





# HEALTH OFFICIALS WANTED

Civil Service Posts Open; Deadline Dec. 11

Health education consultants are to be appointed in the U. S. Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency to assist State and local health officials in solving increasing health problems brought about by national defense activities. An examination to fill the positions was announced by the Civil Service Commission today. The salaries range from \$2,600 to \$3,900 a year. Applicants must have completed a full 4-year college course including or supplemented by specialized study—or for the assistant grade, experience—in public health. In addition, they must have had professional experience in public health education work part of which must have been in the field of community health education. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than December 11, 1941.

An examination was also announced for Teacher in Indian Community and Boarding Schools in the Indian Field Service (including Alaska), of the Department of the Interior. Optional branches of teaching and annual entrance salaries, are as follows: Agriculture, \$1,800 and \$2,000; home economics, \$1,620 and \$1,800; farm mechanics, \$1,700 and one- and two-room day schools, \$1,620 and \$1,800. Applicants must have completed an appropriate 4-year college course and have had experience in teaching in the option for which they apply. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than December 11, 1941, if received from any of the States. A longer period for filing applications is allowed for points in Alaska.

Full information as to the requirements for these examinations, and application forms, may be obtained from S. Crompton, secretary of the Board of U. S. Civil Examiners, at the post office.

## Musical Notes

Just off the press is the book "Favorite Recipes of Famous Musicians" (Prentice-Hall, Inc.) and your correspondent can testify that there are some wonderful recipes contained therein. Pre-publication information came from watching the book develop, for its author is Charlotte Morris. Not only described, but plenty of recipes are there delicacies of the rarest sort suggested for making everyday fare truly glamorous. Some 100 of the most outstanding musicians of today have since Tibbett, Lily Pons, Eugene Orlandi contributed their favorite dishes. Lawmandy, Albert Spalding, John Charles Thomas, Jose Iturbi and the others have all added comments to their recipes and these make the book interesting reading. There is a short biographical sketch for each artist and also a picture and signature so the book is a good reference volume for the music lover. A special chapter written by Moses Smith, director of the Masterworks Division of Columbia Recording Corporation gives ideas for using recordings as a background for the meal and there are lists of recordings given for menus made up from the book. There is a chapter written by Marcia Davenport, giving a menu such as Lena Geyer would have enjoyed. The book ends with ideas for after-the-concert dining by Virginia French, whose husband heads Community Concert Service. The hostess who is also a music lover will find "Favorite Recipes of Famous Musicians" a valuable source of supply for unusual entertaining.

Algor Gorin, well known baritone, likes to mix music with his food. In his contribution to "Favorite Recipes" he says, "Sometimes the music helps to make me forget the food, and sometimes the food helps to make me forget the music!" That is his philosophical attitude toward eating while on concert tours. But his pet dish is broiled chicken a la Ohio, a recipe from his mother-in-law's file.

Tenor James Melton likes Southern specialties. "Shortenin' Bread" is usually called for at a Melton concert and he knows how it really should be sung, as well as cooked. The midnight suppers prepared personally by "Jimmy" for his friends are justly famous, for he is one of America's foremost gourmets. Like a majority of those who take particular interest in the culinary art, Melton likes simple, well-seasoned food.

"We like all Russian dishes!" say the renowned piano-duo, Vronsky and Rubin. "But when Russian food is beyond our reach, we like the various foods of countries we are visiting, provided they represent the best type of local cooking." Their contribution to "Favorite Recipes" is the delicious "Beef a la Stroganoff" (Beef with sour cream gravy). Here is a dish to sharpen the most jaded appetite.

## GARSTANG TO SPEAK

### Archaeologist To Lecture On Dec. 9, 10, 11

Dr. John Garstang, a distinguished English archaeologist, from the University of Liverpool, will deliver an important series of public lectures at the University of Delaware on December 9, 10, and 11.

Professor Garstang, now associated with the Oriental Institute of the University of Chicago, is on a lecture tour of the nation. For many years he has been engaged in archaeological research mainly in the Bible lands, and in his three lectures at the University he will present some of the interesting and significant results of excavations in these ancient countries.

On December 9, Dr. Garstang's subject will be "The Story of Jericho"; on the following day he will speak on "The Foundations of Bible History"; and his final lecture on December 11, will be on "The Hittite Empire".

All of these lectures, which will be of special interest to Bible students and persons interested in fine arts and archaeology, will be illustrated by slide pictures. The lectures will be given in Room 220 of University Hall, beginning at 4:30 P. M. The public is cordially invited to each lecture in the series.

### MACHINERY REPAIRS STRESSED

#### Materials Limited, Shortage Faced For Next Year

Farm machinery and equipment repair will be an important activity on Delaware farms during the coming months if Delaware farmers are to avoid machinery shortages during the 1942 production season.

To learn of the education work of the farm machinery and equipment-repair program suggested by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard to the Delaware-U. S. Department of Agriculture Defense Board, K. W. Baker, county agricultural agent supervisor and farm management specialist of the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, will attend a conference of extension engineers at Chicago, Ill., on Dec. 4 and 5.

The farm machinery repair program is designed to assist in eliminating shortages of equipment through the crop year of 1942. With the quantity of materials for new machinery for next year limited to approximately two-thirds of that used this year, the repair of machinery on Delaware farms may mean the difference between a profit or a loss during the next production season. Then, too, those Delaware farmers who recondition their serviceable machinery this winter and stock replacement parts soon may help to avoid the effects of the labor shortage next year.

At the conference Baker will assist in formulating suggestions for State and county extension programs and hear from other agencies and manufacturers with whom Extension workers can cooperate to aid farm people to produce the food called for under the Farm Defense Program.

### HIGHWAYS NATION'S SALVATION

#### Nation Fed By Means Of Good Roads

The peace-time construction of highways and the increased use of these facilities in our program for total defense has proven to be the economic and social salvation of this nation. H. V. Daniel, secretary, Associated Petroleum Industries of Delaware, stated today.

"The health and strength of a great civilian population engaged in producing defense goods requires enormous quantities of food to keep America in fighting trim," Mr. Daniel declared. "So smoothly does highway transport perform this service of feeding the Nation that the vast majority of citizens is scarcely aware of its importance.

"An essential and vital proportion of our daily supply of foodstuffs is moved from farm to market exclusively by motor transport and all farm produce sold is transported a part of the way from farm to market by highway transportation.

"Typical of motorized food movements, fully 69 per cent of all poultry and 53 per cent of all livestock is so shipped to market and the packing centers. Motor trucks carry 41.8 per cent of all fresh fruit and vegetables and a high percentage of all butter, eggs and milk reach the market by using highway facilities.

"As America moves to defend herself, highway transportation speeds up its service to supply nourishing food in larger quantities to men in arms and to men who make those arms. Highway transportation is today performing a great and essential service."
