Annual Honor Court Will Be Held Outdoors Friday, June 11

A court of honor, the outstanding event of the year for local Boy Scouts, will be held Friday, June 11, at 7:30 p. m. at the community picnic site, on the western outskirts of town.

The outdoor setting, an innovation this year, will center around the traditional scout campfire. Refreshments, including roasted hot dogs, will be served. All members of the troops, their parents and friends are urged to attend.

Troops will be given by local and regional scout officials. Top officer, the Delaware Council, including Lovett president, will be present.

Newark scout leaders scheduled to be on hand are: M. L. Draper, troop chairman of the O'Daniel Post, which sponsors scouting in Newark; Vernon Steele, neighborhood commissioner; and T. A. Baker, E. Tomhave and Dr. T. F. Manns, all former scoutmasters. Dr. T. F. Manns introduced scouting to Newark.

The evening's ceremonies have been planned by a committee from both troops, including Artur Oram and F. Reinhardt, of Troop 55; and Conrad Lewis, Jr., and F. L. Steigler, Troop 56. Mr. Lewis is scoutmaster of Troop 55 and Jay Steiner directs Troop 56. Eleven scouts will receive second class badges and two will get first class. A number of merit badges will also be presented.

In addition, seven youths will be inducted into the troops.

APPEAL FOR CHILDREN IS MADE HERE

Newark Phase Of 'Crusade For Children' Begun

Newark's phase of the nation-wide "Crusade for Children" got underway last week with a town canvass by a committee under Mrs. Robert Price.

The drive has been extended to June 15.

Generous support is being asked from residents here in the drive which seeks funds to aid an estimated 230 million starving children in countries abroad. These are youngsters left in the war's wake. Many are homeless or orphaned.

Also known as the United Nations Appeal for Children, the campaign which was scheduled to close this week has been extended until June 15, Mrs. Price said. In addition to the canvass, collections will be taken up in the lobby of the State Theatre and coin boxes have been set up in various places.

Funds obtained in the nation-wide drive will be used for food, clothing and medicine for foreign children irrespective of race, creed or political belief.

The money will also be used for such things as equipment and supplies for hospitals, medical care for nursing and orphan mothers, preventive public health centers and clinics.

WEEK-END EXERCISES AT U. OF D. SCHEDULED

Climax To Be Outdoor Graduation On Monday

Seniors at the University of Delaware will reminisce and say "farewell" this year at four-day commencement week-end exercises, the most elaborate ever arranged for a Delaware graduating class.

Among the features of the observance is a plan to have all seniors, including commuters, live on campus over the week-end of June 4-7. For Sunday night, arrangements are being made to have parents, wives, husbands and other relatives of the graduates live in Brown Hall dormitory, if they have come to Newark from a distance. Miss Sally Heinel, of Wilmington Manor, who is chairman of the Senior week-end Committee, is in charge of these arrangements.

The Senior Week-end will get underway Friday night, June 4, with the formal dance, for seniors only, in the gold ballroom of the Hotel DuPont from 9 p. m. to 1 a. m. Donald McLellan, of Chadds Ford, Pa., is chairman for the dance.

The next afternoon, at 2:30 p. m. in Mitchell Hall, there will be Class Day exercises, the first held on the campus after a lapse of many years. Taking the form of a "Senior Scrapbook," these exercises will review the past eight years of campus life—many of the men having started their college careers before the war. Bruce Ayars, of Dover, who recently was elected permanent president of men in the Class of '48, is chairman of Class Day arrangements, and will be master of ceremonies for the episodes presented in the "scrapbook." His aides on the committee are Richard C. Kiddoo, Beverly Deidrick, and Irene Short.

An informal dance will be held at 8 o'clock Saturday night in the Women's Gymnasium. Cards, games and other entertainment will be provided by a committee whose co-chairman are Henriette Miller and Stanley Reed.

The more formal aspects of the commencement program will begin at 11 a. m., Sunday, when the Rev. Dr. Daniel A. Poling of the Baptist Temple, Philadelphia, will preach the baccalaureate sermon in Mitchell Hall. At 3:30 p. m., the University Chorus will present "The Elijah" in a Mitchell Hall concert.

A senior class reception for parents and faculty will be held at 5 p. m., Sunday, on the campus outside Warner Hall.

On Monday morning, at 11:15, Dean Theodore C. Blegen, of the University of Minnesota's Graduate School will deliver the commencement address at out-of-door exercises on the lawn in front of University Hall, when the degrees will be conferred. In case of rain, the exercises will be held in Mitchell Hall, where only about half of the expected guests can be accommodated. Others would hear the exercises via a public-address system in another auditorium.

At 1 p. m., President William S. Carlson and Mrs. Carlson will entertain at luncheon for the graduates and their parents, or husbands or wives. Only the Sunday and Monday events will be open to senior's families.

