# A salute to France

Those who drive on Old Baltimore Pike and Route 72 seldom reflect upon the 20 American soldiers buried in a field only steps away from the busy highways.

Last Saturday, however, the Pencader Heritage Area Association (PHAA) not only paid respect to the fallen American Revolutionary War heroes, but to lesser-celebrated veterans of the war - the French.

Pierre Vimont, the French Ambassador to the U.S., placed a wreath at the Battle of Cooch's

Bridge Memorial in remembrance of the French Generals Lafayette and Rochambeau who led their soldiers through Delaware on their way to Yorktown, Va. between 1777 and

Changing a bit from its tradition of honoring veterans from all United States Wars and conflicts-particularly those who died in the lone Revolutionary Battle on Delaware soil-this year's third annual Battlefield Memorial Ceremony had a French focus in honor of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (W3R).

# Film Fest gives indie flicks a shot

ife can be tough for local film buffs who like to see independent movies on the big screen.
"You have three choices: you

can either go to one of the Ritz theaters in Philly and hope I-95 is not a mess; or you hope you're home the weekend they show (the movie you want to see) at Theater N, (an art-house theater) in Wilmington. Or you can wait until it comes out on Netflix, which could take years for some of these independent films," said Barry Schlecker, a longtime film aficionado who lives and works in Wilmington.

Schlecker said weekends of his youth were spent watching double features at Wilmington theaters

"My parents would drop me off; I think for them it was a form of cheap babysitting," he said. He grew to admire works by Woody Allen, Mel Brooks, the Cohen Brothers, Michael Moore; and others with a unusual edge to their films - "anything different," he said.

About five years ago, a friend of Schlecker's made a movie, and rented out Cinema Center 3, the theater on Newark's Main Street, to screen it. It gave Schlecker an idea: he decided to see what it would take to get some independent films of his choice shown to a local audience.

He would call it the Newark Film Festival.

He talked to the Cinema Center 3 owner, who told him September would be the most convenient time to host such

The witness stated that no cars are usually parked there in

#### Suspect gets tasered when resisting arrest

A disturbing the peace call brought officers to the Christina Mill Apartments. found that Benjamin Rubin, 21. of Monmouth Junction, NJ was attempting to force his way into an apartment by head-butting and kicking the door.

An interview showed that Rubin had a blood alcohol content of .247 and that he had been trying to enter the wrong apartment. He was charged with Criminal Mischief and Resisting Arrest.

Newark Police are on the lookout for two white males passing fake \$50 bills at Grotto's Pizza on Main Street. Witnesses told police that the two males bought four slices of pizza and a shot of tequila. They tried to pay with a \$50, but the bartender went back to confront the pair.

They paid with another \$50, but the bartender found out that it was also fake. The pair left the bar before they could be detained by employees. A

video tape shows the pair eating their meal and then leaving the restaurant. Suspect #1 is described as thin, 25-30 years old, 5'09, sporting spiky hair and a thin mustache, wearing a white t-shirt with stripes on the sleeves. Employees think that his name is Randy and that he drives either a black or silver Nissan 3Z or an Infiniti. Suspect #2 is also thin, 27-30 years old, 6' to 6'01 tall, sporting a strap beard, and wearing a white t-shirt with an emblem on the front. Employees think that his ID stated that he was born in 1982.

# Hurricane didn't keep film buffs away

an event, because mainstreammovie attendance is slow in a month with kids returning to school and summer blockbusters having run their course. Schlecker also got business advice by talking to people at the offices of Roger Ebert, who founded his own film festival in Champagne, Ill. and Robert DeNiro, who cofounded Tribeca Film Festival in 2002.

He said the first Newark Film Festival, in 2005, drew about 1,000 attendees. The second drew 2,000 and the third, 4,000.

"Then last year, we ran into Hurricane Hanna, so we didn't get quite as many, but we

retained our attendance from the previous year," he said.

The week-long event has

turned into quite the draw, and now includes wine tastings and guest speakers, along with dozens of films. Schlecker said people come from Cecil County, Baltimore, Kennett Square and even further away, to take part in the festival.

He said he starts thinking about potential films in January, by researching what other film festivals are showing. He starts making his selections based on what is available and which films have gained a good reception from world audiences. He always includes films that have some connection to Delaware.

Schlecker said one year, a

woman was leaving a showing of the documentary "Paper Clips," about a group of school kids who collect millions of paper clips to represent the victims of the Holocaust, and she turned to him and said, "You show movies that matter." He decided to make "Movies that Matter" the tagline for the annual event.

