Vienna, September 25, 1936.

Dear Mr. Carr:

I am sending you herewith a copy of my last letter to the Secretary, which is dated September 18th. I am not writing to him this week, except to call attention to my despatch No. 914 of September 24th. In this despatch I have given some of the intimate background which I usually put in my letters, and for this reason the usual letter to the Secretary is not necessary. I think you will find my despatch No. 914 interesting enough to have a copy brought to your attention in the Department. It gives a very interesting and, in some respects, significant account of developments which have taken place in the Southeastern European picture since you were here.

I have been fairly busy since you left and do not see much let up. We are leaving tomorrow morning in the car to put Mrs. Mustard and Martha on the boat at Hamburg, but shall be back in Vienna on October 3rd. I shall write you on my return.
