RE: 29 Delaware Code, Chapter 89 — "State Lottery"

Dear Sir:

After reading the above captioned law, it appears unclear to me whether or not "slot machines" come within the definition of "lottery" as defined in Section 8903 (b).

Legal opinions expressed to me are of the clear belief that slot machines are lotteries and therefore no further legislation is necessary to further define "lottery." This conclusion is supported by the opinions in *Affiliated Enterprises, Inc. vs Waller*, 5A.2d 257 (Delaware, 1939) and *State vs Eckerd's Suburban, Inc.*, 164 A.2d 873 (Delaware, 1960).

However, I desire further clarification at this point. I do realize the existing law would need to be revised to accomplish the regulation of slot machines.

My question is: "Do slot machines fall within the definition of lottery as defined in Title 29 Delaware Code, Section 8903(b)."

QUESTION: Do Slot machines fall within the definition of lottery as contained in 29 Del. C. §8903(b)?

REQUEST NO: IW-015

ANSWER: Yes.

DISCUSSION:

It is the generally accepted rule that a "slot machine" is a form of lottery. See *State v. Coats*, 158 Dr. 102, 74 P. 2D 1120; *State ex rel. Evans v. Brotherhood of Friends*, 41 Wash. 2d 133,

247 P. 2d 787; Lee v. City of Miami, 121 Fla. 93, 163 So. 486, 101 A.L.R. 1115; State v. Marck, 124 Mont. 178, 220 P. 2d 1017; and Moore v. Atlanta Athletic Club, 79 Ga. App. 41, 52 S.E. 2d 628. It would appear from the decision in those cases that the general term "lottery" includes in its definition many games of chance one of which is a slot machine.

It is a rule of statutory construction that where a term is used in a statute that term will be given its sound usage or meaning unless specifically defined to mean something different within that statute. In 29 Del. C. §8903(b) the term lottery is defined as follows:

"Lottery" or "State Lottery" or "system" shall mean the public gaming systems or games established and operated pursuant to this Act and including all types of lotteries." (Emphasis added).

Since a "slot machine" is generally accepted as a type of lottery, it would be included within the definition contained in Title 29 as a type of lottery which could be operated by the State under Art. II, Sect. 17 of the Constitution and 29 Del. C., Chapter 89.

13TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Senate convened at 1:47 p.m. March 19, 1975, President Pro Tempore Isaacs presiding.

A Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Charles E. Covington.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

By roll call, 21 Senators were Present.

The Journal was approved as read.

A message from the House informed the Senate that the House passed **SJR 15** and **SCR 22**.

SB 157 was reported back from the Finance Committee: 3 Favorable, 2 Merits.

SJR 17, sponsored by Senator Elliott, was introduced and laid on the Table on motion of Senator Elliott:

SJR 17 — “Praising the Delaware Agricultural Industry for its value to the State and thanking all groups and individuals responsible for the Industry’s outstanding Fifth Annual Dinner, honoring the Governor and members of the 128th General Assembly.”

SR 33, sponsored by Senator Isaacs and all the Senators, was introduced:

SR 33 — “Expressing Best Wishes to Walt Rykiel on his recent transfer from the Dover Bureau to the Wilmington Offices of the News Journal Papers and wishing Ron Williams, the new Dover Bureau Chief, a constructive and pleasant assignment in his new post.”

The Resolution was adopted with 18 Senators voting YES and 3 Senators (Holloway, Manning and McCullough) being ABSENT.

SR 34, sponsored by Senator Isaacs, was introduced:

SR 34 — “Congratulating Tim Kwasnieski of Middletown High School on winning the State Wrestling Championship on Saturday, March 1, at St. Marks High School.”

The Resolution was adopted with 18 Senators voting YES and 3 Senators (Holloway, Manning and McCullough) being ABSENT.

The Chair introduced **HCR 12**, sponsored by Representative Clendaniel, Senator Cordrey and all the Senators:

HCR 12 — “Expressing the appreciation of the 128th General Assembly for the contribution of Delaware’s Agriculture Industry to the State’s Commerce and thanking the sponsors of the Fifth Annual Agri-Dinner.”

The Resolution was adopted with 18 Senators voting YES and 3 Senators (Holloway, Manning and McCullough) being ABSENT.

The Chair introduced **HCR 13**, sponsored by Representative George:

HCR 13 — “Urging the Medical Society of Delaware to adopt a policy that member Physicians accept Medicare Cards presented to them for services.”

