## PUBLIC NOTICE.

WHEREAS by an act of the Legislature of the State of Delaware, passed at the last Session of the General Assembly, all and every the Justices of the Peace, and the Constables of each county, are required to repair to the town or place, in which the annual election shall be held, and there attend from ten o'clock in the forenoon, till six o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of performing the duties required of them by law, under the penalty of fifty dollars for every neglect or refusal by a Justice of the Peace; and twenty dollars for every neglect or refusal by a Constable. And whereas, by an act of the Legislature, passed at the Session aforesaid, it is enjoined on the Sheriff, and other Judges of Elections, that the said Annual Election be opened on the first Tuesday of October, annually, between the hours of nine and eleven o'clock in the forenoon; and that the same be closed at six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day; and that no votes shall be received afterwards. I have therefore deemed it to be my duty to give this public notice to the Justices of the Peace, and Constables within the county of New-Castle; and further, earnestly to request, each and every Inspector within the said county, to be punctual in his attendance at the town of New-Castle, on the first Tuesday in October next, that the election may be duly opened within the hours prescribed by law as aforesaid, and duly conducted, and closed at the hour of six o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. And it is also further notified, That no Booths or Stalls, for the selling of spirituous or other liquors, on the day of the said election, or on the preceding or succeeding day, will be permitted in the town of New-Castle, where the said election will be held, or within two miles thereof; the same being prohibited by the above recited act aforesaid. And any Negro or Mulatto slave, or Apprentice (not residing within the said town) if found therein, will be imprisoned.—No person, deemed by the laws of the United States, or this State, an Alien, can, notwithstanding his residence, and payment of taxes, be admitted to vote, unless he shall produce to the Judges of the Election a certificate duly attested of his naturalization, agreeably to the above recited act.

30m. the brig hauled her wind on the star-board tack, hoisted...  
American colours, and made all sail on the wind. The...  
Mufketo instantly tacked, fired a gun, and hoisted...  
English colours. At 3, the brig tacked, and stood in for...  
the land bearing W. by S. On passing us, fired a shot to...  
bring her to; they paying no attention to this, but making...  
off as fast as possible, captain White ordered four shot to...  
be fired at them. Tacked, and chased the brig. At 5, P. M...  
the brig was close within the breakers, off Dewees's Inlet...  
22 miles N. of Charleston Bar. She then tacked; we did...  
the same; finding that the Mufketo completely cut him off...  
from superiority in sailing, tacked again, and were round...  
for the breakers; instantly followed her and firing as our...  
guns would bear. The brig returned a broadside, but his...  
helm had a weather, and ran on shore. The Mufketo being...  
close to the breakers, and in quarter less than three fathoms...  
water, capt. White not having any person on board who had...  
ever been on that part of the coast before, judged it most...  
prudent to haul the ship off into deeper water. At 5h...  
30m. tacked, with intention to stand in, destroy the brig, and...  
if possible, save the prisoners, which would have been...  
difficult, as the sea was then making a fair roll over her...  
The man on the main-head called out, a strange sail on...  
the star-board bow, bearing down on us. Supposing it to be...  
a pilot-boat, hove to, and made the signal for a pilot. At...  
6h. 30m. the pilot came along side, and to captain White's...  
utter astonishment, informed him, the brig he had driven...  
on shore, was the Unanimity of 14 six pounders, and 65...  
men, belonging to the State of South Carolina, and had...  
sailed that morning from Charleston, on a cruise. On board...  
the pilot boat were several gentlemen of respectability...  
who had witnessed the greater part of this day's proceedings."

**CHARLESTON, Sept. 7.**  
Pepyscript to "a letter from Robert G. Harper, of South Carolina, to one of his constituents."  
"As soon as this letter goes to the post, I shall feel out...  
for Ninety-Six, where I hope to arrive about the beginning...

RULES,

Proposed, for preventing the introduction of the Yellow Fever of the West-Indies, into the commercial towns of North America.

THE dreadful mortality and distress, which the inhabitants of several of the sea-port towns of America, have so repeatedly suffered of late years from the ravages of the yellow fever, imported from the West-Indies, must press every reflecting mind with the necessity of devising and adopting more effectual means than those which have hitherto been employed, to prevent a repetition on the like calamity in future.

