**Elm trees returning to UD Green**

Project to restore historic look of campus center

Majestic elm trees will soon return to the University of Delaware's North Green, years after most of the university's original elm trees fell victim to disease.

The elms will replace nine trees that were felled last month to allow for the replacement of steam lines under The Green.

"The removal of the trees was necessary to replace the steam lines, but we are also viewing this as an opportunity to restore historical components to campus by using an elm-disease resistant cultivar that will most closely resemble the American elm," UD spokesman Peter Bothum said in an emailed statement.

American elms were a focal point of the original layout of The Green – formerly called The Mall – which was designed by landscape architect Marian Coffin in 1919. Though there were once more than 160 elms at UD, over the years, most had to be cut down due to Dutch elm disease, which is transmitted by beetles.

**Storm can't dampen Newark's July 4 fun**

Thousands attend Independence Day festival, fireworks

As a heavy downpour drenched the University of Delaware athletic complex Tuesday evening, sending Liberty Day attendees scrambling for their cars, Breena Brown couldn't have been happier.

With a big smile on her face, the 4-year-old danced around in a circle in the rain as her mom, Charitie, huddled under an umbrella.

"As long as she's happy, I'm good," Charitie Brown said, laughing.

For the Newarkers gathered to celebrate Independence Day with the annual Liberty Day festival and fireworks show, a carefree attitude like Breena's came in handy.

Just as the festivities were about to begin at 6 p.m., a thunderstorm moved through the area, prompting city officials to urge those gathered to take shelter in their cars. Most heeded the warning,

though a few people, like Luis Camacho, decided to brave the storm.

Shielded by two large umbrellas, Camacho sent his family to

the car but stayed on the lawn in front of Delaware Stadium to save their spot.

"I wanted to keep everything here," he said. "I didn't want to pack up."

Across the lawn, David Zavala and Gretchen Lewis were sitting in lawn chairs complete with a built-in canopy.

"I've got my canopy, I'm set," Zavala said.

"We're going to ride it out," Lewis added.

Fortunately for attendees, the storm moved through quickly and the festivities were underway in less than an hour. After a second brief downpour, the skies brightened, and a rainbow appeared over Delaware Stadium.

Food trucks offered a variety of culinary options, vendors sold light-up toys and other novelties, and local bands The Honeycombs and Country By Night entertained

# Newark public works employee honored for saving passed-out student

A longtime city of Newark public works employee who saved a passed-out University of Delaware student was honored last week by the Newark Morning Rotary Club.

The club presented its Service Above Self Award to John Bello for his actions in the early morning hours of March 4.

It was 4:30 a.m. and Bello, 55, had just left the city's maintenance yard on Phillips Avenue to head to Main Street to clean. He usually drives his truck up South College Avenue, turns on East Delaware Avenue and then loops around to Main Street, but for some reason that morn-

ing, he drove down Beverly Road.

It was pitch black outside when suddenly his headlights flashed over a woman's body in the 200 block of Beverly Road. She was lying face down in the grass between the sidewalk and the road and wasn't moving.

He got out of his truck and tried to wake her, but she didn't open her eyes. She was breathing lightly, and he could tell that she was cold, wearing only jeans, boots and a short-sleeve blouse.

The temperature that morning was approximately 22 degrees, with a wind chill making it feel like 18 degrees.

Bello took off his jacket

and draped it over the woman, got back into his truck and called police, who arrived a few minutes later.

The woman, later identified as a 19-year-old UD student who had been separated from her friends for several hours, was taken to the hospital with non-life-threatening injuries, but paramedics said that if Bello hadn't found her when he did, she could have died due to the cold temperatures and her level of intoxication.

"I've seen it on TV, you know, someone saving someone's life, but to have it happen to you is a totally different feeling," Bello told the Newark Post at the time.

# Police: Distracted driver hits N. Chapel train bridge

A moving truck crashed into the North Chapel Street railroad bridge last week, causing the road to be shut down for nearly three hours.

