3-Story Building Fire Ruins Drug, TV Stores, Pool Room

Early Wednesday Morning Blaze Results In \$125,000
Estimated damage To Newark Pharmacy, V. W. Nields
Appliance Store, Walter's Pool Room On E. Main St.

A fire believed to have started with a fuse box in the office of the Newark Pharmacy, and which may have smoldered for hours before its discovery by Frank Tolomeo at 7:17 a.m. yesterday caused damages estimated at \$125,000 in the three-story frame building on the southeast corner of Main and Chapel Streets.

The drug store on the first floor at 183 East Main Street, and the adjoining V. W. Nields & Son television and appliance store on the second floor were gutted by the fire, while Charles M. Walter's pool room and apartment on the third floor suffered some fire damage but more seriously from smoke and water.

The third floor storage area was badly damaged. Chief Clifton Knotts and Newark's volunteer firemen with four Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company engines, an ambulance, and a rescue truck, were assisted by Mill Creek, Christiana, and Elkton fire companies, and several firemen were given oxygen when overcome by smoke in fighting the blaze.

Condemnation? City Building Inspector Clarence A. Bader said last night that the building may have to be condemned, although preliminary investigation revealed no dangerous structural weakness. Bader, with Newark Fire Marshal William M. Donahue who was in Dover on other business yesterday, is to make a thorough inspection of the building today.

The roof was badly damaged, and portions of the southwest and west ends of the building were burned off. Firemen prevented the blaze from spreading to nearby buildings, and all traffic in the area was restricted for some three hours until the fire was pronounced under control. Frank Tolomeo's Newark Pharmacy had been recently renovated. Tolomeo discovered the fire when he opened the store and was met by smoke and flames as he unlocked the door.

Aetna Ambulance Membership Drive Opens In Newark

Family Membership Plan
Offered Local Residents
For Ambulance Services

Newark's Aetna Ambulance Service launched its annual membership drive last week with special brochures mailed to residents of the Newark area.

The ambulance is manned 24 hours a day by volunteers, and during the past year, 886 man hours were donated to this service, while the two Aetna ambulances traveled a total of 28,000 miles.

The Aetna Ambulance Service has been operated in the Newark area for more than 30 years, with trained, volunteer members of the Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company.

"In developing the family membership plan, emphasis must be given to the fact that this organization is not 'begging for money' but rather, this is an ambulance insurance plan so inexpensive that no one can afford to be without it," William M. Doyle writes in the brochure.

"Your financial support will insure the continuance of your ambulance service," Doyle concludes.

Some 50 volunteer Aetna ambulance aides have completed the Red Cross course in the past year; there is no limit to the number of times a member may call upon the ambulance; and the family membership plan includes the use of hospital beds, wheel chairs, respirators and other emergency equipment.

During the past year, the Aetna Ambulance Service responded to 796 distress calls—topping the previous year's record of 781.

University Labor Seeks Recognition As Union Group

Some 100 maintenance, dining-room and kitchen employees left their jobs and staged a demonstration at 1 p.m. yesterday in front of the University of Delaware Student Center.

It was the first incident of its kind in campus history. Normal routine at the university was not disrupted by the demonstration which lasted less than an hour, after which the demonstrators returned to their jobs.

Employees were reported to be seeking recognition as members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Workers and an audience with President John A. Perkins, the university's chief official to bargain for higher wages and better working conditions.

Annual Honor Day Program Observed On Local Campus

"The true heroes and heroines on our campus are you who have, by your intellectual attainments, most dynamically personified the true purposes of higher education in this university," Dr. John A. Perkins told students assembled this morning at annual Honor Day exercises on the University of Delaware campus.

The Dr. William E. Silverman memorial prize of \$25 was presented to Robert C. Griggs, Wilmington. This prize is awarded to the pre-medical student in the school of arts and science with an outstanding academic record and recommendation of his dean on the basis of outstanding personal qualities.

The troop will undertake a 48-hour survival hike in June, living off the land.

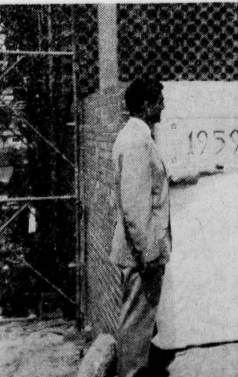

Congressman Harris B. McDowell, Jr., (D-De) will join two members of the University of Delaware faculty in a panel discussion of the United States mutual security program next Monday at 8 p.m. in the West Park Place Elementary School, under auspices of the Newark League of Women Voters.

