U. of D. Dramatic Director To Attend Convention

Dr. C. R. Kase, director of dramatics at the University of Delaware, will attend the fourthcoming convention of the American Educational Theatre Association in Washington December 30 to January 2. Participating in the meeting on the Organization and Management of Drama Contests and Festivals.

Dr. Kase will read a paper entitled "Preliminary Preparation for the Tournament."

Plans are well under way for the second state-wide Delaware Play Festival scheduled for April 18-19. Already 10 public and private schools and 5 community theatres have indicated a desire to enter the non-professional play tournament which was inaugurated last year. The festival is under the chairmanship of George Henry, of Dover.

Delaware's broiler industry has had an important influence on striking changes in the commercial hatching of chicks during recent years. The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U. S. THOMAS A. POTTS

Newark lost its oldest and one of its most honored merchants Wednesday afternoon when Thomas A. Potts passed away.

A familiar figure on Main Street, where he had operated his own hardware store for nearly thirty years, Mr. Potts was widely known throughout the county and highly regarded for his upright principles and business dealings.

Born near Lewisville, Pa., in 1868, Mr. Potts moved to Newark in 1880 where he prospered with the communities growth until, at the time of his death, he owned one of the oldest and soundest establishments in Newark.

The entire community mourns the passing of this honored citizen, pioneer resident and respected merchant.

UNITY, OUR DEFENSE

The strength and security of our nation depends on national unity.

There is no room in this country now for narrow partisanship, for class hatred, for exploiting old grudges and differences. But unity must be more than a slogan, more than a vague and appealing word. It can be achieved only by action.

Unity calls for fair dealing between industry and labor, for a policy that neither favors nor penalizes either side. It calls for an attitude on the part of both labor leaders and industrial managers that will make possible frank and honest arbitration, with each understanding the problems of the other. The nation cannot afford exploiters now—the industrialist who would grind down labor, or the labor leader who would disrupt industry to gain his ends.

Unity calls for a government policy of honest cooperation with all industry. The need of the hour is production—and still more production, in the interest of our ordinary needs no less than in the interest of our extraordinary defense program.

Unity calls for a tax and spending policy which will get maximum results in the least possible length of time with minimum waste. Taxation must be distributed equitably over all income groups, and all industries and businesses. We are willing to spend every dollar that is needed for real defense.

We can have unity. We must have it, if we are to survive as a free people. Now is the time to put into effect a program that will really achieve it.

CONSUMERS GET COOPERATION

The consumer movement, according to recent reports, continues to grow. More and more people, especially women, are showing an intelligent interest in packaging, grading, truth-in-advertising, etc. These people are wisely determined to know what they're buying, and to get maximum value for minimum expenditures.

Fortunately for the success of the movement, it is being given willing cooperation in two important quarters. First, the manufacturers of the country are showing praise-worthy interest in improving their products, in frankly and truthfully labeling them, and in using advertising copy that tells the story without going in for poetical exaggerations.

Second, American retailing is also doing its part to see that the consumer movement achieves the success it deserves. The retailers are seeing to it that packaged foods contain the proper quantity and are of the described quality—are helping to simplify and clarify grading standards and terms—and are keeping the facts in their advertising and promotional activities.

The kind of manufacturer or store which worked on the principle that anything they could get away with was all right, is going out of the picture. Business today is fully aware that its own welfare depends upon the consumers' welfare. It knows that a "gyp-ped" customer doesn't come back. And the consumer is getting the breaks.

The Curtiss-Wright company is considering the installation of 600 loudspeakers to provide continuous music in its big airplane factor at Buffalo. It is believed the music will tend to keep the workers in a pleasant frame of mind and consequently speed production.

During the recent hot spell a thermometer placed on the melting asphalt of a Salt Lake City street registered a temperature of 128 degrees. About the same time the Byrd expedition in the Antarctic reported 71 degrees below zero.

IN THE CHILDREN'S ROOM

The most interesting kind of a children's room is one that is never wholly completed, that holds an element of anticipation because some new feature is always being planned or worked upon. If the children themselves have the larger part in this enchanting process, the room will become, for them, very satisfying.

The play table must be made most unusual and fascinating, if it is transformed into a poetry table. First be sure there is no oil or wax on the surface. "Wax-off" will quickly remove it. If this is not available, consult a painter. Let the children collect from papers and magazines, or have typed, enough poems that they really like to cover the top. Help them to glue the poems to the table, arranging them with spaces between so they may be easily read and an artistic effect be produced. Shellac, or if one of the children is old enough let him shellac, the whole top, giving it several coats so that a hard smooth finish is obtained. Be sure to use white shellac, and test its drying qualities on and around a small piece of paper, later to be covered by a poem, pasted on this same table, before the shellacking is undertaken.

A table like this will be of unending interest to the children, and it may be used for ordinary activities without detriment to the poems.

Another exciting project for the children's bedroom or playroom is a scrapbook screen. An inexpensive screen with pastebord panels is the foundation, and having this, the fun of choosing its decorations will begin. The panels of one such screen were completely covered on both sides with bright colored pictures and copies of famous paintings. One young boy had great fun collecting pictures of ships for his screen, enlisting his father's help to procure pictures of seacraft large and small, of various countries, and representing those from early days down to the latest ocean liner. Another attractive screen was made by using magazine covers. Mother and Father raised the question of harmony, and good choices were made.

If there is a couch in the children's playroom, the making of a personal name couch cover or pillow top provides an interesting experience. The children ask playmates, friends or relatives to write their names with pencil on separate squares of unbleached cotton cloth or any strong, fadeless, washable material of a plain color, and then they outline each name with floss or thread of some fast color. When enough squares are ready, they are sewn together. The children will need help when this is finished for they will be ready for the lining. A variation of this project would be to have the con-

tributors draw animals instead of writing their names. The effect produced is sometimes far from artistic, but it is usually amusing. Either of these covers will last for years and be a continual source of interest to the children.

On the wall of the children's room each year may be hung a personal calendar with monthly pages made by the children as the year progresses. It will require twelve large oblongs of thin cardboard or heavy paper. The days of the month may be printed on each, or leaves taken from any advertising calendar, of suitable size, may be attached. On the blank portions of the sheets, the children fasten their best school work for that month, using drawings, number work papers, or any other records of achievement which have received good marks or are for some other reason worthy of the space. Records of special family occasions or a brief diary of events may be written or printed on white or colored paper and added to the month's collection. At the end of the year the children will have made a pictorial personal calendar that will be of interest and value for a long time.

FACTS FOR FARMERS

H. L. Richardson, poultry specialist for the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, reports that "Prospects for smaller supplies of poultry and eggs and stronger consumer demand indicates that prices of chickens, eggs and turkeys will average higher in the first half of 1941 than in 1940. The hatch of chicks during the spring of 1939 was one of the largest on record which undoubtedly accounts for the large supplies of lower prices of both poultry and eggs during the present year. These low prices in turn had the effect of causing a marked decrease in the number of chicks hatched during the first six months of 1940 which is largely responsible for the present optimistic outlook."

Under the Food Stamp Plan of the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the distribution of farm commodity surpluses, close to two million persons spent more than \$4,500,000 in blue stamps for fruits and vegetables, eggs, butter, pork, lard and flour during August. The Department's Food Stamp Plan is now operating in Wilmington and rural New Castle County and its establishment has been proposed for the remainder of Delaware.