The crash happened at 8:48 a.m. June 30 as the driver was heading north on North Chapel Street, according to Lt. Fred Nelson,

a spokesman for the Newark Police Department.

The driver, Zachary J. Alberto, 35, of Asheville, N.C., was looking down at his cellphone shortly before the crash, Nelson said.

"When he looked up, he realized the bridge was too short and couldn't stop in time," Nelson said.

The truck became wedged under the bridge, and firefighters from Aetna Hose

Hook and Ladder Company had to cut away part of the top of the vehicle in order to free it. Alberto was then able to drive the damaged truck away.

No one was injured. Alberto was cited for inattentive driving, Nelson said.

The Delaware Department of Transportation inspected the bridge but found no damage that would affect train traffic.

## Police: Man committed 'lewd act' in Kmart

Newark Police arrested a man last week after he allegedly was seen on camera committing a lewd act while following two women through Kmart.

The defendant is identified as James M. Harland, 31, of Newark.

According to Lt. Fred Nel-

son, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, officers arrived to the Kmart in College Square Shopping Center on June 29 after employees reported that a man, later identified as Harland, had committed a lewd act while inside the store.

Nelson said the employees

told police they saw Harland on surveillance video following two women in their mid-to-late 30s through the store while committing the lewd act, which Nelson declined to describe. The women, who were not identified, did not notice Harland's actions.

Nelson said officers found Harland in the store and arrested him for lewdness and two counts of second-degree indecent exposure. He was video arraigned in front of JP Court 2 and committed to Howard Young Correctional Facility after failing to post \$1,500 secured bond.

NPD did not release the surveillance video of the incident.

## Police seek man who stole video games from GameStop

Newark Police are searching for a man who allegedly stole several video games from GameStop on Monday after his credit card was declined.

According to Lt. Fred Nelson, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, the incident occurred at approximately 5:03 p.m. at the store located in Suburban Plaza off Elkton Road.

Nelson said an employee told police that a man attempted to buy six video games, valued at \$130.94, with a credit card, but it was declined. He then reached over the counter, grabbed the games and fled the store. He was last seen leaving the area in a 1990s-model flat matte silver or gray Toyota Corolla.

NPD released a surveillance photo of the suspect and is asking for the public's help to identify him. He is described as a black man with a thin build between 5 feet 10 inches and 6 feet 2

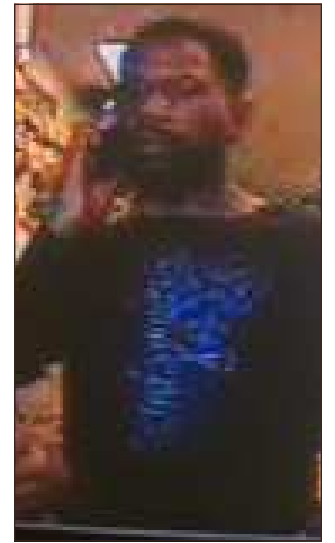

## Man shoplifts cigarettes after debit card is declined, cops say

A man from Elkton, Md., used a debit card with insufficient funds to buy cigarettes in Newark and left the store just as the clerk realized the card had been declined, police said.

The defendant, 24-year-old Alan M. Proctor, later turned himself in after being identified by police.

According to Newark Police spokesman Lt. Fred Nelson, officers were called to Suburban Tobacco in Suburban Plaza off Elkton Road at 6:33 p.m. June 27 for a shoplift-

ing that had just occurred.

When they arrived, Nelson said, an employee explained that Proctor had approached the counter and asked to buy a carton of cigarettes, valued at \$63.50.

Proctor swiped his debit card, and the employee handed him the carton of cigarettes. Proctor quickly left the store and the employee realized the debit card had been declined, Nelson said.

Nelson said the employee followed Proctor outside and attempted to get him to stop as he was driving away by banging on the car window, but Proctor refused to stop and left the area.

The employee was able to provide NPD with the car's license plate number, which Nelson said led police to Proctor. Officers called Proctor on the phone, and a short time later he turned himself in at the police department.