Issuing an invitation to the public to come and ask questions of the panelists, Mrs. Joseph R. Perkins, Jr., president of the local league, stressed the importance of getting first-hand information on what projects are carried on with U. S. assistance and how governments and people deal with each other.

Both Professor Ralph Purcell of the university's department of political science, and Professor John A. Murray, school of agriculture, have had experience working in India, and last fall Congressman McDowell traveled through Asia in a special congressional study.

Mrs. C. Marcus Olson, Delaware State chairman of foreign policy for the league will be the moderator, and participants will include Mrs. Alexander Greenfield of the Wilmington Association for United Nations.

Recently returned from the convention of the U. S. League of Women Voters, Mrs. Perkins said that Monday night's meeting is part of nationwide program to "build public understanding of our national objectives."

Despite conflict of meetings in which a large number of community leaders were involved, some 50 turned out at the Central School at 9 o'clock last Monday evening to discuss qualifications for a member of the Newark Board of Education at a meeting arranged by Millard Zeisberg, president of the PTA Council in the Newark special school district, as a council service.

Edward Schall, a resident of Green Acres, near Wilmington, was moderator and panelists were Harold Meade, ass't. treasurer of the Newark branch, Wilmington Trust Company; the Rev. Milton Keene, pastor of Kingswood-of-Brookside Methodist Church; and Dr. Richard Dersheimer, executive secretary of the Delaware School Study Council.

Meade emphasized the importance of a school board serving as a unit in establishing policies and in planning for and providing personnel and finances for a proper educational program for the community.

The Rev. Keene cited personal qualifications needed by a board member, "paramount among which are knowledge of and understanding boys and girls as individuals; and a keen perception of the needs and problems of all youth of the school district."

Dersheimer pointed out the important role of education in the heritage parents pass onto their children, and said that "progress in any school system is abetted by continuity in membership on the board of education."

Following the panel discussion, questions came freely from the audience.

It was the general consensus of those present that because all four members for the Newark Board of Education will be elected on May 14, serious consideration must be given to electing persons who will maintain and extend the program of education conducted in the Newark special school district.

The armory was offered to the city for a five-year period, at the end of which it would be turned over to the University of Delaware. The city turned down this offer, and has attempted to gain it for a 10-year period. Costs for renovation for public use were estimated at \$35,000.

The Newark Recreation Association does not feel that this capital investment could be justified for the short period of availability. Chittenden concluded, "We wish to thank you for your personal and official efforts, and for those of other city officials to secure the armory for community use. It is unfortunate that the combined efforts of the citizens, the officials, and voluntary agencies of our community could not produce favorable action on their behalf. The need

for a community recreation center still remains."

The armory has provided facilities for youth and adult basketball leagues; as a summer youth center; for Boy Scout meetings, registration, and activity headquarters for community events and athletic leagues; rehearsals for local drama groups, and for other community-wide social events.

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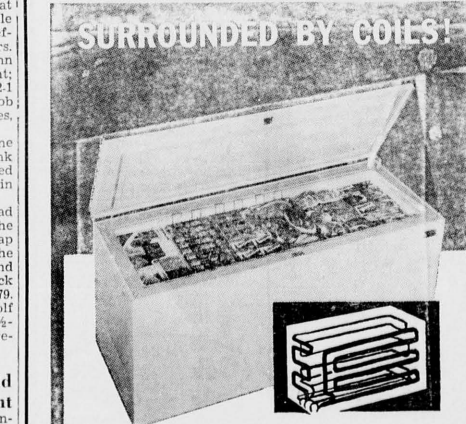

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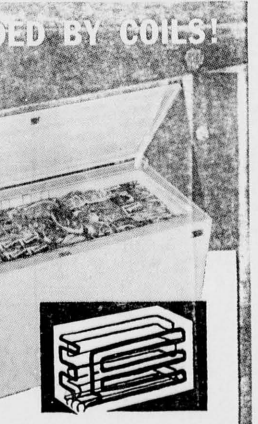

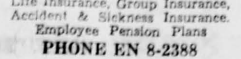
