Health Official Queries Need for Proposed Newark Hospital

Dr. C. P. Knight, State Bd. of Health, Questions Need For Newark Project On Basis State Survey, Occupancy Of Wilmington Facilities; Needs Of 75,000 People Cited

In reply to a statement made by Dr. C. P. Knight, director of the State Board of Health hospital planning and construction division, that there is insufficient current need for such a hospital, backers of the 150-bed Newark Community Hospital and Medical Center claimed last week that the proposed \$3,500,000 institution would meet the medical needs of 6,000 people in the area south of Wilmington.

Red Cross Drive Lags 50% Behind Local Area Quota

Treasurer Reports \$3,100 Received As Drive Passes Mid-Point Of Schedule

The 1954 Red Cross fund campaign which began in Newark on March 1 and is scheduled to continue through April has slowed considerably during the past week, volunteer workers report. Allen Smith, treasurer for the drive, reported to John H. Cronin, local campaign chairman, that returns as of Friday, March 19 totaled approximately \$3100 which is slightly less than 50% of the quota for this area.

A few zones have been completed and only in Zones IC and IB, captained by Mrs. Russell Hyre and Mrs. Chester Hitz respectively, have all solicitations and final reports been made.

More follow-up calls have been necessary this year but on the whole, solicitors have reported good response from citizens of Newark.

The recently adopted slogan for the national Red Cross organization, "People Helping People," seems to have caught on, and Mr. Cronin has urged all zone workers to finish their canvassing as soon as possible.

Local Businessman Robbed Of \$1,500 In Friday Hold-Up

A. S. "Doc" Maclary Loses Store Receipts To Bandit Hiding In Truck With Gun

You may read about such things in the papers, but they don't happen to you in Newark—and particularly not after a tough day in an independent grocery store. But it happened to Alfred S. "Doc" Maclary, proprietor of Maclary's Market, 70 East Cleveland Avenue, when an armed bandit robbed him of some \$1,500 shortly after store closing time last Friday night.

The bandit who staged the Newark holdup was an impudent, revolver-wielding lone wolf.

Mr. Maclary closed his store around 11 p.m. and, carrying the day's receipts in a roll in his pocket, got into his delivery truck and started for his home at 19 Tyre Avenue, Newark. He had gone only a square when the bandit, who had been hiding in the back of the truck, stuck a revolver in his hand and told him to "drive on."

"Don't let me," the gunman was quoted as saying, "or I'll let you have it."

Mr. Maclary said he drove about seven or eight blocks to the extension of East Cleveland Avenue when the robber said, "This is far enough. Pull up to the side and give me your money."

During the whole time, the bandit kept the revolver aimed against the driver's back. "I thought I'd be slugged or shot any moment," Mr. Maclary reported.

As soon as he stopped the truck, the man demanded the money. "Hurry up, hurry up," he told Maclary.

Mr. Maclary said he reached into his pocket and handed the roll of bills, amounting to between \$1,200 and \$1,500, to the gunman. All the time he kept looking forward.

The man then told the driver to look out the side window.

"THI shoot if you turn around and look at me," he threatened.

As soon as Mr. Maclary turned his head, the robber jumped out of the truck and fled. Mr. Maclary said he did not move for a few seconds, and then drove away.

Both state and Newark police were notified. Mr. Maclary said he thought the gunman was young, in his teens or early 20's, but was not sure. He told police he never saw the man.

League Of Women Voters Introduces Local Candidates

City Office Seekers Introduced At Special League Meeting Tuesday

Candidates for elective office in the April 13 election were introduced as guests of the Newark League of Women Voters at the Academy Street public school on Tuesday night, and Carl S. Rankin, retiring Western district councilman, and principal speaker on the program, summarized his views of the duties and organization of Council and the problems confronting the next administration.

Council candidates introduced were W. Alvin Spacks and Harry Maclary, contestants for a one-year term from the Eastern district; William Coverdale and Claude Galven also from the Eastern district, competing for a full two-year term; George Neighbors and Grover Surratt, candidates for a vacancy in the Middle district; and Donald Hill and Frank Scott, competing for the Western district council seat being vacated by Mr. Rankin. Richard D. Gross, also a candidate from the Middle District, was unavoidably detained but appeared before the close of the meeting.

Mr. Rankin, candidate for Mayor, was introduced and discussed his stand on issues confronting the community. Mayor Johnson was unable to be present.

Among the needs pointed out by Mr. Rankin were sound engineering practices, the employment of a trained and efficient city manager, and an informed and active citizenry.

"The citizens themselves," Mr. Rankin said, "must decide if they want improved city services and whether they are willing to pay for them, and must choose their councilmen on that basis."

Councilmen serve on their own time and must accept responsibility for what they have neither the training nor the time," Mr. Rankin continued, "and many departments of city government are seriously overworked. More efficient administration is a must."



A BAD TAX

One thing can be said with virtual certainty about taxes—one is adopted, even though it is supposed to be temporary or of an emergency nature, it is extraordinarily difficult to get rid of it.

The federal gasoline tax is a fine case in point. It was first enacted 20 years ago, purely on a temporary basis. And what has happened is that it has been periodically increased—instead of reduced or eliminated—and has reached the present level of two cents a gallon. There was hope that it would die this April—but the President has asked that it be continued.

The President's position is based upon the need for maintaining government revenues. But, aside from that, the federal gasoline tax is a very bad one. Gasoline taxation is properly a field for the states and the states only, under laws which allocate all the revenues to road work and prevent diversion to other purposes. According to The Oil Daily, the federal tax now brings in close to \$1,000,000,000 a year, while federal appropriations to the states for highways are only \$550,000,000 a year. In other words, close to half of the tax is being siphoned off. The motorist does the paying—but he doesn't get his money's worth.
