

NHS BOARD PASSES ON PLANS FOR GRADE UNIT

Preliminary Drawings For School Here Are Approved

Preliminary plans for Newark's \$600,000 new elementary school building were approved by the local Board of Education at its May session on Tuesday night.

A layout drawing, describing the arrangement of rooms was submitted by E. William Martin, architect.

The new school will be erected on Academy Street between the two existing buildings. No announcement was made on when construction would begin. Full details on plans for the structure will be published soon.

The Board also approved four new appointments to the elementary school staff. Newcomers to the faculty next year will be Mrs. Cora Saunders, New Castle, Pa., with 11 years experience in the Chester, Pa., schools; Mrs. Rose, now on the elementary staff of Delaware City; Miss Marjorie Johnson, of Newark, R. D., currently teaching at the A. I. duPont School; and Miss Margaret Stitzer, of Philadelphia, who will graduate in June at the University of Delaware.

Four resignations, both from the elementary staff here, were also accepted. They are from Mrs. E. Iving Justin and Robert Bennett.

School tax receipts for April totaled \$10,400 according to a report by the city's secretary Wilmer E. Shue. The group also granted permission of the Newark Recreation Association for the use of the school athletic field for summer activities.

UNIVERSITY TO GRADUATE LARGE CLASS HERE JUNE 7

Minnesota's Dean Blegen To Speak At Outdoor Event

Dean Theodore C. Blegen of the University of Minnesota's Graduate School will be the commencement speaker at the University of Delaware on Monday, June 7, it was announced recently by H. K. Preston, chairman of the committee for the exercises.

Dean Blegen's address will be particularly appropriate, Mr. Preston pointed out, since at the exercises Delaware will confer the first earned Ph.D. degrees which it ever has granted. At that time, in addition to approximately four doctorates, the university also will confer some 37 master's degrees—a record number—and about 200 baccalaureate degrees.

An innovation in the commencement program is the fact that for the first time in many years it will be held out-of-doors. Because of the size of the class, Mr. Preston said, it was thought desirable to accommodate as many relatives and friends of the graduates as possible. Therefore, chairs for 1,800 persons—about twice the seating capacity of Mitchell Hall—will be placed on the campus in front of University Hall. In case of rain, the exercises will be held in nearby Mitchell Hall.

Dean Blegen, who also is professor of history at Minnesota, is a specialist in American social and cultural history. He formerly was superintendent of the Minnesota Historical Society, a Guggenheim Fellow, and president of the University of Minnesota.

RECREATION DRIVE NETS ONLY \$1150; \$3000 GOAL

Opening Of Pool, Canteen Planned; Part Of Project To Be Curtailed

A total of \$1,150, less than half the amount sought, was contributed in the recreation fund drive which closed here this week. Although the campaign is officially over, officials stressed that donations may still be mailed to George Haney, treasurer.

Despite the shortage of funds, the Recreation Association plans to go ahead with the usual summer program here, including swimming sessions at the university pool, soft and hard ball leagues, and operation of the youth canteen in the New Century Club.

Lack of finances, however, will force curtailment of such new features planned for this year as the establishment of neighborhood playgrounds in various sections of town and improvements to the community picnic site. Originally, recreation officials intended to set up basketball goals, volleyball courts and other recreational facilities in four quarters of the town for the year-round use of youths of the neighborhood. Also, they hoped to be able to improve the roadway to the town picnic site.

Harry Rawstrom, university swimming coach, will again direct this year's program. Appointed to assist him are: Fred Sposato, Ed Horney and Guy Tracy. The latter two worked with Rawstrom last year.

The swimming classes will start at the pool June 21, according to Rawstrom. A nominal fee will be charged, although officials pointed out this will not nearly cover the cost of operating the unit.

The youth canteen will open June 8 for twice weekly sessions every Tuesday and Thursday evenings throughout the summer.

Four permanent picnic tables for the community grounds are being constructed by members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Dann On Record As Favoring Apartment

Last week's article, reporting that the \$500,000 apartment house development was turned down by Town Council without a dissenting vote, was incorrect.

Councilman Rodney Dann voted against the motion to turn down the building permit. He went on record as favoring the erection of the big project on the Elkton Road site, with the reservation that the builders follow certain regulations, one being the establishment of all entrance ways on Elkton Road.

All remaining Councilmen, except one, voted for the motion to reject the building permit, in view of the protests of property owners present at the meeting. Councilman Frank Durnall refrained from voting altogether.

Council To Reconsider Apartment House Plan

In the face of a rising tide of protest from civic groups and individual citizens, the Town Council may reconsider its action of last week in rejecting application of a building permit for a \$500,000 apartment house development here.

