Specialist Advises On Reduced Losses Of Bruised Poultry

Most broiler growers believe that

anyone else takes the loss on bruised poultry but actually, the loss is felt in farm pockets, says W. T. McAllister, marketing specialist of the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service.

"Costs of operating a business are passed backwards or forwards, whichever way is easiest. In the poultry business, when poultry is damaged because of bruising, the loss is passed backwards to the grower," says McAllister.

"And Delaware's loss from bruised poultry is high. Between five and 12 million birds are seriously damaged by bruising each year. The losses from these bruised animals amount to about \$600 daily per dressing plant."

Practicing it hard to eliminate entirely, but it can be greatly reduced by using care in catching and loading. Some suggestions are: Remove loose equipment before driving birds into catching pens; don't drive them; limit the number of rough handling when cooping and loading; breast and thigh bones occur here; bulk weigh if convenient; and use roller conveyors for loading.

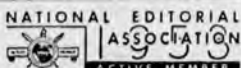
