One Hundred Dollars Reward.

RAN away from the subscriber on Friday night last, the 11th inst. a Negro Woman named GLOE, about thirty-five or forty years of age, and took with her, her two daughters, MILLEY, aged about twelve years, and ROSETTA, aged about nine. Cloe had on when she went away a blue and white striped lincey woolsey petticoat, country made; a Kersey jacket twilled, striped with white and black yarn; oznaburg shift; took with her one other jacket and petticoat, twilled, lincey woolsey, striped with blue, black, and a kind of red colored yarn; three other shifts of oznaburg, or tow linen, and petticoats half worn of the same, with two flannel petticoats; also, took with her three flannel cotton gowns, one of them a dark ground, with a large white flower in it, the other two of a dark clouded ground, one of them very much faded, and I believe, when new had a green sprig on it; the other had formerly a dark sprig on it; one black fluff gown of Joas spinning; one short gown and petticoat of fleecing mullin; one short gown of striped cotton, blue and white; one checked mullin apron; and one man's hat; with sundry other cloths of her mistress, unknown to me at this time. She is a bright milky, of a morpheved complexion, about 5 feet 5 or 6 inches high, stout and well made, black eyes, her upper teeth are very much decayed. She has a mark on one of her cheeks owing to a pain in her jaw, which broke through the flesh, and left a scar on the outside, which as well as recollected, is on the right, though it may be on the left. She has a well as I recollect a small scar on the forehead which appears like a burn; she has a large suit of wool, long and black when combed back, has also a sharp look and brazen face, when spoken to. Her husband passes in this county for a freeman, he was sold out of gaol in Dorechester county, taken up as a runaway, and sold for his prison fees, some years ago, by the Sheriff of said county, who bought him, and after serving him several years had his time given up to him; he calls himself James Green, has a pair from Dr. James Sullivan, and Robert Sullivan, sons of the deceased, living at New-Market, in said county, to work for himself; the pair is only to labour in said county. He is forty years of age, 5 feet 5 or 6 inches high, stout and well made, his wearing apparel unknown to me, he can read and write tolerably well.

GLOE's eldest Daughter MILLEY, is of a dark complexion, her father being black; she has a mark on one of her cheeks, not perceivable without being closely examined, also several marks on her back from misconduct; a bad sore on her hand where the cut herself with a pen knife, between her fore fingers, some bald places on her head, owing to burns when in her infancy; a very impudent, sharp, cunning looking girl. Had on when she went away a tow shift, and green braize petticoat; other clothes to me unknown at present.

ROSETTA had on and took away with her two shifts, one of oznaburg, and the other country tow linen, one new tow petticoat, one black fluff petticoat, and one new cotton jacket, striped copper- and white. She has a pleasing countenance, bushy head of wool, and had one of her fingers on her right hand cut across the joint, when a baby, by accident, the scar of which is to be seen very plain. She has three or four places bald on her head, from being burnt when young.

From the Madras Courier, 15th May, 1799.

The fall of the capital of Mysore, was announced to the public on Saturday morning, by a royal salute from the garrison, and from his Majesty's ship Braave; and at sunset, a royal salute was fired at the mountain by the saluting battery at Fort St. George—by his Majesty's ship Braave—by the honorable company's ship, and by the private ships and vessels in the roads—a feu de joie was also fired by the troops in garison; after which the whole of the cannon mounted on Fort St. George, and on the wall of the Black town, were fired; thus impressing on the mind and memory of every one who has the happiness to live under the British government, an heroic deed, which reflects the highest honor on the British troops, who so gallantly achieved it.

June 8.

On Thursday the 6th inst. anchored in the harbour, the honorable company's cruise, the Antelope, captain Selby, in 28 days from the Straits of Babelmandel.