Mayor Ford McBerty has called a special session to review the matter, but no definite date has been set as yet. The latter will depend on when a quorum of Councilmen can be gathered together. This will be the second special session and the third meeting Council has held on the twice-rejected project.

Major factor in reopening the issue was a formal notice received this week from the John K. Walters Company, Wilmington, promoters of the plan. The letter claimed that the project had not been given just consideration at last week's session and mentioned the possibility of court action if the Council refused to review the matter.

Also forcing the issue were protests from three town civic groups, headed by the Newark Chamber of Commerce.

Plan Brief Memorial Day Service Here; No Parade

Ceremonies At Honor Roll And U. of D. Campus

There will be no parade here on Memorial Day, May 30, according to an announcement yesterday by the town committee under Col. Donald Ashbridge.

Simple ceremonies in the afternoon before the Honor Roll on Main Street and at the Memorial Library on the university campus will replace the customary march in the morning.

Speaker at the main service starting at 4 p. m. on the campus will be Dr. William S. Carlson, president of the University of Delaware.

The day's observance will start at 3:30 p. m. with a wreath laying ceremony at the Honor Roll on the green in front of the Academy Building. Members of the local Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion Posts will take part, along with the Newark High School Band. After the wreath is laid, there will be a rifle salute and the sounding of taps.

Next, the two contingents of veterans and the band will march up Main Street to the campus for the principal service. This will open with an invocation by Dr. A. J. Jackson, pastor of the Methodist Church, after which the band will play the Star Spangled Banner.

Mayor Ford H. McBerty will then be introduced, and the main address by Dr. Carlson will follow. At the conclusion of the talk, the band will play "America."

The high point of the service will come next, when Boy Scouts from local troops will place a wreath in the rotunda of the Memorial Library. The benediction will be by the Rev. H. E. Hallman, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

An invitation to attend has been issued all Newark's Gold Star Mothers. Special seating arrangements will be provided for them, authorities said.

CENSUS OF NEWARK IS COMPLETED

Final Figures Not Tabulated By Town Group

The census of Newark, recently ordered by Town Council to obtain a listing of every citizen 21 or over in order to assess each for a poll tax, was completed yesterday, according to Town Assessor P. A. Wheelless.

Final figures have not been tabulated as yet, however, and will not be available until after the data is turned over to the State Department.

The house to house registration was carried out by a corps of six assistants under Mr. Wheelless.

The information will be used in billing every citizen for a capitation tax. The new system, which will eliminate registration days for non-property owners, was necessary due to a recent decision in the Superior Court by Judge Frank Speakman. According to Judge Speakman's interpretation of the Town Charter, the town must assess each citizen directly for a capitation tax.

Army Leader Schools Are Open To High School Grads

Young men about to graduate from high school who are now volunteering for service in the U. S. Army are eligible to select training in one of the Army's new Potential Leaders Schools before they enlist, 1st Sgt. Robert Botsford, local Army and Air Force Recruiting sergeant said today.

Four schools have been established to train selected new recruits who show promise of real leadership potentialities. Some 6,000 potential leaders a year will graduate from the stiff courses at

Fort Jackson, S. C., Fort Dix, N. J., Fort Knox, Ky., and Fort Ord, California.

Men are selected for the schools, Sgt. Botsford explained, on a basis of demonstrated capacity for leadership. To be eligible, they must score over 90 in their Army General Classification Test and pass strict tests as to character, alertness and physical fitness.

"Once they have started the six-week course," Sgt. Botsford said, "the students learn to lead by leading groups in classroom study, patrol work, and athletics. Subjects studied include leadership problems, psychology of leader-

ship, training methods, public speaking, organization of instruction groups and how to conduct demonstrations."

Graduates are promoted at once to private first class, and are eligible for more rapid advancement than otherwise would be the case.

In addition to the leadership school opportunities, high school graduates, Sgt. Botsford said, also are eligible to pick their own field of specialization in advance of enlistment. If qualified and accepted, the applicants, after they finish basic training, are assigned to the school of their choice for specialized training.

Newark Girl Among 4 To Attend Camp

Four Delaware 4-H Club members have been selected as Delaware representatives to the 18th National 4-H Club Camp which will be held in Washington, D. C., June 16 to 23. Club members who will attend from Delaware are Joseph Mitchell, Hockessin; Dorothy Dempsey, Newark; Francis Downs, Kenton and Madeline Wheatley, Seaford.

Selection of the delegates was based on outstanding ability in leadership, community service and achievement and is one of the highest honors accorded 4-H Club members. Four delegates from every state and territory will be present. The Delaware group will be accompanied by Miss Jean Lee, state 4-H club specialist.