On motion of Senator Schlor, the roll call vote on adoption of the Resolution was taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Castle, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Elliott, Hale, Hughes, Isaacs, Kearns, Knox, Martin,

McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp — 17.

NO: Senator Steele — 1.

NOT VOTING: Senator Zimmerman — 1.

ABSENT: Senators Holloway and Manning — 2.

Therefore, the Resolution was adopted by the Senate and returned to the House.

The Chair introduced **HCR 11**, sponsored by Representative Clendaniel and Senator Adams:

HCR 11 — “Expressing the sympathy of the members of the 128th General Assembly of the State of Delaware to the family of the late Ralph M. Collison, a former member of the House.”

The Resolution was adopted by the Senate with 19 Senators voting YES and 2 Senators (Holloway and Manning) being ABSENT.

The Chair introduced **HB 16 w HA 1**, sponsored by Representative Morris:

HB 16 w HA 1 — “An Act to amend Chapter 381, Volume 59, Laws of Delaware, an Act entitled “An Act making appropriations for the expense of the State Government for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1975, and to amend certain pertinent statutory provisions,” also known as the 1975 Appropriation Bill.” Assigned to Finance Committee.

The Chair introduced **HB 68**, sponsored by Representatives McGinnis and Connor, Senators Holloway and Hughes:

HB 68 — “An Act to amend Sections 8903 and 8915 (a), Chapter 89, Title 29, Delaware Code, relating to monies received from the sale of Lottery Tickets.”

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the Bill was laid on the Table.

The following legislation was introduced and assigned:

SB 165 — “An Act authorizing the Division of State Police of the Department of Public Safety to purchase a second Helicopter so as to enable the State to continue to provide Rescue and other important Safety Services; and providing a supplementary appropriation therefor.” Sponsor: Senator Elliott. Assigned to Finance Committee.

SB 166 — “An Act amending Chapter 736, Volume 57, Laws of Delaware, entitled “An Act authorizing the State of Delaware to borrow money to be used for Capital Improvements and Expenditures in the nature of Capital investments and to issue Bonds and Notes therefor and

appropriating the monies to various Agencies of the State.” Sponsor: Senator Isaacs. Assigned to Finance Committee.

SB 167 — “An Act making a supplementary appropriation to the Department of Highways and Transportation for the purpose of installing traffic signal control equipment at the intersection of Glenwood Avenue and North Main Street, Smyrna, Delaware.” Sponsors: Senators Isaacs and Cook. Assigned to Highways and Transportation Committee.

SB 168 — “An Act to amend Chapter 29, Title 5, Delaware Code, relating to Finance Charge limitations on the sale of motor vehicles.” Sponsor: Senator Murphy. Assigned to Public Safety.

SB 169 — “An Act to amend Chapter 45, Title 21, Delaware Code, relating to truck weights.” Sponsor Senator Hughes. Assigned to Public Safety Committee.

SB 170 — “An Act to amend Chapter 5 of Title 31, Delaware Code, relating to prompt payment of providers of Health Care Services under the Medicaid Program.” Sponsor Senator Elliott. Assigned to Health and Social Services Committee.

SB 171 — “An Act to amend Chapter 50 of Title 15, Delaware Code, relating to requirements on voting machines.” Sponsor Senator Isaacs. Assigned to Banking, Insurance and Elections Committee.

SB 172 — “An Act making a supplementary appropriation to the Department of Highways and Transportation for the purpose of installing traffic signal control equipment at the intersection of Wrangle Hill Road and Route 40, New Castle County, Delaware.” Sponsor: Senator Isaacs. Assigned to Finance Committee.

SB 173 — “An Act to amend Chapter 381, Volume 59, Laws of Delaware, an Act entitled “Act making appropriations for the expense of the State Government for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1975, and to amend certain pertinent statutory provisions.” Sponsors: Senators Kearns and Isaacs. Assigned to Finance Committee.

SA 1 to SB 39 was introduced by Senator Murphy and placed with the Bill.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the necessary rules were suspended for the purpose of lifting and considering **HB 68**.

The roll call vote on the Bill was taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Castle, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Hale, Hughes, Kearns, Knox, Martin, Murphy, Sharp,

Steele — 14.

NO: Senators Elliott, Isaacs, Manning, McCullough and Zimmerman — 5.

NOT VOTING: Senator Schlor — 1.

ABSENT: Senator Holloway — 1.

Therefore, the Bill passed the Senate and was returned to the House.

On motion of Senator Zimmerman, **SB 61** was taken up for consideration and read by title only.