He was video arraigned in front of JP Court 2, charged with shoplifting under \$1,500 and issued \$2,000 unsecured bond.

## Police: Wanted Newark man found with illegal gun, heroin, meth

A 44-year-old man wanted on warrants is in custody after police officers found him with drugs and an illegal gun.

Newark Police Department spokesman Lt. Fred

Nelson said members of NPD's Street Crimes Unit staked out a location in the 2000 block of Capitol Trail in an attempt to find Ralph A. Walsh, who was wanted on traffic warrants and other capias in Newark.

"It was a location we knew he would show up at," Nel-

son said, declining to identify the location or the specific offenses Walsh was wanted for. "We did surveillance there and located him."

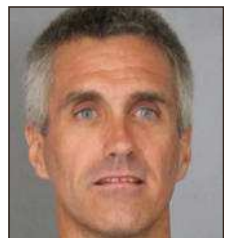
When officers arrested Walsh, they found a Luger handgun in a holster on the inside of his waistband as well as suspected heroin

and methamphetamine, Nelson said.

Walsh was charged with possession of a deadly weapon by a person prohibited, carrying a concealed deadly weapon, possession of heroin, possession of methamphetamine and possession of drug paraphernalia. He

was also charged with possession of a deadly weapon in a safe school zone because the arrest occurred near Forest Oak Elementary School.

Walsh was committed to the Howard Young Correctional Institution in lieu of \$5,300 cash bond.

# Tri-Valley Trail opens in White Clay Creek State Park

After years of planning, the first phase of the Tri-Valley Trail opened Tuesday, filling a gap in the trail system in the Possum Hill area of White Clay Creek State Park.

The new 3.2-mile trail runs between Thompson Station Roads and a new trailhead at the intersection of Smith Mill and Paper Mill roads. From there, hikers and cyclists can access Middle Run Valley Natural Area Park, run by New Castle County.

State officials say the new trail provides White Clay Creek State Park users and commuters with a safe, accessible recreational experience through the northeastern portion of the park. Part of it is paved, while part is covered with crushed stone.

"Trails benefit all of us, in terms of health, the environment, economics, jobs and tourism," said Delaware Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control Secretary Shawn Garvin in a statement. "This new trail expands the overall area trail system which is good for recreational users and commuters alike. But most importantly, the new trail expands the all-weather accessible trail network within the park and creates accessible links to local communities and businesses. It also provides varied accessible trail experiences not found in the local area."

The improvements also include a new parking lot at the trailhead at Paper Mill and Smith Mill roads. In addition, a new bathroom facility will open there this fall.

Work on the project, which was funded primarily by a grant from the Federal Highway Administration, began in January.

The second phase of the trail project, which has not been scheduled, will connect to the county-run Paper Mill Park.

"Once the trail system is completed, it will link the Pike Creek area and the city of Newark," DNREC spokesman Michael Globetti said in a statement.

On Tuesday, the trailhead parking lot was bustling all day as hikers and cyclists checked out the new trail.

The Wilmington Trail Club gathered 26 of its members to hike the trail Tuesday morning.

"This is wonderful," club president Gary Kirk said. "I really like the stone-covered part."

The elms were replaced with Japanese zelkova trees, which were thought to look similar to the elms, but the results were disappointing because the zelkovas did not create the arching effect most people associate with the expansive canopy of a large American elm, according to Sue Wyndham, UD's current landscape planner.

The current replacement project began in early June, and crews have closed off The Green between Main Street and Delaware Avenue, dug up most of the ground and cut down nine trees. Only two remaining elms were saved.

UD will be replacing a failed steam line, and the project is slated to be finished by late August, in time for students to move in.

After the steam line is in, workers will plant 14 to 16 Princeton elms, which are

less susceptible to disease.

"The replacement of these trees, however, provides a wonderful opportunity to restore the trees planted in this area to the original design intent," Wyndham said in a statement.

