

George O. Garey, Veteran Editor, Dies At North East

Forty-Three Years as Editor of Cecil County Weekly; Was Prominent Figure in Local Affairs. Funeral Monday.

Mainly Responsible for Town's High School Building

This community was shocked to hear of the death of George O. Garey, editor of the "Cecil Star," which occurred Friday afternoon at his home in North East, after an illness of several months. He was a son of the late George W. and Emaline Garey, and was born in Easton, Md., on September 8, 1855, where he spent his early years, being educated at the Easton Academy and Western Maryland College. After serving as staff reporter on the New York "Tribune," in 1882 he founded the "Cecil Star" at North East, which he edited and published continuously until his death.

From 1898 to 1912 he served on the school board of Cecil county and is credited by his untiring labor with securing for his home town its present high school. He was for 50 years a member of the official board of North East Methodist Episcopal Church, serving at various times as trustee and treasurer. He was also a charter member of the Knights of Pythias, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and a member of the Red Men.

In October, 1884, at Oxford, Pa., Mr. Garey married Addie Alexander, daughter of Sarah Alexander, who is still living at North East, and the late William D. Alexander.

The deceased is survived by his wife and six children: Mrs. Alan P. Norris, Newark, N. Y.; Lieut. Raynor Garey, U. S. Army, Honolulu; Miss Lois Garey, Syracuse, N. Y.; Mrs. Hilda Garey Rose, North East; Mrs. Charles Otis McCauley, Perry Point, Md.; George A. Garey, Norfolk, Va.; also eight grandchildren and two sisters and three brothers.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon at the North East Methodist Episcopal Church, at 2 o'clock, in charge of Rev. E. M. Shockley, the newly appointed pastor of the church. Interment was in the cemetery at North East.

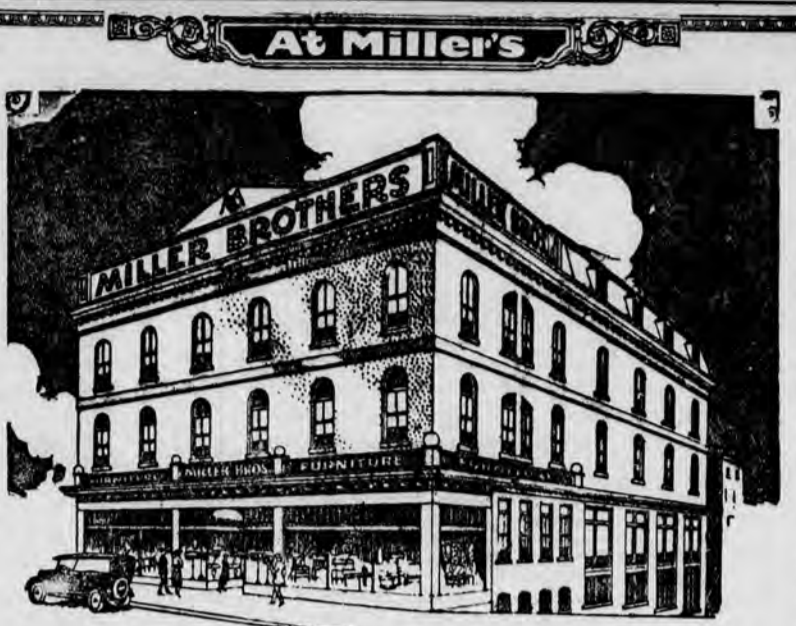