This year's 25 selections include documentaries about subjects as wide-ranging as the Afghan version of "American Idol" ("Afghan Star"); Delaware Holocaust survivors ("Liberation"); the grueling world of dachshund competitions ("Weiner Takes All"); a father's quest to help his autistic son by taking him to Mongolia ("Horse Boy"); the quest of Michael

Berg, the West Chester father of Nick Berg, who was beheaded by terrorists in Iraq, to run for Congress; closet homosexuals who lobby for anti-gay legisla-tion ("Outrage"); Baltimore stayat-home dads ("Happy SAHD"); the fashion designer Valentino ("Valentino, the Last Emperor"): and Mike Tyson ("Tyson").

The festival will also feature the foreign films "Summer Hours," about French siblings dividing up their sick mother's art collection, and "Gomorrah," a series of vignettes about violence that floods the streets of Naples, Italy.

Other treats include "Cheri," starring Michelle Pfeiffer as an upper-class French woman who becomes deeply involved with a much younger man; "Sugar," which follows a baseball pitcher from the Dominican Republic who aches to play for the American major leagues, and "Every Little Step," about the revival of the Broadway show "A Chorus Line.



After stopping for a few minutes, Stratton drove the car from the lot. An investigation showed that the wall had been hit and needed repairs. No major damage to the wall was reported.

Skid marks, indicating a vehicle traveling at a high speed from a dead stop, were also present.

Witnesses nearby verified that Stratton had rammed the wall and hit the Cadillac. Police visited Stratton at her residence in Elkton, where she told police that the two children were dropped off at her mother's house in anticipation that she would be contacted by police.

She was charged with Reckless Endangerment First Degree, Aggravated Assault, two counts of Endangering the Welfare of a Child, two counts of Criminal Mischief Over \$1,000, Leaving the Scene of an Accident, and Driving with a Suspended License.

Extradition proceedings are pending.

# No Vicktory for Michael

hen Michael Vick's dogfights first came to public attention, numerous NFL players defended him by saying that dogfights-to-the-death were part of their culture too, a manly and even noble part of a great Southern tradition. (Did they play for the University of Georgia Fighting Bulldogs or the University of South Carolina Fighting Gamecocks?)

Like many of you, I disagreed with Vick's and their practices. But I didn't say anything. How could I without being a hypocrite?

After all, the official state bird of Delaware is the blue hen, a famous fighting bird since the Revolutionary War days. In addition, I have taught at and earned a graduate degree from a school whose football teams are known as the Fighting Blue Hens!

Then I thought of Mr. Perdue whose farms kill millions of chickens, yet he is admired and rich. Why? Because his killings feed people! It's

not sport – it's food! Ah, there's the difference! Blue hens and Vick's dogs died as miserable, useless losers who deserved to be thrown away. And were.

On behalf of my neighbors and me, thank you Mr. Moore and a special thanks to all of those unnamed workers who are so willing to serve Delmarva's customers.



#### Busy burglary suspect arrested

Delaware State Police have arrested a man suspected in burglaries at three businesses south of Newark. The suspect is identified as Ronald Mainville, 30, whose last known address was the New Castle area.

In the Christiana Excavating case, the suspect had entered


the business by forcing open the front door. Once inside, he stole a security camera.



In A Bind

Soft contact lenses that fit too tightly leave no room for tears to flow beneath the lenses to refresh the cornea. Instead, tears tend to pool under the lens and breed bacteria, which produce toxins that create cloudy patches in the cornea and cause infections. 





At nearly 680 miles long, the W3R details the encampments and roads used by Continental Army troops under George Washington and French troops under Jean-Baptiste de Rochambeau. The route runs from Newport, R.I. to Yorktown, Va., passing along Old Baltimore Pike.

Notable speakers included W3R organization leader Dr. Ralph Nelson, who delivered a brief history of the significant contribution of the French to the Revolutionary War and

# Food volunteer program launched

niversity of Delaware Cooperative Extension is developing a new program entitled the Master Foods Educator Training Program. This program provides training in foods, nutrition and food safety to those who are interested in volunteering in the community. Modeled after the very successful Master Gardener program, this course provides participants with 30+ hours of training and in return, program participants volunteer hours toward Cooperative Extension outreach efforts in the community.

The Master Foods Educator Program training will be held Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. starting October 5 through November 4, 2009. The location will be the New Castle County Extension Office, 461 Wyoming Road, in Newark.

The course is free to individuals who volunteer with Cooperative Extension initiatives and who are committed to provide 40 hours of volunteer

Cooperative Extension also recognizes that there are individuals currently working with other who need resources and training. Professionals working in the field who are interested in taking the class for professional development purposes can pay the \$125 registration fee to attend, but still need to

apply.


