Dear Friend:

I have just received your note of December 30 and appreciate very much your writing me when I know how much pressed you are with more important things. First of all, let me tell you how delighted I am to have news of the prolongation of the Chade concession, and I extend my sincere congratulations.

I am delighted that you are going to take this holiday at Arosa, and I do hope that on your way back you might find it possible to pass by Vienna. I am not going to be leaving Vienna for the next two months, in fact I am not planning to leave here before some time in the spring, when we are going to make our usual trip home. You would be sure, therefore, to see me here if you should come any time towards the end of January or in February. Vienna remains a very good observation post, and there are many things which I would like to have an opportunity of talking over with you. There is no possibility of my leaving here in the near future, for I am tied to Vienna more than ever. The position here remains quiet, and I see it in many ways stronger in view of developments in the general position, but there are various things which make it impossible for me to leave here. If I could do so, I would run over to Arosa with my wife for a few days in order to see you there.

If by any chance you find that you cannot return to Belgium via Vienna, I will try to get a letter to you via our courier. As you are going home in February, I am particularly anxious that we should be able to exchange views on the situation over here in Europe before you go. If we cannot