The privilege of the floor was extended to Mayor Crawford J. Carroll of Dover and Timothy P. Mullaney of the Kent County Fraternal Order of Police to speak on the Bill.

Senator Hale moved that the Bill be tabled before final consideration.

The roll call vote on the motion to table the Bill was taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Castle, Cook, Hale, Knox, Manning, Steele — 8.

NO: Senators Cicione, Cordrey, Holloway, Isaacs, Kearns, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp, Zimmerman — 11.

NOT VOTING: Senator Hughes — 1.

ABSENT: Senator Elliott — 1.

Therefore, the motion was defeated and the Bill was still before the Senate.

On motion of Senator Zimmerman, the roll call vote on the Bill was taken but Senator Zimmerman moved that it be tabled.

The motion to table the roll call was then taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Holloway, Isaacs, Kearns, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp, Zimmerman — 13.

NO: Senators Berndt, Castle, Hale, Knox, Manning, Steele — 6.

NOT VOTING: Senators Elliott and Hughes — 2.

Therefore, the motion prevailed and the roll call vote on **SB 61** was tabled.

At 3:53 p.m. on motion of Senator Cordrey, the Senate recessed for an hour.

The Senate reconvened at 5:53 p.m., Lt. Governor Bookhammer presiding.

SB 170 was reported back from Health and Social Services Committee: 1 Favorable, 4 Merits.

The following Bills were reported back from Community Affairs Committee: **SB 117** — 5 Merits; **SB 118** — 5 Merits.

The following legislation was reported back from the Executive Committee: **SJR 16** — 3 Merits, 3 Unfavorable; **SJR 10** — 1 Favorable, 4 Merits, 1 Unfavorable; **SJR 14** — 1 Favorable, 5 Merits.

SA 1 to **SB 126** was introduced by Senator Isaacs and placed with the Bill.

SA 3 to **SB 123** was introduced by Senator McCullough and placed with the Bill.

SA 2 to **SB 157** was introduced by Senator Isaacs and placed with the Bill.

SB 174, Sponsored by Senator Cicione was introduced and assigned to Finance Committee:

SB 174 — “An Act to amend Sections 1305, 1306, 1307, and 1321 of Chapter 13, Title 14 of the Delaware Code by postponing certain annual salary increases or salary incremental increases previously authorized by the General Assembly of the State of Delaware.”

SCR 24, sponsored by Senator Holloway was introduced:

SCR 24 — “Providing for the establishment of a Committee to study the feasibility and ramification of slot machines for Delaware.”

Senator Elliott moved that the Resolution be tabled.

The roll call vote on the tabling motion was taken and announced:

YES: Senators Berndt, Castle, Elliott, Hale, Manning — 5.

NO: Senators Adams, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Holloway, Isaacs, Kearns, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp — 12.

NOT VOTING: Senator Steele — 1.

ABSENT: Senators Hughes, Knox and Zimmerman — 3.

Therefore, the motion was defeated and the Resolution was still before the Senate.

On motion of Senator Holloway, the roll call vote on adoption of the Resolution was taken but tabled before being announced on his further motion.

SB 115 was reported back from Public Safety Committee: 4 Merits.

At 6:25 p.m. on motion of Senator Isaacs, the Senate adjourned until 1:30 p.m. March 20, 1975.

14TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Senate convened at 1:45 p.m. March 20, 1975, President Pro Tempore Isaacs presiding.

A Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Charles E. Covington.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

By roll call, 21 Senators were PRESENT.

The Journal was approved as read.

HCR 14, sponsored by Representative Gilligan and Senator Sharp, was introduced and on motion of Senator Sharp considered for adoption:

HCR 14 — "Congratulating the Marching Band of John Dickinson High School on being chosen to represent the State of Delaware in the national "Festival of States" Marching Band Competition in St. Petersburg, Florida."

The roll call vote on the Resolution revealed:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Cook, Cordrey, Holloway, Isaacs, Kearns, Knox, Manning, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp, Steele, Zimmerman — 16.

ABSENT: Senators Castle, Cicione, Elliott, Hale and Hughes — 5.

Therefore, the Resolution was adopted by the Senate and returned to the House.

HCR 15, sponsored by Representative Gilligan and all House Members, Senator Cicione and all Senate Members, was introduced and on motion of Senator Kearns considered for adoption:

HCR 15 — "CONGRATULATING WILLIAM JULIUS (JUDY) JOHNSON OF MARSHALLTON, DELAWARE, FOR HAVING BEEN VOTED INTO BASEBALL'S HALL OF FAME LOCATED AT COOPERSTOWN, NEW YORK.

