BOND SALES NOW TOTAL \$694,225 FOR DRIVE

Wayne Brewer, Harry L. Bonham Express Praise For Workers

Newark's Fourth War Bond Drive has gone over the top with close to \$700,000 worth of bonds sold. It was stated last night by Wayne C. Brewer, general sales manager for the campaign. Asked what he attributed the great success of the local campaign to, Mr. Brewer stated that the wonderful cooperation of all organizations and individuals who gave every person in the area an opportunity to buy bonds and the willing support of John Q. Public.

The previous total reported last week in the Post was \$635,400 and sales the past week totaled \$58,855 which have brought the grand total to the amazing figure of \$694,225 for the campaign while Newark's quota had been set at \$450,000. Mr. Brewer stated that the figure represented was 154 per cent of the figure set as the goal.

Harry L. Bonham, general chairman of the local campaign was high in his praise of the work done by Mr. Brewer and the 34 team captains and the close to two hundred workers who gave so unsparingly of their time.

It was stated that of the amount sold \$299,255 worth was represented by individual purchasers and commercial sales amounted to \$395,000. Mr. Brewer stated that the individual sales were largely responsible for the very fine showing made by the local workers and he also expresses much praise for the Women's organizations who have been selling bonds and stamps in the lobby of the State Theatre and to the management of the State Theatre for their very fine Bond Premiere which did a lot to put the sales total in the Over-The-Top bracket.

STOLEN CAR FOUND SAFE IN GARAGE

STEARNS IS ASSIGNED TO PANAMA CANAL DUTY

Is Named Entomology Instructor At Army School

Lt. Col. Louis A. Stearns, Delaware State Entomologist and head of the Department of Biological Science at the University of Delaware, has been assigned to the Army School of Malariology in this Department after a 14-month tour of duty with the Ninth Air Force in India, Egypt and Libya, and with the Persian Gulf Command in Iran and Iraq, Army officials here announced recently. He is instructor in Entomology in the Army school which is supervised by Col. Charles G. Soudier.

Col. Stearns entered the Army on direct commission in June 1942 and completed an eight-week course in the Army School of Tropical Medicine in Washington, D.C., preparatory to his assignment overseas. He was promoted from the rank of major to lieutenant colonel in November 1943, and came to Panama two months later.

A graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University with A.B. and M. Sc. degrees and of Ohio State University with a Ph. D. degree, he has been on the faculties of prominent universities among which are Ohio State University, Alma (Mich.) College, Rutgers University and Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

Author of more than 100 papers on biological science, Col. Stearns has been president of the Eastern and Extension Branches of the American Association of Economic Entomologists and of the Eastern Association of Mosquito Control Engineers. He also served as chairman of the joint committee of the American Association of Economic Entomologists and the Entomological Society of America for the classification of entomologists for war service.

His wife, Mrs. Margaret F. Stearns, lives at 278 Orchard Road. One son, Captain R. F. Stearns, is with a Coast Artillery Unit in the South Pacific. Another son, Lt. D. H. Stearns is in the Air Corps at Bolling Field, Washington, D.C. His daughter, S. Francis Stearns, is employed by the Department of Justice in Washington, D.C.

TRAINING SPECIALIST SOUGHT

Civil Service Job Pays \$3800 to \$5600

Examination for position Training Specialist, \$3800 to \$5600 a year, plus overtime, for duty with the Training Within Industry Service of the War Manpower Commission in the Third United States Civil Service Region, comprising the States of Pennsylvania and Delaware, has been announced by the United States Civil Service Commission according to Mr. Singles.

Applicants for the \$3800 grade must have had at least 3 years, applicants for the \$4000 grade must have had at least 4 years, and applicants for the \$5600 grade must have had at least 5 years of progressively responsible full-time paid experience in industry. Such experience must have involved shop, factory, or foundry practices or management. Familiarity with the techniques of training workers and executive ability are required.

One hundred (100) hours of successful TWI training experience in war production plants may be substituted for 3 years of the required experience. Applicants must be citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States. There are no age limits. Information and application forms may be obtained from Mr. Singles, and should be filed with the Director, Third United States Civil Service Region, Philadelphia 6, Pennsylvania. Applications will be accepted until the needs of the service have been met.