By this opportunity we learn that Commodore Blanket, with his Majesty's ship Leopard and Orettes sloop arrived at Mocha, on the 13th April. We also hear that the French at Suez had fitted out the four dows which they had seized there as formerly noticed and manned them with the intention of taking possession of some Arab vessels which were at the island of Shadwan; but that in making the attack one of the French dows blew up and the rest retreated: the Centurio and Albatros were at Shadwan in the beginning of May, but were soon expected at Mocha, and it was thought they would bring some further particulars of that and other occurrences in the upper Gulf.

By the Arab ship Suffenatal Nubec, arrived on the 6th inst. in eleven days from Mulcat, we learn that when the left that port, some dows had arrived there from a port or ports of Tippoo's coast, with three elephants, and a casket of jewels, intended to be offered by that prince to the present regent or king of Persia; and, through the same channel of intelligence, we learn that Tippoo's agents had spread a report at Mulcat of his having given a very serious defeat to our army, as, in his hyperbolic language, to have made it fly for many cofs. These circumstances afford, were it necessary, additional proofs of the vigilance of our late enemy, and of his inveterate animosity to the British name.

From the Bombay Courier, June 22.

A letter from Seringapatam, dated 26th of May, mentions that of the jewels, not above 6 or 7 lacks of pagodas worth had been then valued; and as to the merchandize, viz. muslins, shawls, and various rich cloths, they were reckoned at the enormous amount of 500 camel's load. The Sultan's throne being too unwieldy to carry had been broken up; it was a howdah upon a tyger covered with the gold: the ascent to it was by silver steps, gilt, having silver nails and all the other trappings of the same metal. The canopy was alike superb and decorated with a costly fringe of pearls all around it. The eyes and teeth of the tyger were of glass. It was said that a dividend to the value of about a million sterl. would soon be made; part of it to the amount of 17 lacks of pagodas, in cash, the rest in jewels; a committee had had been appointed for the arrangement of it.

Other advices from Seringapatam dated the 17th of May, mention that in the breaking up of the throne, which its bulk and weight rendered necessary, the sheet of gold with which it was covered was found to weigh 40,000 pagodas; the silver work about it, the supporters of the canopy and the fringe of pearls which were round it, were valued at 10,000 pagodas more. Every inch of the howdah contained an Arabic sentence chiefly from the koran, superbly stamped, being raised and polished in the most beautiful manner. A gold figure of a bird, covered over with the most precious stones, was screwed to the roof of the canopy; its beak is a large emerald; its eyes carbuncles; the breast covered with diamonds, and the wings, which are expanded as if hovering, completely lined with diamonds; on the back are many large jewels well and fancifully disposed; the tail which resembles a peacock's is also studded in the same manner; the whole to be arranged as to imitate the plumage, and to celestly let that the gold is scarce visible.

Official advices have been received by government, that a deputation of the friends of the house of Orange at Amsterdam, had been received by General Abercrombie, pro-

viding their active aid in reinstating the Stadtholder;—and that part of the province of West Friesland, Middenbick, Hoorn, &c. had followed the example of the loyal friends of the Republic, and had shaken off the yoke which French superiority, and Dutch pusillanimity had fixed upon them.

The Orange flag is flying on the whole coast, as far as Egmont, and in the interior country.

A flotilla has been ordered by Ad. Mitchell, into the Zuyder Zee, to assist the military operations.

The Dutch ships taken in the Texel, &c. are on their voyages to England, for repair and safe keeping.

Seven sail of Russian Men of War, with about 6000 troops have arrived at Yarmouth Roads, are to proceed immediately for Holland, 20,000 more passed Elbeur two days before them. The combined forces in Holland, will exceed 70,000 men.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 8. Latest from Europe.

By the Washington, from Yarmouth; and the Three Brothers, from Hamburg.

STUTTGARD, September 1.

Sztarray is hastily advancing with an army of 20,000 men, and every where preparations are making for the reception of his troops, and to furnish them with bread and forage; the advanced guard it already arrived at Kalw. A new army of the Rhine is organizing under the archduke, which will consist of 50,000 men. A courier from the Archduke to prince Conde has passed through here, on his way to Prague, to desire him to hasten his march to Bamberg, and there to embark, for the lake of expedition.

