"We played only mediocre ball against Dover last week," Coach Fred Spasato said this week, "especially during the first half when we were able to score only once. We will have to do a lot better to whip Wilmington."

Spasato said this week, however, that the injury does not appear to be serious and Zejky is expected to be in the starting lineup next Friday.

Don Sharp, defensive lineman, kept up his average of one blocked kick per game as he broke through to short circuit one against Dover.

His team's inability to kick the point after touchdowns with any degree of success is worrying the Newark coach at the present time and is being emphasized in this week's practices. Against Dover not one was successful in four attempts.
