### Plantings Advised As Aid In Winter To Birds, Humans

Bird-feeders are fine with their sweet and seedcakes, for helping our feathered friends happy during the long lean winter months. But by selecting the right plants, home-owners can provide both garden beauty for themselves and den-bounty for the birds, says Dave Tattall, assistant agent in ornamental horticulture.

There is a wide choice of available plants, which, because of their colorful and long-lasting fruits, can furnish wintertime eye appeal for people, as well as taste appeal for our winged visitors, Tattall says.

Varieties for both purposes include: Trees — flowering dogwood, Washington hawthorne, Japanese flowering crabapple, American holly, and Eastern red cedar.

Shrubs are Rockspray Cotoneaster, winterberry, bayberry, (Myrica pensylvanica) Laland firethorn, and nannyberry.

I just returned from Washington, D. C. where the National 4-H Agents meeting was held. There were many impressions I received which might be of interest to you.

### SAFE — SO FAR!

With dedication of the Northeastern Expressway and Delaware Turnpike today, traffic safety officials await with bated breath the knowledge as to who will be the first fatality on this new perfect roadway of concrete and asphalt.

"This wondrous piece of construction cost \$74,000,000 and is a toll road," Paul E. Burke, executive director of the Maryland Traffic Safety Commission, stated "But I hope the toll exacted is just monetary and not the life or limb of the motorist."

There are many dangers awaiting the motorist on this new speed roadway, Burke pointed out, especially the dangerous practice of backing up when passing the exit or interchange. At the rate of speed motorists travel on this super highway, this backing action may bring death to anyone attempting it.

Anyone inadvertently passing the interchange or exit should keep going to the next, rather than courting death and injury in this hazardous manner.

The motorist can make this expressway the safe, fast method of travel for which it was constructed—or a road to death.