The National 4-H Camp has been held each year since 1947 except during the war years and is under the cooperative supervision of the state agricultural extension services and the extension service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The purposes of the camp are to give the 4-H delegates an opportunity to confer together regarding the development of a constructive rural leadership, to help them learn about the work of the Department of Agriculture and other branches of the Federal government and of the important part that can be taken by each citizen in government affairs, and help them gain a deeper appreciation of the ideals that have shaped Washington as the nation's capital.

SUMMER SESSIONS

2 Terms Again Are Scheduled

The 1948 Summer Session at the University of Delaware again will be held in two terms, for the third consecutive year. Dr. W. Earl Armstrong, director of the session, has announced in bulletins which now are being distributed.

The two-term plan for the summer session was inaugurated to enable many former service men to complete their college work sooner than they otherwise could. Course work is organized so a full semester of work may be completed in six weeks.

The first term will start on Friday June 11, with registration for all students, and classwork will begin the next day, continuing through Tuesday, July 20. Although normally the Summer Session operates on a five-day week, Saturday classes will be held June 12 and 19, and July 10 and 17 to make a complete term. There will be no classes on July 5.

The second term will begin July 21 with registration, and classes will start the next day, concluding August 27. Saturday classes will be held July 24, August 7 and August 21.

Dean Armstrong listed a faculty of approximately 100 persons to care for the students enrolled in both terms. The instructional staff includes members of the university's regular faculty and approximately a dozen visiting instructors.

DR. BECK RESIGNS

The resignation of Dr. Lewis W. Beck, associate professor of Philosophy at the University of Delaware, effective at the end of the summer, was announced recently by Dr. William S. Carlson, president of the university. Dr. Beck will become professor of philosophy at Lehigh University in September.

He came to the University of Delaware in 1941 as head of the philosophy faculty, but from 1942 to 1945 he was on leave from Delaware to join the Hercules Powder Company's staff, preparing technical bibliographies and translations, and administering the technical library.

Dr. Beck is a native of Georgia and holds an A. B. degree from Emory University and two graduate degrees from Duke University. He taught at Emory before coming to Delaware. A new translation of Kant's ethical writings will be published by Dr. Beck next year. He is a former president of the American Philosophical Association and now is chairman of its national committee on employment.

Dr. Francis H. Squire, dean of the university, said that a successor to Dr. Beck at Delaware would be appointed soon.

TEACHERS ADVISE ON NEW UNIT

NHS Staff In Final Workshop Of School Term

In designing the new elementary school here, the suggestions of teachers are not being overlooked, Supt. Wilmer E. Shue said this week.

Pointing out that it is the teachers who will be most concerned with the classroom lay-out and new features embodied in the building, he said the faculty's ideas are being given prime consideration.

A discussion of plans for the new school marked the final session of this term of the in-service teacher training workshop. The session, which was held last week, gave faculty members the opportunity to make specific suggestions on the design and equipment of their own rooms in the new school.

In a review of the accomplishments of the workshop sessions the past year, Supt. Shue said the program had proved highly profitable. The program, he said, aims at acquainting faculty members with new techniques and procedures in teaching specific subjects.

During the term, the elementary staff devoted its workshop to the fields of reading and language-arts. A number of graphic demonstrations of new and more effective methods of teaching these vital subjects were given at the series of meetings.

The high school workshop dealt with such phases of the curriculum as English, mathematics, social studies and laboratory work.

Cooperating with the teachers on the project were several members of the faculty at the University of Delaware. Miss Rena Allan worked with the elementary staff and Dr. Milosh Muntyan, the high school teachers. W. Earl Armstrong, Dean of the School of Education, supervised the program. In addition, Supt. Shue and Frederick B. Kutz, principal of the High School, were also responsible for much of the organization work.

A dead chicken is similar to a hole in the pocket. A chicken that dies before it produces enough eggs to pay for the cost of rearing represents a serious financial loss to the poultry industry, says J. Frank Gordy, extension poultry specialist for the University of Delaware.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates that about 20 per cent of the hens of laying age in the United States are victims of early mortality. The Delaware Agricultural Extension Service is aiding Delaware egg producers in keeping their laying flock mortality down below the national figure. However, cites Gordy, the 17 per cent mortality figure for Delaware last year is still too high.

Among the production practices stressed by Gordy are the use of disease-free chicks of high resistant strains, care in keeping disease from being introduced from other farms, and avoiding of crowding the chicks—allowing approximately 3 1/2 sq. ft. floor space per broiler chick started and 1 sq. ft. for replacement stock.

Also recommended is vaccination of chicks in areas where Laryngotracheitis or Fowl Pox is prevalent. Keep young and old stock separated during growing period. Cull constantly, says Gordy, and control rats. Dispose of dead birds by burning or burying promptly. And when symptoms of disease appear, don't guess, but get an accurate diagnosis. Following these production practices will help lower mortality of chicks.

