Caroline Lusardi Named Miss Newark By Jaycees

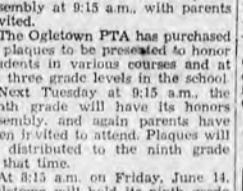

M. Katharine Jones To Retire This June As Home Ec Extension Agent For County

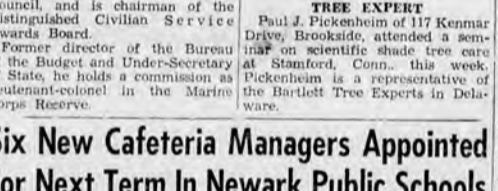

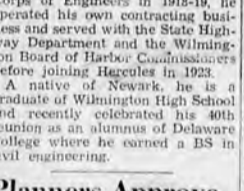

Katharine Jones Advises

On Fabric Fire Hazards

Clothing and other fabrics, accidentally ignited, can cause severe burns and dangerous home fires.

The first preventive is to see that matches and inflammable liquids are properly used. The second step is to treat fabrics with flame-resistant solutions to retard spreading, says M. Katharine Jones, New Castle County extension agent in home economics.

English Classes Textbook Changes Planned By Group
A new set of English textbooks for grades one through six is planned for the Newark school district, and a textbook selection committee has been working out the details. The committee is headed by Dr. Ramon C. Cobbs. The committee includes Mrs. Beatrice Derickson, Mrs. Mary Fox, Mrs. Grace Gibb, Mary Keppler, Mrs. Mac Leasure, Sidney McClain, Mrs. Kathleen Rivers, Mrs. Olive Ryland, and Mrs. Barbara Stepnek. The committee began the task with nine sets of materials from as many publishers. Each book at each grade level, together with its accompanying teacher's manual, had to be read and evaluated by the group. After discussion and review of books, the committee settled on two series. They recommended that either series would be acceptable to teachers of this district and that the final choice should be made as soon as possible by building principals. Dr. Cobbs noted that the committee expressed hope that building principals would implement adoption of one or the other of these textbook series as rapidly as they can. During the final session, Dr. Cobbs presented thanks to the group from all of teachers and students who will benefit from the work which this committee has done during the present school year.

Speaking of Money...
You've Changed Your Spending Habits

SPEAKING OF INSECTS

with DALE BRAY
ENTOMOLOGIST

Many of our human pests are insects. Some are very common and some are very rare. Insects are everywhere and they are always just the right size. The bagworm feeds on a great many kinds of plants, but it seems to prefer evergreens. If bagworms chew all the foliage from any of these trees the trees usually die.

When the bagworm reaches full growth, the bag usually is about two inches long. Inside these bags, the worms change to pupae in September. A few days later they change again — this time to adults; the males emerging as small black moths, and the females remaining in their cases as wingless moths. After mating, the females produce several dozen eggs, but they do not lay the eggs. Instead, they die, and their bodies serve as sacks to house the eggs. This is the winter stage — inside the bag where the eggs are safe from birds and most other enemies.

In spite of the protection by the bag, some enemies do get in. Tiny wasps and flies lay eggs through the case and these eventually destroy the bagworm. In early June, the surviving eggs hatch and the young caterpillars crawl out of the old bag. Each one spins a silken case about its body. Then as it feeds on leaves it attaches bits of the leaves to its case thus starting the cycle over again. To control this pest on a small plant, you can count on hand-picking. Don't just pick them — burn them after they are picked. On large plants, spray in mid-June with Sevin. The larger the bagworms become the more difficult it is to kill them with insecticides. This is true for nearly all insects.
