Tar And Crushed Stone Laid On New Dual Road

Brack-Ex, Wed., Sept. 24 — The State Highway Department last week completed surfacing dirt shoulders on both sides of the new dual highway between Oak Grove and Marshallton, with tar and crushed stone. When the first section of the highway between Wilmington and Newark was completed a few years ago, the shoulders lacked a hard surface for about six feet on both sides.

NEWS IN THE WORLD of RELIGION By W.W. REID

According to rural sociologists of Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa, there are twelve types of community betterment that churches should render the towns and open country they serve in America: (1) participation of church members in community council to integrate activities of school, church and other agencies; (2) use of church building for community activities; (3) members and leaders of 4-H Club work in constituency; (4) leaders and participants in home project work; (5) leaders of agricultural projects; (6) assistance to out-of-school youth groups; (7) leaders and activities in other fields; (8) projects and leaders contributed to civic education projects; (9) activities and leaders furnished for health and social welfare programs; (10) leaders of farm organizations; (11) economic cooperation of church members who are leaders of cooperatives; (12) programs to which pastor has contributed as member, speaker, or counselor.

"The church is not the state, and the state is not the church," said the bishops of the Norwegian Church (Lutheran) recently to the (German) Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs in Norway. "In external matters, the political power may attempt to exercise compulsion upon the church; but the church is a spiritual and sovereign body, built up on the Word of God and the fellowship of faith. In all its human weakness, the church has God's commission and authority to proclaim His laws and His Gospel to all nations. Therefore the church can never keep silent when the commandment of God is pushed one side and sin comes upon the scene. . . . On the basis of this our commission, we exhort the rulers to put an end to everything contrary to the holy ordinances of God regarding justice, truth, freedom of conscience, and goodness, and to build unshakably on the law of God."

The American Bible Society recently shipped 4,000 English New Testaments to "Stalag VIII B, Germany" (a camp for British war prisoners). This almost unprecedented request is based on one of the very few communications that have been permitted to go out from such camps in Germany. For war refugees and prisoners in Europe, 3,200 Bibles and 58,000 Bible portions in seven languages have been shipped by the Bible Society; for Germans held prisoner in Canada by Britain, 2,000 gospels in German.

"No matter who wins the war, there is no hope for future order and stability unless we have some common Christian principles," says Dr. Roswell P. Barnes, of the Greater New York Federation of Churches. "If America can solve its problems on a Christian basis, this will be a demonstration that will hearten and guide the rest of the world. What is America going to have to suffer before she realizes what the world is to be?"

"In the first century, the church paid the price of the catacombs, the arena, prisons; today in Europe the church is in prisons and concentration camps. This does not mean its defeat, but its testing. The church in America must choose between pride and prestige in the community, losing its life to save all."

In the heart of old Brooklyn—one of New York City's residential boroughs—members of four Indian tribes meet at 9 p. m. each Sunday for a Christian service in the Cuyler Presbyterian Church. While the service is in the Mohawk language, the Indians are from the Omaha, Winnebago and Cayuga tribes as well as from the Mohawk.

The American Friends Service Committee (Quakers), which has relief workers in almost every war-torn country in the world, has joined the United China Relief and will enlarge its activities in Free China. One of its first new services will be the sending of a medical and surgical unit to Chungking and vicinity to aid bombed civilians. The Committee now has a home in Shanghai for refugee Chinese children, and is aiding some 19,000 Jewish refugees from Europe who are stranded in China en route to other lands.
