Five residents of the Newark area are candidates for election to state or national office with voting to take place Tuesday.

Firemen To Return On Sunday For Donations In Fund Drive

Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company Volunteers Seek Donations In House-To-House Drive For \$24,610 Goal For Provision Of Fire Protection In Newark District

Ninety-four volunteer firemen of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company distributed folders at homes in the Newark fire district last Sunday—folders containing the 1963 budget and explaining the fund drive; pictures of Aetna's front-line fire-fighting equipment; the new, second station; gummed stickers with the new fire phone number; and business reply envelopes.

Return calls will be made by uniformed volunteer firemen this Sunday, to pick up envelopes with contributions and to answer questions concerning operation of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company.

The fund drive is needed to supplement money provided by the fire company through city, county, state, and insurance appropriations and from members' dues. President Olan Thomas said.

Aetna's equipment consists of 10 pieces of active apparatus including a rescue truck, four pumps, a tank truck, and aerial ladder engine; a brush fire truck, and two ambulances.

The Aetna fire district includes the City of Newark, Brookside, Chestnut Hill Estates, Delaplaine Manor, Roseville Park, Milford Meadows, Newkirk, and Todd Estates, and other building developments in the general Newark area.

Acknowledgments will be mailed for all contributions received, and the Aetna Secretary, Don Butterworth, requests that names and addresses be included on all envelopes returned.

"These dollars help maintain and buy the apparatus and equipment necessary to help us protect our community," Treasurer Sam Gray stressed.

Fire Station No. 2 is being constructed on the Ogletown Road next to the A&P store at a cost of \$184,345.

"Aetna" volunteer firemen will supply the manpower, but we need community help financially," Sam Gray said.

Fire Chief George W. Smith added, "It is important that we reach our goal in order to maintain our high standard of fire protection for the area. New and replacement apparatus are planned," he said.

The \$24,610 is sought to provide the major share of Aetna's projected 1963 budget of \$43,330.

Heinecken Predicts Owls As Tough Test For Delaware Blue Hens This Saturday

One of the nation's most lopsided examples of gridiron domination may end this Saturday as the Delaware Blue Hens meet Temple in Philadelphia at 8 p.m.

Coach Dave Nelson's Blue Hens have won the past eight games, including 1961's 28-0 victory. Since 1951 when Temple last won, Delaware has piled up six victory margins on 51-13, 46-0, 71-7, 35-14 and 62-0, and has outscored the Owls 333-53. In one game, Delaware requested the clock be run non-stop through the fourth quarter to end the massacre.

But this year's game is expected to be different. Temple, under Head Coach George Mackris, has staged a grid renaissance, and they've defeated King's Point, Muhlenberg and Lafayette this year, losing tough 15-14 and 16-13 decisions to potent Bucknell and Buffalo.

Former Delaware Little All-American Mickey Heinecken — now the Blue Hen assistant line coach — emphasizes in his scouting reports that Temple's rushing defense "will be tough."

Heinecken, who saw the Owls lose to Hofstra 19-10 last Saturday, warns that Delaware's next opponent is a team confident and ready for an upset.

"I think Temple definitely will give us trouble," Heinecken said. "They have one of the best rushing defenses we've faced to date. Nobody has been able to move the ball successfully on the ground against them, and that includes Buffalo."

Heinecken added, "Temple is a team that can really generate some team spirit when they're high, which they didn't seem to be at Hofstra, anything can happen. We know they want to beat us and we'll have to be ready for a determined effort — and of course, they'll be playing us on their home ground."

The erstwhile Hen end and 1960 team captain also praised the Owls' "excellent team speed, especially backfield speed." He was impressed

Mike Brown Tops Delaware Offense With 353 Yardage

Delaware Halfback Mike Brown gained 107 yards in 17 carries last Saturday against Connecticut to widen his total offense lead over Quarterback Ted Kempki.

The last 195-pond junior from Wilmington also scored his fourth touchdown of the season, giving him 24 points for second place in scoring behind Senior Halfback Clint Ware. Brown is now averaging 60 yards per carry, based on 353 yards gained in 59 attempts.

Kempki, a senior, enjoyed a fine day in the 34-0 rout of the UConn, completing five of eight passes for 74 yards. He now has thrown for 297 yards, with 26 completions in 51 attempts, and has passed three times for touchdowns and once for a two-point conversion.