Maryland Track Seeks 28-Day Meet at Pimlico

Maryland's four major race tracks have asked the State Racing Commission to approve a 28-day joint spring meeting, to be held at Pimlico April 12 to May 13, inclusive.

Chairman Frank Small, Jr., of the commission said the application would be acted upon within a week. Representatives of Pimlico, which is located in Baltimore, and officials of Laurel, Bowie and Havre de Grace reached their agreement at a meeting in the offices of President Henry A. Parr III of Pimlico.

Maryland had 60 days of major racing last year, all of it at Pimlico. State law permits a total of 100 days per year.

Prompt Renewal of 1944 Auto Licenses Is Urged

Out of a total of more than 17,000 automobiles in New Castle County whose registration expires March 31 only 163 have been renewed, it has been announced by the Wilmington office of the Motor Vehicle Department.

The department urges that owners in this group mail their entire registration card with money order or check covering the necessary fee, promptly. Unless there is a better response this month than last it is predicted that undue congestion will result during the final week of March.

The department will begin issuing operators licenses after March 1. Motorists are urged not to send in their applications now but to wait until that time. The licenses must be secured by May 31. It is urged that the operators be sure that their original and duplicate license each bear the holder's signature before sending them or bringing them to the office.

SUBSTITUTE RAIL CLERK TESTS OPEN

Civil Service Jobs Open To Applicants

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced a new examination for Substitute Railway Postal Clerk to fill positions located throughout the United States and territories. Salary is \$1,850 a year plus approximately \$615 additional compensation, including overtime under the present 48-hour workweek. Applications must be filed with the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., not later than February 29, 1944.

There is no maximum age limit and no experience required. The written examination includes a general test and mail tests in sorting, routing and following instructions.

In most States appointments will be made for duty in cities where terminal railway post offices are located. Vacancies on Railway Post Office lines may be filled by transfer from the terminals. A limited number of women will be appointed for duty in terminal cities only.

Applications are not desired from persons now using their highest skills in war work. Appointments will be made in accordance with War Manpower Commission policies and employment stabilization programs.

Information and application forms may be secured from the Commission's Local Secretary, Mr. Singles located at Newark Post Office. Applications are also obtainable from most first- and second-class post offices, and from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C.

RED CLOVER—Supplies of seed adapted for this territory are about 40% short for the next planting season. Southern States patron-members are urged to purchase only anthracnose-resistant seed. Southern States will furnish no other kind.

MAMMOTH CLOVER—Crap is about 25% short.

ALSIKE CLOVER—The shortest crop in six years. Supplies are down about 40%.

ALFALFA—Due to the feed shortage, many growers have used their fields for hay rather than seed. Although seed crops were about even with last year, there are no carry-over stocks to take care of increased demand.

DELAWARE FARM FRONT THIS WEEK

Northeastern Dairy Meeting March 14-15

Anticipating a greater demand for farm production financing this year because of high war food production goals, the Farm Credit Administration is setting up an independent organization in Delaware under the Regional Agricultural Credit Corporation. Last year the Delaware Agricultural Adjustment Agency rendered this service for the Farm Credit Administration. W. Fred Richards of Dover, field supervisor for the FCA in Delaware, reports that while RACC will designate its own loan agents it will continue to receive loans through country offices of the AAA as well as through the Dover FCA office. Loans will be offered on several vital Delaware war crops.

Three hundred tons of oilseed meal for mixed feed for livestock have been allocated to Delaware by the War Food Administration, according to an announcement from Clarence E. Ocheltree, chairman of the State AAA. This is the first February allocation from the 50 per cent of the national output ordered by the WFA to be set aside through the AAA feed allocation committee of farmers.

The Annual Meeting of the Northeastern Dairy Conference will be held on March 14 and 15 at the Commodore Hotel in New York City. A feature of the meeting will be a report from each Northeastern state represented on how the war-time regulations, particularly on price controls, are working.

Homemakers who wish to can early fruit may now obtain five pounds of sugar from their retailers for this purpose by using sugar stamp Number 40 in War Ration Book Four, OPA says. This stamp will be valid from February 1, 1944, through February 28, 1945 (thirteen months), and will be the only sugar stamp used for buying canning sugar. Additional amounts will be made available later on application to local boards for persons who wish to can and preserve more fruit than can be put up with the five-pound per person stamp allowance.