Still, though, returning students used to seeing tall trees providing shade on the North Green may find the scene jarring. The new trees will eventually grow up to 60 feet tall, but will take at least a decade to reach full height.

"It's a great time," organizer Tom Parkins said, noting it draws a mix of church members, homeless people acquainted with the church through its various outreach programs and other people who just happen to wander by. "It's Newark."

# Fury travel softball team promotes balance

For many softball travel organizations around the country, the summer tournament season can be a bit overwhelming.

For the Delaware Fury 10-and-under softball team, the season ended at the end of June after performing in seven tournaments over three months.

Balancing softball and life is the philosophy of team founder and head coach Tom Boyd, who firmly believes his players, coaches and parents need a realistic schedule and a break coming off the spring season when all 12 girls played not only for the Fury, but their local in-town softball teams as well. And many are still playing on local all-star teams.

"It's about a reasonable travel schedule," Boyd explained of his team's modest travel schedule compared to most. "That's the theme that plays out in our practice and tournament selection. It's a balanced approach."

Boyd's idea to start his own travel team came about in the summer of 2016 when his daughter Mia's previous travel team was disbanding. In an effort to keep the girls together, Boyd, along with a few other parents and coaches, stepped up and started the Fury.

"That original team was

comprised of a very special group of girls and parents," Boyd explained. "Our objective was to build a comprehensive program to develop our players on and off the field. Success is defined first and foremost by their personal growth and skill development, and then their on-field performance and results. We were very intentional about intertwining character building and leadership opportunities into our team huddles before, during, and after our tournaments."

The Fury just completed its first season, and to say it was a success would be an understatement. In its first four spring tournaments, the Fury won the championship trophy in three of them and placed second at the one Boyd called the "toughest of the spring."

"It's a combination of dedicated coaches and players who always had the willingness and ability to compete and rise up to the level of play necessary," Boyd explained of his team's quick success. "They especially stepped up on Sundays when we were in the tournament championship series of the events."

In total, the Fury competed in eight multi-day events over 10 months in Delaware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia. The Fury rarely played on consecutive weekends and played at such a high level in the spring that the United States Specialty Sports Association quickly re-classified them up to the "B" level for the team's final four tournaments.

"These girls play hard, believe in each other and ex-

pect to win every time they walk on the field," Boyd said. "There's not much more you can ask for as coaches."

What the coaches — assistant coaches are Bobby Trzonkowski, Cameron Donovan, Jason Foltz and Chip Watkins — do ask for is what Boyd refers to as "balance." They want the girls to still be girls, and not feel like their lives revolve around the sport of softball.

"The reason why we try to have a more reasonable practice and tournament schedule is that we encourage our girls to be athletes and not have to decide at age

9 whether softball is going to be the only sport they play," Boyd explained. "Having a lighter schedule than most travel clubs allows them to compete in other sports and activities and still be able to compete at a high level in softball. It's all about balancing life."

The balance included cutting practices down to once every two weeks in the spring once the local town leagues began play. It also included participating together in activities away from the softball field. Team trips to Frightland, trampoline parks and a teammates' backyard pool highlighted the Fury's outside team activities schedule. And sometimes, even practices had nothing to do with softball, like the night a few team moms taught the girls how to dance to "Juju on That Beat."

"We try to maintain a certain culture within our team," said Boyd, whose team also donated 10 percent of the money raised in its own fundraisers and sponsorships to local charities. "When I look back on my own upbringing, team sports were one of the biggest platforms to

learn life: How to compete; be a good teammate; learn how to fail. And so I think our parents and coaches need to set the tone that all of those experiences are going to happen here with the Fury. And win or lose, those experiences can all be used as teaching and learning moments for life."

This day and age, the Fury's demonstrated level-headed approach to travel sports is not a common one. But it is one that was an attraction for not only its players, but their parents. It's a mix of playing a more serious brand of softball than the local leagues provide, while still promoting fun and camaraderie for everyone involved.

