STUDENT'S BOND DRIVE TOPS QUOTA BY \$3025

Net \$33025 On Six-Day Campaign At Newark School

Surpassing its quota by over \$3,000 the bond drive conducted by the pupils of the Newark School last week showed a final tabulation of \$33,025, said Superintendent Wilmer E. Shue yesterday congratulating the student-body on its fine work. The school's quota had been set at \$30,000.

STATE TO OBSERVE DELAWARE DAY DEC. 7

Constitution Was Ratified By Delaware 158 Years Ago

Honoring tomorrow, Dec. 7, the 158th anniversary of Delaware's ratification of the federal Constitution as "Delaware Day" Gov. Walter W. Bacon this week called on the citizens of the state to pay tribute to the part Delaware played in the establishment of the basic law of the land.

A group of 30 men representing all parts of the state met on this day in 1787 and unanimously agreed to accept the constitution as the ground-plan of a new nation — the United States.

By so doing, Delaware led the way for the other states of the then young nation that was recovering from a revolutionary war and tribulations of forming a united country.

Because of the action, Delaware earned the right, to the first star in the national flag and also earned the honor of being "the first state in the union."

Leon DeVallinger, state archivist, this week reported that an exhibit of Delaware documents in connection with the ratification of the federal Constitution will be held in the hall of records in Dover.

ELECTION BY FARM COUNCIL

3 Officers Named By USDA Here

Officers were elected at the organization meeting of the New Castle County U. S. D. A. Council Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 28 in the County Agents Office, here, as follows: B. T. In order that various USDA agencies might become acquainted with each other's work, plans for the near future were discussed. Mr. Boggs explained the activities of the Soil Conservation program and stated that the Delaware Farm and Home Program on Dec. 4th would be Soil Conservation, with Mr. Boggs and Lewis Phipps discussing "How Soil Conservation Can Help the Farmer."

Mr. McCauley announced that the Delaware Crop Improvement Assoc. would hold their annual show at Middletown School on Jan. 3rd, 4th, 5th, and discussed certification of seed and the value of a show of this type. Mr. Hopkins discussed AAA and agreed to furnish a copy of the AAA Program to each agency in the county at the next meeting, the date of which will be announced later.

4-H GROUP ATTENDS SPECIAL CLASS HERE

20 Complete Training In Tractor Repair At University

A class of 20 Delaware 4-H boys and leaders completed a special course in tractor repair and maintenance last week at the University of Delaware. Willard Wilson, of Newark, was among those who took the training.

The objectives of this course as stated by George M. Worrlow, associate director of the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, were: Background-honor of being chosen to represent their county in the course; objectives—to stimulate interest among Delaware farmers in giving more attention to tractor care and maintenance on their own farms; to encourage trained leaders to develop among farmers the realization of the importance of proper tractor care; to encourage trained leaders to promote more efficient tractor operation in their communities by giving demonstrations, talks and personal service on proper tractor care and maintenance.

Among the subjects the trainees studied were: Types in common, the tractor engine, fuels and carburetion, and carburetor care, cleaning and adjusting, tools, cooling system, oil filtration and engine lubrication, transmission and final drives lubrication, and tractor safety.

DOORDAN IS GUEST SPEAKER AT C. OF C. MEET

Ex-Fighter Pilot Talks On Air War Against Japs

John E. Doordan, Agricultural Deputy for the Delaware War Finance Committee, was the guest speaker at the dinner meeting of the Newark Junior Chamber of Commerce held at the Deer Park Hotel last Thursday.

Mr. Doordan was formerly a Captain in the Army Air Force, credited with 105 missions as a fighter pilot during 19 months on New Guinea and is a recipient of the DFC, Air Medal with 2 oak leaf clusters, and the Purple Heart.

The speaker gave vivid accounts of Air Force operations against the Japs, especially the defensive tactics against Jap bombers in the earlier part of the war. This was followed by a recount of the reasons why a Bond Drive is necessary at this time, both as a help to the Government in its program of rehabilitation and as a sound investment during a period of high prices. The talk was followed by the showing of two Government films.

President Jim Garner was in charge of the business meeting preceding the talk of the evening, when it was decided by vote that each of the bi-weekly meetings henceforth would be a dinner meeting.

'Gift To A Yank' Drive Ends Monday

The "Gift To A Yank" campaign, purpose of which is to provide a Christmas gift for every hospitalized veteran, is scheduled to close here, this Monday. Residents are urged to leave a contribution at Sheffer's Paint Store before the deadline. The nation-wide drive is sponsored locally by the American Legion Post No. 70 and Auxiliary. Last year a total of 8,255,450 gifts, with a value of \$5,896,350, were distributed to veterans following the campaign. Not only were wounded men and women in government hospitals remembered but all patients in state Veterans' institutions, and in convalescent centers and rest camps.

HOME AGENT FOR COUNTY RESIGNS HER POST

Mrs. Daugherty To Leave For Far East; Held Post 17 Years

After 17 years as home demonstration agent for New Castle County, Mrs. Kate Henley Daugherty has resigned from her position effective last Sunday, according to George L. Schuster, director of the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Delaware.