With this view therefore, I beg leave to propose the following rules to the consideration of those whose particular duty it is to provide for the public safety, and submit them to the revision and correction of those that are better qualified to do justice to the subject.

It is a well known fact, that the seeds of many diseases denominated infection, may be retained in various kinds of goods and wearing apparel when excluded from the air a very long time. Incontrovertible examples of which, are recorded in the works of Mead, Pringle, Lind, Blane, Ruffell, Trotter, and many other authors of respectable characters. This being the case, it must be evident to the most superficial observer, that the detention of a vessel and crew in the stream, for a few days can be no security against the contagion, if there should be any in the vessel, and can answer no other purpose than to observe whether any of the men become sick or not. This indeed would be sufficient if contagious diseases could only be communicated from those that are actually sick; but as the exhalations transmitted from the sick, may, and do often lodge in different kinds of goods, clothing, bedding, furniture, and even in unpainted and unpolished wood, where it is retained in an active state, such kind of quarantine can not possibly answer the design intended. For this reason, I am of opinion, that the following rules should be observed in order to render quarantines effectual, in preventing the introduction of contagious diseases, and particularly the yellow fever.

Upon the arrival of every vessel from the West-Indies, from June to November, in the Delaware opposite the Marine Hospital, let every article of her cargo, with her crew be landed--and whether there be any sick on board or not, let the cargo be exposed under sheds to the open air, excepting in rainy weather, for 20 days--let every article of clothing, made of wool, cotton, silk or fur, belonging to the master and crew, as well as their hammocks, mattresses, and other articles of bedding, excepting such as are composed of linen, be sunk with proper weights in the river or other ways destroyed--let barracks, surrounded by strong palisade fences and fresh clothing and bedding be provided for the men that are well, and sufficient guards stationed to prevent them from leaving the island, for 20 days, or for such time, as all danger of their sickening from infection previously received, shall be over.

Let the Hospital for the sick be divided into wards, and let only one sick person be kept in a ward, because if several are confined in the same ward, they may generate an infection of a dangerous nature, if none had existed before.

When the sick recover, let them be shaved and washed, and supplied with fresh clothing, and after remaining on the island a competent time to observe whether they relapse or not. let them receive a certificate and be discharged.

Articles of linen need not be destroyed, but after immersion in cold water, dried and ventilated on lines under sheds.

While the men and goods are undergoing this discipline--let the vessel riding at anchor in the stream, be washed, scuttled, fumigated and ventilated, and all the bilge water baled out; and let unslaked lime be thrown into the ship's well, to correct the noxious quality of the confined air.

This being effectually performed, the vessel, having rode at anchor 20 days, may be permitted to proceed to the city.

As every reasonable provision should be made by government for the accommodation of those who perform quarantines, and all expences defrayed, the rules directed by law for the due performance thereof, should be enforced by the severest penalties--deprivation from the place appointed for the performance of quarantine, before the expiration of the term prescribed, the concealment of any article, which had belonged to any person sick, or that had died during the voyage, the concealment of any person sick on board, at the time the vessel arrives, or of any death that has happened on board, and the smuggling of any goods or clothing into the city, belonging to any vessel or person, while under the discipline of quarantine, ought to be punished, by forfeiture of the whole of the property of such offender, and confinement to hard labour for at least seven years; because an offence of this kind is more injurious to the safety and interest of the community, than murder or any other crime excepting treason and rebellion.

As rules similar to the preceding have preserved Marseilles, from being visited by pestilential fevers, for more than seventy years, which, before they were established, were very destructive, I propose them with the more confidence.

Take half a point of the best Vinegar, and four large spoonfuls of fine marine Salt, or a sufficient quantity to saturate the vinegar; when the effervescence is over, take, one large spoonful of this solution, add to it four spoonfuls of boiling water, and let the patient take of this preparation one spoonful every half minute, until the five spoonfuls are got down, as hot as it can be swallowed. This is a dose for an adult: the quantity may be varied according to the age or constitution of the patient. Repeat the dose, if necessary, once in six hours, A tea of Plantain or Mallows may be used with it; and if a thirst

for Cyder should be discovered, it may be safely gratified. The medicine should not be kept in any pewter or leaden vessels, it has been found useful in the Searlatina Anginosa, Diarrhoea, and Yellow Fever. It is a remedy at once safe and cheap, and is recommended by one who has twice experienced its efficacy.
