LOCAL MAN CORN CHAMP

U. of D. Graduate Captures Prize In Dekalb Contest

Robert W. Hopkins, of near Milford Cross Roads, has been announced as the winner of the state corn growing contest staged recently by the Dekalb Seed Company, represented locally by J. Irvin Dayett. He received a trophy and a set of silver for eight for his achievement.

Eight hundred and sixteen acres yielded Hopkins an average of 165.37 bushels of shelled corn per acre to give him top honors for Delaware. Earl Biddle, of Glasgow, was named New Castle County champion with a yield of 94.33 bushels per acre.

Hopkins, who has been farming for 12 years, was graduated from the University of Delaware school of agriculture in 1930. The land has been farmed by three generations of the family over the past 78 years.

MORE PAY URGED FOR TEACHERS

Givens Declares School Budgets Must Be Increased

The National Education Association today urged the local Board of Education to help avert a serious threat to the schools' represented in the rocketing costs of living which have commenced to force qualified teachers into other lines of work, cutting the quality of educational opportunity to the danger point. "This loss of capable and experienced teachers," says the letter written to the president of the Board by Willard E. Givens, executive secretary of the National Education Association, "can be prevented in your community only if you and the other members of your board take immediate steps to make adequate salary adjustments. School budgets must be larger. Through your determined leadership this can be done."

Accompanying Secretary Givens' letter to the Board of Education was a brief description of the situation in the schools. Characterizing "effective and universal education as the bulwark of self-government," the Association pleads "that we not weaken our long-time defense of democracy as we did in the war of 1917-18 when vacated classrooms were filled largely by unqualified people because inflated living costs compelled low-salaried teachers to accept better wages in business and industry."

MORE THAN 50 SIGN FOR CIVIL POLICE

Emergency Force To Be Given Training By Newark Force

With more than 50 local men registered for the Civil Police, Chief of Police William H. Cunningham announced today that the first general meeting will be held on Dec. 29 at 7 p. m., in the council offices.

Volunteers will be divided into two groups which will meet for one-hour sessions two nights a week until the course is complete. Most of the classes will be conducted by Officer Leroy C. Hill. Both Hill and Cunningham attended the FBI course held recently in Baltimore, Md., and Dover.

Emphasizing that no man will be sworn in, Chief Cunningham pointed out that most of the volunteers' work will come under an "emergency" classification, although there would be an immediate use for their services in case a convoy should pass through town.

A few of the points to be covered at the school include:

Maintaining of control stations to keep informed concerning air raid damage and to take action prescribed when such damage occurs; evacuating dangerous areas in the vicinity of unexploded bombs; serving as 'incident officers' at any premise which has been bombed; keeping headquarters informed as to amount of damage, number and type of casualties, morale of the public incident to a bombing; discovering and reporting damage to sewers, water mains, light cables, and gas mains; enforcing blackout requirements, including illegal use of lights; increasing traffic control, particularly at night, enforcing laws against unauthorized use of cameras and chart makers.

Cooperating with the home guard and military forces in the event enemy parachute troops land and reporting promptly any indication of the presence of parachutists; enforcing laws concerning illegal use of fireworks and light signals; aiding in the evacuation.

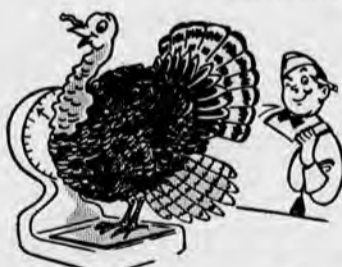

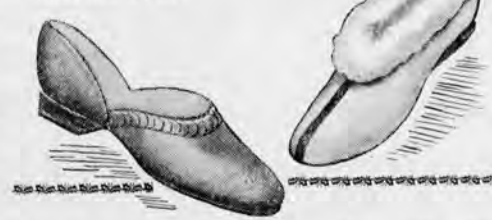

Flashes By Bill Fletcher

JUST HOW MUCH OF A PROBLEM will face Bill Gillespie in building a Newark High School football team for 1942 is evident when you consider the fact that 17 of the 22 boys who received letters at the banquet Monday night, will be handed their diplomas in June.