The imperial magazines at Heilbrunn had been removed before the French arrived there: they left that place again, on receiving a contribution of 80,000 florins. A printer in that city was shot in his own house.

OSNABRUCK, Sept. 7.

The 3 battalions of Prussians quartered here, and the hussars in the neighborhood of this city, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march. The whole corps, which is advancing, is commanded lieutenant general de Schlöden, and consists of 10,000 men. They are marching towards Wesel.

PARIS, Sept. 3.

It is ascertained that Jean Bon Saint Andre has escaped from the forrels in which the Turks had confined and that he is arrived at Toulon.

Citizen Adet has not accepted his appointment of commissioner at St. Domingo.

The journal des Hommes Libres of this day says, that St. Gall is in the hands of the French.

Our papers contain accounts from Genoa, dated August 21, stating, that the French head quarters are at present before the gates of Genoa. The hospitals in that place are to be removed to Nice, and from thence to Toulon. A great many individuals are flying to Nice, to which place our troops are also retreating. The unfortunate soldiers are in want of the first necessities. Several divisions have been without bread for three or four days, and at the battle of Novi there were many soldiers who were in that predicament.

Two thousand prisoners who were taken in the above action, have been sent to Nice. No Russians, however, would be made prisoners.

Ancona is said to have capitulated. Three ships of the line, formerly Venetians, are lying at Toulon, ready to sail. They are laden with provisions, and said to be destined for Malta.

There are now in all 90 ships of war lying in Brest waters.

They write from Strasburg, under the date of the 19th Aug. that the passage of the Rhine has not taken place, but it is announced by the proclamations of general Moller of the 23d, the one to his army to recommend discipline, and the other to the inhabitants of the right border, promising safety and protection.

The head quarters of the army of the Alps is at Eubrun. It was there that Championnet received his appointment to the chief command of the two united armies.

The head quarters of the army of Italy has returned to Corneghiano, near Genoa, on the 18th Aug.

It is reported that Championnet has obtained a very considerable advantage.

The son of the duke of Deux Pont was killed in one of the actions in Switzerland.

General Macdonald is arrived by sea at Toulon.

Vatar, the printer of the Journal des Hommes libres, is declared by the jury in a state of acquiescence.

All French vessels have been forced to abandon precipitately the coasts of Sardinia,

where they were refused provisions. The English privateers alone enjoy the protection, a favourable reception, and the friendship of the inhabitants.

On the day of the battle of Novi, Joubert had the picture of his young bride, to whom he had been married a fortnight, hung round his neck, with a gold chain. He showed it to his officers, saying, "I shall conquer, for I have promised it to the republic and to her, or I shall die." General Grouchy, who was taken prisoner, is since dead of his wounds.

Admiral Bruix is arrived here, with the Spanish admiral Maderado.

Reynard, or minister for foreign affairs has denounced the municipality of Toulon to the directory, on account of the ill treatment he experienced from them while he was in city.

Talleyrand is talked of to be minister of the finances; Robert Linder, minister of the interior; and Bourgoing is to return ambassador to Madrid.

The first division of Russian troops (13,681 of whom have passed the Sound,) are said to have arrived in Holland. The third expedition, commanded by the duke of York is also said to have failed from England.

The Prussian ambassador to the court of St. James's, baron Jacobi, is gone to Dretzen.

LONDON, Sept. 9.

Expedition to the Texel.

The embarkation of the troops now under orders for Holland, is continued with the utmost activity, and several thousand of them will sail immediately under the orders of the duke of York.

The easterly wind which prevailed yesterday must have prevented the duke of York and his army from sailing. They are completely ready to sail the first possible minute.

His royal highness prince William of Gloucester, and the Earl of Chatham, take their departure for Holland in the Amethyst frigate capt. Cooke.

Yesterday captains Hearn and Flynn, of Yarmouth, who have attended the expedition, arrived at Walmer Castle, with dispatches from vice admiral Mitchell to the right hon.