Mrs. Daugherty is one of the pioneers of the home demonstration field, having worked with the Texas Extension Service for over 11 years, and for a short time with the Massachusetts Extension Service, before coming to Delaware. She began her work as home demonstration agent in New Castle County in September, 1928.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Daugherty, the number of home demonstration clubs in this county has grown from three to 12, and the membership from 50 to 350 women. During this time, the rural home-makers methods of food production and conservation that played such an important part in the recent war effort, including economical and appetizing food preparation for the family, and stressing substitutes and left-overs.

Immediately after leaving the extension service, Mrs. Daugherty will travel to California with her husband, Maj. Martin M. Daugherty, where she will remain until it is possible for her to join him in the Far East.

DR. INMAN TO SPEAK AT U. OF D.

Latin America Authority At Mitchell Hall

Dr. Samuel Guy Inman, authority on Latin America, will return to the campus of the University to deliver two lectures on Monday, December 10, at 4:15 p. m. in Mitchell Hall. Dr. Inman will address the College Hour on the topic: "Democracy versus Fascism in the Western Hemisphere." Again, at 8:15 p. m. in Mitchell Hall, Dr. Inman will address the University Hour on the title: "Argentina."

Dr. Inman is returning to the University by request, his memorable talk last spring on the significance of the Chapultepec Conference having created a demand for his return from both faculty and students. The University Committee on Lectures is therefore highly gratified to be able to announce Dr. Inman's coming for these two talks. Both meetings will be open free to the public. Special attention is called to the evening meeting, which will be the first University Hour meeting of the winter season.

The University Hour is a public-service feature of the University designed to present to the public on certain evenings during the winter and spring months speakers of unusual merit upon topics of timely interest. It is hoped that this year, with the cessation of gas rationing and the entailed necessities for driving economy, that the University Hour may regain its pre-war popularity with the public of the Wilmington metropolitan district. The public will be informed of the later features of the University Hour in due course through the newspapers and other public notices.

Dr. Inman has been lecturer and exchange professor at various Universities in the United States, Latin America, Madrid, Hawaii, Geneva. He has been one of the faculty of Columbia University, Yale and the University of Pennsylvania.

\$45,200 IN BUILDING PERMITS ISSUED

Permits For Laundry And An Apartment Are Included

Building permits for a house, laundry, and an apartment house were issued this month, it was reported by George E. Ramsey, Town Supervisor, at a meeting of the Town Council Monday night. The permits totaled \$45,200, with the breakdown as follows: one house, \$5,000; 1 laundry, \$10,000; apartment house, \$30,000; and garage, \$200.

A cash balance of \$71,721.45 on hand at the end of the month was also reported together with \$100,000 in war bonds, giving the town a total surplus of \$171,721.45.

Electric light receipts for the month were \$6,636.47, while from the sale of Electric power came \$3,672.68, and from water rents \$6,905.98.

Chief of Police William H. Cunningham reported 32 arrests classified as follows: drunk, 9 arrests; assault and battery, 5 arrests; disorderly conduct, 4 arrests; reckless driving and speeding, 3 arrests for each offense; passing a red light and parking, 2 arrests for each offense; larceny of balck, larceny, following too closely behind a fire engine, and operating an unregistered motor vehicle, one arrest for each offense.

The magistrate reported \$202.00 collected in fines for the month.

Investigations were as follows: 5 accidents; 4 breaking and entering cases, 3 were cleared, two attempted breaking and entering cases, three larceny cases, three were cleared, and the case of one man hit by a train at the B and O crossing.

Overnight lodging was provided for three travelers, there were 188 police calls received, and the police car traveled 2164 miles during the month.

Mr. Ramsey reported the work on North Chapel Street completed. All holes in the street were patched with Amesite. Water pumped during November totaled 15,232,800 gallons, an increase of 380,500 gallons over the same month last year.

ARMY IS RECRUITING FOR ERC

Sub-Station In Post Office Is Open Thursdays;

Newark's recruiting sub-station, newly opened in the postoffice building under direction of M/Sgt. John T. McKinney, is seeking recruits for the Enlisted Reserve Corps from among local veterans. The office is open every Thursday 9:30 to 4:30.

Listing some of the advantages as well as requirements for joining the ERC, Sgt. McKinney pointed out that former enlisted men of the Army of the United States, other than those currently enlisted in the National Guard, who have served honorably and satisfactorily since 16 September 1940 and who were separated from active service prior to 2 October 1945, may enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps in the grade in which serving at time of discharge, provided they are found fully qualified physically and otherwise, and apply within 90 days of date of discharge from prior service. Men discharged since 2 October 1945 have 90 days from date of discharge to enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps.

Members of the Enlisted Reserve Corps who wish to reenlist in the Regular Army must request that they first be called to active duty in the AUS. They must be reenlisted in the Regular Army before 1 February 1946, if they wish to retain their present grade. Attention is called to the fact that men in the ERC who wish to be called to active duty in the AUS must pass a final type physical examination, if they have been separated from active duty for a period of over ninety days. In every case, they must pass a physical examination in order to be discharged from the AUS for purposes of enlistment in the Regular Army.

Reenlistment allowances and reenlistment furloughs will not be granted men presently in ERC unless their reenlistment is accomplished within the periods specified in Circular 310, that is, within 3 months following discharge from active duty to be eligible for reenlistment allowance; and within 20 days to be eligible for reenlistment furlough.