"Delaware Fury is targeting young ladies who are coachable, enjoy being challenged, and have a strong desire to play at high level," Boyd said.

Next year the Fury plans to have two teams, one each in the 12- and 10-and-under divisions. Players interested in being notified when tryouts are held should contact DelawareFuryTravel@gmail.com or Facebook.com/Delaware-Fury-Travel.

# Saxophonist brings music to Main Street

It's a Thursday afternoon on Main Street and between the beeping of car horns, chatter from diners enjoying lunch outside and the soft hum of a utility truck making repairs to electrical lines, it sounds like any typical day downtown.

That is, until Khari Hayden steps onto the sidewalk, switches on an amplifier and starts playing Bruno Mars' "That's What I Like." The notes radiate out of his saxophone and into the ears of passersby, who smile as if Hayden waved a magic wand over Main Street, making everyone instantly happy.

"I think seeing that transformation is the best part. The street can just go from dead and cars going by and people talking, maybe, and then I'll come out and you can see it changes the atmosphere," he said. "Music has that power."

Hayden, 21, who lives on Madison Drive in Newark, has been playing saxophone on Main Street since he was a freshman at the University of Delaware. He refers to himself as a busker, which by definition is someone who plays music or performs for donations in the street or subway. Busking is more common in major cities like Boston, Philadel-

phia and New York City, but that's exactly why Hayden likes playing in his hometown the most.

"In big cities people are used to it, so they pretty much ignore you, but on Main Street, they seem to appreciate it. You don't necessarily expect to see a saxophonist in Newark," Hayden said. "Main Street really is the best place I've ever played, like I can go to Philly or New York, but there's nothing like Main Street. It feels like home in a way; not to sound too cheesy or anything."

Growing up, Hayden was always interested in music and even played drums in marching and jazz band at William Penn High School in New Castle. He said he taught himself how to play saxophone in fifth grade by listening to popular songs on the radio and mimicking the notes, which is the method he still uses today.

He plays all genres from country to hip-hop to rhythm and blues, as well as top songs on the radio, but Bruno Mars is hands down his favorite. He said he just needs to listen to a song roughly 10 times to understand the melody and the words before he feels confident enough to play it without any errors.

"If a new song comes out, I can probably have it on Main Street within two days

or so," he said.

Hayden admitted he was worried when he first started busking downtown that people wouldn't like his music, but he quickly learned that wasn't the case. He said street people often say he made their day, and one time a man told him he heard him playing from his Main Street apartment window. The man told Hayden it was his anniversary with his girlfriend and Hayden happened to be playing their favorite song, making their romantic evening even more special.

He's also gained quite the following. Hayden said a Newark parking enforcement officer once drove past him in Philadelphia and beeped his horn and waved, and many people recognize him as the "Main Street sax-

ophonist" when he drives for Uber.

"It's cool that I'm not really bothering anybody and that Main Street seems to enjoy it," he said.

Many people think street musicians are beggars, according to Hayden, so he works hard to change that misconception by dressing nice and not putting out any cardboard or signs soliciting money. He said his main concern is just doing what he loves and sharing that passion with the rest of Main Street in the hopes of adding to the musical, artistic and cultural hub Newark has become.

"That's really why I try to do it and I want to give people that push and change their perception of busking," he said. "I want people

## Christiana church's historic bell tower saved by renovation project

The melodic sounds of a historic bell are once again ringing out over the village of Christiana.

On Sunday, Christiana Presbyterian Church unveiled its restored bell tower after a major renovation project.

"We as a congregation and church family are very prideful of our heritage, so it's important we maintain the historic value of the property," said Paula Sims, a longtime church member who led the fundraising campaign.

One of the state's oldest churches,

Christiana Presbyterian traces its history back to 1732, and the first church building was built on land purchased and donated by Colonel John Read, the father of Declaration of Independence signer George Read.

In 1857, that structure was replaced with a new building, complete with a bell tower. The bell was partially cast using melted-down silver dollars donated by congregants, Sims said.