WHEREAS, the members of the 128th General Assembly are elated to learn that William Julius (Judy) Johnson has been elected to baseball's Hall of Fame located at Cooperstown, New York, the first Delawarean ever to be chosen to the Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, Judy Johnson started playing baseball in 1918 when he began playing on Saturdays for the Chester Giants at \$5.00 a game and subsequently became a charter member of the Negro Eastern League in 1922 which was really the start of his baseball career; and

WHEREAS, during Judy's baseball career, he was an excellent fielder and a consistent batter with outstanding speed

as a base runner; and

WHEREAS, in 1969 Jet Magazine honored him as the greatest third baseman ever to play in Negro baseball; and

WHEREAS, Judy played with and against such great names as Satchel Paige, Josh Gibson, Buck Leonard, Monte Irvin and Bell, all of which have been inducted into baseball's Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, Judy Johnson, at 74, has achieved his life long ambition which he narrowly missed in 1973 when James (Cool Papa) Bell was voted into the Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, Judy Johnson, a modest, soft-spoken man never once in his long baseball career expressed resentment or bitterness about his exclusion from the major leagues, but simply remarked "I was born too soon"; and

WHEREAS, the members of the Delaware General Assembly wish to congratulate Judy Johnson for such an excellent career in baseball, plus the honor of having been the first Delawarean ever to be elected to baseball's Hall of Fame.

NOW, THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the 128th General Assembly of the State of Delaware, the Governor concurring therein, that congratulations are hereby extended to William Julius (Judy) Johnson for the highest honor one can receive from a career in baseball, namely election to the Hall of Fame.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the 128th General Assembly express their highest gratitude for the honor you not only brought to yourself and family, but the honor you also bestowed upon Delaware by having been the first Delawarean ever elected to baseball's Hall of Fame.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor of the State of Delaware is hereby requested to designate the day on which William Julius (Judy) Johnson is inducted into Baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York, that such day be proclaimed by the Governor as Judy Johnson Day.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution be made a part of the House and Senate Journals and that a copy be forwarded to the residence of William Julius (Judy) Johnson, Marshallton, Delaware."

SB 176 — “An Act authorizing the State of Delaware to borrow money to be used for the purpose of constructing a new bridge and water control device on Route 485, the Smyrna Landing Road, and to issue Bonds and Notes therefor and appropriating the monies to the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.” Sponsor: Senator Isaacs. On motion of Senator Isaacs, the necessary rules were

suspended for the purpose of lifting **SB 178** from the table and considering the Bill for passage.

The privilege of the floor was extended to Duane Olsen, Controller General, to speak on the Bill.

The roll call vote on the Bill was taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Castle, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Elliott, Hale, Holloway, Hughes, Isaacs, Kearns, Knox, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp — 18.

NO: Senator Steele — 1.

NOT VOTING: Senator Zimmerman — 1.

ABSENT: Senator Manning — 1.

Therefore, the Bill passed the Senate and was sent to the House for concurrence.

SB 124 was taken up for consideration on motion of Senator Cicione.

SA 1 to SB 124 was taken up for consideration on motion of Senator Cicione, the roll call vote taken and announced:

YES: Senators Berndt, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Elliott, Hale, Holloway, Hughes, Isaacs, Kearns, Martin, McCullough, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp — 15.

NO: Senator Adams — 1.

NOT VOTING: Senators Knox and Steele — 2.

ABSENT: Senators Castle, Manning and Zimmerman — 3.

Therefore, the Amendment was adopted.

On motion of Senator Cicione, the roll call vote on **SB 124 w SA 1** was then taken; however, on further motion of Senator Cicione, the roll call was tabled before being announced.

On motion of Senator Elliott, **HB 11 w HA 1** was taken up for consideration, the roll call vote taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Castle, Cicione, Cook, Cordrey, Elliott, Hale, Holloway, Hughes, Kearns, Knox, Manning, Martin, Murphy, Sharp, Steele — 17.

Therefore, the Bill passed the Senate and was returned to the House.

Senator Cicione moved that the roll call on **SB 61** be lifted.

Senator Castle raised the question as to whether Senator Cicione had the authority to lift the roll call since the sponsor of the Bill, Senator Zimmerman, was not present in the Chamber.

There were several motions and counter motions in regards to the manner and on motion of Senator Isaacs, the Senate recessed at 3:39 p.m.

The Senate reconvened at 3:53 p.m., Lt. Governor Bookhammer presiding.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, and without objection, the roll call on **SB 61** was laid on the table in its original form.

