

BANKING INSTITUTE TO CONDUCT FORUM

Dr. Jos. S. Gould To Participate In Round Table Discussion

Dr. Claude L. Benner, vice president of The Continental American Life Insurance Company, Dr. Joseph S. Gould, head of the Department of Economics at the University of Delaware, and Dr. Woodlief Thomas, assistant director, Division of Research and Statistics, Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve Bank at Washington and author of the new Federal Reserve Index of Production, will participate in the first round table forum meeting to be held by Wilmington Chapter, American Institute of Banking, on November 12 at 8 o'clock at the Wilmington New Century Club.

Dr. Benner will first give a brief informal talk on current matters of importance as affected by the election results. Mr. John B. Jessup, executive vice president of Equitable Trust Company will be the chairman of the forum, the theme of which will be "The Near Term Outlook for Interest Rates."

Among the subjects of economic importance to be discussed by the three economists are the following: The impact of the indebtedness program upon business with particular reference to prices and interest rates, the matter of whether or not inflation can be avoided, the business outlook for this country at the conclusion of the preparedness program, and the necessity for the revision of the Federal Reserve Index of Production. Dr. Thomas will explain the difference between the old and revised index, and will discuss the reason for Colonel Leonard P. Ayres' refusal to recognize the new index.

Wilmington Chapter is one of the 385 chapters and units of American Institute of Banking, the educational section of the American Bankers Association. Bankers from every state, totaling 67,700, are members, 46,000 of whom are students in the courses of study prescribed by the Institute. 90 members in Wilmington and Harrington, a branch of Wilmington Chapter, are studying banking subjects under the auspices of the local organization this year. Forum meetings have become an important part of the educational activity of chapters in the larger cities, and the meeting on Tuesday is expected to be of particular interest to senior bankers, officers and directors. The Wilmington Clearing House Association has evidenced its approval of the project here by an appropriation of funds for the promotion of such meetings.

Mr. Arthur H. Clarke, Jr., assistant cashier of The Union National Bank, as president of Wilmington Chapter is also chairman of education of the Delaware Bankers' Association. His committee for the forum includes Mr. Calvin M. Whitesell, Jr., of Wilmington Trust Company, chairman, Miss Norma Lippincott and Mr. Marshall C. Tyndall of Equitable Trust Company.

ANNOUNCE EXAMS FOR CIVIL JOBS

Applicants Will Be Rated On Qualifications

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions listed below. Applications must be filed with the Commission's Washington office not later than November 25.

Senior specialist in higher education, \$4,600 a year, Office of Education, Federal Security Agency. The duties of this position include making studies of problems in the field of higher education involving curricula, methods of instruction, faculty welfare, student personnel, financial support, etc. Applicants must have completed a 4-year course and in addition must have had progressive experience in the field of higher education, including experience in making or supervising normative and comparative studies of higher institutions of learning.

Superintendent of clothing factory salaries ranging from \$2,600 a year to \$3,800 a year; foreman tailor, salaries ranging from \$1,860 a year to the \$2,300 a year. The salaries vary with the establishment to which assigned. Employment is under the Bureau of Prison Industries, Department of Justice. Applicants must have had experience in the clothing manufacture business sufficiently broad to render them familiar with materials and processes used. Part of the experience for either position must have been in an appropriate supervisory capacity.

No written examinations will be given for these positions. Applicants will be rated on their qualifications as shown in their applications and on corroborative evidence.

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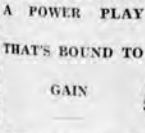
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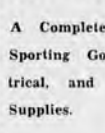
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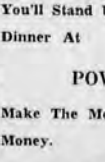
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