Add to this the fact that more than half of this year's squad are members of the senior class and the sum total is an abundant supply of headaches for the Jack-ets' mentor.

Material, as far as quantity is concerned, has never been a problem at the local high school and it has always been represented by a large squad, but there has always been a tendency on the part of many of the boys to delay reporting until their junior or senior years.

ONE OR TWO YEARS IS NOT enough to develop a player unless, of course, he is a natural athlete, and as a result, the boy who should be playing varsity ball during his last two seasons, is just learning the fundamentals of the game.

This problem is solved at many of the larger schools by a junior varsity program which offers every boy, regardless of how light he is, a chance to participate actively in competition.

In the absence of such a program at the local institution, however, members of the squad who return next year should take it upon themselves to do a little campaigning and recruit boys in the lower classes. A little encouragement and pressure should swell the ranks considerably.

STRICTLY AN INFORMAL AFFAIR, the grid banquet Monday night, featured by turkey and "all the trimmings" was a pleasant one due mainly to its informality.

If the spirit moved them, the guests spoke—if it didn't, they kept quiet.

Probably one of the school's most ardent fans, Rev. H. E. Hallman, who has been following the Jacket team for more than 20 years, was high in his praise for the 1941 eleven and the speaker was probably more in authority than the average enthusiast.

Not just a "game follower," Rev. Hallman can be seen frequently at the field during practice sessions and we, for one, believed all he said because we knew he knew what he was talking about.

CONSPICUOUS IN ITS ABSENCE was the score of the Newark-Millville game which was not listed in the season's record appearing in the program, and some explanation is due.

The series with the New Jersey school was started a few years ago as a PRACTICE game but as the larger institution began dominating the relationship, Millville began to play it up more and more as a regularly-scheduled contest.

To officials at the local school, the tilt has never been more than a pre-season workout, one that aided a great deal in preparing the Jackets for their inter-state opponents.

Relationships have, however, been discontinued. Millville, incidentally, has an elaborate athletic system, and is represented by several football teams of various weights and sizes.

WRESTLING TEAM IS ORGANIZED

Squad Headed By Champion Bill Laurelli

A squad of 15 men, expected to increase to 25 after the first of the year, is working out under William (Shack) Martin in an effort to form the first wrestling team in the history of University of Delaware athletics.

The candidates, headed by Bill Laurelli, Blue and Gold football star, all lack experience with the exception of the Hen lineman, who holds the Middle Atlantic Conference 165-pound championship. Laurelli, who has been wrestling for several years, won the title while representing the Wilmington Y. M. C. A.

Coach Martin, who assisted Bill Murray as grid mentor and who will handle the Blue and Gold baseball team, is pleased with the competitive spirit shown by the candidates and is highly optimistic of developing a wrestling team within a few years. "The spirit shown by the boys helps a great deal to compensate for their lack of experience and several promising wrestlers are beginning to shape up."

It is unlikely that the team will officially represent Delaware on the mat this year, although practice matches are being planned with the Johns Hopkins University second team and the Wilmington "Y."

Among the schools in this section which are represented by wrestling teams are: Johns Hopkins, Ursinus, Gettysburg, Franklin and Marshall, Muhlenberg, Western Maryland, Haverford, University of Maryland, Rutgers, Lafayette, and Brooklyn Poly.

One of the most promising candidates, Jim Buchanan, has dropped from the squad after enlisting in the U. S.

EIGHT-GAME SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED FOR BLUE HEN FOOTBALL ELEVEN

1942 Campaign Includes Battle With Gettysburg; No Other New Opponents listed; Card Includes Six Home Tilts, Two In Newark

An eight-game schedule, including six home engagements, is listed for the University of Delaware football team in 1942, William D. (Bill) Murray, director of athletics and grid coach, announced this week.

Only one new opponent, Gettysburg, last met on the gridiron in 1912, is included on the slate which will open in Wilmington Park on Friday night, Sept. 25 when West Chester State Teachers' College provides the initial opposition. The Bullets are also booked for a Wilmington Park appearance on Oct. 17.