The Senate reconvened at 2:18 p.m. April 8, 1975, Lt.

Governor Bookhammer presiding.

The Secretary informed the Senate that the House had passed **SB 184; SB 119; SB 116; SB 9; SB 120; SB 71.**

SJR 13 was reported back to the Senate from the Public Safety Committee: 1 Favorable, 2 Merits, 1 Unfavorable.

SB 111 was reported back from the Administrative Services Committee: 4 Merits.

SB 164 was reported back from the Labor and Industrial Relations Committee: 4 Favorable, 2 Merits.

At 2:20 p.m. the Senate adjourned on motion of Senator Isaacs to immediately convene for the 17th Legislative Day.

17TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Senate convened at 2:20 p.m. April 8, 1975, Lt. Governor Bookhammer presiding.

A Prayer was offered by Senator Elliott.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

By roll call, there were 21 Senators PRESENT.

The Journal was approved as read.

SR 41, sponsored by Senators Isaacs and Cordrey, was introduced and considered for adoption.

Dear Lt. Governor Bookhammer:

The Administrative Board of Wesley United Methodist Church in Dover, Delaware, at its April 1st meeting, acted in regard to the pending legislation having to do with slot machines and casino gambling, the bills in question being House Bills Nos. 114 and 120 and Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 24. The Administrative Board of Wesley Church opposes the passage of such bills on two basic principles in addition to its opposition to gambling.

(1) The Administrative Board feels that the State of Delaware has other more reasonable and honest ways of approaching its fiscal problems than resorting to gambling bills to raise necessary revenues. While taxation is not a welcome solution, we recognize that the problems of our State must be faced in a way that deals realistically with the issues and we feel that the gambling bills do not do that.

(2) Secondly, Wesley Church is deeply involved in providing assistance to those who are economically pressed and are victims of the present economy and inequality in terms of distribution of necessary funds, and the board feels that these very persons are the ones most apt to be victims of methods to quickly secure funds by means of games of chance. The very nature of gambling is that the losers have to outdistance the winners and therefore the intensity of the economic problems of those seeking these methods will be increased. We therefore urge you and both houses of the legislature to reject these bills.

As senior minister of Wesley Church, I would ask that this letter be spread in the minutes of both houses of the legislature with my personal endorsement added to that of the Administrative Board of Wesley Church.

This letter is written in response to your letter of April 17, 1975, stating that you are considering Hiram W. Warder, Esq., for appointment to the recently created additional judgeship on the Family Court in New Castle County. You asked for our views and, if they should not be favorable, to give our reasons for such judgment.

The Committee on Judicial Appointments of the Delaware State Bar Association met on Tuesday, April 22, 1975, and considered the matter at depth. The unanimous opinion of the Committee was that Mr. Warder is not qualified for appointment to the Family Court bench. Our specific reason is that the Committee does not believe that Mr. Warder has the legal ability or the judicial temperament that fit him for the position as a judge of the Family Court.

Although our Committee has responded to your request that we give the reasons for our judgment in this case, the Committee, because of the delicate nature of some of the matters considered by it in performing its functions generally, is reluctant to establish a practice of giving our written reasons for unfavorable judgments in every case.

The Delaware Motor Vehicle Division endorses **H.B. 248** as introduced by you.

This Bill will enable Delaware contractors to be competitive in the State of Pennsylvania by allowing their 4 axle dump trucks to haul a similar gross load as the Pennsylvania registered vehicles are allowed to haul.

However, I must point out that this Bill will **not** entitle those vehicles to haul a gross load of 73,280 lbs. in most other states unless their laws are changed.

Along with the increased allowable weights, we are

suggesting increased penalties for "overweight" violations. This proposal will be presented in another "weight" Bill which should be introduced in the very near future.

At 5:47 p.m. on motion of Senator Isaacs, the Senate adjourned until 12:30 p.m. May 8, 1975.

28TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Senate convened at 12:50 p.m. May 8, 1975, Lt. Governor Bookhammer presiding.

A Prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Kendall K. McCabe.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

By roll call, there were 20 Senators PRESENT with 1 Senator (McCullough) ABSENT.

The Journal was approved as read.

At 12:54 p.m. on motion of Senator Isaacs, the Senate recessed and the Sergeant-at-Arms was sent to inform the House that the Senate was prepared to go into Joint Session.

