Dear Danny:

I have just received your note of January 7 with which you sent me a clipping from the DAILY MIRROR. David Billikopf in Philadelphia is a very good friend of mine and he is also a good friend of Drew Pearson. This explains the item in Drew Pearson's article.

I have no information as to developments in Washington with respect to personnel for Germany. I didn't see Lippman's article to which you refer, but he is entirely right. I wouldn't make any difference how many people we need and what we have to pay them to do the job in Germany--it would still be a very small investment in view of the importance of the task. Unfortunately Government do not act that way.

I have no news as to what recent developments there may be in the thoughts of the responsible people in Washington with respect to Germany. So far as I am concerned, I am plugging away here and doing the best I can. I will keep you informed of any developments in the personal situation.

This is just a hurried note as I am very much occupied these days, but I have been thinking of writing you about developments in the street car situation and I hope to be able to do so in the very near future.