The pass-receiving lead is divided between Sophomore End Wes Frith, and Halfback Joe Slobojan, a junior. Slobojan, 160 pounds, caught three last week for 61 yards and has three all time for 88 yards and a TD. Frith received one for nine yards in the UConn game, making his 1962 record seven receptions for 88 yards.

In team statistics, Delaware's impressive 416-yard total offense figure against Connecticut boosted the Blue Hens' per-game offense average to 307.5. Opponents have managed 194 yards per game.

The Hens have averaged 236.3 rushing, 71.3 passing — opponents, a meager 76.7 rushing and 117.3 passing.

In six games, no opponent has been able to complete a pass for a touchdown against Delaware.

Delaware has scored 24 touchdowns to opponents' eight, and has outscored opponents 167-56.

Delaware's Blue Hens delighted a capacity Homecoming crowd at Delaware Stadium last Saturday by driving to a 34-0 win over the respekted Connecticut gridgers.

Delaware's victory set the Hen season record at 4-2 as Coach Dave Nelson's team rebounded from losses to Buffalo and Villanova, and amassed a 416-yard total offense and ran wild for 22 points in the final period. The Hens picked up 26 first downs, 13 in each half.

It was the first meeting between the teams since 1958 when Delaware won 28-0.

The fired-up Hens drove 75 yards to score on their first series of plays, with Halfback Joe Slobojan, sweeping in from the five for the TD.

Delaware added another in the second period when first Mike Brown outran the UConn defenders on a 22-yard touchdown sweep. Brown, 195-pound All-East candidate, gained a total of 107 yards in 17 carries in the game and was voted the outstanding back by press-box scribbles.

At halftime, it was 12-0 Delaware.

Don't let the crisp autumn air cool your determination to keep your lawn neat and trim, advises New Castle County's garden specialist Dave Tattall, who says most lawns will need to be mowed until mid-November.

To insure a healthy lawn, keep the grass trimmed to about two inches. If your lawn gets too long, it will mat down during the winter months and deprive the grass of needed light and air. Also, mowing will increase chance of disease and winter kill.

Tattall advises raking fallen leaves into a compost pile as a source of organic matter.

If leaves are allowed to accumulate and remain on the lawn over winter, they will smother the lawn.

When I was a young man working my way through college by doing farm work, the pitchfork, milking stool and scoop shovel were the most widely used pieces of equipment on the farm.

To a large extent we have replaced these items with more efficient machines such as the hay baler, milking machine and power operated conveyor. In spite of these mechanical advances, however, farming continues to be an occupation that requires a lot of hard,

physical labor. Although the amount of muscle power needed has been reduced, there is still a long way to go on most farms.

Certainly there will be a lot of new labor saving machinery in the future. This is going to be expensive and in a lot of cases won't be practical for the small farmer. So now and in the future, many farmers will still be substituting brain for muscle power to find easier ways of accomplishing difficult jobs.

The most efficient operator from the standpoint of getting work done easier that I have ever known, was a Dutchman in Lancaster County. He followed the philosophy that when his back got tired before the job was completed, it was time to figure out an easier way.

Most farmers can make their farm work easier without spending a lot of money. Analyze a time-consuming or tiring job by asking these questions:

1. What is being accomplished? Is the job necessary? Could it be combined with other work? Does the job involve double handling, back-tracking and hand carrying?

2. How is the job done? Why is it done this way — is it by habit or by plan? Is there a better way? Can the job be simplified?

3. When is it done? Could it be done better at some other time? Does doing it now interfere with getting more important work done on time?

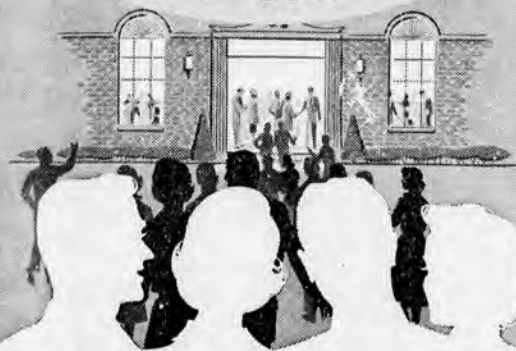