JOINT SESSION

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the Speaker and Members of the House. They were admitted and seated. The President invited Speaker Jonkiert and President Pro-Tempore Isaacs to a seat on the rostrum.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the Senate and House convened in Joint Session.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the President of the Senate presided over the Joint Session.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House were appointed to act as Secretaries of the Joint Session.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, the President appointed Senators Sharp and Knox and Representatives Sincock and Harrington as a Committee to escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the

duly appointed committee to the Senate Chamber. The President invited the Governor to the rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session. The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

The unpleasant current status of the Delaware Lottery brings me before you legislators today.

All of you are aware that the Loto-Superfecta Game was suspended after five weeks of operation. The Game failed because the people of Delaware found it too complex, did not understand it, and — frankly — refused to buy tickets.

This was probably a sensible decision on the part of Delawareans, because the Loto-Perfecta Prize structure failed to function. After five weeks, our Lottery had yet to award a First Prize to anyone.

Hindsight tells us that this disaster might not have occurred had two mistakes **not** been made.

The first one was that I accepted the findings of the Legislative Lottery Study Committee as to the type of Lottery to be initiated; and second, I contracted with the consultant selected by the Legislative Lottery Study Committee to implement that Game.

In fact, according to the following letter, dated on November 2, 1973, under the signature of Representative Robert T. Connor, Chairman of the Delaware Lottery Study Committee, the majority of the members of that Committee — eighteen months ago — had already decided on a preferred Game Plan and a Preferred Consultant.

The letter, to Louis D. Wilson, Vice President of Analytics, Incorporated, of Jenkintown, Pennsylvania, reads as follows: "Dear Mr. Wilson:

It is the intention of the Delaware Lottery Committee to award a contract for Phase II, the technical design and implementation of a State gaming system, to Analytics, Inc., upon their successful completion of the tasks incorporated in the Agreement for Professional Services, executed between Analytics and this Committee on this date, and the passage of enabling legislation by the General Assembly of the State of Delaware.

The Committee understands that the price quoted by Analytics in their proposal to the Committee will be subject to re-negotiation, should the necessary legislation fail to pass by June 30, 1974. . . ."

* * * * *

The game design was complex; the consultant was inexperienced.

And it is ironic to note that the \$400,000 start-up appropriation for the Loto-Superfecta was insufficient to finance the front-end costs of a complex equipment oriented Lottery game.

Thus, a further legacy of these two recommendations which I accepted is a mountain of bills for all the equipment which we were required to purchase to implement the Loto-Superfecta bitter-tasting though these bills may be, they still must be swallowed by our State Treasury.

Today, we stand at a point of decision.

If we elect one fork in the road, it leads to the permanent stoppage of all lottery operations.

If we pursue the other path, we will develop a new Lottery Game, and reinstitute the Delaware State Lottery.

I propose to Delawareans today that a new Game be developed and the Lottery be reinstated.

Since the implementing Legislation passed by the General Assembly placed the Lottery Office under my direct supervision, it is my responsibility to rescue the Lottery by proposing a Plan which will lead to the implementation of a successful Delaware Lottery Program.

Radical surgery is necessary and radical surgery is what I propose.

First: the Loto-Superfecta Concept must be discarded.

Second: Our current Consultant must be discharged.

Third: A new Consultant must be retained—Mathematica, Inc., of Princeton, New Jersey.

Fourth: The new Consultant must be instructed to initiate a Basic Lottery Game, similar to the one which was so successfully initiated by Mathematica last year in Rhode Island, the Nation's smallest State. It is evident from our experience that starting a Lottery Game without the benefit of a highly-qualified and experienced Consultant can well be a prelude to failure.

This is why I have selected Mathematica as Delaware's new Consultant. In my opinion, after making my own study of lotteries, Mathematica — which has already successfully started 18 Lottery Games in 10 States — should have been the original choice of the Lottery Study Committee. Evidently, success was not a major criterion in the Committee's selection process.

Further, Mathematica, Inc., has been highly recommended to me by Lottery Directors around our nation.

Fifth: Once the General Assembly has authorized the funds necessary to finance the start-up of the reinstatement of the Delaware State Lottery, I will ask the private business community in our State to provide me a top-flight executive — at no cost to the State — to act as Special Assistant to the Governor for Lottery operations during the start-up phase of the new Game and during the first four weeks of its operation. I am sure that at least one of our many prominent companies will agree to my request. I have full confidence in our new Consultant and in the employees of the Delaware State Lottery, but I believe, in view of our recent problem, that the addition to the Staff of a highly competent professional administrator loaned by industry to act as my special assistant and watchdog during the start-up and first four weeks of the new Delaware State Lottery will add the necessary additional measure of credibility to our operation and contribute mightily to the restoration of the confidence of our people in the Delaware State Lottery.

