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Speaking of Money...

"One answer to Automation"

Hello there. This is John Buchanan again Speaking of Money and speaking of money... the source of our money is our jobs. And I had two experiences which stopped me cold recently. Before I tell you my point, I'll tell you the stories.

Number one... I came off a limited access thruway to get gasoline and a bit to eat. As I approached the station, my reaction was sour. I had stopped here before... and it was a miserable experience. The manager of the place does that he had a captive trade... the only place you could get gas and food for fifty miles.

This time, though, I was in for a shock. There was only one human being on the staff. The inside had been beautified... and it was strictly self-service. You put a five-dollar bill in a machine and out came a bunch of quarters, dimes, nickels and three one-dollar bills.

You put your money in more slots and pulled out beautifully wrapped food, packaged by a high quality restaurant chain. Then you put your hamburger... or a whole meal in a radar oven, and it was cooked in thirty seconds. You carried it to a beautifully decorated Early American dining room... and dined in dignity.

The food was outstanding. The delay was only the 30 seconds in the radar oven... compared to the 20-30 minutes we have sometimes waited. The machines were prompt, good natured and clean.

Now I know all the emotion that stirs up around the word automation... and how it's customary to duck the subject. But we can't duck it.

We went on down the freeway another hundred miles, and I was getting sleepy. Needed a cup of coffee. Went into another place... also under a new management. But this was manned by people. These were people, however, who put the machines to shame with courtesy and hospitality. Frankly the service wasn't much better than in the old days. But you didn't notice it or care. The only real addition was courtesy.

It is true that there are certain types of products in which the margin is so low that you can hardly afford to have people as salesmen any more. But even in products where you can still afford to have people selling... people have fallen in the courtesy department so badly that they have scarfed themselves right out of jobs.

Today four million vending machines are selling everything from stamps to socks. It's fashionable to say that these machines are merely taking advantage of new and unique sales locations where people couldn't operate anyway. But unfortunately that isn't true.

It's no longer merely a nice plus... courtesy is a hard-boiled, cold-eyed must. And despite all the talk lately about the high standards of technical training needed for a successful career today, the plain fact is that, given necessary basic training, the young man or woman who is going up that ladder fast today is going to be long on the oldest old-fashioned asset in business. The human quality.

And the middle-aged cornucopium who has long since taken his job for granted and his customers and his associates... that individual should hear a loud ringing alarm bell to make a fast switch-over... back to the interested courtesy with which he began his business life.

Automation is no longer a phenomenon which affects only the production floors. It has come right into the management floors... and it is reaching right out to the sales and counter.

A plant wants to know how many units to produce for July to fill the demand. Computers using the experience of the past... are giving us good, accurate answers to those questions. And... the computer will be able to move on to other. For example, if the computer has low inventory units we should produce more. It will be able to have corner brackets we should produce more. It will be able to have van figure out how many units should produce. We would order to replace some which were broken back to the factory. The computer will be able to store the units we make. It will be able to contract that... high rates, and a... electricity will be used to store that extra work. And, therefore, how much... it's a matter of dollars versus...
