

FIRST OF CONCERTS GIVEN

Julius Huehn Pleases Audience With Program

Last Thursday, the first concert under the auspices of the Newark Community Concert Association was given in Mitchell Hall. The artist was Julius Huehn, leading baritone of the Metropolitan Opera Association. Mr. Huehn is the possessor of an extremely resonant baritone voice, of great power and beauty, under perfect control from the lightest head tones to fullest fortissimo. From the first moment he stepped onto the platform he was at once with his audience.

He gave a varied program beginning with oratorio and music of a classic nature, followed by German lieder and operatic numbers, and ended with a number of well chosen songs in English. Outstanding was his rendition of Ruhe Meine Seele by Strauss, and the Credo from Otello. His encore to this latter selection was the Toreador Song from Carmen, a splendid piece of singing and acting. In his picturing of the bragging bull fighter he completely captured his audience.

It is obvious that Mr. Huehn enjoys singing, and he communicates this enthusiasm to his audience. He was most gracious with the choice and number of his encores at the conclusion of his program.

Brooks Smith, accompanist, not only supported Mr. Huehn ably, but in his solo numbers displayed technical ability, beauty of tone, and artistic interpretation.

Those responsible for bringing this series of concerts to Newark should be gratified at the success of the opening program.