Extension Bulletin No. 39, "The Care and Simple Repair of Household Equipment", available through the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service and County Extension offices, will be of particular value to homemakers since repair service is scarce now. The bulletin gives instructions with diagrams for simple repair jobs on fuses, cords, plugs, small appliances, refrigerators, ranges, washing machines, kitchen utensils, pressure cookers, and simple plumbing, along with information on good care of these facilities.

Distribution in Delaware of government-directed oilseed meals by AAA farmer committees was described as intelligent and satisfactory by Donald Danforth, president of the Ralston Purina Company, mixed feed manufacturer, in a letter to Walter C. Berger, chief of the WFA's feed and livestock branch. Recently one or more of the larger feed mixers asked their Delaware dealers and the farm users of their products to protect against the distribution through state and county farmer feed committees of twenty per cent of the meal output of oilseed processors. The remaining eighty per cent is distributed through regular trade channels. The Danforth letter states, "If we have caused these Eastern war board chairmen any embarrassment or criticism, we sincerely regret it."

MAN POWER CONSULTANT JOB OPEN

RATION TOKEN DATA ISSUED BY OPA

Questions And Answers Expected To Help Consumer

With ration tokens scheduled to come into use Feb. 27, the following questions and answers were issued by the Office of Price Administration yesterday to help consumers understand how they will buy with this new ration currency.

Q. When will I begin the use of ration tokens?

A. Consumers will begin to receive tokens in change from their retailers on Feb. 27. They can be used immediately.

Q. Will OPA give consumers a certain number of tokens when this new program begins, just as everybody was given a supply of ration stamps?

A. No. The only tokens you will get are those your retailer gives you in change.

Q. Why will I need ration change? So far, except for receiving one-point meat stamps in change, I have just counted out the right number of stamps to give my retailer when I have bought rationed foods.

A. You will need change when tokens go into use because each red and blue stamp in your ration book will be worth 10 points. It will no longer be so easy to give your dealer an exact number of points as it was when you had eight, five, two and one-point stamps to use.

Q. If each stamp will be worth ten points, will I have more points to spend than I do now?

A. No. You will have almost exactly the same number of points that you have now. You will simply use fewer stamps during any one ration period. That's one advantage of the new plan, since handling fewer stamps will cut down the work of your retailer and will make your ration book last longer.

Q. When each stamp is worth ten points, how will OPA adjust the rationing program so as to give me the same number of points per month that I have now?

A. At present, three sets of processed food stamps, a total of 12 stamps, are worth 48 points. Under the token system, five blue stamps, worth ten points each, will have a total value of fifty points. This small difference of two points can be adjusted by a slight change in the point value of processed foods.

Q. Will meat stamps be handled the same way?

A. Yes. At present each consumer gets 16 meat points a week, or 32 points every two weeks. Under the token system, three red stamps, worth ten points each, will give him 30 points to use during the first two weeks of token rationing. As in processed foods rationing, the small difference of two points will be adjusted in the point value of items rationed under the meat order.

Q. What will consumers do with their tokens?

A. They will use them very much as they now use pennies. A consumer who buys items worth 23 blue points, for example, will give his retailer two blue stamps (a total of 20 points) and three blue tokens, (each worth one point). If he has no tokens, he will give his retailer three blue stamps (30 points) and receive seven blue tokens in change.

Q. Is there any difference between the meat and processed foods tokens?

A. The only difference in the two kinds of tokens is in their color. The colors match the stamps with which they will be used; Blue stamps and blue tokens for processed foods; red stamps and red tokens for meats and fats.

Q. I have no blue tokens, may I use red ones to pay for processed foods?

A. No. You will use two kinds of tokens just as you have always used two kinds of point stamps—one set for processed foods, the other for meats.

Q. What is the advantage of using tokens?

A. Tokens are expected to make rationing simpler both for the consumers and for the trade. There will be point currency of only two denominations — all stamps will be worth ten points; all tokens, one point. Consumers who have long used dimes and pennies will find it easier to figure than when they handed ration stamps worth eight, five, two and one point. It will be easier for retailers to count stamps

and to make change than when they had to examine each stamp to determine its point-value. Tokens are also easier to handle than stamps.

Q. Will I turn in my ration tokens at the end of each ration period?

A. No. Tokens have no expiration date.