I want to add an important note here about Mr. Gene Auen, in my opinion, he has done a very credible job in the face of an impossible situation, as given him by members of the Lottery Study Committee and the General Assembly. He and his Staff have worked enthusiastically and tirelessly, even when under sharp attack — often from people on that same Study Committee — for a situation that they, in fact, created.

Now, as I was about to say, Mathematica advises me that they will be able to begin the start-up Phase of the new Lottery on May 15 — and we should expect to be in operation by August 1st.

I am confident that Mathematica can implement a basic, weekly Lottery Game which will have mass appeal to the citizens of our State, and which our citizens will support.

I stress it will be a much-simplified version

Start-up costs have been estimated at \$130,000. I have prepared a supplemental appropriation which will be submitted today to underwrite the start-up costs of the new Lottery Game.

Mathematica has agreed to a consulting and management contract.

That contract will terminate one year from the date of sale of the first ticket. Under the contract, they will develop new

Games, as necessary, and provide continuing technical assistance during the first year of the Lottery operation.

What will their fee be, for this service?

Five percent of the gross receipts of the Lottery for the first year of operation. The year to begin upon the sale of the first ticket. (They will receive no payment for services prior to initiation of the new Lottery.)

I am also submitting legislation which would permit the turning over to the Lottery of the general and special funds generated by the Loto-Perfecta Game.

Also, I will submit an additional supplemental appropriation request that will be sufficient to underwrite the remaining, unfunded obligations stemming from the implementation of the Loto-Superfecta Game.

Further, efforts will be made to dispose of the equipment purchased to implement the Loto-Superfecta Game, and which will not be needed to implement the new Mathematica-designed Game. Monies generated by the disposal of surplus equipment will be returned to the General Fund, and may significantly reduce the total cost of the implementation and operation of the now permanently-suspended Loto-Superfecta Game.

Additionally, I will introduce legislation to permit the 20% set aside by statute for Lottery operations, to be retained by the Lottery Office for operational purposes.

Finally, I will request that the new Consultants arrange for a drawing to award the undistributed Loto-Superfecta Prize Money, consistent with the recently-received Attorney General's opinion.

Before I close, let me make these observations.

Delaware entered the Lottery Business long after other States had gone the same route.

Since we were not at all familiar with the Game or its set-up, the Bipartisan Lottery Study Committee bore the responsibility of researching Lotteries, comparing Lotteries, and proposing a mechanism suitable to Delaware.

Chaired by Representative Connor, the Committee moved forward and submitted its recommendations and enabling legislation, after a ten-month study.

There was one, lone voice **not** concurring with the type of Lottery proposed in the Study Committee report, nor with the choice of the Consultant. And that person was David Broetemarkle, a member of the Study Committee. He came to my office and registered his objections. Unfortunately, I did not

recognize the wisdom in that solitary protest.

But nonetheless, the then-proposed Lottery was riding high on the crest of enthusiasm, and many of the Legislative Lottery Committee members involved — on both sides of the aisles — sought press coverage to boast of their participation in the establishment process, and to praise their own wise judgment.

But then, problems began to surface.

Again, in a Bipartisan spirit, meetings were held in my office, and we tried to iron out the problems.

But suddenly, and inexplicably, the Lottery became the prime topic of political sniping, and rapidly, some members of the Lottery Study Committee began denouncing the Lottery, including Study Committee Chairman Connor.

I have told the press, and I tell you all again now. . . .

The Legislative Lottery Committee bears the responsibility for choosing, implementing and funding the Consultant (who bears 99% of the responsibility for the Game's success).

The Legislative Lottery Study Committee bears the responsibility for placing rigid restrictions on the type of Lottery you want established (whether it be tied to horse-racing or anything else).

And then when it all proved a flop because of the Legislative Lottery Committee's decisions, you tried to deny your responsibilities. But you cannot just wash your hands of it, or blame the Lottery Director, who has tried so desperately to adhere to your directives.

Had I not accepted the recommendations of the bipartisan Study Committee, I would have been accused at that time of political interference.

Let's face it, the responsibility, ladies and gentlemen, belongs to the Lottery Study Committee.

And now, let's move on. Let's quit the political sniping.

Let's proceed in a renewed bipartisan effort.

I believe that if we work together, and move forward with an experienced firm like Mathematica, that we in Delaware can have as successful a Lottery as other States.

I supported **your** original Program, down the line.

Now, I urge your support for **my** Program, down the line.

I am confident that with your support, it will prove to be successful.