The senior week-end activities were enlarged this year with the cooperation of a University committee headed by Dr. Francis H. Squire, dean of the university. SERMON TO NHS SENIORS ON SUNDAY

Excerpts From Baccalaureate Address Here

"The Fiftieth Boy" was the topic of the baccalaureate sermon made to the members of the graduating class of the Newark High School on Sunday evening in the Newark Methodist Church by the minister, Dr. Arthur J. Jackson.

A summary follows: One day not so very long ago I ran across some lines by Dr. Frank Crane which he called "The Fiftieth Boy." So the idea of this sermon, together with its subject came to me in this way. This is what he wrote, in part—

"About one boy in fifty will remain after the feast and of his own accord offer to help clear the things up or to wash the dishes.

"Do you know this fiftieth boy?" "There are forty-nine boys who are seeking jobs; the job seeks the Fiftieth Boy.

"The Fiftieth Boy makes glad the heart of his parents.

"He looks you straight in the eye.

"He tells the truth, whether the consequences to him are unpleasant.

"He is not sorry for himself.

"He works as hard as he plays.

"Everybody is glad to see him."

An additional characteristic of this Fiftieth Boy or Girl we are thinking about tonight is that he or she sees the burning bush of God's presence along the mountain path of duty. And here I turn to the story of Moses found in the third chapter of Exodus, verses one to ten.

The path of duty is usually a mountain path where the climbing is steep and the going hard. It is oftentimes lonely, too, because it lies in obscure back sides of deserts and unfrequented places. It was so with Moses thirty centuries ago.

Plans Nearly Complete For Big Fire Company Fete

Plans are well underway for the big firemen's carnival which will open a 10-day stand here on June 25.

Proceeds from both ventures will go towards the \$5,000 drive for Newark's proposed war memorial.

The members were anxious for the President to see the historic Academy, the State University, the State Farm and Cooch's Bridge—thus the compliment to our town.

...turies ago and it will still be true thirty centuries hence. But it must be remembered, also, that as Moses tended the sheep of his father-in-law on the back side of the desert his attention to duty brought him to the mountain of God. There the Angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush. And as he turned aside to see the bush that burned with fire and was not burned up, he heard the voice of God calling to him, saying, "Moses, Moses. And he said, Here am I. And God said to him, Put off thy shoes from off thy feet: for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground." And then came God's great call and commission to Moses— "Come now therefore, and I will send thee unto Pharaoh (the king), that thou mayest bring forth my people the children of Israel out of Egypt."

In her poem entitled "Aurora Leigh," Elizabeth Barrett Browning caught this idea of seeing the burning bush along the mountain path of duty when she wrote—

"Earth's crammed with heaven,
And every common bush afire with God;
And only he who sees takes off his shoes—

The rest sit round it and pluck blackberries."

This idea of seeing the burning bush and hearing the voice of God as one walks along the mountain path of duty is demonstrated again and again in the life of Jesus Christ.

Because he, like Moses, walked the steep and lonely mountain path of duty, Jesus Christ heard the voice of God calling him to be the Saviour and Redeemer of men and women who in every walk of life do the hard, day by day, work of the world.

May God help each one of you this evening to resolve to be the Fiftieth Boy or Girl who shall see a needed job to be done and go and do it without delay, and who walking the mountain path of duty throughout life shall hear the voice of God in Jesus Christ calling you to accept his redemption and enter, into his service, whatever your means of livelihood may be.

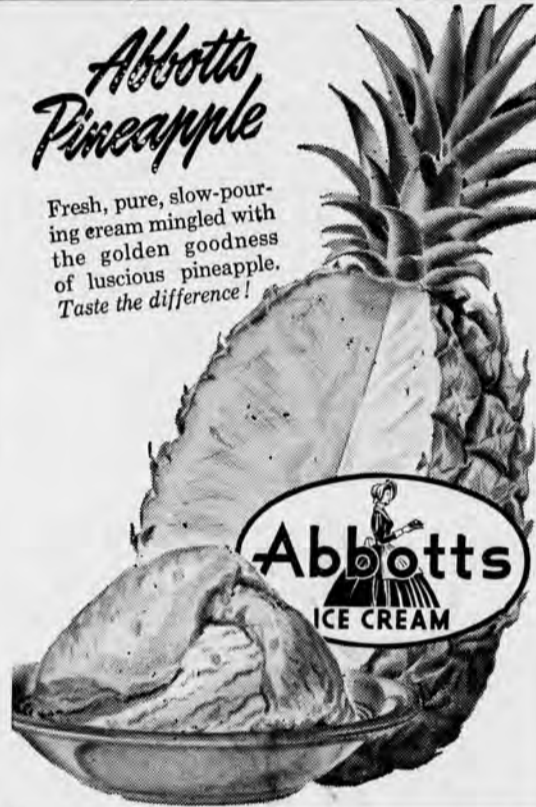
