CAPT. KASE ASSEMBLY SPEAKER

Is Director Of Entertainment For Caribbean Area

Captain C. R. Kase, of the Army Specialist Corps, on furlough from the Army, will be the speaker at the University Assembly in Mitchell Hall next Monday, October 16, at 4:15 p. m. Captain Kase will tell of his experiences as director of entertainment for the U. S. forces in Puerto Rico and Trinidad.

Captain Kase was Director of Dramatics and an Associate Professor of English at the University of Delaware, where he was most successful in developing the E-52 Players and other dramatic entertainments. He was granted a leave of absence from the University in order that he might carry on similar work for the Army in the Caribbean area. Captain Kase will resume his post at the University when he is discharged from the service.

He has stated that the men in the armed forces enjoy participating in dramatics and similar forms of entertainment and that unquestionably such work has been a great factor in building up morale among the men stationed in the area in which he has served.

In the course of his two years of service he has met a number of graduates of the University of Delaware who have been stationed in that area or passing through it.

SGT. BLAND IS CITED

Sergeant James E. Bland, 19, of Thompson Circle, George Road Village, has been awarded the Air Medal. It was announced by the Fifteenth Army Air Force.

In the words of the citation, the award was made for "Meritorious Achievement in Aerial Flight While Participating in Sustained Operational Activities Against The Enemy".

Sgt. Bland is an aerial gunner on a B-24 Liberator bomber. He is a member of a veteran group, commanded by Lt. Col. Joseph G. Russell of San Antonio, Texas.

The group has completed over 110 combat missions and its crew have dropped thousands of tons of bombs on strategic targets in the network of German industrial, rail and oil installations throughout Southern Europe and the Balkans.

Dr. J. R. Downes Again Named Department Athletic Officer

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A GASOLINE RATIONS TO BE ISSUED NEXT MONTH

Local Boards To Distribute 'A' Books Under Approved Plan

At a meeting of the Board Chairman of the War Price & Rationing Boards of the State of Delaware, held Wednesday evening, October 4th in Dover, a plan was approved for the distribution of the "Basic A" (for passenger automobiles) gasoline rations.

As a convenience to the public it was decided to issue them through the War Price & Rationing Boards and also temporary board sites.

In addition to the main boards, temporary sites in this area will be established at Hockessin and Glasgow.

The registration will start on Wednesday, November 1, 1944 at 3 p. m. to 8 p. m., and will continue as follows: Thursday, November 2 — 3 p. m. to 8 p. m.; Friday, November 3 — 3 p. m. to 8 p. m.; Saturday, November 4 — 12 noon to 5 p. m.

All main boards and temporary boards will be open during the hours listed for the issuance of "A" books only. No other business will be transacted during these hours.

The applicant will obtain from his gasoline dealer an application (R-534), fill out both the application and stub and, together with the BACK of his old "A" book, take it to the nearest Board site or temporary board site. He will then be issued a new "A" book. It is most desirable for each applicant to register in his own board area to prevent loss. No books will be mailed.

11 NEWARK STUDENTS AT U. OF D.

Seven Are Taking Arts & Science Course

The announcement that 345 civilian students are registered this fall at the University of Delaware is most gratifying. These young people of Delaware are looking ahead and seeking the splendid opportunities being offered by their State University.

Of the 264 women students 178 are enrolled in the Arts and Science course, 39 in the field of Education (both elementary and secondary), 46 in Home Economics, and one in the school of Engineering.

Of the 81 men students 32 are in the Arts and Science School, 6 in agriculture, 1 in education, and 42 in the various branches of Engineering. Among the new students registered in the University, 48 are from outside the State of Delaware and one, Miss Mercedes Hererra, is from Honduras.

DELAWARE FARM FRONT THIS WEEK

OPA Eliminates Cheese Quotas Effective Oct. 1

All three Delaware counties are included in additional areas which have just been named for supplemental dairy payments as a drought relief measure.

Quotas limiting the sale of cottage, pot, and baker's cheese to 100 per cent of the quantity sold in June 1943 have been eliminated by the WFA.

In line with a previously announced reduction in support price on hogs for October 1, the WFA has established officially a support price of \$12.50 per hundredweight.

The rationing of farm machinery, with the exception of corn pickers, has been ended officially by an order of the War Food Administration.

Marketing quotas on Delaware farm production are not contemplated for 1945 by the WFA, according to C. E. Ocheltree.

"We have adjusted our production downward and we have adjusted it upward," says Mr. Ocheltree. "And for the first time in our national life we know that both can be done with definite economic benefits both to the producer and to the consumer."

The Office of Defense Transportation has announced that under the dairy industry transportation program more than 397,400,000 tire miles, 7,225,000 gallons of motor fuel, and 4,317,000 man hours are being saved annually by commercial motor vehicles transporting dairy products from producers to assembly points and processing plants.
