

CEREMONY TO MARK ANNUAL REUNION

Graduates To Honor Alumni Now In Armed Service Of U. S.

The annual Homecoming for alumni of the University of Delaware will be held here on Saturday, Oct. 18.

A special feature of this year's homecoming will be an impressive ceremony which will take place on Frazer Field between the halves of the football game between Dickinson and Delaware, at which time this game will be dedicated to all University of Delaware alumni who are now on active duty in the U. S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, as well as to the memory of Major John E. Mortimer, a graduate of the University of Delaware in the class of 1924, who died last May at Windy Hill, South Carolina, while on maneuvers. Major Mortimer was plans and training officer for the 67th Coast Artillery.

All alumni of the University who are on active duty in the various branches of the armed forces of this country have been invited to attend the dedication ceremony as guests of the University. As soon as the first half ends these men, who are requested to attend in uniform, will form at one end of the field and march to near the center. The university band will march to a point near the center of the field from the other end. Dr. Walter Hüllihen, president of the University, will then make a brief talk lauding the alumni in service. When he finishes speaking, the band will play the national anthem as the American flag will be raised.

Immediately after the football game a tea dance will be held in the lounge of Old College, and emphasis is placed on the fact that the Homecoming is the one reunion of the year to which wives and friends of the alumni are invited. At 8:30 p. m. a banquet will begin in the Commons of Old College. Joseph M. McVey of Newark will be toastmaster, and while there will be a principal speaker, many guests of prominence will be introduced.

MUSICAL NOTES

A slender blond girl at the controls of a five-ton tractor, snaking a load of logs down a rough woods road—this was the sight that met the eyes of natives of the Tupper Lake district in the Adirondacks recently at the Stanley Sisson logging camp at Sperry Pond. The comely young lady at the controls was Eleanor Steber, soprano of the Metropolitan Opera, who was spending a few days at her cottage in the vicinity. Miss Steber's vacation was a brief one as she had to hurry off to sing the role of Marguerite in "Faust" in Havana on September 30 with the Gran Compañía Internacional de Opera, where she had an ovation equal to that accorded the veterans Pinza and Kullman. She returned to the United States immediately to begin a heavy schedule of concerts, broadcasts, and opera.

Ernest McChesney, the American tenor, is one of the first artists scheduled for the season for a Town Hall recital in New York. He sings there October 22. Well known through concert tours, radio, and opera, McChesney is already established as one of the most outstanding young singers with complete American training.

Superstitious? Maybe not, but Fate seems to have directed the course of many a concert venture. John McCrae, baritone, of the Nine O'Clock Opera Company, recently explained how this unique organization came into existence. The group is composed of Juilliard Music School graduates and had given performances of operas in English at Chautauqua. Invited later to give excerpts from the "Marriage of Figaro" at a New York evening musical, they decided that it seemed rather uninteresting without some explanation of the story. Hence David Otto worked out a commentator's part. The guests at the musical were so delighted that they persuaded the singers to give a Town Hall performance. This was done with the idea that the novelty would appeal to the public but not expecting the warm praise critics bestowed upon them. Town Hall thus launched them on their career, and this season they have already some 33 dates throughout the country.

NEWS IN THE WORLD OF RELIGION BY W.W. REID

Warren Memorial Presbyterian Church, Louisville, Ky., has found that some of the New England boys stationed at Fort Knox and at Bowman Field were "a little bit homesick." So on Saturday evenings the church members have been entertaining them with dinner and games. They plan to entertain one hundred soldiers on an evening.

In more than fifty needy centers in seventeen states the "Church Army," an organization of young men and women of the Protestant Episcopal Church, are carrying on home mission and humanitarian services under the direction of the National Council of the denomination. Commissioned by Presiding Bishop Tucker as "captains" and "mission sisters," they lead a simple and sacrificial life, serving in city slums, in mining, mill and mountain communities, in isolated rural sections, and among underprivileged and migrant peoples. Often they gather the nucleus of new churches. The Church Army was established in England in 1882, and in the United States in 1927. It is now considered one of the outstanding methods of reaching unchurched people.

A citizens committee, composed of representative Jews, Catholics and Protestants in Brooklyn Borough, New York City, has cited three Brooklynites for awards as having "done the most for inter-faith unity" during the past year. The Flatbush Council of Religious Goodwill organized the committee. The awards go to: Oscar A. Lewis, attorney, chairman of the Brooklyn Jewish Community Council and promoter for inter-creedal understanding; David F. Soden, government official, sponsor of outings for crippled and orphaned children; and Dr. J. Henry Carpenter, executive secretary of the Brooklyn Church and Mission Federation.

Following the experimental work of

Doctor Collier and McKean, in the noted Presbyterian Leper Asylum in Thailand (Siam), in which they appear to have demonstrated that the ordinary diphtheria toxoid is also a specific for leprosy—at least in its earliest stages—the Rev. George W. Harley, M. D., superintendent of the Ganta (Methodist) Mission in the interior of Liberia, has begun toxoid treatment of a group of lepers in the colony he conducts there. A large number of other American medical missionaries in Africa, in the territories where leprosy is most pronounced, have also undertaken to experiment with the new remedy. The course of injections is given in addition to the regular chaulmoogra oil treatment—hitherto the best available specific for the disease.

The American Bible Society is the principal source of supply of scriptures for war prisoners in German camps, and other places in Europe. It has distributed Bibles, Testaments and Gospels in English, French, Italian, Dutch, Polish, Russian, Czech, Hebrew, Yiddish and Finnish. The Netherlands Bible Society is cut off from practically all the continent except Portugal and its capacity to support its world-wide work is being reduced; the French Society is also cut off from its large constituency in Southern France. The

American Bible Society, through its War Emergency Fund, is endeavoring to save the work of these Bible societies during this crisis.