Now, Mr. President, with your permission, I would like to

turn the podium over to Major Peter O'Connell of Rhode Island.

Late Monday evening, I spoke with Rhode Island Governor Noel.

And he graciously granted my request that Major O'Connell, the Executive Director of the Rhode Island Lottery, be with us today so that he can explain the mechanics of what Governor Noel advises me is an extremely successful Lottery, now approaching its first anniversary in operation in that New England State.

This Lottery was designed by, and initiated by, the Consultant to the Rhode Island Lottery, Mathematica, Inc., and I have been advised by Mathematica that the basic Game they propose to initiate in Delaware will be similar to the successful Rhode Island Program.

I ask you to give Major O'Connell your kind attention.

He is here to help all of us — and to tell us the rewards of a successful Lottery Operation.

Major O'Connell. . . .

* * * * *

The previously named committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

Senator Cordrey moved that the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compare their respective Journals.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compared their Journals, found them to agree, and so notified the President.

Senator Cordrey moved the two Houses now separate to reconvene in their respective Chambers. Motion prevailed.

* * * * *

At 2:00 p.m. on motion of Senator Cordrey, the Senate recessed and reconvened at 2:43 p.m.

The Secretary announced that messages from the House indicated that it had passed **SB 102; SB 173; SB 81 w SA 1, HA 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8; SB 128 w HA 1; SB 175; SB 65; SB 246 w HA 1; SB 207; SB 142 w SA 1.**

On motion of Senator Hale, **SB 81 w SA 1, HA 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8** was reassigned to Administrative Services Committee.

At the request of Senator Holloway, the Biography of William J. Tomlinson (which was printed on these pages for the 25th Legislative Day on April 24, 1975) was read by the reading clerk.

The privilege of the floor was then extended to Mr. Tomlinson and his assistant, Randall T. Kazik, to demonstrate and explain the operations of the slot machine.

The privilege of the floor was then extended to Robert E. Moor, Complete Coin Corporation, to speak on slot machine operations.

SB 128 which had passed the Senate was again taken up for reconsideration on motion of Senator Cordrey, as further amended by **HA 1**.

The roll call vote on **SB 128 w HA 1** was then taken and announced:

YES: Senators Adams, Berndt, Cook, Cordrey, Elliott, Holloway, Hughes, Isaacs, Kearns, Knox, Manning, Murphy, Schlor, Sharp, Steele, Zimmerman — 16.

NOT VOTING: Senator Castle — 1.

ABSENT: Senators Cicione, Hale, Martin and McCullough — 4.

Therefore, the Bill, as so amended passed the Senate.

The following proposed legislation was introduced and assigned:

HB 240 — “An Act to amend Title 29, Delaware Code, relating to Public Work Contracts and procurements by exempting the Division of Libraries of the Department of Community Affairs and Economic Development from the requirements thereof.” Sponsor: Representative Kelly. Assigned to Community Affairs.

HB 228 — “An Act to amend Chapter 24, Title 3, Delaware Code, relating to Johnson Grass.” Sponsor: Representative Darling. Assigned to Agriculture Committee.

HB 64 — “An Act to amend Chapter 9, Part I, Title 10 of the Delaware Code relating to the Family Court; and the adjudication or disposition of cases in that Court.” Sponsors: Representatives Connor, Matushefske, Morris. Assigned to Judiciary Committee.

Since Easter of this year copper roof flashing, copper downspouts, copper guttering and cooper roof vents have been stripped from the Rose Hill School. Such was done not by kids exercising vandalism, but by professional strippers who took the copper and sold it at a profit.

I, invited James W. Cluck, State Supervisor of Maintenance, to inspect the building and he did then concur in this proposal. We explored the avenue of Minor Capital Improvement as a source of funds; however, such repairs could not be included in that program until FY '77. Local funds are not sufficient to cover the cost.

Therefore, I am requesting that a bill be introduced into the General Assembly for \$45,000 to replace the flashing, guttering and downspouts at the Rose Hill School.

Until the guttering, downspouts and flashing are replaced the roof of the school will be subject to numerous leaks, and if continued too long will cause interior damage to the building.

We propose to replace the flashing with plastic neopreme which would offer no temptation of removal. The guttering and downspouts would be replaced with either aluminum or galvanized, whichever is the least expensive.

If either of you would like to inspect the damage to the school, we can meet and go on the roof as the damage is quite apparent. I do have pictures of some of the damage area that I can show you.

As always I appreciate everything you do for the school district and know you will do everything possible in this matter.
