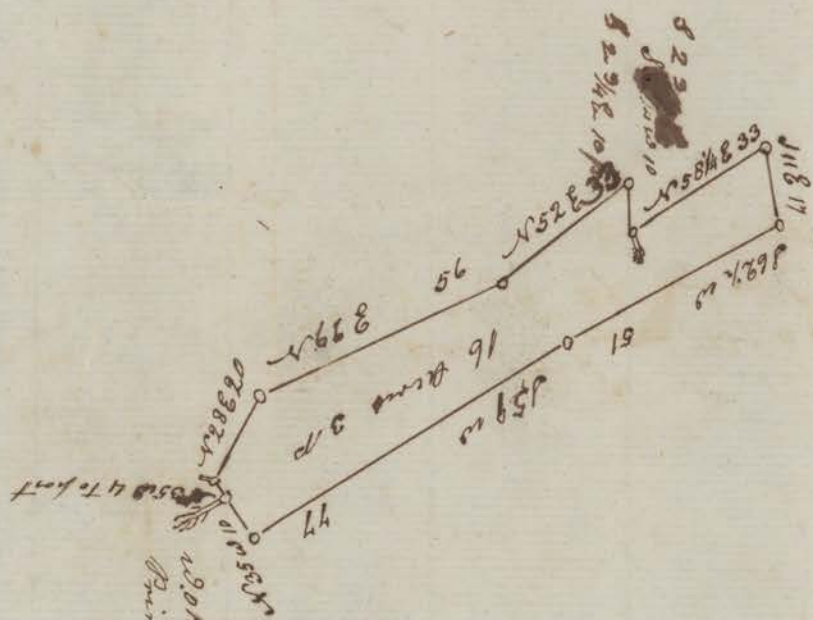

In the Name of God Amen I William Shank  
Tand of Sussex County of State of Delaware being in a sound mind  
and memory and being of full age, calling to mind the uncer-  
tainty of life and length of days, I do hereby give my Will and Desire to  
those who are near and dear to me and that they may survive me  
so that there may be no doubt as to my design & desire (being  
in pursuance to a written instrument heretofore given by me to my  
beloved Wife binding them to fulfill any thing clearly expressing my  
Will) Do make and declare this as my Will and desire in matter and  
form following.

First. After my just debts are paid, it is my desire & I do hereby give and  
bequeath unto my beloved Wife Mary, If she shall survive me, one  
third part of all my personal Estate, to her and her heirs and assigns  
forever. Also one other sixth part to be held by her during her widowhood  
to be enjoyed by her during said Term but to be returned by her to my  
representatives within three months from the date of her marriage or in  
case she should never marry and leave so much then at her death.

Second. It is also my Will and desire that she possess all my right  
in a Lot in Lewis Town sold by us to Geo. Parker with a privilege to  
redeem the same as by an Article of Agreement, also she first allow-  
ing and discharging all of a debt to us by John Neill all such  
sums as has been received as a payment on Account thereof that she  
enjoy the same to her & her heirs & assigns forever.

Thirdly. in order to provide a decent Support for my said beloved  
Wife, particularly during her widowhood, it is my Will and desire  
first that in case she does choose to reside on my said farm then in  
order to procure a suitable Tenant to conduct her farm she may give  
him a lease of the ground herein describe that <sup>shall</sup> not expire until two  
years after her own death, she living a widow during said Term vizt  
Beginning at the Edge of the woods North of the House where Saul a  
Black man resides then by a line so as to exclude said House South  
Eastward nearly as the fence now runs until it intersects near the  
other or back fence between s.<sup>d</sup> House & Branch then by or near the  
last named fence Eastward until it intersects the Town road turning  
by my gate about half way between said gate & Branch then by a  
line with said road until it intersects the upper field South West corner  
commonly called the Barn field then with the fence as it now runs  
near the Branch and the Middle field nearly as the fence runs to East  
or South East corner of the lowest field by the woods, thence up the  
marsh or the fence from said field to the North East corner thereof  
then by a line nearly perpendicular to said fence and creek to the creek  
thence up the creek to the gut parting me and Burton Robinson thence  
with said dividing line Westward to the woods between said Robinson  
& myself And that she be allowed to close between this & the beginning

One acre every two years if necessary and all the rest of the timber  
she may need out of the woods to be taken in any part thereof  
picking such large Timber trees as are decaying or not thriving or  
young Dogwood & Hickory so as not to injure the now thriving large  
timber trees Except out of this division the North West part of the farm  
vizt a corn crib and stable with the privilege of my heirs at law  
to use & occupy during said Term provided she wish the same for  
beating out Corn & drying thereof, or in case my said Widow to reside  
off my said farm or may be disposed to Marry it is then my will  
and desire that she will agree with my heirs at law on two or  
three suitable freeholders to lay her off her proportion on the West  
end of the plantation by a line running Nearly North & South so as  
to include the half part of the tilable ground and a suitable portion  
of marsh & hills for hay and pasture while a widow but the third  
part only in case of marriage, and in case she remains a widow  
she be permitted to take off such Timber trees as are not fit for logs  
except as to building Timber to her own use so far as is necessary  
for any building & firewood that she may need, And in case she  
does not choose to Administer she be permitted to have have a  
third choice out of the Appraisement in Household goods & stock  
so far as she may require thereof. It is also my will & desire  
and I do hereby give and bequeath to my beloved daughter and  
her children all the rest and remaining my Estate Real & per  
sonal to them their heirs & assigns forever after the death of  
said daughter. Lastly it is my will & desire that in case Jno.  
H. Munton the present husband of my daughter survive me  
he take upon himself the administration of this my will taking  
with him my said wife in case she desire it. In Testimony

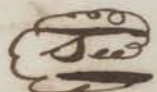

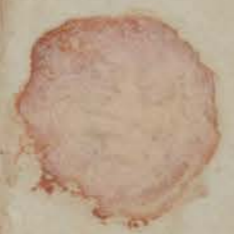