DR. BAUSMAN ISSUES FINAL DRIVE TOTALS

\$6,612 Netted Here In March By Red Cross

A final report on the Red Cross drive conducted here during March was released this week by Dr. R. O. Bausman, general drive chairman for the Newark area. The figures include full returns from all zones.

The total amount collected was \$6,612, a surplus of \$612 over the \$6,000 quota.

The number of persons contributing was 2,135, or 17 per cent of the area's population. This was an increase of 159 over 1947, when only 15 per cent of the people in the area contributed.

Newark, Dr. Bausman said, ranks second in the state for percentage of persons contributing.

Zeitler Guernsey Sets State Champion Mark
Peter Zeitler, Glasgow, has made a state champion record on his registered Guernsey cow, Fancy Rilma Princess. Her production of 9725 pounds of milk and 544 pounds of butterfat is the highest record in the state made by a five-year-old milked twice daily for a ten-month period.

The sire of this cow C. F.'s Fancy Rilma King, owned by Peter Zeitler, Glasgow, Del., has five daughters in the Performance Register of The American Guernsey Cattle Club.

State Poultry Output Figures For 1947 Given

The 1947 gross income for chickens, eggs, turkeys, and commercial broilers for Delaware farmers amounted to \$57,996,000. This is about three per cent below the record high of \$59,767,000 in 1946. Of the total gross income 85 per cent was from broilers, nine per cent from eggs, five per cent from chickens and one per cent from turkeys.

Egg production in 1947 amounted to 127,000,000 compared with 138,000,000 in 1946. Gross income from farm eggs in 1947 was \$5,408,000 compared with \$4,878,000 in 1946.

The number of chicks produced by commercial hatcheries in Delaware during 1947 is estimated at 34,131,000 compared with 29,350,000 chicks hatched in 1946.

ACCIDENT PEAK FOR FARMERS

Haying Season Top Period For Farm Hazards

"The approach of the haying season on Delaware farms ushers in that period of the year when accidents to farm people occur most frequently," asserts Jack P. Bell, agricultural engineer for the Delaware Extension Service. According to the records of the National Safety Council, the peak of such accidents is reached in July and August so it behooves farm people to take extra precautions to insure safety of this time of the year.

To reduce hazards and thus avoid disastrous losses, Mr. Bell suggests the following:

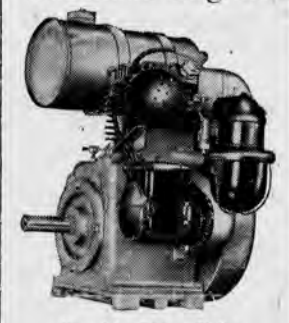
1. Carefully check all equipment for defective hitch, ropes, pulleys, lifts, hay racks or ladders. Loft floors should be put in good repair and hay chutes guarded.
2. Make starts and stops gradually in all haying operations and watch out for falls from hay racks and hay mows.
3. Machinery should be stopped and thrown out of gear before oiling, adjusting, or unclogging, and safety guards should be kept in place at all times.
4. Pitchforks are dangerous, always place them where they are in plain sight of all workers. Never throw a pitchfork.
5. Do not wear loose or ragged clothing which may catch easily in moving machinery.
6. Damp hay is one of the principal causes of barn fires. Be sure that the hay is well cured. Check regularly for several weeks for any signs of heating.

Delaware farmers desiring to participate in this group should go to their local Agricultural Conservation Association Office to file for this program which provides practice payments and materials for farm conservation. County offices are located in Newark, Dover and Georgetown.

LEVY COURT IS TOPIC AT ROTARY CLUB

County Group's History Traced By C. C. Wood

The history and development of the Levy Court was outlined by Clement C. Wood, Levy Court attorney, at the weekly dinner meeting of the Newark Rotary Club on Monday night. President William S. Hamilton presided, and the program chairman was Samuel Handloff.

Pointing out that the Levy Court is not a court in the strict legal sense of the term but actually the governing body of New Castle County, Mr. Wood said that the organization was first formed 39 years before the American Revolution, although it was not until 1793 that the state legislature provided for the regular election of its members.

An interesting sidelight in its history, Mr. Wood said, is the fact that in 1787 the Court refused to levy a tax on the grounds that it already had sufficient funds to govern the county for the year. This was, even then, a novel practice for any governing body, he said.

During its history, the Court has played a large part in the development of the county schools. Its largest expenditures now are for public welfare. Last year, Mr. Wood stated, the cost of operating the county government through the Levy Court was two million dollars.

Under the present system, the Court is composed of three men, elected to six year terms, staggered every two years.

Guest at the meeting was Hugh Fairclough, member of the New Castle Rotary Club.

President Hamilton appointed a two-man committee, composed of Ernest Nachod and Jerry Weinberg, to work with the local V. F. W. in its current campaign to erect a war monument here.