Over the years, however, vibrations from passing traffic caused the bell tower to begin to separate from the building. The 61-member congregation had to decide whether to tear down the tower or take on the enormous task of raising money to restore it.

"It was a huge decision, but we felt like we wanted to save the tower," Sims said.

The church reached out to current and past members and was able to raise \$80,000, and is still working toward the goal of \$140,000.

The congregation spent three months worshipping in a nearby building while the church was under renovation. The sanctuary reopened Sunday, just in time to ring in Independence Day, which Sims called "a fitting celebration for a church rich in American and Delaware history."

## Council appoints two new members to Downtown Newark Partnership

"I am interested in assisting in maintaining strong, vibrant, inclusive and economically successful businesses in our city by working to offer opportunities that allow them to succeed," Hadden wrote.

She claims to have no personal or business relationships with any members of city council, city board or commission or employee and wrote that she does not believe there will be any conflicts of interest on the DNP.

## Newark Country Club creates Certified Wildlife Habitat

The Newark Country Club recently revamped its grounds to become a Certified Wildlife Habitat through the National Wildlife Federation's Garden for Wildlife program.

The work was done over the last three months by members of the country club's new Garden Club, who volunteered their time and donated the necessary plants.

"We realize we are a great asset to the community and we want to

preserve it," said Laura DelPercio, the Newark Country Club's general manager. "We really wanted to be good stewards to our property."

According to DelPercio, the Newark Country Club's 120 acres at 300 W. Main St. hosts a bevy of wildlife, including red-tailed hawks, deer, blue heron, fox and several species of birds, both native and migrant.

The NWF's Garden for Wildlife program promotes responsible gardening that helps pollinators and other wildlife thrive by en-

couraging planting native species like milkweed and discouraging chemical pesticide use. The certification checklist states that every Certified Wildlife Habitat must provide food, water, cover and places to raise young, as well as demonstrate a number of sustainable practices.

DelPercio said the Garden Club worked with Joe Gulotti, who serves as the country club's grounds superintendent, and Lori Athey, Habitat Outreach Coordinator for the Delaware Nature Society, to identify areas for im-

provement and run through the checklist. She said there were several invasive species Athey suggested they swap out for native plants.

After a few months of planning and labor, the club met all the criteria and recently received its certification. Still, DelPercio said the club is far from finished with beautifying the grounds. Garden Club members are continuing to add plants and flowers around the tee boxes and in areas where certain species are lacking and hope to attract more pollinators to the course.

"We want to be able to improve and enhance those areas," DelPercio said.

In addition to the certification, the country club's Certified Wildlife Habitat garden is now also part of the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge, a national effort to create a million gardens that provide habitat for declining pollinator insects, like butterflies and bees.

DelPercio said she's excited for the club to be part of the effort.

"It's nice to be able to give back to the community," she said.