More than any other Protestant church in the United States the Lutherans have developed broadcasting as a means of spreading the Gospel message in this country. Lutheran ministers scores of centers broadcast on Sunday and during the week, and their messages are received in some of the most inaccessible rural places as well as in the cities. Now the Lutheran Laymen's League has signed a contract with the Pan-American Broadcasting Company which will carry the "Lutheran Hour" to 59 important stations in 16 countries in South and Central America. Each station will broadcast the program in Spanish, and a number will release it in English.

HIGHWAYS IMPORTANT TO FARMER

Enable Them To Compete With Other States

Delaware farms are largely mechanized, thus enabling them to produce in direct and successful competition with the farmers of other states, according to a statement made today by H. V. Daniel, Secretary, Associated Petroleum Industries of Delaware.

"The tractor and the stationary engine have served to make Delaware farms more productive but it has been the growing ownership and operation of motor vehicles which has enabled farmers to rush their products to profitable markets where they meet a ready demand," Mr. Daniel stated. "Unless our farmers are able to get their perishable products to market speedily and with economy, the time element would completely nullify the natural productivity of our fine farmlands."

"Today it may surprise many to know that 76 per cent of our farmers own motor cars and about 25 per cent own trucks. Every large farm owns both units of transportation. Obviously, good roads, cheap motor fuel and reasonable taxes are most essential to the general prosperity of a state that depends so largely on the purchasing power and stability of a substantial rural population."

"Under these conditions it is evident that the keen interest displayed by the State Grange and intelligent and interested farmers in the diversion of motor tax revenues to purposes other than highway improvement is sincere and based on sound economics."

"Farmers are currently expressing fear that the operation of the 'One-Fund' Act will serve further to increase diversion trends that have been extreme. The voting strength of those farmers who lean so heavily on motor vehicles will undoubtedly be a major influence in the proposed repeal of the 'One-Fund' Act and in the enactment of a Constitutional Amendment which will, for all time, eliminate non-highway use of motor tax revenues."

MALLARDS HEADING SOUTH, POPULAR, WARY GAME BIRD

Greenheads Found In Every State, Offers Test For Hunters; Established Reputation As Table Delicacy

When the hunters look from their blinds to spot their first flock of wild ducks on October 1, the opening day of the 1941 migratory waterfowl hunting season in northern States, the mallard will be prominent among the game birds testing the hunters' ability, it is reported by the Fish and Wildlife Service, United States Department of the Interior.

The greenhead, as the mallard is popularly called, is one of the most popular wild ducks in the country. It is probably the best known duck because of its wide distribution, being found in every State. Its popularity is attributed to its large size, its reputation as a table delicacy, and its wily nature, which appeals to sportsmen.

"It adapts itself rapidly to changes wrought in its environment by man," states Robert C. McClanahan, Service biologist. "When hunted persistently, the mallard becomes extremely wary and develops nocturnal habits."

Arthur C. Bent, famous ornithologist, describes the mallard as an active, wary bird well worth prominence among game birds.

Sportsmen delight in watching the mallard as it takes off in flight at the first sound of alarm. It springs out of the water at a single bound, straight into the air like an autogiro, and after it has attained sufficient height to clear the surrounding brush and trees, it flies off swiftly in a direct line.

In winter, the bird is found throughout the United States but its principal breeding grounds are in the northwestern and prairie States, Alaska, and in Canada from the Great Lakes to the Athabaska and Mackenzie drainages.

A hardy bird, the mallard is one of the leaders in the migration north each spring. It "pushes" spring, getting into the northern areas just as fast as the ice breaks up on the sloughs, ponds, and streams on which it alights during migration. This habit of getting in as cold weather leaves a region has led sportsmen to call the early migrants "ice mallards."

Within 3 or 4 weeks, the birds have arrived on the breeding grounds. Courtship is conducted largely on the wing. Two or three males may be pursuing a female, when suddenly the female will touch a drake with her bill and the two fly off together.

In water, the drake will swim about the female bowing and bobbing his head in nervous jerks, until she responds with her bows.

Eggs are laid early in May, usually in nests located on or near the edge of a marsh or slough. Often, however, a female bird will build her nest on the open prairie, many miles from water. Normally, the mallard lays only one set of 8 to 12 eggs.

Incubation is performed entirely by the female and lasts from 23 to 29 days. As soon as the young are hatched and the downy coats are dried, the female takes her brood to the nearest water.

Until the young are old enough to fly, the female protects her offspring from all danger, even at risk of her life. The drake, however, assumes no family responsibilities. As soon as the eggs are laid, it flies off to join small flocks of drakes that summer together.

By fall, young and old are ready for

the southward migration, the greater part of which takes place late in September and during October.

It is then that the mallard pits its knowledge against the gunners in marshes, sloughs, and lakes.

Although it is a fresh water bird, it must go in bays and rivers in Greenland, Alaska, on the northern Pacific Coast, and in New England. On the Atlantic seaboard, however, the mallard is not so numerous as its close cousin, the black duck, sometimes called the black mallard.

En route, the flocks of wild mallards stop to feed in grainfields, and along small lakes and potholes surrounded by forests and brush where acorns and beechnuts are available. On the West Coast many mallards feed on dead salmon and salmon eggs obtained in the pools of rivers.

The bird's wariness and its ability to adapt itself to changing conditions imposed by man have been in great part responsible for its ability to maintain its numbers better than many other species of wild ducks.