Delaware's last meeting with Gettysburg was not a happy one for the Hens suffered a 27-0 reverse, one of the several defeats in a campaign which netted only one tie and a single victory in eight starts. After dropping decisions to Lehigh, Haverford, Washington College, Muhlenberg, Catholic University, and Gettysburg, and being held to a 0-0 deadlock by Lebanon Valley, the Blue and Gold concluded its season with a one-sided 50-0 triumph over the University of Maryland.

Mount St. Mary's College bows out of the Delaware grid picture temporarily in favor of the Bullets, while West Chester, Drexel, Ursinus, Dickinson, Pennsylvania Military College, Swarthmore, and Washington College are listed as repeaters for 1942.

Undeclared in their past 13 appearances, the Hens will be given an opportunity to meet the only team which mars its record, West Chester, which held the Murraysmen to a 7-7 deadlock in the 1941 debut. With the exception of the Teachers, the Blue and Gold eleven ran up one-sided scores over the rest of their opponents, all of whom have been listed for 1942 with the exception of the Mounts.

Ursinus, booked for Oct. 10, and Swarthmore, slated for Nov. 7, are the only two Newark games scheduled, while four have been listed for Wilmington Park. All tilts have been scheduled for afternoon events with the exception of the P.M.C. clash which will be held either Friday night, Oct. 30, or Saturday afternoon, Oct. 1, and the Teachers' battle, Nov. 14 is listed

FREDDY MITCHELL LEADS HEN CAGERS TO 52-51 WIN OVER CADETS IN OPENER

Blue And Gold Leader Accounts For 21 Points Against P. M. C. As Adkins' Charges Cop Overtime Decision; Barlow's Foul Decides

An extra-period foul toss by George Barlow, his only point of the contest, gave the University of Delaware basketball team a 52-51 victory over Pennsylvania Military College in the Hens' 1941-42 opener last night.

The winning point was scored with 45 seconds remaining, climaxing a heated struggle that saw the Blue and Gold cagers, operating under Coach Emery Adkins for the first time, come from behind to cop the verdict.

Baffled by the Cadets zone defense which was especially effective in the second quarter, the Hens trailed the invaders 23-18 at the end of the first half but rallied in the third period to knot the count at 32-32.

With Capt. Freddy Mitchell leading the Blue and Gold attack and outscoring the Cadets' leader, Larry Miller, the Hens overcame the deficit, increased to nine points in the third stanza, to tie the score, then went ahead 34-32 at the start of the fourth quarter when Mitchell dropped in a long shot.

The score was tied up at 34, 37, and 39, but Mitchell and Conrad Sadowski, who accounted for 15 points, gave Delaware a 43-39 edge with exactly one minute to play. Ken Klein and Jake Lesnow broke through to tie the score again at 43-43, however, as the regulation game ended.

The situation reversed itself in the five-minute overtime period, however, as the Cadets built up a four-point margin, 51-47, with only two minutes to play. Mitchell and Sadowski again came through for the Blue and Gold, however, and deadlocked the score with only 45 seconds to play, setting the stage for Barlow's winning toss.

The contest, packed with spectacular long-range gunning which had the crowd, Hens and Cadets alike, talking to itself, developed into a Mitchell-Sadowski, Miller-Bartow dogfight as these combinations accounted for most of their team's points. Mitchell walked off with high honors with 10 action shots and a foul for 21 points, while P. M. C.'s Miller dropped in 7 field and 6 foul tosses for 20. Jake Bartow collected 18 points for the invaders, while Sadowski was racking up 15.

With Hill showing the way with 12 points, the Delaware junior varsity

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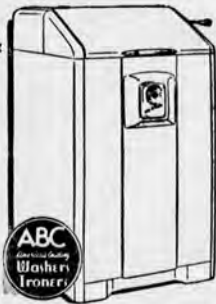


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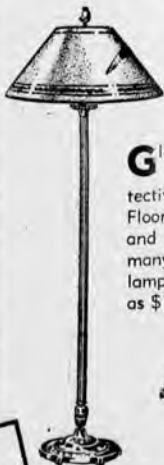