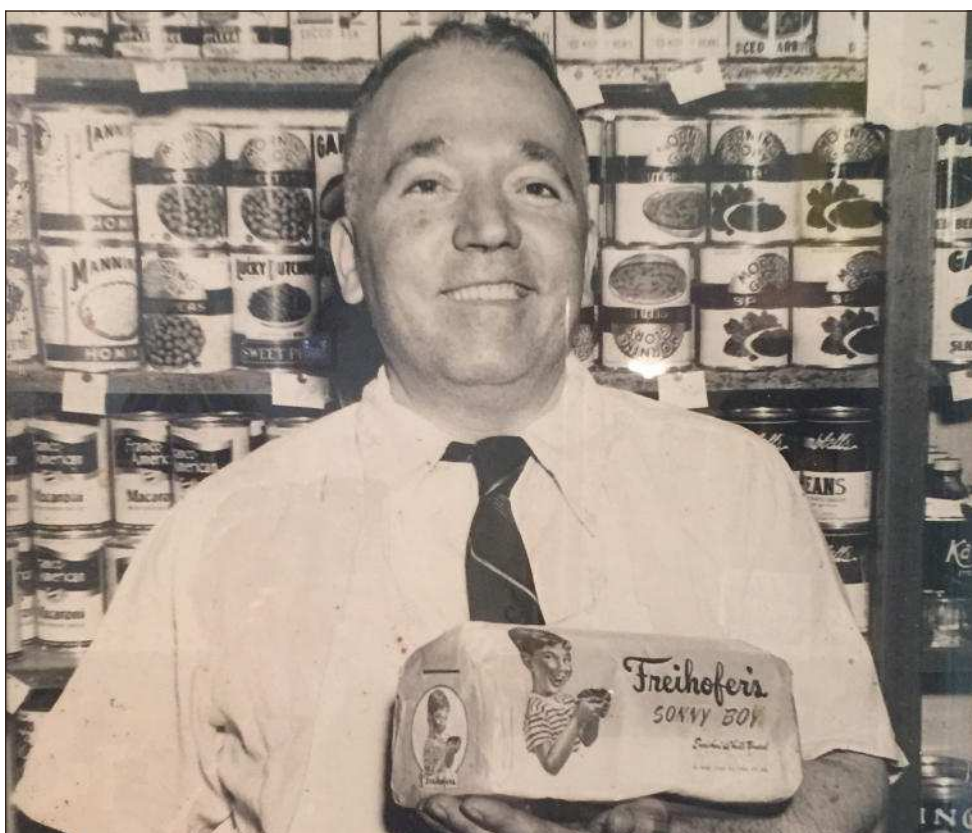

### B&O Market and Restaurant – 1951



This week's Out of the Attic item is a 1951 photo of Thomas Boines, owner of the B&O Market and Restaurant, which was located at 7 Elkton Road (now South Main Street).

Boines opened the store in the early 1930s and ran it until his death in 1971.

The business sold a variety of groceries to both residents and passengers from trains stopping at the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad sta-

tion across the street. The store also offered delivery.

After Boines' death, the building was rented out and housed as several businesses over the years, last housing the Newark Bike Project. It was torn down in 2014 and replaced with One South Main, a mixed-use building containing commercial spaced occupied by the University of Delaware and 12 apartments.



# Trail named for longtime county park planner

After graduating college with a degree in landscape architecture, Jon Husband planned to bounce around between industries, gaining a variety of experience before opening his own consulting firm.

But that plan hit a snag when he took a job as a park planner for New Castle County in 1985. He only planned to stay five years, but this week, he will retire from the county with 32 years of service.

"The rest is history," said Husband, who worked his way up to engineering and environmental services manager, a position that oversees the design and construction of county parks, libraries and other projects. "I fell in love with public service."

Last week, county officials surprised Husband by naming a trail in Middle Run Valley Natural Area Park after him.

"We don't do enough to thank those who actually make this park a reality," County Executive Matt Meyer said June 28 during a ceremony at Paper Mill Park. "I hope this is a small token that will make our kids and our kids' kids for years into the future stop to remember the service Mr. Husband has performed for us all."

The previously unnamed, 1-mile trail opened in 2010 and connected Paper Mill Park on Polly Drummond Road to Middle Run Valley, a sprawling 850-acre park popular for its walking and mountain biking trails.

Husband, who oversaw the design of the project, explained that the trail is meant to ease people from Paper Mill Park's paved paths onto the natural trails in Middle Run Valley. Many people visit Paper Mill Park but may not be as familiar with Middle Run Valley, a "passive park" that features woods but not traditional park amenities like playgrounds and athletic fields.

"We wanted to get them more into nature and see what they're missing," he said, adding that the trail starts out as crushed stone and then becomes more natural. "This is just a great transition trail."

Approximately 40,000 people use the trail each year.

Jim Ireland, president of the Trail Spinners, lauded Husband for being willing to work with his organization. The Trail Spinners, a mountain bike club, helps build and maintain many trails in the region.

"Your legacy will live on through all you've helped create," Ireland told Husband.
