowler, and Phoebe Folke. Jill Graber broke three Delaware records this year, with most assists in a season (1440), most assists in a match, against both Drexel and Penn (52), and most career assists (2,403). Jerelyn Lawson holds positions on five out of six of Delaware's all-time career record lists. She achieved first in career blocks (416), fourth on the dig list (730), sixth on the perfect pass list (513), fifth on the kill list (928), and ninth on the service ace list (928). Sarah Fowler led the team's record this year with 987 kills. She also led the team with 270 perfect passes and is fifth on the perfect passes alltime list (626) as well as getting 526 digs this season, achieving second place on the all-time dig list (1,039). Phoebe Folke led the team in blocking 193 balls, breaking the former record for the most blocks in a single season. She also made third place on the all-time list with 359 blocks.

Injuries were few this season, with only three major losses. Freshmen Emily Rome and Sue Diener lost considerable playing time this season and K.T. Nieradka was out for the season after suffering a knee injury in her 14th match.

This year, morale was kept high by many key wins, among them, the UMBC Invitational, the Navy Forrestal Classic and their own Invitational tournament in the newly opened Bob Carpenter Sports Center. Winning the North Atlantic Conference for their first time ever and qualifying for post-season play at the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in Kansas City, Missouri will not be forgotten soon!

Congratulations are in order for the Blue Hen Volleyball Team this year. The outgoing seniors, Graber, Lawson, Fowler, and Folke will truly be missed. They have contributed much to the program in their careers and will be hard to replace.




Kristy Hendrickson lead the Hens offense with seven points this season. Henderson's powerful presence will inspire the team to excel next year.





Men's Basketball


This year's Blue Hen Basketball team is due a hearty congratulations! This team clinched their second straight North Atlantic Conference tournament title and second straight NCAA berth, with a 67-64 NAC final win over Drexel on March 10, to win the title as one of the very best University of Delaware basketball teams ever. The Hens, second year members of the NAC, were 6-0 all-time in NAC playoff action and were only the second No. 3 seed to win the NAC title in 14 years. The Hens also achieved their second straight 20-win season and entered the NCAA tournament with a 22-7 record. Prior to last season, Delaware had never won 20 games in a single season or advanced to the NCAA tornament in 86 years of basketball.


A few key players on this year's team were Spencer Dunkley (SR), Anthony Wright (SR), and Brian Pearl (SO). Dunkley has proved himself to be a very valuable player, ranking 11th on the UD all-time scoring list with 1,142 points, first in both rebounds (909) and blocks (194), and 4th in free throws made (316) and attempted (471). Wright, despite two bulky knee braces from reconstructive surgery, earned 2nd team all-NAC honors and ranks 6th on the UD all-time scoring list with 1,214 points, 3rd on the career steal list with 157, and is the 12th UD player to reach 600 career rebounds (621). Pearl, a second year starter and second-team all-NAC player, gained recognition this season due to his tough and aggressive style of play. He is already ninth on the UD career assist list with 268.










Right: Ricky Deadwyler plays close man to man defense.




Left: Molly Larkin, who was named to the Pittsburgh All-Tournament Team, goes up for the short jumper shot.













(Right) Swimming freestyle with the correct form can be a powerful stroke.






Left: Delaware swimmers smile for the camera.
